The Treaty of Versailles and the peace settlement with Germany will become effective, it is asserted in well informed circles in Paris, on November 28th. The signature of the protocol and the exchange of ratifications between Germany and such allied powers as have then ratified the treaty, will take place on that date, it is reported.

The forty-eight hour week was adopted by the International Labor Conference at Washington last week after a five hour fight for the passage of the resolution. The vote was 55 to 2. The two seconded votes against the motion for adoption were Mr. Draper, Canadian workers' delegate, and Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labor. The working week, however, is to be governed by the exigences of the different plants and industries and agreements for longer working hours may be made where employees and operators find it ne-cessary and employees willingly teren into such agreement. Scotland is to vote on liquor licenses this coming Summer. Electors will have a threefold choice. By a cross on the ballot paper they can signify their preference for: No change in the number of licenses, Reduction of licenses, Aboliation of all licenses. If aboliation is carried, all licenses will end on May 28 following. But this "No license" reduction can be carried only if 55 per cent? of the votes recorded are in favor of it and if these number not less than 35 per cent of the electors on the register. If a district goes "dry" the sale of drink will stop entirely with this exception, that under special circumstances the licensing board may allow certain hotels or restaurants to sell drink to residents or to those taking a meal, but there is to be no drinking-bar.

Under this Act the open seasons for migratory game birds are lim-ited to a period of three and onehalf months, and insectivorous birds and many birds, other than game birds, are protected through-out the year. In addition, many of the species of shore-birds and the eider ducks are protected throughout the year.

Any person having these pro

tected birds in their possession is liable to a heavy penalty, and any equipment used in capturing them illegally may be confiscated.

As Mr. Tufts will be supported

by an able staff of deputy officers, any person who goes afield with a gun should be sure of the provi-sions of this federal law.

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



In America from the year 1750 until the beginning of the temperance agitation, was a period of sad debauchery. The mother was stupified heavily with intoxicants while in labor. The babe was given liquor, too, for medicine. Alcohol ruled at weddings and christenings, also at funerals.

About 1840 a temperance society was organized at Baltimore composed mostly of drunkards of long standing. Through the tears and pleadings of his twelve-yearold daughter, Hannah, John Hawkins, a confirmed drunkard, was among the first to join this society.. He was a man of extraordinary ability and soon developed into a powerful speaker.

The work grew rapidly and it was his influence which added force and life to the movement. In a two weeks' series of rallies in New York, 2,500 drunkards pledaed themselves to give up drink At the first anniversary of the founding of this society in Baltimore, April 5th, 1841, six thous-
