New York, March 16.—Both sides in the threatened railroad strike controversy expressed a willingness touay to hold further joint conferences, although the situation this morning was devoid of any suggestion that a compromise would be reached which would avert a national transportation tie-up. Indications were unofficially that both the railroad managers and the brotherhood chiefs were marking time pending any possible action by President Wilson, and with each group prepared to respond to overtures from the other side.

Reports from Kansas City and other points in the west, that some of the employees were unwilling to obey a strike call, were met by a statement by W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, that the leaders expected at least one in twelve to refuse to strike.

Paris, March 16.—A bill to demonetize existing French gold coinage has been introduced in the Chamber of Deputies by Deputies Lenoir, Bouffandeau and Eymond. The purpose is to force hoarders to bring out gold estimated at 4,000,000,000 francs which is still kept in hiding in spite of patriotic appeals to the owners to exchange it for notes. The bill provides for the issue of a new design which alone will have currency after the war. Special arrangements would be made in the case of French gold held abroad.

### BOOKKEEPING MADE EASY.

A "Mere Man" reader of Our Consumers' League has ventured to step into the circle of contributors this week. He writes as follows:

I have been very much interested from time to time in the discussions in your column in regard to the importance of keeping household and personal accounts. This is somewhat of a hobby with me. There is another hobby of mine which was touched upon some weeks ago, namely, that of apportioning the income. I remember that your correspondent suggested that a family living on \$100 a month might allow one-sixth, or \$16 a month, for rent. I talked in over with my wife, and we wondered where in London a suitable house for family of that income could be found for \$16 a month. We were inclined to think this apportionment rather too low for rent.

But to return to the subject of keeping accounts, which seems to be a kind of bug-bear for a number of women, the other day I ran across a system of bookkeeping suggested by Miss B. M. Philip, lecturer, Macdonald College, Quapec, which perhaps will interest some of your readers.

Miss Philp says: "Keep accounts in order that you may see where your money has gone, and what proportion your respective expenditures bear to the whole outlay and to each other. ### FIVE CENTS FOR BUTTER, FIFTEEN FOR MOVIES.

Talking of the subject of apportioning the income, are you exercising thrift rathing of the subject of apportioning the income, are you exercising thrift in getting the most satisfaction out of yours? The whole of managing money isn't just to keep out of debt and perhaps have a little to lay by in the bank. There is still another principle involved, namely, getting the best returns in comfort, health and happiness for expenditure. Are you starving your mind that you may have a few more delicacies for the table, or denying yourself the music or lecture you are capable of enjoying in order to pay a few dollars mor for a spring hat? Are you dissipating your funds on unnecessary furbelow which will make the well-cut, substantial suit you need an impossibility?

Do you buy new ornaments for the living-room when you are sorely in need of a leak-less wash boiler and a new stew pan and kettle? Are you fairly and squarely meeting your patriotic, religious and philanthropic obligations, according to your means? Or are you excusing yourself on the ground, "things cost so much and you have no idea how the money goes," that you haven't anythere?

Ever hear of the kind of woman who fed her family on famine diet five days a week that she might spread an impressive feast for strangers who didn't really matter on the sixth day? Of course, you didn't think much of that kind of a person. You would be indignant if anyone should accuse you of being like her. But are you really showing very superior wisdom?

But are you really showing very superior wisdom?

You say, perhaps, so much is required for "bare necessities," you have scarcely anything left to "apportion." Why not try a re-apportionment for the necessities? It should be good mental exercise and add interest to the daily task of meeting the daily needs. Essentials must naturally come first. An important point to decide is what are essentials, and what are not. Good whole-some food is an essential, but not the most expensive cuts of meat. Medicus discoursed on this very point last week. A certain amount of amusement is required for good health and good spirits, but not pleasure at the expense of sufficient food. One of the extreme cases of misapportionment came to the notice of the writer recently. It happened in London.

The grocer found it impossible to cut the exact amount of cheese and when he was handing the little customer her parcels he said, "Tell mamma I could not cut the cheese exact to five cents worth, so here is seven cents worth of cheese and five cents worth of butter and thirteen cents to give back.

