



Unfortunately Dr. Brehm was not able to trace the origin. In commenting on this failure to trace the original cause he says:—

"This is not surprising, in view of the fact that more than two weeks had elapsed since the first case occurred—and, further, that it is now a matter of common knowledge that the slightest form of sore throat which causes no illness and very little inconvenience, may be diphtheritic in nature, though not recognizable as diphtheria without a bacteriological examination. These mild and unrecognized cases are nevertheless, capable of giving rise to the disease in a severe form in other persons who are more susceptible. It will thus be seen that an outbreak of diphtheria may easily occur, even in a comparatively isolated place like Trepassey.

Through the failure to reach a definite cause for the outbreak, it became all the more necessary to investigate the symptoms which afflicted Mary Hagerty, and this Dr. Brehm did.

He found that the Molloy child first attacked was said to have been in contact with Mary Haggerty, but so were many others from all parts of the settlement, but the only outbreak was in the Molloy family.

He found also that the suspicion that Mary Hagerty had diphtheria arose two days after Mary Hagerty's burial, when the outbreak occurred in Molloy's house.

Dr. Brehm's Report

On the Diphtheria at Trepassey
We append the report of Dr.
Brehm on his investigation into the outbreak of diphtheria and into its origin. It was furnished to us by Hon. R. Watson, Colonial Secretary.

Department of Public Health,
St. John's, Newfoundland.
December 13th, 1910.
Sir.—I beg to report that, in accordance with the instructions of the Government. I visited Trepassey on the 9th instant for the purpose of enquiring into the reported outbreak of diphtheria at that settlement. I found that the outbreak was limited to the house of James Molloy—no less than ten cases having occurred in his family. The cases were of a very severe type, and only one member of nis family. The cases were of a very severe type, and only one member of the family has escaped infection. Up to the time of my visit three deaths had occurred, and a fourth child was then in a critical condition. I have since been informed by Dr. Giovanetti that this child died on the 11th, but that all the others are doing well. Strict quarantine has been enforced by the magistrate. Dr. Giovanetti and by the magistrate, Dr. Giovanetti, and all possible steps have been taken to prevent the further spread of the dis-

with the object of tracing, if possible, the origin of the outbreak, I visited—with Dr. Giovanetti—a number of persons who have been more or less connected with the matter, including the Molloy family and the family of the deceased girl. Many Hagerty, who was said to have suffered from diphtheria shortly after returning from the General Hospital. I obtained the following facts in connection with this patient: Mary Hagerty arrived at Trepassey on the 13th of November, having been discharged from the General Hospital as an infrom the General Hospital as an in-curable case of tuberculosis. She was extremely ill and weak on land-ing, and, gradually becoming worse. died on the 21st. She was not seen by a doctor after leaving the Hospital, and it is therefore impossible to obtain an accurate description of her symptoms or condition; but the girl's mother and sister, who were in constant attendance upon her, state positively that she did not complain of sore throat at any time after her return home, and that she was able to swallow solid food without discomfort up to an hour or two before her Against this I could only elicit some vague and conflicting statements by neighbours to the effect that some swelling of the neck or face was noticeable after death, and that they believed the girl had had sore throat. There does not appear to have been any suspicion that the girl had had diphtheria until the disease appeared in a neighbouring bouse two days after her/burial. Tho Molloy child first attacked by diphtheria was said to have been in con-tact with Mary Hagerty several times during the last few days of her life, but this is true also of a number of others, and during the two days which elapsed between the death and burial the Hagerty house was visited in the usual way by a large number of persons, both children and adults, from all parts of the settlement. Man of these persons ate and drank in the house, in which there had, of course, been no attempt at disinfection. In been no attempt at disinfection. these circumstances it would be very remarkable—if Mary Hagerty had died of diphtheria—that only one per-While it is, of course, now impossible o obtain absolute proof, there is, in my opinion, no reason whatever to believe that the deceased suffered from diphtheria, or that the outbreak in the Molloy family originated in this way.

I regret that the most careful enquiries, made during the limited time at my disposal, as well as by Dr. Giovanetti before my visit, have failed to trace the origin of the outbreak. This is not surprising, in view of the fact that more than two weeks had elapsed since the first case occurred; and, further, that it is a matter of common knowledge that the slightest form of sore throat, which causes no illness and very little inconvenience, may be diphtheric in nature, though not recognizable as diphtheria with out a bacteriological examination.

These mild and unrecognized cases are, nevertheless, capable of giving rise to the disease in a severe form in other persons who are more susceptible. It will thus be seen that an outbreak of diphtheria may easily occur, even in a comparatively isolated place like Trepassey, which is not traccable to any well-marked or recognizable coefficients. cognizable case.

As seventeen days have now elapsed since the first case was recognized and quarantine was established, and no case has occurred outside the fanily originally infected, there is every reason to hope that there will be no further spread of the disease in Trepassey.

The Gulf Stream and Its Influence

on Europe.

remarkably mild, not only in New-foundland but also on Labrador. There has also been a marked absence of ice. I have always maintained that our climate is greatly influenced by the Gulf Stream. Anyone who observed the weather in November would be greatly struck with the continuance day after day of south-erly winds. The general idea about this great ocean current of warm water is that it-strikes off east a long way south of our island. We have, however, outside proof that it approaches much nearer to our shores. We see this often in the dead of winter when there comes a southerly wind and we feel a warm blast al-most like summer evidently from the Gulf Stream. Lest my readers should think that this is all absurd and the offspring of my senile imagination, I enclose the following extract from the London Times of 2nd Dec., 1910:

SEVERE WINTER PREDICTED.

Dr. H. Habenicht, a member of the staff of Perthes great geographical establishment at Gotha, has for several years endeavoured to make a forecast of the winter weather, largely from observations on the Gulf Stream and the movements of the ice in the Arctic and southwards. This year he ventures to forecast a hard winter. From the uniform distribution of temperature in the Gulf Stream, a result of the scarcity of ice this year round Newfoundland, and from the extraordinary large masses of drift ice during the summer between North Cape and Spitzbergen, he concludes that there will be unusually hard and continuous cold during the coming winter in SEVERE WINTER PREDICTED. cold during the coming winter in

Europe.

The want of temperature variations in the Gulf Stream leaves little room for low North Atlantic minima, and the ice masses around the North Cape favour the extension of the Siberian high pressure and cold region westwards. In Central Europe hard winters often set in about the end of

November or the beginning of December, after a new or full moon, with considerable precipitation, followed immediately by east winds and cold weather.
