

While returns showing the ber which have been killed during the last fiscal year are not yet available the indications are the number of bob cats which have been killed will exceed that of the previous year. Applications for the bounty offered are required to present themselves before a game warden where the tip of the animal's tail is amputated by the official and a declaration made out by the hunter to the effect that the animal was killed by him

Last week at Doaktown during one morning no less than six hunters appeared before Game War den Harry Eussell for the purpose of claiming the bounty.

Requests for additional declara tion forms have been received from game officials on the Tobibue McAdam and the south eastern see tion of the province, the origina supplies of these forms having been exhausted in those sections From Hampton came the reque for a permit to carry a rifle in the woods from a young man who claimed to have shot a bob-cat in self defence.

A large number of hunters have brought their skins here for the purpose of obtaining the bounty and have made their declaration before the officials of the Depart ment of Lands and Mines. In addition to the \$3 bounty paid by the department the skins sell at \$2.00 to \$3.00 each. A few years ag bob cat skins were as high at \$18 but when the price reached such a peak the bounty was removed.

# KODAK MAGNATE GIVES \$15,000,000 TO AID EDUCATION

George Eastman, president of the Eastman Kodak Company is finding it troublesome to be making money all the time.

In order to be rid of the annovance of piling fortune on fortune he announced recently new gifts amounting to \$15,000,000 in stock or his company. This makes a total of \$30,000.000 he has given away to various institutions.

"One of the reasons why I wish this disposition of my kodak stock is that i tseparates me from making money for myself and will give me the benefit of a somewhat more detached position in respect to human affairs. I look forward with interest to finding out how much the changed conditions will affect my aspect."

The institutions benefited by this gift announced and the amounts they will receive are, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, \$4,500.000; Eastman School of Music of the Uni versity of Rochester \$3 000 000. Ilni Warrity of Rochester Medical School 1.000.000; University of Rocheste College for Women \$1.500,000; Hamp ton Instute \$1,000,000 and Tuskegee Institute 1.000,000

The total of gifts which Massachu setts Tech has received from Mr Eastman is \$15,000,000. For a long time he poured great sums money into the college treasury an onymously, his name being known only to the officials of the institu-

gifts of stock announced, the phil antrophist had given away more than half of his holdings in the great business he has built With the stock to be delivered un der these new gifts, he will rid him self of all of his holdings excep sufficient to insure himself a place in the management. It is probable that never in the history of American philanthrophy has any individual given away so great a share of his fortune. The late Andrew Carnegle may have exceeded Mr. Eastman's liberality for he was often quoted as saying he wanted to die poor. He failed to die that way. The Exckerfeller Foundation has expend ed a greater total, but the Rockerfeller properties keep on earning vast sums.

One of the kodak millionaire's savings, which may be a guide to the spirit in which he gives is this anything. He only distributes a part of his surplus. It is the person of moderate means, the poor manwho really gives.'

One of the beauties of Mr. East man's manner of giving that, while the great business he has practical ly turned over in a financial way is in the hands of institutions he will still continue to work making money for his beneficiaries, more for them than he can possibly make for himself.

Although seventy years old Mr. Eastman clean shaven and with the flush of health in his cheeks, looks a great deal younger. He retains his passionate lovefor music, his interest in hospitals and institutions of learning and his devotion to his many employees. ### IS YOUNGEST OFFICIAL OF CANADIAN PACIFIC



LEO SOLLOWAY

Leo Solloway, recently appointed Asiatic Freight Agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway with office at Montreal and supervision over Oriental and Australasian traffic via Pacific Ports.

Born in Vancouver in 1895, Mr. Solloway has the distinction now of being the youngest official in Canadian Pacific service, a distinction which he has won through fourteen years' service in the freight department of the Company. He commenced work as stenographer in the steamship department of the General Freight office in Vancouver in 1910, and remained in that department until 1915 when he enlisted for active service with the 72nd Highlanders. He returned from overseas in the Fall of 1917 and was attached to the steamship export department in Vancouver until 1918 when he was loaned to the British Ministry of Shipping, acting as assistant to the agent of the Ministry at the Pacific port.

In June 1919, Mr. Solloway went to Montreal as chief clerk to the Asiatic Freight Agent. Two years later he was appointed chief clerk to the General Foreign Freight Agent, and last May appointed as Acting Asiatic Freight Agent which office has been confirmed by promulgation.

### Says Hetherington Leading For Senate

Dr Walter E. Foster former Premier of New Brunswick are just as active as ever on his behalf and they are confident that he will yet emerge the victor for his services to his political party.

These committees and boards will be replaced by permanent bodies when the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church meets and reorganises on June 10 and the work of the church will continue without

interruption. The bo Prosbyteries will be fixed as condidone may require. We wish to sure Ministers, Missionaries and Members who remain Presbyterias that full provision will be made to assist them In their work where as
