Terrific Blasts at the West. One Hundred and Fifty Lives Lost.

CHICAGO, June 5, 1860.—From telegraphic messages received here last night and this morning, we learn the following particulars in regard to the terrible disaster which occurred.

The first that was heard of it was between Madison and Cedar Rapids, in Lyon county, Iowa, going west and south-east, in three different currents, crossing the track of the Chicago, Iowa and Nebraska Railroad several times.

The station the depot buildings and the warehouse in the village were completely demolished.

A train of freight cars, heavily loaded with lumber, was derailed and dashed to pieces.

Before the tornado reached Lisbon it had killed sixteen persons. From there one current of the storm passed north through Mechanicsville, demolishing everything in its course and killing sixteen persons more. Another current took its course Olin Agency, killing in that vicinity seventeen persons.

It then passed south of the railroad near De Witt, killing twenty-seven persons, sixteen of whom belonged to the family of Thomas Hatfield. The current then passed south of Rowersville and Leno-Moor, destroying the house of David Willard, killing him and a portion of his family.

It then struck the town of Camanche, on the Mississippi river, at which point the loss of life is much greater than was at first estimated. From all accounts there cannot be less than fifty killed at this place. Some reports state even a larger number, but the bodies cannot be found. There are also 125 wounded, some fatally, and ten missing.

A large lumber raft from the Chippewa river, manned by a crew of twenty-four men with two women on board, which was tied up opposite Camanche at the time of the tornado, was completely scattered, and twenty-one of the men and both women were lost.

The tornado is known to have traversed a distance of ninety miles in Iowa, and seventy miles in Illinois, doing incalculable damage to property. The loss of life cannot be less than one hundred and fifty. During the evening yesterday, two trains were running every hour from Clinton to the scene of destruction, and through the aid of efficient committees much relief was rendered.

The Newark Daily Advertiser, June 1st says:—

The Massachusetts cattle disease, known as Rinderpest, has made its appearance in this part of our State, exciting well-founded alarm among farmers and owners of cattle, who are threatened with great loss in consequence.

The New Jersey Agricultural Society are taking prompt measures to investigate the subject, with a view to the adoption of some means of relief from the scourge which has swept away so many horned cattle in the Eastern States, and a Report from their Committee may be issued for within a few days. We understand that several cattle have perished in the vicinity of Morristown, and four out of seven that are affected with it on the farm of Mr. Abraham Johnson, just below the southern boundary of Newark, have died. One of those affected was killed this morning, and a post mortem examination made in the presence of Governor Olden and a number of leading men connected with the Agricultural Society; one lung was found to be perfect, but the other was very badly diseased with the same affection as that which appeared in Massachusetts—from which State it has been brought by cattle raised there and purchased in the New York market by New Yorkers. It is only known among horned cattle, and is believed to be contagious, but not epidemic.

Hicks, the oyster sloop pirate, under sentence of death at New York, has made a full confession. He admits killing Captain Burr and the two Watts boys, giving the details of the circumstances attending the murders. He also confesses that he was "one of the murderers of barque Saladin. He is dictating a story of his life and adventures, to be published after his execution.

The Japanese Ambassadors visited the President of the United States on Tuesday, and took formal leave of him. The speeches were brief on both sides, and the strangers expressed themselves highly gratified with their reception. The President gave to each member of the Embassy a medal, commemorative of the great event which binds Japan and America to amity.

The N. S. Telegraph lines having been leased to the American Company, all agreements with the Associated Press, or other parties, for priority of messages, are broken off. "First come first served" is the motto adopted. We are pleased to learn that Mr. J. Hoyt has been appointed Superintendent of the Nova Scotia lines, and Mr. W. H. Wiswell, Chasler and Auditor, they are very competent and attentive officers. We are informed that a reduction of about 20 per cent. has been mutually agreed upon between the Newfoundland and Nova Scotia lines on messages to and from Newfoundland. The arrangement comes into operation to day, and the charge for message of ten words from Halifax to St. John will be 31s, instead of 18s. 9d. as formerly. [Halifax Sun.]

LATE FROM CHINA.—Important news by the Overland mail, has been received. The Chinese have concluded to pay the English and French governments their expenses and accede to all their demands. The ports and navigation of rivers are to be free.

