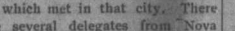

Of these 423,556 were sent to London, 67,100 to Liverpool, 26,219 to Glasgow and 14,853 to Hull, the latter being shipped from Annapolis. These with 255 barrels sent by way of Montreal, make up the total given above. About 50,000 barrels were sold in Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Cape Breton and Eastern Nova Scotia.

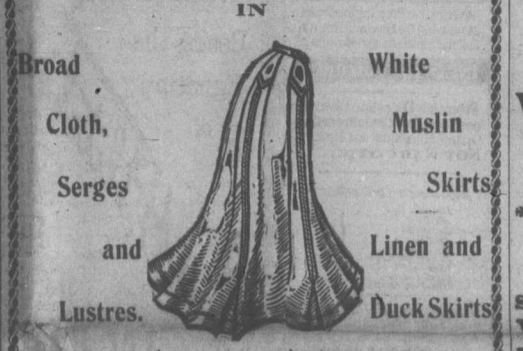

The Impoverishment of Crime.
One of the yellow journals of New York, the one which has been most heartless in invading privacy and tossing the names of the innocent into the street for the brutal to play with, the one which has probably contributed more to the breaking down of modesty and the promulgation of crime than any other force, is having a series of sensational articles on the Ten Commandments. It hires great dilettantes to write for it over their own names, and so to give it absolute in the eyes of the great public for all its crimes and a plenary indulgence for the further prosecution of its work of devastation. As between the newspaper and the theatre, with its posters, it is hard to say which is more responsible—the work responsible can be applied to either for the criminal conditions which are increasing so rapidly. A certain sort of moralists, or rather non-moralists, have a way of making out that wretchedness is the cause of crime and drunkenness instead of crime and drunkenness being the cause of wretchedness. They keep sneering at efforts to make men good, and say you must improve their conditions and then they will get good of themselves. Well, there has never been a time of greater prosperity than the last few years. Yet the development of crime in the large cities of the United States is astonishing and appalling. Chicago has had a hundred and twenty-five murders this year, and only two or three convictions. Chicago had three hundred and ninety-four burglaries in October, and only eighty-eight arrests. In four days twenty persons were held up on the streets and robbed—some were shot. Two men were beaten into unconsciousness and robbed. One of the highway robberies was by girls. Several places of business were held up. An attempt was made to hold up a street car. Innumerable people are found to carry concealed weapons. Of the thousands charged with this dangerous and useless irregularity more than half are discharged without punishment.—M. Withers.
