Young Men's Christian Association OF ACADIA.

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Extends to you a hearty greeting. Standing on the threshold of a new session, all Acadia men, new and old. are given a most cordial welcome. In this issue of the Hand-Book we have tried to give such information regarding the University and its Societies as shall be of service in the present year. It is desired that every Student will take a personal and hearty interest in the Association and Christian Work of the University, and that. during the present year the tide of Christian life may rise higher than ever before.

Young Men's Christian Association.

During the last fifty years the need has been felt throughout the Christian Church for definite work for young men. This need is being filled by the Young Men's Christian Association. The first Association of the world was organized at London in 1844; in America, at Montreal, in 1850, and eight years after the first College Association was formed in the University of Michigan. The work has so spread that now in America every city and town of importance and every College has its Y. M. C. A. as a centre for organized Christian work for young men by young men. And it has spread beyond us until this year there are reported 1,448 Associations among 40 nations speaking 17 languages; the . total amount of their property being \$18;189.300. In North America 520 Colleges have Associations; there are 108 among railroad men, 11 for Germans, 61 among Negroes, 33 for Indians, one for French and one for Japanese. The Lord is using this instrument to advance His Kingdom all over the world.
