

LONDON, To-day. The most important news from the war is a report confirmed from Sofia of the appearance of a large Bulgarian force at Vrania, which threatened the Servian line of retreat. Still more significant as tending to confirm the belief that the Servians are suffering defeat is the announcement from Belgrade of only meagre reports being received from the Servian army head-quarters, that the Government has decided to publish reports only on alternate days, in addition a rigorous censorship of newspapers is being enforced and the publication of special war editions has been stopped. The Servians wounded described the battles as of almost inhuman ferocity, men throwing away their firearms and using their bayonets as daggers. Roumania and Turkey are giving signs that they will not long be idle spectators. A despatch from Saloniki warnerted the Greeks occupied Doroinspectators. A despatch from Salonil reported the Greeks occupied Doroin hiser and Stramitz. According most likely information, the Bulgar an General Wanoff has been slowly retiring northward before superior Greek forces. Beron was found dead on Clapham Common and Morrison was arrested shortly after-

When Morrison was first arrested he gave the name of Morris Stein, but afterward gave the name of Stinie Morrison. It was charged that he was seen in the company of Beron on the night of the murder. Beron was he landlord of the houses in which he supposed Houndsditch murderers lved. Morrison, who strongly denied that he had committed the murder as found guilty on March 15, and entenced to death. When sentence vas pronounced Morrison exclaimed: "I am innocent. I do not beleve there is a God in Heaven!" His counsel appealed from the verdiet, but was not successful. Later






