



Hr. Grace Not

The sad news was flashed on wires from Sydney on Saturday. James Pike, son of Mr. and Mrs. Pike, of Harvey Street, had been crushed to death at that place on previous day. James Pike was bright young fellow of only 18 of age. He was a member of K. E. B., and Secretary of the Edward Branch of the C. B. B. is only about three weeks since his brother Alan and several young men that he left here for money. The awful news has gloom over the whole town. The body arrived by train last night, and with the whole community offering our sympathy to the family.

Mr. William Sparkes, of Harvey, passed away on Friday night at short illness. His funeral took place on Sunday afternoon and was held at 2 o'clock.

Mrs. Richard Smallcombe, of the head, whom we referred to last, as being very ill passed away at 11 o'clock on Friday. Much sympathy is expressed by the husband and other relatives of young woman, who was well and favourably known here.

The Supreme Court sat here on Saturday morning when the case of The King vs. Richard Sparkes for breaking and entering the premises of Mr. James Cron, in August, with the intent to steal, came up for hearing before a Special Jury composed of the following:—John Ash, Ed. Taylor, Geo. Willie, James Moore, Andrew Power, James Clarke, A. Norcott, Arthur Heath, James Walsh, W. A. McKay, Frank Cody. Several witnesses were examined for the Crown. Mr. Sparkes conducted the case for the defence and was ably assisted by Mr. A. Morine. The prosecution was conducted by Mr. W. R. Howley and Mr. W. R. Warren. After the witnesses had been examined, and the accused had given a statement, very addresses were delivered by Mr. Squires and Mr. Warren. As the jury by this time 20 minutes of Sunday His Lordship deferred the case till Monday morning at 11 o'clock. The jury were allowed to separate and sufficient accommodation could be had for them. At 11 o'clock the case was continued, and His Lordship Justice Johnson delivered his charge to the jury, who shortly before 1 o'clock retired to their room to render their verdict. At 2 o'clock they returned to court, and announced through their foreman, W. A. McKay, that they had found the accused guilty of having entered the shop with intent to steal. Mr. Squires, for the defence, objected and gave notice of appeal at once. The case will likely conclude at St. John's on Wednesday.

Special Evening Telegram. SOFIA, Dec. 4.

Peace plenipotentiaries, representing Turkey, Bulgaria, Serbia, and Montenegro, will begin work in London on Friday of next week. The armistice was signed last evening at the village of Bagchetsah on the Tcha-talja lines, and took the revised form drafted by Dr. Daneff, Speaker of the Bulgarian Parliament. It contains the following conditions:—

- (1) The belligerent armies shall remain in the positions they at present occupy.
(2) The besieged Turkish fortresses shall not be revictualled.
(3) Re-victualling of the Bulgarian Army in the field shall be carried out by way of the Black Sea and Adrianople, commencing ten days after the signature of the Armistice.
(4) Negotiations for peace shall begin in London on Dec. 12th.

It is officially announced that the Greek plenipotentiaries at Bagchetsah did not definitely reject the terms of the armistice, but reserved their decision for twenty-four hours. Even in the event of her declining to approve the armistice protocol, Greece will participate in the peace negotiations at London.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 4.

A Vienna despatch to the Telegraph says that the Little Kingdom of Serbia becomes daily more and more dreaded as the point on which the peace of Europe depends. This is because she and others believe that Russia will support her through thick and thin, despite the fact that Russia has made every effort to persuade Serbia to adopt a reasonable attitude. These efforts have been made by secret diplomacy, and something more overt is necessary to bring about the desired results. The Servians, to-day, are too excited and too over-wrought by their successes to recognize the danger which their attitude threatens Europe. The European Powers should, therefore simultaneously take Serbia in hand, and demand the immediate evacuation of Albanian territory, failing which Austria and Italy should be empowered to turn her troops out of Durazzo, Alessio and elsewhere. If it is said that Serbia will probably climb down at the last moment, but Austria's patience is not inexhaustible, and it will be well for Serbia, if she does not delay too long.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 4.

