ONLY MEAGRE ACCOUNTS OF BATTLE IN THE EAST; CZAR AND KA

No Word Yet of Decisive Result In Battles In Eastern War Theatre -Russians Driving Austrians from Their Positions Around Cracow and Capture of Town Expected Soon-Czar's Army in Control of Positions Protecting Carpathians-Changes Bring made in German Front in West and May Foreshadow Another Attempt to Get Through Line to French Ports.

London, Dec. 1.-The battle in Northern Poland, concerming the progress of which there has been so much mystery, is now being fought out under the eyes of the German Emperor, on the one side, and the Russian Emperor on the other. These two monarchs left for the front today; so that virtually all the heads of the nations which are at war are with their troops.

The King of England is in France; the King of Belgium, as usual, is spending all his time with his soldiers, while M. Poincare started today for another visit to the northern bat-

Official news from Poland continues to be scanty, and, with both headquarters claiming successes, it is impossible to say how the battle is going. Of its intensity, however, there can be no doubt.

The Germans, when they started for Warsaw, dashed full tilt into a mass of Russian troops and forced their way so far in that the Russians closed in on them. This was taken in Petrograd to mean that some of the German divisions had been cut off and that their surrender or annihilation was

It appears, however, that fighting for their very lives, and in the knowledge that a great defeat would end the German defensive and compel them to fall back on their own border, the German troops succeeded in breaking through the ssian lines at one place, and at another in holding their entrenchments against all the Russian attacks.

Their flanks are still being harrassed by the Cossacks, but seemingly the Russians are not in a position to gain the

sweeping victory they had anticipated.
RUSSIANS HOLD KEY TO SITUATION IN CARPATHIANS.

The losses, with the desperate fighting that has been going on for a fortnight, must necessarily be very heavy on both sides.

Against the Austro-German forces in the south, the Russians continue to gain more decisive results. They are now in possession of all the Austrian positions protecting the Carpathians, and are said to have arrived abreast of Cracow, while their captures for three weeks amount to fifty thousand men.

In the West, although the German official report says there is nothing to communicate, the French official statement notes a somewhat lively cannonade in Belgium, and German activity to the north of Arras. This may mean that the Germans have commenced, or are about to commence, another attempt to get through to the French ports. Certainly there are some important changes in the dispositions of the German troops, but what they foreshadow is known only to the German general staff.

Military men here take opposing sides, one side believing that the Germans will rest content with holding their present positions until the battle in Poland, where they need all the men they can get, is over, while the other looks for an immediate resumption of the battle in non-thern France and Flanders.

No New Developments on Battle Front In France and Belgium Yesterday-Fighting in West Taking Second Place Until Great Struggle in Poland and East Prussia Has Been Fought to Decision—Berlin Claims a Victory Near Lodz.

The fighting in the North of France and Belgium, has for the time being, assumed an aspect of minor importance, as compared with the battles in the East, where Russians and Germans are struggling for supremacy over miles of battlefront in Russian Poland and East Prussia.

Emperor William has already visited the German positions at Gumbinnen and Darkehmen, and by his presence has cheered the German troops to further efforts. Likewise the Russian Emperor has joined his troops at the front, with a similar object of urging them forward.

King George, of England, who, ever since the despatch of the expeditionary force to the continent has followed the fortunes of his soldiers with deep concern, is now paying them a personal visit, while the

The Allied forces in Northern France are again sustaining a heavy cannohading by the Germans, and mention is made in the French official statement of small advances, which means that the infantry are again operating. Otherwise conditions in this territory are comparatively quiet.



Officially the German report says the final result in Poland is still pending. Lemberg, Galicia, via Petrograd and London—The energetic Russian advance is persistently pushing back the Austrians into Cracow. Information reaching Lemberg from a trustworthy source is to the effect that the Austrians are evacuating position after position, with

It is stated that the Austrians' line of retreat is strewn so thickly with the dead that the Russians have not time to bury them. The cold is so severe that the bodies are frozen.

German officers are in supreme command at Cracow. They are placing machine guns, light artillery and wireless apparatus, it is reported, on the Cathedral and other historical edifices, drawing the fire of the Russians to these buildings.

Recent arrivals from provinces of Galicia state that the inhabitants of all the regions evacuated by the Austrians are facing familine.

PIT PROPS

PIT PROPS are the original hold-up gang. They appear to be pieces of timber so many feet long, and so many inches thick, and they have but one duty to perform, to stand up straight and carry the burden placed on their heads.

In coal mines where the men are piercing tunnels or opening new galleries these props are set in place as the work goes forward. The whole structure of the mine depends upon them and every prop has its own little section, to support. Should one weaken under the load, the roof, through natural disentegration, crumbles and falls, blocking the passages, suspending work, and generally playing havoc with the normal condition of mining activity.

It is not sufficient that one pit prop here and there should do its duty, they must all stand together in their own little spheres, each performing its share in the united task of maintaining stable conditions in the mine. Should one fall, its neighbors are forced to carry a heavier load, sometimes resulting in a serious collapse of the entire structure through the failure of one individual unit.



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. In unsurveyed territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district, must in all cases be made, and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after flung application.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500. Fee \$5. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$600.00 has been expended or paid and other requirements compliced with, the claim may be purchased at \$1 an acre. PLACING MINING CLAIMS are 500 feet long and from 1,000 to 2,000 feet wide. Emiry fee, \$5. Not less than \$100 must be expended in development work each year.

PREGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 as mile per annum. Royalty, 2 1.2 per cent. after the output exceeds \$10,000.


