

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



### Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any made over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Naskatchewan or Alberta, Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominiot Lands Agency (out not Sub-Agency,) on certain conditions.

certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with n nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A babitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader is good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his hemstead. Pric. \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation Pre-emption patent may be obtained also so as homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation pre-emption patent may be obtained also so as bimestead patent, on certain conditions.

Duties—Must reside six m onto out of the years, cultivate 50 acres and exect a house worth \$300.
