PAUL KRUGER, BOER EX-PRESIDENT, IS DEAD.

Died Thursday in Switzerland--Britain Will Be Asked to Allow Him to be Buried in the Transvaal.

CLARENS, Switzerland, July 14--Paul Kruger, former president of the Transvaal Republic, died here at 3 o'clock this morning from pneumonia and supervening heart weakness.

Mr. Kruger, who was staying at the Villa du Boiche, had been gradually failing for a long time, but he was able to attend to the extension of the Transvaal. In the meantime they will be temporarily interred here.

PARIS, July 14--The death of the former president of the Transvaal, Paul Kruger, at Clarens, Switzerland, aroused widespread regret here owing to French sympathy for the Boer cause.

He was a man of great energy and courage. He killed more lions than any one else. As he grew older he became a leader in councils and in fight. He became field cornet and member of the Volksraad.

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WOODSTOCK CARNIVAL IN FULL SWING.

Procession in the Forenoon Was Very Creditable--Track Record Broken in Afternoon's Races.

(Special to the Sun.) WOODSTOCK, N. B., July 12.—The mid-summer carnival opened today under most favorable circumstances. There was a shower last night which nicely laid the dust, and this morning the weather was all that could be wished for. People began to flock into town early in the morning, and each following train added its quota to the already crowded streets. At noon the special excursion train from the north came in with eight cars jammed full. There must have been fully 800 people on this train. The town is entertaining more people than at any previous celebration for years past.

PARLIAMENT.

HONOR 12th OF JULY.

Fine Weather All Over the Provinces Made the Many Events Successful--Big Celebrations in Nova Scotia.

OTTAWA, July 11.—The house this morning took up the militia bill, which is the subject of the government's attention. Sir Frederick Borden explained parts of the measure, but the strain fell on Fitzpatrick, the minister of justice, and he explained the bill as follows: Sidney Fisher was conveniently absent and so was Laurier most of the time. Sir Fred. Borden read a cable received from the colonial secretary asking him to confer with the war office in regard to the bill. That was the reason the bill was left over last year. Since the bill had been introduced he had the opportunity of studying the subject, and he was anxious to follow the British system. Every-one would agree that the system in vogue in Canada since confederation did not work well. He wanted to blame the system and the officers commanding who had been sent here. There was a want of continuity under the present system. At present there were no records to show the reasons which had caused the various officers commanding to reach the conclusion they did. Under the new system the general officer commanding would be dispersed with the rank there would be a militia council. This council would be composed of the minister as chairman of the council, with four military men and two civilians, and everything that the council would do would be a matter of record, at any rate all conclusions would be recorded.

ORANGEMEN EVERYWHERE HONOR 12th OF JULY.

Fine Weather All Over the Provinces Made the Many Events Successful--Big Celebrations in Nova Scotia.

Owing to the misty weather as large a crowd did not attend the Orangemen's excursion to Gagetown as was expected. However, over three hundred people were on board when the Victoria turned her head up the river. At 8 o'clock the procession started from the Orange Hall, Gormain street, headed by the Boy's Brigade band, proceeded by way of Princess, King, Dock, Mill and Main streets to the upper end of the town. The tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford R. R., with the intention of wrecking a passenger train, Edward Stoddard, alias Michael J. Sullivan, entered an impassioned protest against continuance of the case to the October term. In spite of this his case was continued and counsel assigned to defend him, bail being fixed at \$2,000, which the prisoner was unable to furnish. Sullivan was brought to this city a week ago from New York, where he had been held as a fugitive from justice after having been arrested in Tunkhannock, Pa., from which place he said to have sent a letter to President Mellen of the New York, New Haven and Hartford R. R., offering to give details of an attempt at train wrecking. The specific charge in the writ of habeas corpus was that on the day that on the evening of May 30 he attempted to wreck a train near North Haven. The penalty for such an offence is 30 years in prison. Two men in the courtroom identified Stoddard as having been seen in North Haven on the night of May 30.

FROM THE CAPITAL.

FREDERICTON, July 12.—Graham L. O. L. of this city under escort of the militia was taken to the Gagetown, where he was surrounded with all the leading members of the department. Fowler, Kings, N. B., objected to the clause giving the governor-in-council power to call out the militia in case of defence and in case of emergency to send them beyond the boundaries of Canada. Mr. Fowler, who was backed up by Col. Hughes, took this as a matter of course and parliament should be called before a general calling out of the militia and certainly before troops could be sent out of the country. Mr. Fowler (Rev. Elgin) spoke against partisanship in the militia. In reply to Col. Hughes, Sir Frederick said he was of the opinion that the minister had the right to consult the governor-in-council, but it was when he was confronted with an order that the general officer commanding had made, that no officer was to approach him unless first obtaining the consent of the governor-in-council. He said he was of the opinion that the general officer commanding all that the minister had to do.

THE TRIP UP.

Early in the morning about two hundred Orangemen left the hall on Gormain street and at the boat were met by four hundred more at Oak Point in the Kingston Lodge, consisting of forty members, joined them.
