We feel that the loss brought about by your removal to another land will not be confined to Knox Church, where your christened character has been so much admired that every citizen of Listowel shall regret the departure of one who was universally considered one of its brightest ornaments. Although you are about to enter a land protected by a flag that to us, we shall always pray that the God of Jacob may continue to guide you in the path of righteousness and holiness. Permit us then, to offer you this silver pitcher, not for its intrinsic value, but as a memento of the good will and fellowship of the past.

THE HESS BOXES.—A public meeting was called on Saturday evening in the town hall by the worshipful Mayor for the purpose of ascertaining the feeling of the ratepayers in regard to the proposed bonus to Messrs. Hess Bros. There was a large proportion of ratepayers present, including the principal property owners in the town. His worship, who occupied the chair, advocated the granting of the bonus, and was of opinion that the proposition of Messrs. Hess Bros. was the best offer that had ever been made to the town. Messrs. J. W. Scott, R. Martin, D. B. Hay, and Geo. Draper, addressed the meeting, all of these gentlemen expressing themselves strongly in favor of the bonus. Mr. B. Rothwell took a different view of the question, his opinion of the system of giving bonuses to manufacturers was that it was wrong in principle. Mr. Geo. Hess upon being called to the platform, gave a short sketch of the firm's business from a very small beginning to its present large proportions. Concerning the proposition which the firm had made to the town, it had been made, not from a desire to get a bonus from the town, but in conformity with the wishes of many of the citizens to have their present shops removed from the centre of the town and to secure to the town an industry of such large proportions as they proposed to establish. Mr. Hess intimated that the withdrawal of their proposition would not lessen their interest in the prosperity of Listowel. They had no intention of moving their business to Palmerston or anywhere else; but would go on developing their business here as they were able to do. They had built upon a prosperous business here, would remain true to Listowel. At the conclusion of the speaking, the meeting almost unanimously manifested its approval of granting Messrs. Hess Bros. a bonus of \$17,000, there being only two or three hands held up to the contrary. We understand that since this meeting this enterprising firm have requested that the matter be laid over until January, to which the Council has patriotic. The interests of the town were not forgotten, and our efficient fire brigade, which is certainly a very important institution, received high commendation. The gathering broke up about midnight.

HYMNAL.—On Wednesday, at the residence of the bride's parents, Mr. Samuel Brickner, hardware merchant, of this town, and Miss Ada Campbell, daughter of our respected townsman, J. W. Campbell, Esq., were united in marriage. The nuptial knot being tied by Rev. T. W. Magaly, brother-in-law of the bride, assisted by Rev. G. B. Taylor of Listowel. The happy couple left by the afternoon train for their new home, from which they are expected to return in about a fortnight. A number of the wedding guests accompanied them to Stratford. We congratulate the young couple upon their good fortune in winning a bride so amiable and accomplished, and wish the happy couple a long life of conjugal felicity.

NEW SYNDICATE.—Another "huge monopoly" has been launched forth. This time it is a Perth-Sydney, and its chief members are understood to be Messrs. J. W. Scott, D. B. Hay, M. P. P., T. E. Hay, Mayor, and several other gentlemen of this town. J. A. Halsted, of Mt. Forest, and Messrs. Jas. Frow, M. P., and W. Buckingham of Stratford. It is the intention of the Syndicate, so we understand, to purchase some hundreds of thousands of acres of land in the North-western distance west of Stratford. The land is to be all in one block, and to ensure its early settlement a branch railroad is to be built through it. The Syndicate, like their greater prototype, will reserve alternate blocks of the land. The extent of the new Syndicate's plans have not as yet been made public. Messrs. T. E. and J. C. Hay, and Mr. J. A. Halsted have this week gone to Brandon, and no doubt when they return the scheme will be disclosed.

THE DEPUTY-REEVESHIP FOR 1892.—The opening of the International Hotel, recently purchased by Mr. Wm. Hagon, took place on Wednesday evening, the event being celebrated by a supper and dancing. A large number of invitations were issued, and were readily responded to, especially by the municipal candidates, upwards of a score of whom were present. After the initial valves had received full justice, J. W. Scott, Esq., was nominated chairman, and speeches were declared in order, and yet candidates were given an opportunity to air his eloquence. It is sufficient to state that there was nothing said that wouldn't wash down with lager, and that the town was promised sufficient good government to satisfy it for the next twenty years. The meeting voted the affair a grand success and mine host a "jolly good fellow," and the "International" a "happy hunting ground" for municipal candidates.

CHERRY MARKET.—From the report of the special committee appointed by the Town Council, which is published elsewhere, it will be seen that arrangements are being taken to establish a regular dairy market in Listowel. The Council has appropriated \$200 towards defraying the expenses, and has also granted the free use of the town hall for holding the market in. As it is understood that the dairymen of this town are favorable to having a market established here, and it would certainly be a material convenience to them, there does not appear to be anything to prevent the successful carrying out of the scheme. Dairymen during the past few years has become quite an important interest in this section, and if a market for their produce were its importance would no doubt very soon attract plenty of buyers. The committee purpose inviting the dairymen of the neighborhood to attend a meeting which is to be called for the purpose of discussing the matter and organizing a local association.

PRESENTATION.—On Monday evening a number of the members and adherents of Knox Church assembled at the residence of Mr. John Henderson, and presented his daughter, Miss Maggie Henderson, with a handsome silver pitcher and an address. McCullum, head master of the Listowel High School, read the address, which was replied to by D. D. Campbell, Esq., on behalf of the young lady. Mr. Campbell's remarks were very happy and appropriate.
