





MILITIA DEPT.

AUTHORIZES 65

Reorganizes Artillery To Com-

memorate Overseas Units.

LONDON NOW HAS 12TH

Other Western Ontario Cities

To Have Units Under

New Scheme.

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—(By Canadian Press).—The initial phase of the reorganization of the Canadian militia was entered upon yesterday by the issue of an order by the militia department authorizing the organization of the field and heavy artillery of Canada. Under this order it is proposed to organize and train during the coming year 50 field batteries and 15 heavy or siege batteries.

Practically all the militia batteries except those that fought through the war under their militia numbers and designations are wiped out by this order, and batteries bearing the numbers of the batteries of the Canadian corps artillery are substituted. In this

corps artillery are substituted. In this way the newly-organized batteries will hear the numbers under which they fought in the war, except in a few instances where batteries were depot units that did not see service.

Overseas Officers.

All the brigades and batteries will be commanded by officers who have served overseas, and it is expected that a very large percentage of the men will be gunners with overseas ex-

men will be gunners with overseas ex-perience. It is hoped to select a con-siderable number of junior officers from the non-commissioned ranks who served with distinction in the war. In order that the batteries may not

have to travel long distances to the annual training, it is proposed to hold three or four training camps in June. These will probably be located at the Sarcee reserve in Alberta, Camp Hughes in Manitoba, Petawawa in Optarta and possibly one in the Maria

Ontario, and possibly one in the Maritime Provinces. This arrangement will mean a considerable saving of expense, as the batteries will not have to be taken long distances by rail, as was the case when all artillery had to be prought to Petawawa

Guns Are Arriving.

The guns for the batteries are already commencing to arrive from England, and will be issued in sufficient time to enable the batteries that have

been designated for training in 1920 to be armed and equipped for the

DID DANIELS THINK IT?

Secretary of the United States Navy Daniels promptly denied that he was the "high official" accused by Rear-Admira! Sims of warning him (Sims) not to let the British pull the wool over his eyes, and that, "we would as soon fight Great Britain as Germany." He now follows this up with a statement in the American press as to what he did say to Sims fust before the latter left for overseas to take command of the American fleet. Here is his explanation:

"At that time Congress had not declared war. Rear-Admiral Sims was cautioned to perform no act and to make public no statement that could commit this country to any course pending declaration of the country's policy by the president and the Congress. In this connection I reminded him of the statement in his Guildhall speech in England when he was a younger man, for which he was reprimanded by President Taft: 'If the time ever comes when the British Empire is seriously menaced by an external enemy, it is my opinion that you can count on every man every dollar, every drop of blood of your kindred across the sea.' I told him he was selected, not because of this speech, but in spite of it, believing he would exercise the discretion and diplomacy which the confidential nature of his mission necessitated."

Daniels declares he did not make the sensational remark that Sims says somebody was guilty of when he was receiving final instructions from the administration. Daniels' word must be taken on the matter, of course, but from a reading of his explanation it is not difficult to believe that the secretary of the navy felt somewhat as the "high official," presumably a .colleague, talked. As Mr. Daniels points out, when the instructions were given Sims the United States was not officially at war. The president and Congress had still to pass on the question. But to all intents and purposes America was in the war. Gerard been recalled from Berlin and Bernstorff from Washington and German submarines were sinking American vessels right and left, Germany having decided to defy the United States and stake everything on the submarine campaign. British fleets were protecting American ships and rescuing American sailors and citizens. It was to assist in this war on the U-boats and help sustain the blockade that Sims was being sent overseas. And it was certain-so effective was the Hun campaign at sea-that only the most powerful combination of Allied and American fleets and the greatest activity would prevail. Yet Mr. Daniels told Sims in the face of this that he was not expected to appear too kindly or friendly towards the British. Furthermore. for months after war was declared, according to Sims, the United States navy department showed an extraordinary listlessness in co-operating with the British fleets. Is it surprising that somebody, that "high official," took his cue from the attitude of Mr. Daniels, which

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—December exports decreased in value \$60,000,000 from the \$741,000,000 recorded for November, while imports dropped to \$381.000,000, a decrease of \$44,000,000, according to a statement today by the commerce department.

The excess of exports over imports for the action recognition of the statement to the sta

for the entire year 1919 reached \$4,017,-000,000, a high record. Exports totalled \$7.922,000,000, with imports amounting to \$3.904,000,000, compared with 1918 exports of \$6,149,000,000 and imports \$3,031,000,000.


IN POLICE COURT