The Emperor of Japan had been assassinated in the street.

Our thanks are due to Wm. Whitlock Esq. for late Boston papers, from which we select the following items of late European intelligence:

Latest from Europe.
Arrival of the North Briton.

FATHER POINT, June 10.—The Canadian screw steamship North Briton, from Liverpool 30th and Londonderry 31st ult., has passed this point, en route for Quebec.

The Insurrection in Sicily.

The despatches from Sicily are still very contradictory. The bombardment of Palermo was progressing. Garibaldi had entered, or was expected. Neapolitan despatches claim the defeat and flight of the insurgents.

The Sardinian Chambers had approved of the cession of Savoy.

Late despatches assert that everything was going on well for Garibaldi.

The English and French residents at Palermo had embarked on board the steamer of their respective nations.

Several Neapolitan vessels of war had arrived before Palermo.

The Paris Patrie says that the insurrection was being organized to such an extent that its ultimate results are no longer doubted.

The fall of Palermo is inevitable, it being only a question of time.

As soon as the insurgents become masters of Palermo, Garibaldi will declare Sicily annexed to the Italian kingdom, reserving the ratification of his resolution to universal suffrages. The Provisional Government, under the Presidency of Garibaldi would then direct the insurrection.

The official Davon Zeitung publishes the following, dated Naples May 27 the bands of Garibaldi have been totally routed. Garibaldi himself is endeavoring to embark. The rebels accuse each other of treachery.

In contradiction of the above, we have the following:

Tarifa, May 29.—The official Gazette publishes a dispatch from Naples announcing the arrival there of an English steamer, with the following news: The insurgents have entered Palermo, and a considerable portion of the population has arisen against the royal troops. The city was being bombarded by sea and land. The bombardment commenced Sunday morning, and the firing continued up to the time of the departure of the steamer.

GREAT BRITAIN.—There is no political news of importance. Parliament is not in session, owing to the Whitsun holidays.

A furious gale has prevailed all along the English coast. It was severely felt at Liverpool, where it inflicted considerable damage on the shipping, but nothing of a serious nature.

There was a rumor of a matrimonial alliance between the Prince of Wales and a Russian Princess.

Ten men, charged with ribbonism, were under arrest at Dundalk.

The Morning Globe, a staunch, and ably conducted supporter of the Government, has in the last few numbers, made some serious charges against them, for "the conveyance of sundry blocks of Crown Lands, in all 50,000 acres, to the Roman Catholic Bishop, and the St. Paul de Vincent Society. The Globe says that several persons applied for lots of land in Queens County, which were duly advertised in the Royal Gazette, but that a few days before time of sale, the lands were conveyed to the Roman Catholic Bishop—without the knowledge of the applicants.—The Globe firmly, but respectfully adminis-

ters a rebuke to the Government for thus acting unfairly with the respectable men who desired to purchase these lands for actual settlement, and pertinently enquires "has the Government any assurance that these lands will be settled, in accordance with the intention of the act under which they were obtained?" And gives currency to the assertion that the transaction on the part of the Government "is a bid for the Roman Catholic vote at the coming election?"

The last Royal Gazette contains Mr. Connell's second letter with reference to his resignation, and also the rejoinder of the Executive Council, which confirms the report which was circulated with respect to his opposition to the granting of lands to the Railway Company. The Council say: "We do not quite understand what Mr. Connell means by his statements in reference to the survey of the lands reserved for the St. Andrews and Quebec Railway Company. We cannot suppose that he intended to assert that all the reserved lands ought to have been granted to the Company in the spring of 1859, as we believe that such was not his wish."

From this paragraph we have a corroboration of the report of Mr. Connell's opposition to the application—the testimony of his eight colleagues. The Council however adds,—"the present position of the Company proves that had the Council then advised your Excellency to grant them the whole of the reserve, they would have acted not only unwisely, but also in opposition to the spirit and letter of the law." We entertain the opinion that had the lands been granted to the Company, the works would not have been completed to Richmond Corner this season. With reference to the violation of the law, we have heard it stated to mean the reverse of the Council's rendering.

