EGG AND POULTRY MARKET
SYSTEMS ARE DENOUNCED
AT FARMERS' CONVENTION

Careless Disposal of Undrawn Fowl Floods Market for a Time and Breaks Prices—Egg Consumption Could be Increased if Excellent Quality Was Available—Immigration Problems Before the Farmers.

Fredericton, N. B., Mar. 9.—F. C. Ellford, of Ottawa, was the first speaker at the evening of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association, now in session here. Talking on poultry keeping he stated he could not understand why New Brunswick was so much more prominent as a poultry province than it was.

They must be marketed when ready as 75 per cent of all birds sold as table fowl were marketed in four or six weeks in the fall. There was no wonder that the market broke. The Maritime Province, he stated, insisted upon drawn birds on the market while in a drawn bird, the diseases which might exist could never be told as the head, the only means of telling the bird's health, had been removed.

Against Drawn Birds
P. G. R. Wilson, representative of the Dominion Poultry Division of Moncton, dealt with the marketing of poultry stating that undrawn birds were more healthy than drawn ones.

Protecting Roads
He also asked the co-operation of the farmers in the question of protecting the roads after improvements had been made. There was no greater menace to people travelling than allowing cattle to run at large on the highways.

Egg Marketing
At the present time he stated that the egg marketing system was better, but he stated that it should be improved by the introduction of a system of egg grading.

Immigration Problems
F. E. Sharp, Provincial Immigration Superintendent, who was called on to state that the question of immigration should be given a place on the programme. The Dominion Government controlled the immigration but the Provincial service supervised the people after arriving.

The Hon. Mr. Veniot
The Hon. F. J. Veniot, minister of public works approved of the idea of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Convention stating that it was one of the bodies which was broad-minded and liberal enough to allow the French speaking people of the Province equal privileges with the English-speaking people.

Northern Part of Province
In the past two weeks the North of the Province had been practically cut off from the remainder as far as rail road facilities were concerned and he asked those present to unite in the restoration of transportation service.

RESENT STIGMA OF DISEASE IN CANADA'S CATTLE

Members of Commons Discuss Embargo Question from Every Angle.

ABATTOIRS REMEDY CLAIMS ONE M. P.

Hon. Dr. Tolmie and the Premier Outline Situation from Government Side.

(Continued from Page 1.) There might be a possibility that British people feared that diseased cattle would be shipped to Great Britain by way of Canada. The embargo was no longer intended to be a stigma on Canadian cattle. Mr. Fielding contended that it was unfair to make it appear that the British Government was treating Canada in a mean manner. The British Government had the right to be wrong and he was willing to give them that right.

Dr. Clark. Dr. Michael Clark (Red Deer), had no sympathy with an attempt to force Canadian cattle into Great Britain with a crowbar. Canada ought to respect the wishes of the English people in this regard. If Canada needed a bigger market and it was admitted that the did, some inducement must be given to the English people to buy in Canada. At the present time, Manchurian, Argentine and Australian wheat was forcing Manitoba wheat out of the English market. This was also true of Canadian cattle. If Canadian cattle growers wished to get their cattle into Great Britain they must be prepared to reduce the tariff against British goods, and thus bring ships to Canada. Dr. Clark criticized the government for not reducing the tariff against British goods at the close of the war. As a free trader he would vote against the motion.

Hon. Dr. Tolmie. Hon. S. F. Tolmie, minister of agriculture said passage of the resolution might give the impression that Canada was satisfied with the embargo. This was not the case. He gave Canada a clean bill of health as far as the disease was concerned, and said that this country was in better shape in this respect than any other country in the world. In view of this the British Government should come out into the open and remove the stigma from the embargo and admit that the embargo was purely for the protection of the British cattle industry, and not to protect that industry from diseased cattle from Canada.

The prime minister further reminded the House that there had been protests by every Canadian Government since the embargo was put into effect. Mr. Peditow's amendment had not been the case. Canada rested her case on a promise given to Sir Robert Borden in 1917 that the embargo would be removed at the end of the war. The prime minister thought it was not proper for the House to launch a propaganda campaign against a policy followed by the British Government. Debate on the resolution was adjourned by Dr. Michael Clark (North Perth) and the House adjourned at six o'clock.

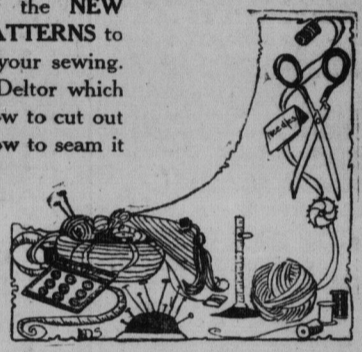

AROUND W Poor Outlook For Maine Shipyard

Few Contracts Have Been Secured and a Number of Yards Will be Idle.

There is a very poor outlook for shipbuilding this year in Maine yards, as very few contracts have thus far been secured, a number of yards where quite a business had been done the past year will make no attempt to probably start this season. Boothbay, especially has been hard hit by the prevailing depression in the ship industry, and the two prop yards at that place, the Atlantic and East Coast plants, where quite a number of large four-masted schooners have been turned out the three years ago are now absolutely dead, and it is said there is a possibility that the latter plant be turned into a chair factory, four-masted schooners are now idle at Boothbay Harbor all being in the Crowell & Thurlow yards at that place, the Atlantic and the Atlantic Ocean are new vessels, and have yet to make their cargoes, the owners having failed to secure profitable charters for them. It is said that at the present time the sailing vessels in the Crowell & Thurlow fleet are tied up for want of business.

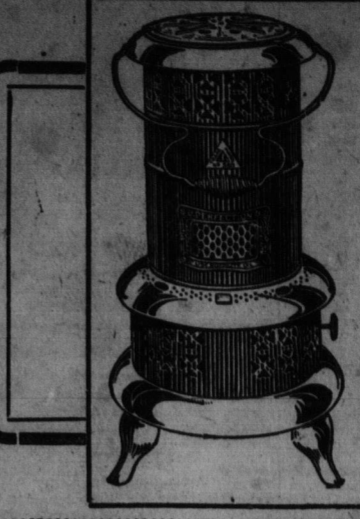
