M. H. O. Finds Quality Slightly Below Average—Standing of Dairymen.

The following is a copy of Dr. Autchinson's report on the milk supply of London as presented to the board of health at its last meeting. It explains

I beg to lay before you, a report of the quality of milk sold in the city and also the veterinary surgeon's report of his inspection of the herds and dairies for the six months ending Dec. 31, sells to Abe Smith. 1906. The average quality of all the milk was 3.90. This is a fair quality, although some seasons the butterfat has averaged 4 per cent. The herds and dairies are classified according to merit-A, B, and C. The milk, first, second, and third class. That is, 4 per cent and upwards of butterfat comes in the first class; from 4 per cent to 3.50 is placed in the second class; from 3.50 to 8 per cent is third class. It frequently occurs that a B, 2. first class, tut at the same time the milk from that dairy or from the vendor who purchases wholesale from that dairy, is in the second or third class, and vice versa. The householder should be careful to see, from where the vendor procures his supply, as to cleanliness and condition; secondly, the quality of milk that vendor retails. The names are given as far as possible n order of merit.



The Electric Merger. Before the orders of the day were proceeded with, Mr. Hugh Clark (Center Bruce) rose to inquire through the Speaker whether the Premier had had his attention called to the merger of various electrical companies in Hamilton under the title of the Dominion Power and Transmission Company Mr. Clark considered the merger a direct attack on the powers of the Legislature. Under the authority of the Ontario railway and municipay board, the various electric roads had been held down to a rate of 2 cents a mile, but now they were to operate under a Dominion charter, "for the general benefit of Canada." Some protest should be made against the action of the Dominion Government in giving charters to local roads.

"I want to know through you, Mr Speaker," said Mr. Clark, "if the Prime Minister is going to submit tamely to

this state of affairs?" Whitney Threatens. In replying, Hon. Mr. Whitney declared that the Government was not going to submit unless compelled to. In past years a stream of applications had been going to Ottawa, in order to take local roads out of the jurisdiction of the Province, leaving the Government only a nominal control. If merely by amalgamation, a number of short lines chartered by the Province could escape control, then Mr. Whitney thought it was time to protest. He was not prepared to make any charges against the Dominion Government, but he did not expect much from the Dominion railway board. If all else failed, probably the Government could still exercise its powers of taxation. Mr. Graham assured the Premier

that the Liberal party would, as always, support provincial rights and back up the Government in any move to obtain them. Mr. Studholme (East Hamilton) said the subject touched his constituency closely. People were saving that if the merger went through the Legisla-






