Brandon, June 20.—Mr. Borden's second address, delivered tonight in Brandon, forms with his Winniper speech of last night, presumably the very best summary of the special pleading against the reciprocity agreement that the Opposition leader can put forth. Recognizing that the tariff question as a whole and the reciprocity agreement in particular, are practically the only really live questions the west at present wants to hear about; Mr. Borden devoted all his time to those issues.

Mr. Borden was quite frank in his declaration of hostility to reciprocity. "I am absolutely opposed to the reciprocity compact now pending before Parliament." he said, and the reasons he gave were the usual dnes, which answer themselves or have been answered time and again by those who favor reciprocity. The United States, he said, was not a market for our natural products, because it had an exportable surplus of the same products. MINISTERS TO **EXCHANGE VIEWS**

Between the Gatherings for an Imperial Conference.

NEXT MEETING IN LONDON

Sir Wilfrid Says Home Government Took Delegates Into Full Confidence.

London, June 20 .- In the Imperial Conference this afternoon Sir Andrew Fisher, of Australia, moved that the ministers of the United Kingdom and the dominions exchange views beministers of the United Kingdom and the dominions exchange views between conferences, so that they might acquaint themselves with all autonomous parts of the Empire, and also that the next Imperial Conference be held in one of the dominions. The motion was heartily seconded by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, of Canada, Sir Joseph Ward, of New Zealand; the Right Hon. Louis Botha, of South Africa; and Sir Edward Morris, of Newfoundiand, doubted the practicability of transferring the conference. Premier Asquith accepted the idea of an exchange of views. He said that he would be pleased if the conference could be held elsewhere than in London. He feared, however, that the usefulness of the conference would be impaired if it were held elsewhere. Sir Andrew Fisher believed that the conference must eventually be held oftener than every fourth year.

An amended proposal that the United Kingdom consider the possibility of a conference being held in one of the dominions was accepted.

The conference wound up with a series of complimentary speeches. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as the oldest member of the conference, declared

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as the oldest member of the conference, declared this was the first time that the British Government had taken the overseas dominions into its complete confidence on questions of defence and foreign politics. The overseas dominions were thoroughly gratified, he said. The fact that the overseas sepresentatives had the foresight to indorse the move would not be lost sight of.

The warm appreciation of the Government's action, as evidenced by the Right Hon, Louis Botha, of South Africa, was applauded. He said that it had been a conference of friends. The only way to make the Empire greater was through love, and the conference vivified that friendship which must end in co-operation.

Premier Asquith said that the Government was most satisfied. The conference under a veil of confidence had resulted in a satisfactory agreement. While it had recognized common obligations, it equally recognized the various local needs. The circumstances were different in various parts of the Empire. They could not take the world, or even their fellow-citizens, into the same confidence, but they who had shared the confidential discussions realized that the conference would be a landmark in the development of imperial constitutional history.
