On the Evansville and Terre Haute Railway.

The "Midnight Cannon Ball" Leaves the Rails.

As the Result of Recent Rains - Five Trainmen Killed - The Passengers Escape With Their Lives.

Evansville, Ind., March 10.-The most isastrous wreck that has ever occur red on the Evansville and Terre --aute Railroad occurred this morning be-tween 12 and 1 o'clock, as the train known as the "Midnight Cannon Ball" from Chicago, was coming south over the road.

The recent rains have had a terrible effect on the roadbed, and the train was proceeding cautiously. At a point three-quarters of a mile north of Hazelton, where the roadbed is built on an embankment, it suddenly gave way, and the engine, baggage car part of the smoker went down.

LOSS OF LIFE. The engine turned over, but the baggage car remained uprignt. The smoker hing over the abyss. Engineer Wm. McCutcheon escaped death, but his fireman, Joe Boleman, was killed. Conductor George Sears, of Terre Haute, who was in the smoker, was also kill-

Shortly after the train went down the crevasse spread, and it is now 100 feet wide. The baggage car and smoker floated off into a field. The sleepers and coach were taken back to Vin-cennes. Many Evansville people were in the sleeper, including State Senator Leich and wife, returning from Inroad in Unicago gave out the state-





Last summer while in Germany I stopped at the ancient town of Traves, and in the hotel where I put up there was a large picture that is extremely popular in Germany, showing the old Emperor William with his son by his side, and Von Moltke and Bismarck nearby, standing all on a height watch ing a battle going on in the valley below. As I looked at this picture a German officer, with whom I acquainted, said:-

"There will be none of that in the next war.' "None of what?" I asked.

"No standing on heights and watching battles. Smokeless powder and longreaching guns have made that sort of thing impossible. Hereafter everyone in sight will be killed.'

'Then what of the army?' I asked. "Well, most of the soldiers will be killed also. The fact is that future battles will be go-as-you-please affairs. battles will be planned out as well as possible beforehand, but when actual en gagement takes place the officers will have to dismount and trust largely to luck. Anyone in a conspicuous position will be doomed. The fate of the day will depend on the ingenuity and expertness of captains of small divisions, probably not more than a hundred men in each. Every officer will have to do the best he can with the soldiers immediately under him, doing what seems to him the most effective on the spur of the moment. The slaughter will be something so appalling that the civilized world will stand aghast.'

It seems, then, there is coming a complete revolution in military tactics, and that experience of the past will be no guide to the commander of the future. ing the lead in preparing for this and is now training her small officers, lieuten ants, captains and the like, who com mand merely a hundred or two hundred men, to work these small bodies to the best advantage in a battle. 

I am not an expert in military matters, but I believe it to be the case that the trouble with a light field gun is this: When such a gun is fired, the recoil causes the muzzle to jump upwards, the wheels to run back, so that the gun must be reaimed before it can again be fired. This reaiming takes time, and, in

a battle, time is everything. Monsieur Canet, the manager of the artillery works of France, which are situated on the Mediterranean, has by a very simple device neutralized the effects of the recoil, so that his gun, once it is accurately aimed, may be fired as quickly as it can be reloaded. The trail of the gun carriage consists of two steel tubes, one of which slides within the other. The end of one tube carries the gun cradle, while the other, the end of which trails on the ground, is attached to a spade which can be thrust deeply into the earth to hold the gun steady. When the gun is fired the carriage wheels roll back a few inches, the end of the inner sliding tube compressing the air in the recoil chamber, while the compressed air, acting like a strong spring, shoves the wheels and gun carriage forward again into their former position.
