THE DEBATE IN THE NEW BRUNSWICK SCHOOL QUESTION.

MR. DEVLIN'S SPEECH.

Mr. Devlin said he would be wanting to duty the one million and a half of Roman Catholics in this Dominion if he were to remain silent while 26,000 of them were knocking at the door of the House asking for common justice. He spoke on behalf of 26,000 Catholics who asked the privilege of educating their children according to the dictates of their conscience. It was not, in the power of this House to impose any law upon the Catholics of New Brunswick which would exempt them from the exercise of that right of the obligation to educate their children so that they might learn to know their God, to love and reverence Him, if he were called upon to address this House on behalf of the Protestant minority seeking justice at the hands of a majority of this kind, he would raise his voice louder on their behalf, and insist with all the power and strength he could bring to bear on the subject for that justice which he claimed for the Catholic minority of New Brunswick. He did not know what course the Government intended to pursue, but he would follow the Reform party for 20 years of his life, in all its trials and difficulties, and he would stand by them in their high and lofty and generous and independent spirit, and he would stand by them in the hour of difficulty. He did, therefore, expect as an honorable member of the Legislature that the Government would be and his friends were supporting would recognize the justice of the cause made by the big duties which as Catholics they would show by their acts that they were not content to be treated as second class citizens, and that wherever they found a fair and honest man they would support him, and place them upon an equality with all other citizens of the Dominion.

Canadian, British and Foreign.

[To the Associated Press.]

LONDON, March 13. A despatch to the Times from Berlin says large consignments of horses purchased by French dealers in East Prussia recently were stopped in transit at Berlin depot.

The Papal brief in answer to the address of the German Episcopate is published. It declares the Vatican decrees contain nothing which alters the relations of the Pope and Roman Catholics which can affect a protest for further opposing the church and interfering with the election of the next Pope.

A letter received by a Spanish house in this city states that twenty-two young men of Cuban birth, residents of Chicago, had been arrested in their homes in that city by volunteers, and without even the face of trial were shut outside the walls.

LONDON, March 16. NEWS RECEIVED THAT THE NATIVES OF ASSAM have massacred a missionary party consisting of a British Lieutenant and consisting of sixty-three sepoy and coolies.

THE HAMBURG AMERICAN and British steamship lines have effected a consolidation of their interests in the Atlantic service.

FIELD MARSHAL SIR WILLIAM MAYNARD GOMM, Colonel of the Chesham Guards and Constable of the Tower, died yesterday at 91.

THE FRENCH ASSEMBLY has elected the Duke D'Audrebert-Pasquier its President, he receiving 418 out of the 520 votes cast.

A NEW BATHON OF CANDIDATES at a consistory at the Vatican yesterday, Archbishop Manning of Westminster, Ledochowski of Posen and Guiseppi, McCloskey of New York, Deschamps of Maline, and Monsignor I. Gemelli and Bertelli, were created Cardinals.

THE BISHOP OF METROPOLITAN SEES, and Bishops were appointed for the dioceses of Whiting, Portland, Harstold and Kingston. The allocation was delivered by the Pope.

NEW YORK, March 16. PRESIDENTS. The town of Huala, Miss., was nearly destroyed by a rain and hail storm yesterday. Four persons were killed and several wounded. The recent warm rains have swollen the western rivers, and much damage has been done and is being apprehended from freshets.

THE PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

(To Morning Papers.)

OTTAWA, March 15. Mr. Duggan introduced an amendment to the Civil Service Bill, placing the age for superannuation at 60 in place of 45 years service.

CHARLES BURTON drew attention to an article in the Mail and denied that he has any interest in the Fredericton Branch or ever advised any committee or necessary influence to procure the sale of the Fredericton lands. He conducted fairly every statement that he is interested in the selling but denied that he had used his influence to procure the sale of the lands which he said should be given to the Railway as forming part of the connection between the Atlantic and the Pacific. He said that he holds a receipt for the price of the lands of the Branch in stock per lands, and is contributing the statement that he had in any way promoted the sale of the land, the price of which was fixed by an impartial independent officer.

Applyed having taken part in any combination with respect to these lands or railway matters.

Mr. Donville moved for papers connected with the sale of Ordnance lands at Fredericton, N. B., to the Fredericton Branch Railway, or to Temple and Baccus, Carried.

