ALARMING FIGURES.

In a statistical analysis of British past year, just issued by the Board of Trade, there are some figures, ominous for the future, showing a steady in crease in the departure of the native born and an equally steady increase in the arrival of for-eigners taking up permanent residence

In 1904, 271,435 British born emigrated. Of these 65 per cent. were English, 14 per cent. Scotch and 21 per cent. Irish. Seventy per cent. of these were either skilled artizans, agriculturalists or belonged to commerce and the professions—nearly 200,000 of the best of the country's population and a considerable in-crease over 1902 and 1903. Of foreign-ers from various European countries entered as immigrants the number was 32,345 as compared with 69,168 in 1903 and 66,471 in 1902. Over half of these tinuance. 