The tot looked worried. "O, dear," she said, "my mamma told me to get five cents worth of butter and five cents worth of cheese, and I must bring her fifteen cents, cause she wants to go to the moving pictures this afternoon."

What about the moral effect on the child of such a lesson as that in apportionment, or rather misapportionment?

I used to imagine I was suffering from starvation unless I had a nice fresh egg in the morning. I "starved" a number of weeks this winter, but substituted finally with bacon. I really believe after just a few days of experimenting that both my sister and I are feeling better than when we atte a more varied breakfast, which probably didn't provide nearly as much strength and energy.

We have our heavy meal at night. As we are employed until six

We have our heavy meal at night. As we are employed until six o'clock the only time we find for shopping is at noon, and this must be taken out of our eating hour. We are both going to have new spring outfits this year, the first in three years. As we get them so seldom, we like to be pretty sure we are buying the right thing. That gives us perched up at a lunch counter and ordered by number a cup of chocolate, a ham sandwich, a dab of ice cream, and two pieces of cake. 





Recruiting Officers Will Personally Interview Many of the Local Men.

Names of other classes of men have also been received, but it is to these men that the letters are being sent, as the names arrive from Ottawa, though the lists are by no means complete as yet. The work of sending out the letters will be continued until every eligible man has received one. The names of those to whom letters have been sent are also forwarded to the nearest recruiting officer, whose duty it is then to personally interview the man in question, and either obtain his enlistment or his reasons for not enlisting.

The letter follows:

"Dear Sir,—As you are no doubt aware, the board of national service, acting under authority of the Dominion Government, has recently made a registration of all males in Canada between the ages of 16 and 65 years. On the basis of this registration a list has been prepared, containing the names, addresses and occupations of several thousand men throughout Canada who are without dependents and are not deemed to be now engaged in work absolutely essential to the winning of the war, and who, by their statements, as made on the cards recently signed, could and should offer themselves for military service oversas. This list here ande on the cards recently signed, ould and should offer themselves for illitary service overseas. This list has sen handed to the department of milia and defence.

want an Answer.

"I beg to inform you that your name appears upon this list, and has been sent by me to the nearest recruiting officer in your district, who has instructions to interview you to secure your voluntary enlistment or a definite statement as to your intentions or reason, if any, for not enlisting.

"It may be that up to the present time you have had a perfectly legitimate reason for not joining the Canadian Expeditionary Force, but in view of the growing seriousness of the war situation and the pressing need in all branches of the service for men, it is surely not too much to ask you to examine that reason carefully in the light of conscience and of duty, and to decide whether it ought to hold good any longer. If, after weighing the matter, you feel that your country's call at the moment is louder and more imperative than any other call, and that you cannot honorably refuse it, and if you are of military age (18 to 45), perhaps you will make it unnecessary for a recruiting officer to wait upon you, by going to him yourself and voluntarily offering your services. If after medical examination you are found fit for military service, you will be assigned to whatever branch of the service you prefer or are physically qualified to join. If unfit, you will be granted a certificate to that effect.

### FOSTER WELLS ARE EXPECTED TO YIELD 2,000,000 GALLONS

Utilities Board to Take Up Options on Property.

AUDITOR'S HYDRO REPORT

Revenue Showed an Increase of About \$55,000 for the Year.

The utilities commission, at the regular session yesterday afternoon, decided to hook up the Foster wells with the city system, at a cost estimated at \$47,000. The options on the property expire in April, and they will be closed

at once.

Three producing wells are supplying water now, at a rate of over 1,000,000 gallons daily. Two others will be sunk at once. It is expected that over two millions will be obtained very soon. The conduits will be wood instead of iron, being cheaper and just as efficient. There was an alternative scheme proposed, that is, to pump the water direct into the mains. This would cost \$85,000, but the commissioners as well as the general manager favored the cheaper proposition.

Commissioner Mitchell thought that by sinking a trench deep enough, the water could be brought by gravity at a much smaller cost than by pumps. This will be investigated, and if feasible may be adopted. The Egerton street wells, two in number, producing 430,000 gallons a day, will be covered, and will only be used in case of emergency.