BRANDS OF FLOUR.—The Commercial Bulletin, in an article on flour and wheat, in commenting on the difficulty of obtaining a first rate article, says:

"One of our Rochester, N. Y. exchanges, in speaking of the shipping demand for wheat, remarks, that 'while wheat is in such demand, and at so good prices, there is nothing in the price of flour to encourage our millers.' We will add that there never will be, so long as the millers in New York State, and elsewhere, fail to bring their flour up to the old standard of excellence. It is almost impossible, says the Bulletin, in buying any brand of flour in this city or vicinity, to be sure that one is getting a first-rate article. The time was, when the H. Ely

and other favorite brands from the Genesee valley, were sound as wheat.

There is a temptation somewhere to dishonesty; whether with the miller, or after the flour leaves the miller's hands; or an advance in the price of best quality of wheat is, perhaps, a strong temptation to the miller to substitute a poorer quality in manufacture while selling the better. Of all the necessities of life there seems to be as little excuse for imposition in flour as in any other article. Bread is emphatically the staff of life; and when the poor man or the sick man give his eight or ten dollars per barrel for flour, he is not very willing to submit to the imposition of receiving a quality of flour greatly inferior to that which the brand represents.

The volunteer movement is gradually permeating our community. Military organization, drill and evolutions, are the "order of the day," absorbing the attention and exciting the emulation of no inconsiderable number of our staid and unimpressive citizens. We have good bone and muscle amongst us, stout hearts and strong arms; and within a very short period, we have no doubt our city will be in a position to show as an effective and stalwart body of trained men—equal for any contingency—as can be mustered in any portion of the North American Continent. Not to be "clashed in the fray" the sons of "Caledonia stern and wild" have responded to the call of the President of the St. Andrews Society, and this day week a number of them met, and formed themselves as a company under the title of the "Duke of Rothsay's Rifles." On Wednesday evening the Company—which already numbers sixty "good men and true"—elected their officers, viz: the hon. John Robertson as Captain, and Messrs. Macfarlane, Rowan and Kempas Lieutenants. The uniform, we understand, is to consist of a tunic of green cloth, turtan pants plaid and Highland bonnet and plume. The south wing of the Custom House Building has been secured as a drill room; and from the well-known energy of the capt. and other officers, we suggest an efficient addition to our volunteer military force well prepared for according an enthusiastic reception to the Prince of Wales. This Company, we are told, are to have the honor of forming the Prince's body guard, while he is in this city. In the absence of a Welch company this post is their due as the Prince's Scottish titles of Duke of Rothsay, Earl of Carrick, Baron of Renfrew and Lord of the Isles, takes precedence of his English and Irish titles. [Courier.]

The Hon. S. L. Tilley was in town on Wednesday and left again on Thursday morning to attend the meeting of the National Division of the Sons of Temperance, at Portland. His object in coming this way we believe, was to make some inquiry and elicit some information respecting the channel of the river at the Lodge, and to decide some point which has arisen as to the liability of ships loading in American waters and moored upon this side of the river to pay beacons and light-house duties. A knotty question appears to have been raised, and as some international rights and privileges may be involved, probably a different kind of solution may be required.

The question has arisen in consequence of the Act of the Imperial Government in abolishing differential duties, whereby deals shipped from Calais go to British ports upon the same terms as if shipped from St. Stephen. It becomes the interest of the shipper, therefore, if possible, to load his vessel at Calais and thereby escape the Provincial export duty of one shilling per M. We are informed that Mr. Tilley expressed no opinion upon the points submitted to him, intending to complete his investigation of the circumstances upon a future occasion. [Herald.]

AN ELOPEMENT IN THEATRICAL CIRCLES. The Herald gives a paragraph under the above heading, which, however, appears to be a statement of a marriage without the consent of the "old folks," and the subsequent departure of the happy couple to St. John, N. B. The parties are Mr. T. Davenport formerly of the Boston Theatre Company, and Miss Honey, of the Howard Athenaeum. The mother of the latter was opposed to the match, but on Wednesday, without her knowledge or consent, her daughter, in company with Mr. Davenport, proceeded to the residence of Rev. Mr. Gaylord, where they were married. The same evening the bride performed her allotted part at the Howard Athenaeum, and on Thursday morning disappeared from the sight of her friends in this region, having in company with her husband, taken her departure per steamer Admiral for the British Provinces.—[Boston Traveller.]