Comparative quiet reigns in the Balkan districts, since the signing of the armistice, but the tangle between the Powers persists, and is becoming even more accentuated as the days pass. Russia has retorted to what she terms the rattling of the German sword by the Imperial Chancellor, by saying that the methods resorted to when Austria occupied Bosnia and Herzegovina will not now be admitted. The prominence given by Chancellor von Bethmann Hollwig to the idea of war is resented by the St. Petersburg press, the trend of the comments being voiced by the Novye Vremya, which says that history is repeating itself, but it is not now so easy to force Russian diplomacy into a faint-hearted retreat. Intimidation will frighten nobody. The immediate withdrawal of the vast Russian deposits from German banks is now advocated by many Russian journals. The war parties of both Russia and Austro-Hungary seem to hold the stage for the moment against the peaceably disposed ministers of these countries, and any untoward action by Serbia might set Austria in motion, this would probably let loose the forces in Russia that the Czar, himself, would be unable to resist. Should Greece persist in her refusal to adhere to the armistice, this would throw Bulgaria more closely into the embrace of Servian, and give fresh encouragement to Servian resistance to the Powers, who are practically unanimous in condemning the Servian demands. If Austria should attempt to employ Roumania to keep Bulgaria quiet, as has been suggested, such action would only enlarge the area of conflict and precipitate a general catastrophe.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 4.

Any intervention by Roumania would, it is argued, compel Russia to take drastic action on behalf of the Slavs in the Balkans. Diplomats realize that the crisis demands immediate treatment, and efforts are being made to bring about an ambassadorial conference as quickly as possible, in the hope of thereby extinguishing the incendiary tendencies of the extremists. It is believed that Greece will ultimately adhere to the armistice.

DUBLIN, Dec. 4.

Promises and Performances.

Yesterday we made a contrast between Morris's pledges and his performances to cheapen coal at once, should be got into power.

We drew attention to the promise that he would develop the coal areas immediately on his advent to office, and referred to the evidence of Mr. Howley that up to the present, neither money nor men are forthcoming even to explore the coal areas, which contained hundreds of millions of tons of coal.

A second line of relief to the serious situation on the coal question was promised, and that was "the utilization of our peat fields to meet the price of coal, and the depletion of the stock of fire-wood in our forests."

We have voiced protests which have come to us of the depletion of the timber on the three mile limits, the ground reserved to supply the fishermen with fire-wood and fishery supplies. But we know of no development of our peat fields, which has in the remotest degree helped to abate the national grievance about the price of coal. On the contrary, the price is much higher now than it was when Sir Edward made the promise we have shown he has broken.

But these promises are by no means the only pledges Sir Edward has not kept.

He promised a reduction of taxation so that it would lean equitably on the fishing and laboring classes. But they are still paying the very heavy taxes on tea, sugar, pork and the other prime necessities, which Sir Edward pledged himself to put on the Free List.

Sir Edward promised the establishment of Cold Storage for Bait, so that all fishermen needing bait could get it. The fishermen were calling for bait all last season and calling for Government assistance. Indeed the only persons satisfied by the action of the Government over our bait are the American Press, which told of extraordinary concessions to an American Fishing Company.

At Burin, fourteen months ago, Sir Edward told the people that his Government had "made contracts with foreign companies for the development of our peat, coal, and beach-stone industries, the manufacture of explosives, the smelting of copper by the establishment of smelters, and the establishment of woollen factories and cold storage for fish."

But where are these industries today? We know of no company manufacturing peat in the country. We hear of no coal being mined. Explosives are not being manufactured here. No copper is being smelted. Cold storage of fish is still an unde-

Special Evening Telegram. PARIS, To-Day. Billy Papke, American fighter, defeated Geo. Bernard, the French middleweight, for the middleweight championship. Papke was awarded the decision after 17 rounds, when the Frenchman was unable to respond to the call of time.

OTTAWA, To-Day. To-day promises to be one of the most memorable of all the great days the Commons have seen. Premier Borden will begin the announcement of Conservative policy for increasing the effective naval force of the Empire. The announcement has been awaited keenly. The nature of the proposals Borden will lay before Parliament has been the subject of many conjectures, and will involve very great consequences to the Empire and the current of world politics.

WASHINGTON, To-day. New York City is about to inaugurate elaborate plans for waterfront improvement, which will require several years to construct. They will permanently provide for the largest ships to be built without extending pier head lines further into the fairway of the Hudson. While the Secretary for War has granted or denied an extension, Congress, as the last resort, is appealed to, to save time in an emergency.

The vast interests involved are the location of the pier head lines on the Hudson river, says Mr. Gardiner, so far transcend the importance of those of any single riparian owner, that he believes Congress will give relief by passing legislation to the effect that all commercial organizations of New York City.

Lost Overboard.

