**Shackleton to
Take No Liquor.**

Tea, Cocoa and Sugar to be Stimulants of Expedition—Expects to Cross Southern Continent.

London, March 5.—Total abstinence from alcoholic drinks will be strictly observed during Sir Ernest Shackleton's trip across the south polar continent. He and his men propose to work long hours, including eight hours marching every day, but for stimulants they will rely on nothing stronger than tea or cocoa. The tea will be taken at mid-day to refresh the men for afternoon march and the cocoa the last thing at night to preserve the body heat during the hours of sleep.

Sugar will figure largely in the rations. On his last expedition Sir Ernest and his companions took two or three lumps of sugar every two or three hours, and he says ten minutes after eating they could feel the heat going through their bodies.

The men thus far chosen for the expedition are between 30 and 40 years old. Shackleton, who is 39, believes that men are at their best between 35 and 40. A man, he says, does not reach his full strength until he is 25, and whatever may be the superiority of youth in the way of spring, nerve and enthusiasm, these do not weigh against the staying power of an older man or the balanced judgment of one who has experience behind him.

The working day arranged calls for an hour of preparation after walking then a four hour march, an hour's rest and another four hour march, which in previous trips has been observed between 4 a.m. and 6 a.m. will be cut to eight hours.

Sir Ernest is busy arranging for details of the expedition, which is regarded as the biggest undertaking ever attempted in polar exploration since the distance to travel from Weddell Sea to Ross Sea is 1700 miles. At first Shackleton proposes to return from the South Pole to Ross Sea by one of three routes, that taken by Scott in his ill-fated expedition or by Amundsen in his successful one, or a new one known as the western route, crossing the great range of the Victoria chain of moun-

tains. It has since been decided that unless conditions prevent the expedition will avoid the two old routes and come out either through the Victoria Range or by a route to the eastward of Amundsen's track. If this can be done, the expedition will open entirely new ground.

This greatly increases the difficulties and dangers of the journey, for the party will not have the advantage of a chain of food deposits, which proved such a material aid to their predecessors. They will, however, be helped by the resources of science to a degree never dreamt of by former explorers. The expedition will be assisted by a wireless installation, which will keep it in touch with its base for most of the time, and will, besides, have aeroplane sledges.

Two steamships will support the expedition. A Norwegian steamer, for which negotiations have been opened, will take Sir Ernest and his party to the Weddell Sea, while the Aurora, which has seen much Antarctic service, will go to the Ross Sea, to pick them up when they have accomplished their journey.

The first steamer will leave Buenos Ayres some time in October and push to the Antarctic, reaching, if possible, 78 degrees south latitude, where a good landing place was found by the German expedition. If the ice conditions are favorable, winter quarters will be established, depots laid out and the start made the following season.

Expects Task to Take Five Months.

In the meantime the Aurora will also have started from New Zealand to land a party in the Ross Sea to meet the transcontinental party. Sir Ernest believes that the trip can be accomplished in five months, but should the obstacles be insurmountable, he will have the base in Weddell Sea to fall back upon. The first part of the trip, that from Weddell Sea to the Pole, is giving the explorer

much serious thought. The distance is about 800 miles and through an entirely unexplored region. The party has no data whatever to go upon, but believes that the dogs, which proved such a blessing to Amundsen, and sledges fitted with aeroplane propellers, all obstacles will be overcome.

Neither of the steamers will winter in the Antarctic. The Aurora, after landing the supporting party in Ross Sea, will return to New Zealand, going back later to bring the whole party home. The other steamer will return to South America after unloading Sir Ernest Shackleton and his friends, going back in the following year to pick up the Weddell Sea party, for besides those who are going to make the long trip, some will be left at the base to carry out scientific investigation. Immigration officers are patrolling the line. One hundred and eighty dollars in one dollar Canadian bills were picked up on the trail by one of the posse and one of the bandits dropped his coat in which was found \$12 of the stolen money.

SEALING NEWS.

As it is customary for something interesting to occur in sealing circles about St. Patrick's Day, the city was astir yesterday, everybody seeming hungry for the latest news from the sealing fleet. Since going to press on Monday, the following messages were received:

FROM NEPTUNE.
"Neptune 40 miles N. by E. Grindstone. Sighted Viking on 16th; foggy S.S.E.; no seals yet; all well."
Mr. J. S. Munn received brief messages from the Stephano and Florizel, stating that in effect that neither ship had struck the main body of seals.

FROM BELLAVENTURE.
"With Neacopic and Stephano, position very little changed; ice heavy and tight."

FROM BONAVENTURE.
"In company with Eagle, Sagona and Florizel; not much change in position; ice heavy and tight."

FROM HERRING NECK.
"Four steamers passed here at 2 p.m. to-day supposed to be the Fogo, Eagle and two steel ships. They cut out in a north-easterly direction from Twillingate, Gull Island. Ice a little slack. Wind W.N.W. Bloodhound, Diana and Kite worked out N.E. slowly this morning."

Ice moving off; 5 steamers sighted about 20 miles off, apparently cutting north.

FROM FOGO.
Fogota, Kite and Ranger in sight; Bloodhound struck hoods yesterday 20 miles north of Fogo.

FROM NASCOPIE.
Poor progress to-day, jammed all day, just got clear at night; saw few old harks this evening; rest of ships gone ahead about 5 miles, not drifted together; other ships got clear and left us jammed; all hands on ice blasting and prizing.