LEGISLATURE OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

(By Telegraph to the Tribune.) HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

FREDERICTON, March 15. After reading Mr. Keane's motion, the Reformatory Bill, Mr. Beveridge in the chair. A discussion arose on the subject of the bill providing that the Provincial Secretary shall pay over to the directors out of any sum that may be placed at his disposal for the purpose, a sum not exceeding \$80 per head per annum for each vagrant.

The Provincial Secretary thought it would be best not to make any maximum sum, but to leave it to the discretion of the Governor in Council.

The section was allowed to stand over for amendment as suggested by the Secretary.

Mr. Burns contended, and moved, that no child should be sent to a reformatory except for an offence punishable by law. The bill, as it stood, gave magistrates power to take children from their parents, which was an authority they should not have. He also thought that when a child was bound out as an apprentice it should be to a person of the faith of the child or its parents.

Mr. Burns said he would accept the last named amendment.

Mr. Burns also proposed his first named amendment.

The Attorney General said he had always thought the power of committing a child should be placed in the hands of two Justices instead of one, unless it should be a Sideritary Magistrate or Judge. The section was allowed to stand over with the understanding that the Attorney General would assist Mr. Keane in framing a substitute embracing Mr. Burns's and his own objections.

The section disqualifying clergymen from being Directors was supported by Mr. Pickard, who held that no clergyman, on account of his profession, should be relieved of any duties, or deprived of any privileges devolving upon or enjoyed by other citizens.

The section was amended in accordance with Mr. Pickard's suggestion.

Mr. Burns moved that while religious

instruction is being imparted by any clergyman to children at his communion, it shall not be impaired in the hearing of the children belonging to any other denomination.

The Secretary moved to add to Burns's amendment the words "Under such rules and regulations as the directors may, from time to time, make in this respect."

The Secretary thought it was a new principle in the treatment of criminals and offenders who are sentenced to prison to ask their parents to contribute to the maintenance, as provided in the bill.

This point was discussed at some length, and the provision struck out. Some other necessary amendments offering progress was reported with leave to sit again.

Mr. Tweedie introduced a bill to amend act in addition to acts relating to high-ways.

Mr. Butler introduced a bill to incorporate Gloucester County.

Mr. Butler introduced a bill to incorporate the Grand Lodge of British Templars of New Brunswick.

Mr. Davidson introduced a bill to establish a new polling place in Northesk, Northumberland County.

The order of the day being taken up, the Hon. Secy. reported that Supply had been granted. Mr. Keane, when the Speaker had thought the motion irregular, under the rule of the House requiring two days' notice before going in to Supply.

The bill referred to was referred to the practice since 1867 of treating the order of the day as notice required by law.

The Speaker referred to the practice prior to 1867, and said that he would allow more recent practice to be adhered to, but in the future the rule and original practice must be adhered to.

Supply was then made the order of the day for to-morrow.

Mr. King presented the petition of James G. Jordan and others, against the Portland Permanent Improvements Bill. Mr. Melrose presented the petition of Nelson Arnold and others, against the bill to vest Church lands at Sussex in Reformed Episcopal Church.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

FREDERICTON, March 15. The bill to incorporate the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, &c., was read a second time, Mr. Beckwith in the chair.

Hon. Mr. Chandler in opposing the bill spoke of the influence that had been at work to secure a majority in favor of it in the other branch.

After speeches from Hon. Messrs. Mackenzie, Seely, Lewis, Hillard, Bailey, Hamilton and Leckwith, a motion of postponement was put and lost. Hon. Messrs. Chandler, Hamilton, Taylor, Peley, Hans and McEwen, &c. Non-content; Hon. Messrs. Seely, Hillard, Bailey, Beckwith, Hamilton, Lewis, Peley, &c. carried.

Ward meeting at Islington.

The election of Ward No. 1 held a public meeting in Hamon's Hall, Islington, last evening, for the purpose of selecting candidates for the representation of the Ward in the Town Council. Mr. H. A. Gregory occupied the chair and Mr. S. Holly acted as secretary, and after some preliminary remarks the meeting proceeded to nominate candidates. Messrs. James Holly, M. D. Asselin, Stephen Keane, James T. Kennedy, A. N. Shaw, John A. Chesley, John G. Tobin, and George Quinn were named. A committee representing the Eastern and Western and Hillingdale sections of the Ward was appointed to select three men from those in nomination, and, having retired, choose Messrs. Holly, Stevens and Kennedy. Previous to this remark and been made by some of the candidates, and after the report of the committee had been received and adopted by a large vote, the chairman congratulated the Ward on their choice. A vote of 56 was then moved and carried, after which the harmonious meeting ended.

