The Dowager Duchess of Sutherland's Experience.

LONDON, May 30.—The Dowager Duchess of Sutherland, who was released yesterday from Holloway prison, where she had been from Holloway prison, where she had been confined as a first-class misdemeanant, stated in an interview that she had suffered terribly during her imprisonment. She had lost two stone in weight in six weeks. She was not allowed to see her friends whenever she desired, but only three times a week. Not a single prison rule had been in the least relaxed in her rule had been in the least relaxed in her case any more than might have been accorded to the humblest prisoner. "My loneliness," added the dowager duchess, "was terrible; but I was borne up by the thought that I did what my dear duke would have had me do. The paper which was burned did not relate to the will, but was a letter of a single sheet referring to a grave family scandal, occurring many years before I entered the family. I promised my dear husband in his last hours that I would prevent the sosndal from coming up, and I was faithful to his dying wish."

The Home Rule Bill.

LONDON, May 30 .- The House of Commons to-day by a vote of 281 to 169 refused

mons to-day by a vote of 281 to 169 refused to adopt a motion to adjourn over tocorrow in order to enable the members to attend the Derby at Epsom.

The House by a vote of 273 to 240 rejected a motion to pestpone discussion on clause 3 of the Irish Home Rule Bill dealing with and defining the powers of the Irish Legislature.

As soon as the members decided to proceed with the discussion of clause 3 of the Home Rule Bill Viscount Wolmer, Liberal-

me Rule Bill Viscount Wolmer, Liberal-ionist for West Edinburgh, moved an amendment forbidding the Dublin Legislature to discuss subjects on which they were not to make laws.

Prime Minister's treatment of this amendment was most significant, he said, and his question indicated the motive of the whole bill. The Prime nister apparently meant that contracts de under the bill with the Minister apparently meant that contracts made under the bill with the Irish Legislature were worthless, because they could not be enforced. If such were the cass the whole fabric of the bill fell, and no contracts ought to be attempted. Col. Saunderson, said that the Primo Minister's words had confirmed the truth of the Unionist contention that every restriction in the bill was a sham.

John Rigby, Solicitor-General, replied that the restrictions in the bill would have validity since, if the Irish Legislature

validity since, if the Irish Legislature should exceed their powers the acts in question would be worthless.

The sole reason for Gilbert's release is the breaking-down of his health. He moves feebly and stoops. His face and figure have aged twenty years since he was taken to Portland Prison. Several times during the journey to London he was so faint that a stimulants were used to revive him. Gilbert was taken by Father Matthew directly to a hospital to a room engaged for him by the Irish Amnesty Association.

A LONG RELAY FOOT RACE.

The business should not be permitted under any circumstances in the place mentioned.

Dr. Fraser, who lives opposite the building, stated that on a very hot Sunday recently the stench was oppressively obnoxious.

Mr. J. B. McKillop said that people as far east as the Tecumsch House were complaining of the same nuisance.

Dr. Hutchinson, in reply to a question, said the proprietors of the establishment had carried out the regulations instituted by the board last year.

Mr. Wrighton said that he had done everything in his power to place the premises in a thoroughly sanitary condition. He did not deny that there was an efflavia from the business; but was there not an odor of some kind peculiar to almost every business? He held that it would be an injustice to interfere with the business of a man who was trying to carry it on in a straightforward and respectable manner. If the board interfered in this matter where would such regulatory proceedings end?



GOLD SENT OVER THE SEA. Exports to Europe \$60,000,000 Since Jan. 1.

Exports to Europe \$60,000,000 Since Jan. 1.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Since Jan. 1.

\$60,000,000 in gold have been exported to Europe, and the export movement, instead of having abated, seems to have received a fresh impetus. Most of this gold was taken from the United States treasury and practically all that is now being exported comes from the same source. In that time the Treasury Department has sustained a net loss of \$25,354,243, the net total gold in the treasury on Jan. 1, 1893, having been \$121,206,602, while to-day it is only \$95,-912,419. The gold holdings within the five months of this year have at times fluctuated, but since. May 1 the gold has been nearly always below the limit of the reserve of \$100,000,000. The total not gold remaining in the treasury now is about \$93,000,000, the lowest figure reached since the resumption of specie payments. In addition to the large sum engaged there are reports current here from sources usually well founded that more gold will go out on next Saturday, sufficient, it is said, to reduce the gold holdings to \$90,000,000. Despite these heavy shipments, treasury officials express the greatest confidence in the ability of the treasury to restore the gold balance. They point to the fact that there is a gradual and healthy inflow of gold from natural causes to the treasury, which is only temporarily checked by the large amounts taken for export. A cossation of gold exports in large amounts is looked for by July 1, as it is understood that the Australian demand is well nigh supplied.

A peculiar and encouraging feature of the decrease of gold is that a corresponding increase is shown in the net treasury bepartment. Of this money \$11,340,000 is in subsidiary coin, and \$11,650,000 in national bank depositaries. Both of these items are slightly in excess of what they were on March 7.


