

How to Lower Mortality of Young Lambs-Best Methods of Caring For Both Ewe and Lamb

Contributed by Ontario Department of

LANS are being carefully evolved by the Department of Agriculture to continue experiments, begun last year, it is expected will have farreaching results for the potato industry in Ontario. The investigations which officials of the Department are making are thorough and extensive, and consequently somewhat slow. But it is confidently believed that within a few years potato seed grown in Ontario will be in great demand not only by other parts of the Dominion, but by many districts of the United States. This, it is anticipated, will be a distinct boon to the farmers of the province.

The two-fold program which was inaugurated last year of certifying a high standard of potato seed and making a survey to detect diseases is to be carried on on a much wider scale this coming season. Reports from the various inspectors have now been compiled by the Department, and the statistics are of considerable interest to the progressive and up-to-date agriculturist. The two founda-tion varieties which the Department is showing—Irish Cobbler, the early seed, and the Green Mountain—have been the subject of widespread discussion. There has been much dif-ference of opinion as to which is the better for general table use. The reports for last year clearly prove that the Green Mountain is the best variety for the general farmer. Seed of these two varieties from three dif-ferent sources—Northern Ontario, New Brunswick and Old Ontario has been experimented with and districts in different parts of the pro-vince. These show the following average yields per acre:
Irish Cobbler—Northern Ontario,
153.4; New Brunswick, 148; Old

Ontario, 127. Green Mountain—Northern Ontario, 177.5; New Brunswick, 137.3; Old Ontario, 167.8. The general average per acre on the different plots was:

Irish Cobbler planted in sand,

to the acre from seed planted on

Green Mountain planted on sand, 169.3, and 153.2 bushels planted on clay, a yield of 16.1 more bushels per acre from seed planted on sand.

The two main factors contributing during the lambing period. Plenty of exercise coupled with a sufficient amount of the right kind of feed to condition will usually result in the birth of active, rugged lambs for which the mother will have a liberal supply of milk. In practically every flock, no matter how well cared for, the attendant must be on hand frequently, day and night, during the period the lambs are arriving. A little attention at the proper time will often result in the saving of not

a few lambs. Absolute dryness and freedom from draught are very essential for the flock, and when the lambs are provision should be made for reasonable protection from the cold.

Wool balls in the stomach is often

the cause of much loss in young lambs. This trouble as well as diffi-culty in getting the lambs to nurse may be avoided by clipping away all loose and dirty wool from around the udder and quarters of the ewes. Provision should be made for a few small pens located along the warmest side of the building. The ewe to lamb is much safer separated from the main flock and in cases of difficult parturition, weak lambs, ewes disowning their lambs and numerous other difficulties that may arise they can be looked after a great deal more satisfactorily when confined in small enclosures. It not infrequently happens that a ewe has difficulty in delivering her lamb; this is more common in the case of young ewes with their first lamb. When the lamb has come forward far enough so that the nose and front feet are in sight and the head is unable to pass through the ewe should be assisted by gentle pulling on the forefeet. If this fails smear the inside of the vagina well with linseed oil, this has the effect of softening Apply this soothing. penetrating and allowing the opening to stretch severe one, give relief. # Land and Loans—to Help Soldiers Become Farmers

IT is anticipated that a great many soldiers who have served with the Canadian, British or Allied forces may want to become farmers in Canada. The vital need to-day is to increase production and the acreage under cultivation. It is thus in Canada's best interests to give these soldiers every assistance. The Government has therefore been developing a programme that includes the providing of land, the granting of loans and the training and supervision of those inexperienced in farming.

The Present Plan.

Under the Soldier Settlement Act, 1917, an eligible returned soldier is entitled, in addition to his ordinary homestead right, to a free grant of one quarter-section of Dominion Lands on homestead conditions.

For this purpose the Government has suspended homestead entry by others than soldiers on all remaining homestead lands in the Western provinces within fifteen miles of railway transportation, pending enquiry into their suitability.

As soon as a soldier goes on the land, the Board has power to grant him a loan up to the maximum of \$2,500.

This loan is granted to settlers to help them acquire land for farming, discharge incumbrances, undertake improvements, erect buildings and secure necessary livestock, machinery and equipment.

It is not given as an actual advance of cash, but in the form of payment for expenditures. In this way the settlers' transactions are carefully supervised.

The loan is made at the low interest rate of five per cent. It is to be repaid in twenty annual instalments. The first two payments may be deferred by the Board when desirable.

The New Proposal.

The Government have found it necessary to broaden these original plans for the following reasons:

(a) It has been found that only a limited amount of suitable homestead land is available for soldier settlement.

(b) Some Crown lands are held by the Provinces.

(c) Homesteading may not suit all the returned soldiers.

It is now proposed that the Provincial Governments co-operate with the Soldier Settlement Board in acquiring suitable lands at present held uncultivated by private owners. The Dominion Government has announced its intention of introducing necessary legislation along these lines at the opening of the next Session.

The lands so bought will be re-sold to the soldier at cost price. It is suggested that the purchaser be required to make a cash payment of one-tenth of the purchase price. The balance will be payable in equal annual instalments extended

over twenty years or longer. The amount of the land purchased by this plan, if it is approved by Parliament, will be limited in value to \$5,000. Interest will be charged at a low rate of five per cent.

When these new proposals for land pur-chase become effective the Board will be able to loan the soldier settler up to a total of \$1,500 for the purchase of livestock and equipment in addition to the lean for the purchase of his land. It will he granted on practically the same terms as the loans now allowed.

As the soldier improves his farm the Board may advance him a further \$1,000.

Who May Apply

The Act applies to any one who has served with an honourable record in the Canadian or Imperial forces in the present war, or to any Canadian who was on active service with the Allied forces, or the widow of any such person who died on active service.

The Board will loan money only to those who have had sufficient experience or training in farming. Each applicant may be required to appear in person before the Qualification Committee in his district.

Training

Those soldiers who have had insufficient experience in farming will be helped by the Board to secure the necessary training to qualify them for the loans.

Special instructional courses are being arranged with the agricultural schools and experimental farms.

Farmers will be asked to co-operate in giving the soldier practical training and knowledge.

Expert Assistance

The work of the Soldier Settlement Board is carried out by Supervisors in each of the provinces.

These supervisors have under them a staff of land appraisers to valuate the land, and farming advisors or practical farmers in the community to advise the soldier after he has definitely settled on

Qualification Committees are being appointed in each Province to advise the Board as to the qualifications of each applicant.

Results

Loans, amounting to over 11 million dollars, have already been granted to over one thousand returned soldiers.

Since the regulations were completed last July, over eight hundred soldiers have made entries on Dominion Crown Lands under the Soldier Settlement Act.







Straw May be Used Much More Freely for Idle Horses.

HE-year 1917 provided, bott in the United States and in Ontario, conditions very un favorable for the production good seed corn. Excess of moisture in the crop was followed by treezing and these conditions result ed in one of the worst seed cort rears in a generation. As a result of the seed corn sown in entario in 1918 was, to say the least varieties that were late in maturng. A very high percentage of this corn which will be used for seed next rear, now contains a large amount of moisture. To make this corn of the greatest value for seed purposes, it should be harvested, if possible, be-fore heavy frost and thoroughly dried. Maturity is one of the essentials in producing good seed corn, but no less important is the thorough drying of

It is not even necessary for corn to be frozen to lose some of its vital-ity, it will deteriorate at ordinary temperatures if not well dried. When freezing occurs, greater loss in vitality is experienced.
