Mighty Loans.

Last year, the chancellor of the exchequer said, the total expenditure was estimated at £1,825,580,000, but the actual expenditure rose to £2,198,113,000. Part of this excess was due to the unexpected increase of a hundred millions of pounds in loans to Great Britain's allies and the dominions. The advances made by England to her allies and the dominions since the beginning of the war totalled £594,000,000.

The national debt, he said, now stood at £3,554,090,000 but the Government was entitled to deduct the amount of the advances to the allies and dominions. 

OVER MILLION GERMANS

Amsterdam, Vla London, May 2 .- One million, three hundred thousand Germans have perished in the war, according to a statement made by Naunann, formerly a Conservative member of the Reichstag. Herr Naunann, speaking on the "influence of the war on population," said in part: "Until now the war has caused us a loss of 1,300,000 dead. This, together with the decrease in birth gives a reduction of 3,800,000. The surplus of females has increased from 800,000 to far more than 2,000,000. The nation has bled as never since the Thirty Years' War."

THE WAR SITUATION

With Internal Strife—Bitter At tacks on Hollweg — Armles Deadlocked on Western Front.

Beyond an officially inspired dispatch from Berlin stating that no disorders occurred in Germany during May Day, the veil of secrecy which has been drawn over the situation in the Central Empires remains unbroken, as far as any direct news is concerned. News dispatches from the German frontier speak of great strikes and rumors pile upon rumors in re-gard to the growing unrest among the Teutonic nations, but there is little that is tangible on which t base a judgment. Everything points to a crisis having been reached in the internal affairs of both Germany and Austria, but the

outcome is uncertain. Great Demand for Reforms. The demand for internal reforms is growing louder and more insist-ent in Germany, and the newspapers are voicing this demand with a boldness never known since the commencement of the war. The one certain thing of significance is that the German Government is proceeding to unheard of lengths to prevent the outside world from learning the truth of the situation. It is reported that Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollwes will make a new peace offer before the Reichstag tomorrow, but this is based entirely on a newspaper statement, and lacks either detail or confirmation. In view of the high cost of living which is weekly soaring higher, the taxpayers of Middlesex will perhaps find some consolation in the fact that there is a strong possibility in the reduction of the county rate, which will be struck at the next session of county council, which opens on Monday, June 4, next.
