February 25 is the birthday of the Rt. Hon. Robert Bond, eminent New oundland statesman, 1857.

THE PASSING DAY

During the month of February the people of the great republic of North America celebrate the birthdays of Washington and Lincoln. With no less cause the people of Argentine Chile, Peru and Bolivia will observe today the anniversary of the birth of Jose de San Martin, "the purest patriot in bistory" and one of the greatest n history," and one of the greater nen that ever fought under the banne men that ever fought under the banne, of liberty. Statesmen as well as sold iers, Sam Martin was the true liberator of South America, and a thousand times more entitled to that designation than the haughty, selfish, ambitious and despotic tyrant, Bolivar. He was a victim of the proverbial ingratitude of republics, and died in poverty and exile.

Over the public buildings of Sofia the white, red and green banner of Bulgaria will fly today in recognition of the fifty-third birthday of the Bulgar Tsar, Ferdinand I. Although the day is a public holiday, there will be no rejoicing, for Bulgaria, which bore the brunt of the Balkan war, and paid, the highest price in blood and treasure is a nation plunged into the depths of grief and poverty. Down cheeks emaciated by starvation the bitter tears still flow for the fathers, brothers, sons, husbands and lovers, patriarchs and striplings, who marched bravely away to fight the hated Turk and came not back again. Victorious in battle, Bulgaria gained little from her trlumphs, and the dream of a vast empire ruled by the Bulgar Tsar has been shattered. While the men fought the women tilled the fields as best they might, but, without horses, there efforts were well nigh futile, and the Bulgars are starving. 
