Peas with Potatoes.—We have several times planted peas and potatoes, and incline to the opinion that the pea does not improve with the potato any, but that, while you get a good crop of peas, you also obtain just as many potatoes as you would had there been no peas planted among them. It would be advisable to have some exact comparative experiments instituted to ascertain the truth in regard to it. The pea and potatoes are very dissimilar in their form and products, and if they do not rot each other, while maturing their several fruits or crops, it is certainly best to put them together, for while you cultivate the potato, you can also cultivate the pea. In thus combining the two we have thought that it did better, when the potatoes were planted in drills, although they do very well when planted in hills. Try it.—Maine Cultivator.