The schr. Excelsa was towed to port by the tug Ingraham at 7 p.m. yesterday, a week out from Sydney coal laden to Harbor Grace. The vessel had a very rough voyage, and in the storm encountered her sails were badly blown by the crew, and were carried away, and she carried a "goose wing" fore and aft. The accident occurred at 10 p.m. Tuesday, near Bay Bulls, by how it happened is not definitely known by the crew, but it is reported that the mainsail was being put on the vessel when the boom suddenly swung over and striking the mainmast, it fell into the water. It was very dark at the time and the vessel was running at a good clip. The cry of the captain could be heard for some time, but it was impossible to search for him, as the dory on the deck had been badly smashed with the sea. The mate, who is a brother of the captain, took charge of the ship after the accident. The drowned man was 32 years of age, single, and leaves a father and mother and several relatives to mourn him.

This morning the evidence of Capt. Andrew Wilson, master of the Lake Simcoe, on which vessel the occurrence took place, was taken. The further hearing will be proceeded with this afternoon.

The Sydney Embargo.

As regards the embargo on Newfoundland freight at Sydney, to which allusion has been repeatedly made in the daily papers, Mr. Theobald, the Assistant General Freight Agent, told our representative that the embargo put on our goods was placed without the consent or cognizance of the Company. When the principals of the company heard of it, they immediately set to work to have it removed, with the result that the freight was taken away with more promptness and despatch, in removing goods from Sydney this year the company have employed in addition to the Bruce and Invermore on the Gulf, the Nascopie, Sagona and Beothic, all of which took along full cargoes from the Sydneys. In November of this year there were removed from Sydney 294 cars of freight as against 102 last year. A deal of telegraphic correspondence passed between the Reid Nfld. Co. and the Sydney authorities on the question of the embargo, and interested persons, if they wish to, can peruse this at the General Freight Agent's office.



Detective Killed

And two others dying, following raid in New York. Woman supposed killed by crook who suicides.

New York, Nov. 29.—The body of Henry Vogel, described by the police as an international crook, and beside it the body of his girl, Lottie, lay in the morgue to-day, whilst in uptown hospitals one dead detective and four other men were stretched out, hovering between life and death, unable to give a connected account of how they were shot in a raid in Vogel's rooms where he was sought as a diamond thief.

In the fusillade which followed the entrance of the detectives, Vogel and

the woman were killed instantly. Accounts vary as to whether he shot his companion and committed suicide or whether they fell before the fusillade from the officers.

John Allen, a detective, died this morning. Of the wounded hope was expressed to-day for the recovery of two, Luigi Gerardi, a private detective and Wm. Butler, a waiter. The other two were shot in the abdomen and little hope was held out. They are Martin S. Fay, a city detective, and Louis Mordschein, proprietor of the hotel where the battle occurred.

The police have in their possession to-day two steamer trunks, a valise, a dress suit case, a hand bag and a steamer bag which, when opened, are expected to reveal the secret, if not

the loot, of many big robberies, and may lead to arrests in other cities. The trailing of the pair yesterday which resulted in the fatal shooting followed directly the arrest of a dishonest servant girl. She is Sophie Beckendorf, a girl of eighteen, who broke down in the Tombs yesterday and confessed to several robberies and implicated Vogel as the "fence" for servant girls who made it their practice to answer advertisements accept positions with the sole idea of robbery.

She told the police of Vogel's whereabouts and within an hour he had been trailed to the hotel where the fight occurred.

Mordschein, the proprietor, had ordered William Butler, a waiter, to

show the detectives to the Vogel's room on the 4th floor.

A woman's voice asked what they wanted as they knocked. A moment later Vogel opened the door, and as Allen forced his way in, declaring that the couple were under arrest, Vogel struck the detective over the head with a black-jack, and then grabbed a magazine revolver which lay upon the bed. His first bullet struck Allen in the right side of the head and he fell across the bed.

Detectives Fay and Cerade hurriedly threw themselves into the room, followed by Mordschein and Butler. It is declared that they did not fire a shot, but expected to grab Allen's assassin. They were not quick enough. Vogel let go one shot after

another, almost every one taking effect. Fay and Mordschein received wounds in the abdomen. Gerade was shot in the leg and back, and Butler received a bad wound in the hip. The woman, also armed, had fired several shots, and probably helped to shoot down the detectives.

Evidently crazed at his gun work, Vogel is believed to have turned his gun upon his young woman companion. She was shot through the abdomen and soon expired. Vogel made quick work of himself by putting the last bullet from his gun into his own head and fell dead.

