General Intelligence
KICKED TO DEATH.
One of the most revolting affairs which
has darkened the name of Charlottetown
for several years past occurred here last
night.
His name is Wm. Proud, a son of
George Proud, of Loyalist Road, near
Wiltshire. Accompanied by his mother
and his brother, Peter Proud, he came
to the city yesterday. The young man
traded horses through the day with
James Carr, and towards the evening
they were joined by a young man named
John Rodd, also from the vicinity of
Wiltshire.
About six o'clock these three started to
leave town, and were followed by four
others, whose names are said to be John
Travis, George Thomas, Peter Hughes,
Dan Carroll, and—Hughes, all of
Charlottetown.
It appears that when near Boyle's lan-
tern on Pownall street and between
Charlotte and Stewart streets, some
quarrelling in which they were previously
engaged developed into a fight. Wm.
Proud was struck and knocked down by
one of the participants after which he
was fatally kicked on the jugular vein.
He was unconscious for a time but
afterwards rallied slightly and was helped
into the wagon, where he bled profusely.
His head finally began to redden upon
his shoulder and he was laid on the
ground beside a house.
Here he remained for over half an hour
before a doctor could be obtained and
when at length Dr. Gane of Boston
arrived on the scene the unfortunate man
had expired.
Marshall Cameron, Officers Kiggins,
Taylor and Campbell had the body re-
moved to the police station. The throat
is considerably swollen and a mark
appears on his nose and another on his
upper lip.
Dr. Courcy coroner was summoned
and the United States with their newly-
acquired foreign possessions in the
Pacific Ocean. On June 21 Captain
Glass of the United States steamship
Charleston, captured the Ladrona Island,
took the governor general, his staff and
the entire military force prisoners and
raised the stars and stripes over the ruins
of the Spanish fort of Santa Cruz, in the
harbor of San Luis Para. It was a
bloodless victory, for the Spanish, not
having heard of the war between their
country and the United States, were
taken completely by surprise and sur-
rendered the islands, their arms and them-
selves without offering the slightest
resistance.
PONCE, Aug. 4.—The transport Massa-
chusetts, having on board troops A and
C of the New York cavalry, the Phila-
delphia troops, the sixth cavalry and the
eighth infantry is surrounded here.
The Spaniards with four batteries of
artillery, under the command of Major
Rohrer, are around at Guanica.
The transport Washington, with the
fourth Pennsylvania regiment, and the
Seneca with Colonel Quirt's regiment,
are landing here today. The 11th and
19th regular infantry regiments and
troop B of the second cavalry, are dis-
embarking here.
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3.—A despatch
from Cavite to Chronica says that
it is probable that two of the vessels sunk
by Dewey's fleet may yet be raised and
rendered serviceable.
HAVANA, Aug. 3.—A French steamer,
the Manitoa, was captured last Saturday
at noon off Isabella, Sagua, and was taken
to Key West by American ships.
A Spanish report says that at noon on
Saturday last two American warships
near Punta Maya, Matanzas, battery
opened fire on the latter and were an-
swered. Only one Spanish artillery man
was killed.
AFFAIRS IN PORTO RICO.
PONCE, Aug. 3, via Kingston, J. A.
Aug. 4.—The Spaniards are reported
to be advancing though it is not generally
believed. In addition to the regular for-
tifications at Ayonista, on the road to
San Juan, it is reported that the enemy
has mined the cliffs, preparatory to cap-
ping the road if obliged to retire. San
Martin, the Spanish commander here,
who evacuated this place without orders,
is a prisoner at San Juan de Porto Rico.
He will be tried for cowardice and will
probably be executed.
A NEW BRUNSWICK BOY.
A Massachusetts paper says: Mrs. W.
W. Johnson to-day received a letter from
her brother, John Costin, from Cuba,
who is a member of the Indiana crew,
which gave a number of interesting facts
regarding the battle at Santiago, July 2,
and the capture of the Maine. Captain
Bob Evans of the Indiana gave credit to
Costin for firing the shot that sank the
Maine. The letter contained the infor-
mation that during the engage-
ment the quarter deck of the Indiana
was badly damaged by the explosion of a
shell which wounded several of the men.
The John Costin above referred to is
New Brunswick boy, the son of Edward
Costin, of Pass River, Kent County,
where his mother still lives. His brother
Michael Costin is a foreman in the employ
of Hale Irvine, Esq., of Blountville. He
has a sister living in Point de Bute
John joined the American navy in June,
1892.

