

She had been anchored to a pine tree near her shed after a short journey, during which, manned by the engineer, M. Juchmes, and two mechanics, she performed various evolutions over the Seine. 

#### LITTLE WATER IN BOILER

Expert Engineers Discover the Cause of the Toronto Explosion.

Toronto, Sept. 15. - A party of expert boiler men, O. P. St. John, J. E. C. Boyce, A. L. Wickens, and J. J. Main, superintendent of the Polson iron works, makers of the boiler, today inspected the boiler at the Toronto Bolt and Forging Company's works, which exploded vesterday. They found closed, and that, although the engineer thought there was plenty of water, the glass was no indication of the state of the boiler. As a matter of fact, Mr. Main says, there was only 14 inches of water in the bottom of the boiler. #### THE FAMOUS BLACK WATCH BAND DELIGHTS TWO LONDON AUDIENCES

Forty-Second Organization Difficult Programmes at Princess Rink.

us posed to attach to comparison, it is a comparison that is first thought on hearing the band of the Black Watchthe splendid concerts of the Coldstream Guards' Band having set a standard in band music that succeediry appearances of similar organizations are naturally judged by. The Forty-second Regiment came into existence, as such, in 1751, pendent companies having been formed some 22 years before, in 1729. During the century and a half that has elapsed, this historic regiment has taken a conspicuous and creditable part in events which every citizen of the empire is accustomed to hold in gagements of such epoch-marking wars as the American, Napoleonic, Crimean,

Indian, Soudan and South African.
The band, which was organized in 1790, has therefore traditions to uphold, such as should put every musician and officer on his mettle. And there is much appropriateness in the fact that the Black Watch Band is essentially a regimental one. Its playing is much more in keeping with the martial traditions of the regiment than the musical traditions of perhaps former concert organizations. There is even some suggestion in the almost

Coldstreams. There is an absence of detail, which, in music of this type is almost as important as general effect, and, indeed, is one of the dominant factors in the effect. To quote an example: The opening bars of "Tannhauser" are scored for clarionets, bas-soons and valve-horns. Everyone knows the sonorous, yet delicately beautiful effect, and this was obtained, generally speaking, by the Black Watch. But one missed the finish in phrasing and balance of tone which must be combined with beauty of tone -the players seemed to yield to the unwieldiness of their instruments. With that comment on this weakness, which ran through all their more am-

bitious numbers, unfavorable criticism ends.