Obituary.

MR. WILLIAM IRVING.

The death occurred at his residence, George's Street, yesterday morning, of Mr. William Irving, at the age of 77 years. Later he accepted a position with Balne Johnston & Co., and was a faithful servant of the firm for 35 years. After the Bank Crash he went to Anderson's where he remained until about three weeks before his demise. Mr. Irving was an upright, honest man, of a kindly, genial disposition and will be mourned by a large circle of friends in St. John's. He is survived by a widow, 2 sons and 6 daughters to whom the Telegram extends its sympathy.



Do mysterious disappearances like that sometimes happen to you? And afterwards do you usually have reason to be sorry for any unkind suspicions you have entertained? I fancy so, for that is the experience of almost all of us. As I look back I can see that I have very seldom been suspicious of anyone in this way without having had reason to regret my suspicions. If it is a choice between accounting for a loss by the dishonesty of some person who, according to all other appearances, is honest, or by the cussedness of inanimate objects that have a mysterious way of taking to themselves wings, isn't it infinitely better to take the latter alternative? For in the first place, it is really the more likely explanation; in the second place it is infinitely kinder. If we grow older successfully—that is if we mellow instead of growing sour—I think we are likely to have more and more faith in human nature, and to learn to give the benefit of the doubt in all such matters. But, however, we explain such happenings to ourselves, there is one thing we can be sure enough to do, and that is not to pass on our suspicions to other folks until they are no longer merely suspicions. The law judges a man innocent until he is proven guilty. Surely we ought to be as kind. And remember that proven guilty means something pretty definite.

Incompatibility.

If it were not for the temper, the jury would never know how incompatible the defendant had been behind their noticed the swelling behind his left ear. There would be less incompatibility rushing into the divorce court if more people would give and take. The trouble is that some want to give a whole lot more than they take. Incompatibility which shows itself in front of the children can't be wiped out by saying grace or attending revival meetings. The only cure for it is to sweeten up and stay there.

The Horrors of the War.

Mr. Ashmead-Barrett, in a despatch to the Daily Telegraph, from Constantinople, describing the terrible ravages of Asiatic cholera, among the Turks, says:—"Every village through which I passed had its victims, every road over which the troops move to the front is marked by a trail of corpses or of men dying by the roadside. As there are no medical arrangements of any sort, it is impossible to succor or save any of these wretched victims of the war. Those who fall are left to die where they drop. No pleading or prayers will move the living to raise a helping hand even if they are in a position to do so. In the village in which I had been stopping, a great number of troops had been quartered, and cholera at once broke out. As soon as a man was seized by it he was thrown over the back of a horse, carried outside the outskirts of the houses, and laid on the first patch of open ground, there to die. When dead, his body was hastily covered with a thin layer of earth. These ghastly mounds litter the country. But these horrid scenes in the villages in the rear of the army pale together into insignificance when compared with the horrors of Hademkei the headquarters of the army. It is the hardships and sufferings of the front, where men lived for ten days on green corn or scraps of offal picked up as they marched, that yield the greatest number of victims to the altar of Asiatic cholera. Gazing into valley of death's shadow. I never actually entered that village, because the sights I saw from the outside caused me to turn my horse's head in the opposite direction and filled me with a vague terror I had never known before. Three days ago I rode over the hills, intending to visit Hademkei. I mounted the last slope which hid the valley in which it lies, and then I was brought to a standstill by the awful babel of sounds which arose beneath me. I looked more closely and found I was gazing into a valley of the Shadow of Death. There was the station of Hademkei, and a train was at the station. It was delayed with wretched specimens of sick humanity seeking to escape from the dread spectre. The train was leaving for Constantinople, and all who could crawl were endeavouring to secure a place on it, hoping thus to reach a heaven of refuge. Some were wounded, some down with dysentery, others with enteric, others were feeling the first spasms of the scourge itself, others were merely sick at heart. Unable to stand longer the constant strain of waiting for their natural deaths, all were trying to escape. Square Covered With Writhing Bodies. In the centre of Hademkei lay a large square formed on one side by some barracks, on two others by lines of hospital tents, on the fourth by the high road. This square resembled a successful flypaper in midsummer—it was covered with corpses of dead and writhing bodies of living in all attitudes, some prone, some sitting, some kneeling, some constantly shifting, some with hands clasped as if in supplication. In some parts of the area dead were piled in heaps, in others those still living were almost as closely packed.