News of the War.
PONCE, P. R., Aug. 2, via St. Thomas,
Aug. 3.—The Porto Rico of Ponce and
the streets by hundreds and filled the air
with cheering on the arrival of General
Garretson's brigade from Yanco.
The arrival of these troops and those on
the St. Louis makes the fighting strength
of the Americans now operating near
Ponce about nine thousand men, equal to
the entire force of the Spanish regular
troops.
General Garretson's camp is temporarily
located on the outskirts of the town.
The brigade marched 17 miles from Yanco
to Ansy, where they arrived travel-
stained and mud-bespattered. Almost
the entire population saw the troops pass
through the city and gave cheer after
cheer. The officers at the front com-
manding the advancing companies do not
believe the Spaniards will make an ad-
vance. They claim the enemy will act
only on the defensive.
There was some firing last night be-
tween Capt. Austin's pickets and the
Spaniards in the brush, but no damage
was done.
All the American troops are restless,
due to false alarms of the approach of the
Spaniards, and they are evasive for an
enemy with the enemy. It is the gen-
eral belief, however, that there will be no
forward movement of the main of our
troops until the other transports arrive.
They are expected every hour.
The troops on board the St. Louis are
reported to be in good health. She
brought twelve representatives of the
Porto Rican Junta of New York, whose
business is to influence the people of the
island not to resist the American advance.
Their good offices are not necessary.
The Dixie's shot at Morro Castle on
Saturday caused the utmost consternation
through the city and gave cheer after
cheer. It is reported that the enemy
believed to have signified the place was to
be bombarded within twenty-four hours.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Spain's answer to the demands of the United States is now on its way to Washington, but it is coming with a slowness almost painful in view of the earnest desire to know whether the acceptance is complete or qualified. The reply had not reached here during the early hours of the day. There are no less than five translations, four of them cipher, in the transmission between Madrid and Washington. After the Spanish cabinet meeting last night, the response was reduced to the Spanish cipher and then sent to the British ambassador at Paris.

SENATOR CASTRO, who it was to be expected, and translated into French, after which Senator Castro would deliver it to the French ambassador here. These moves, including work on the cipher code, calls by Castillo on the foreign office, the European states and the dispatching on arrival have occupied much time, and the report will not reach the President until late to-night or to-morrow morning.

PARIS, Aug. 8.—The Spanish Ambassador, this morning, presented to the French minister for foreign affairs, M. Delcasse, Spain's reply to the peace terms of the United States, which were subsequently called to Washington.

SHAFER'S TROOPS RELIEVED. WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The Secretary of War has ordered Gen. Shaffer's troops to be relieved from further duty in Santiago as fast as transportation can be provided and the transfer of Spanish prisoners will be made as soon as the necessary arrangements are made.

TROOPS TO BE SENT HOME. SANTIAGO, Aug. 5.—Major General Shaffer has received orders to move his entire army. The six transports here will take the first shipment, and the embarkation will begin to-day. There is great rejoicing among the troops. From the moment Secretary Alger's call was received this morning, the men have been in a state of excitement, and the removal of the army north, everything has been bustle and activity at headquarters. The transports here, six in number, have been ordered to discharge their cargoes and get ready with their troops to start on board the first shipments for home. Other transports are expected here shortly. The embarkation will begin to-morrow, and it is expected that eighteen transports will soon be conveying our soldiers back to the United States.


Gen. Shaffer's orders for the movement of his command requires the following programme: The embarkation of the third and fourth regular cavalry, the first regular cavalry and the first volunteer cavalry (Rough Riders). These regiments have been ordered to be ready to go on board the ship after to-morrow. For the present, the ninth and tenth cavalry will remain in camp. Only the private horses of the officers will be taken. The other horses will be turned over to Gen. Wood, who will designate an officer to receive them. Gen. Wood remains here as military governor. All the tents will be left standing, and all the extra worn clothing and bedding which may possibly be infected will be destroyed. The first brigade of Gen. Lawton's division, under Gen. Chaffee, will go next. All the men able to ride will be put on horses and taken to the wharves. The others will be conveyed there in wagons. All the men who are suffering from yellow fever or infectious diseases will be left here. Every precaution will be taken to provide for the safe and healthy arrival of the men north. The volunteer regiments have been ordered to hold themselves in camp on board the transports the day after to-morrow or so soon after as possible. All the troops will first be examined by a medical board and any suspicious cases will be isolated.

HALIFAX, Aug. 7.—The steamer Hiawatha chartered by Es-Judge Dillon of New York and others to go in search of the bodies of relatives, who lost their lives in the La Bourgogne disaster has returned with little success. Thirty bodies were discovered and were buried.
