Almost every hamlet in Canada has a clean up week now, and our turn comes next week. We have the healthiest spot on earth to live in, proven by statistics such as this from 1919 to 1923 the average age at which our people died has been 79½ years which cannot be surpassed if equalled in any place that we can hear of.

Almost all our homes and yards are kept in first class shape, and many of our citizens have painted outside and in several times lately, but some have not, and it certainly pays to do so. Paint saves lumber and lumber is worth saving now.

A committee, consisting of Mrs. A. M. Slater and Messrs. W. A. Ryckman and C. P. McGregor, has been appointed by the citizens to assist in any advisory capacity possible to carry out this great improvement.

Paint will be cheaper next week at our local stores. Our local truck men and teamsters will give you special rates for the week, and if everyone joins in we won't know ourselves when we wake up on the 13th of May, but our property will be worth more and we will be proud of "Waterdown the Beautiful."

## Letter of Protest

By request we publish the letter from the congregation of St. Thomas Church to the Community Hall Board protesting against the use of the building by J. J. Maloney, who had secured the hall for last Tuesday evening. At a special meeting of the Board on Monday evening, the resolution granting him the hall was rescinded. Mr. Maloney was taken to the Orange hall where he delivered his lecture.

Waterdown, April 28th, 1923

To the Board of Managers of the Community Memorial Hall:

We, the Congregation of St. Thomas' R. C. Church, Waterdown, having learned that you have consented to rent the new Memorial Hall on Tuesday night, May 1st, 1923, to a lecturer who is endeavoring to create bad relations between our Protestant neighbors and ourselves, by his creed references and allegations which are unjustified and untrue, do hereby strenuously and most vigorously protest against his presence here in a building which we were all given clearly to understand, was erected to the memory of our valiant and self-sacrificing martyrs of all creeds on the battlefield who died shoulder to shoulder for the great cause of Liberty within the British Empire, without any thought whatever of a man's religious views, which of course, as all fair thinking citizens agree, is the great policy of our Great British Empire, namely: Civil and Religious Liberty. Our poor soldiers shed their blood for that specific cause and at a great price of both blood and money obtained it. We feel that you will never agree, as British subjects to condone in this work any fanatic, who has been ostracized by his own action in his irregular business conduct.

Furthermore, there is no discrimination whatever among the different creeds with regard to the high taxes caused by the construction and maintenance of our Memorial Hall, also no discrimination in the peoples' minds with regard to the respect and honor for the fallen dead now sleeping their long sleep in Flanders Fields, having protected us from slavery. We are absolutely certain that the high Dignitaries of our Protestant churches would never countenance either in thought or action the privilege of entering by that agitator our much respected building which was erected for the sacred purpose of honoring the fallen heroes not of any one class, but for all. We, as a congregation, therefore ask you to respect our wishes in this matter, or accept the responsibility of flatly refusing our request.

In conclusion, please remember that the Padres of all creeds died in each others arms, with thought only of God and Eternity. If those great men of exalted minds died in that spirit, surely it should be a good enough example for the community of the village of Waterdown to follow, both in spirit and in action. Trusting that you will respect this protest, we beg to remain, Yours faithfully as British subjects,