(Special Telegram to the Tribune.) HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

FREDERICTON, March 16. Mr. Keane committed a bill in amendment of the St. John assessment act, South in the chair. Mr. Keane expressed a hope of seeing the day when St. John would be governed by two Boards empowered to enact all laws for its own government not inconsistent with general laws. The present measure is for the purpose of authorizing an additional assessment of \$15,000 on Police and Fire Accounts. Agreed to.

Mr. Keane committed a bill to aid the Corporation of St. John in paving Fifth, Washington, Blanchard and in the chair. Agreed to.

Hon. Mr. McQueen committed a bill to authorize Westmorland Justices to sell by auction certain school lands in the chair. Agreed to.

Hon. Mr. Keane committed a bill to amend the School District in St. Mary's, Westmorland Parish, in the chair. The mover explained that the lands embraced two lots that were vested in trustees, under the Statutes, for school purposes. If sold, they will realize a sum that must result a better result than the present arrangement.

Mr. Rogers committed a bill to incorporate Harvey Corner Institute, Keane in the chair. (Our reporter falls up what was done with it.)

The Surveyor General tabled papers signed by Tweedie relating to scales of lumber in Northumberland.

Mr. Keane committed a bill to provide for the purchase of additional market lands and the erection of a Market House in St. John; McKay in the chair. Agreed to.

Hon. Mr. Stevenson committed a bill to authorize the lease of Debentures by certain School Districts, McLeod in the chair. The mover explained that the bill was to enable the School District in St. Mary's, Westmorland Parish, District No. 1, in St. Andrews, and District No. 1, in St. George's, to issue Debentures for a longer time than was contemplated by the School Act. It also authorizes Millwrights to issue Debentures for a shorter time than contemplated by the Act. Agreed to.

Hon. Mr. Fraser committed a bill to amend the several Acts relating to the City of Fredericton, and to establish a lock-up-house therein; Tweedie in the chair. Agreed to.

Mr. Keane committed a bill to vest the appointment of Recorder of St. John in the Council, Keane in the chair. The bill was in favor of vesting the appointment in the Council, but it was opposed by Mr. Fraser. It was carried.

The Attorney General's motion to postpone the consideration was carried.

Mr. Burns moved for papers relating to the case on Crown Lands in Gloucester and Northumberland, but the motion was not pressed.

Mr. Burns also moved, according to notice, for papers relating to bridges in Gloucester and Northumberland, but the motion was not pressed.

The Chief Commissioner said that he would be brought down as soon as they were out of the hands of the committee on accounts. Motion not pressed.

Mr. Kelly introduced a bill to provide for the establishment of a Police Force and Lock-up at Carleton; Mr. Burns presented the petition of the inhabitants of Carleton against the bill.

Mr. Burns introduced a bill, with petition, for winding up the affairs of the St. John Gymnasium Co.

Messrs. Jones and Rogers obtained leave to introduce a bill to amend the several Acts relating to the Gas Light Company Act.

Mr. Kelly introduced a bill to establish an additional polling place in Carleton.

Mr. Fraser introduced a bill to further amend the Albert Railway Company Act.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

FREDERICTON, March 16. Hon. Mr. Leckwith in the chair. Mr. Keane presented a bill to amend the Orange Bill yesterday, said in substance that he had always supported the principle of giving the bill to the people. There had been a motion to amend the bill, but the Catholic Bishop or the Sisters of Charity who desired incorporation, and he could not see the justice of denying the Orangemen their right to be heard in the way they thought most conducive to their interests. He then entered into history to show that the Orange body had taken its rise from a determination to overthrow the most oppressive tyranny, quoting Macaulay and D'Arcy McGee to throw light on the cruel and uncongenial character of James II.'s reign, and approved that no body of people had so much cause to feel grateful to King William as the Roman Catholics, or had more reason to venerate his pious glorious memory. When James left his country for his country's good, and crossed to France and sought aid of the French King, he held that he had forfeited all title to the crown.