FROM BOETHIC.
Made no progress this morning, made good progress this afternoon, position 15 miles S. E. by S. Grey Islands; saw good sign of old harks this evening late; Bella-venture, Nascopie, Stephano in company, ship in good condition.

FROM TWILLINGATE.
Four steel ships now at Twillingate, Gull Island, forcing through ice; Diana jammed about 20 miles off.

FROM STEPHANO.
Position 9 p.m. last night 6 miles south of Grey Islands, thin ice; stopped for the night; Bella-venture, Boethic alongside; Nascopie got jammed 15 miles S.E.; hope better news to-morrow.

FROM FLORIZEL.
Florizel, Bloodhound, Bona-venture, Adventure, Sagona, jammed close by Twillingate Long Point; believe chances good for getting around Bay when ships get free.

FROM TWILLINGATE.
Four steel ships came from Eastward now at Twillingate, Gull Island, forcing slowly through ice; think they will get around Long Point; prospects good for Cape John; suppose Florizel, Adventure, Bella-venture and Sagona; others coming behind; Bloodhound some across the Bay; Diana jammed 20 miles off.

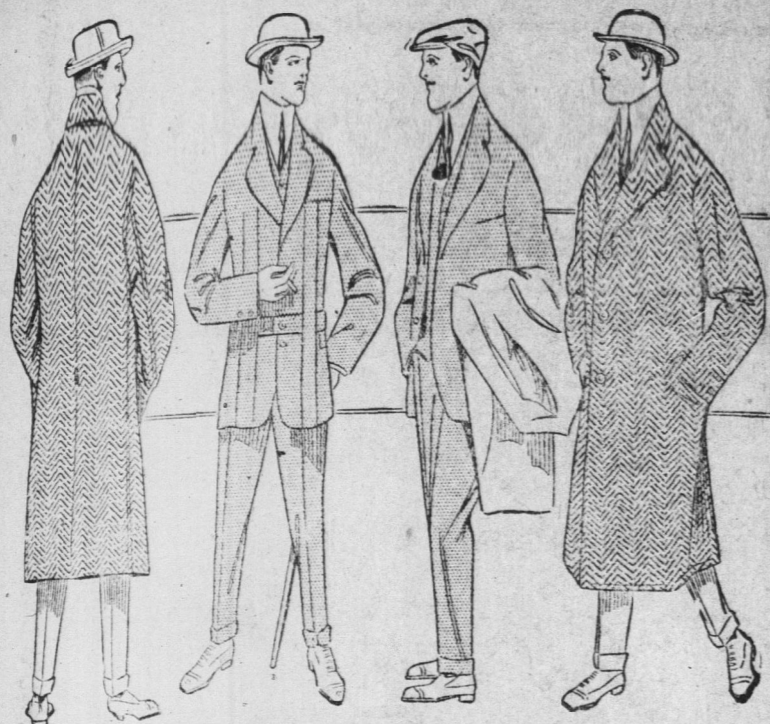

It is never too early to start making something worth while of your life; nor is it ever too late.

A letter friend complains to me in a recent letter that she is past the age of success. "My life has been a failure," she says. "I feel that there are possibilities within me, and yet somehow one thing worth while. And now it is too late."

How old do you suppose the woman is?

Only 34! Just think of it, and she is foolish enough to say it is too late!

"After thirty" is the title of a group of tales in one of the popular magazines, which deals with this period of life as if it were a distinct epoch. And indeed thirty does seem like a very black dividing line. It is the end of first youth. We feel as if we must have declared ourselves by then if we are ever to amount to much.

And yet, think over the lives of some men and women whose names spell success in the various lines of human endeavour, and you will find that there are many of them whose success came "after thirty."

At the age of twenty-nine Charlotte Bronte wrote: "Meantime life wears away. I shall soon be thirty and I have done nothing yet." She was between thirty-one and two when her first novel, Jane Eyre, was published.

She only lived to be thirty-nine, and yet in those eight "after thirty" years, in spite of miserable health, household cares and painful bereavement, she managed to build for herself a name that will probably live as long as English literature.

It seems sordid to use money as a measure of success, but it certainly is a measure of recognition. Therefore, you will be interested to know that although he had been writing ever since he was a child, Stevenson never made over \$250 a year up to the time he was twenty-eight.

At the age of thirty-nine, Grant was a poverty stricken store-keeper in a country town. He had never accomplished anything of note. Then the opportunity came and a phoenix from the ashes of failure he rose—one of the greatest generals the world has ever known. So Grant also proved that it is never too late.

Corot, after having completely failed as a tradesman, took to painting at the age of twenty-six. He was seventy years old when the world finally recognized him as a genius of the first water.

Take courage, then, all who have crossed the first great divide, and who feel, as Charlotte Bronte did, that they "have done nothing yet."

The years "after thirty" may bring you many wonderful things.

Take heart and remember, it is never too early to start making something worth while of your life nor never too late.

Eighty-three persons were killed by an earthquake yesterday at Akina, on the Island of Honshu. Entire families were crushed to death. Five hundred were injured and many are missing.

LONDON, March 17.
A despatch says that while the police were escorting Winston Churchill after a speech at Bedford on Saturday, a man pushed his way through the police and hit Churchill a severe blow in the mouth. The man escaped.

NEW YORK, March 17.
At a meeting of the Women's Dressmakers' Association a vote was taken in favor of a general strike, to be effected to-day. Saul Elstern, manager of the Association, said that 5,000 dressmakers would walk out, and demand a fifty-hour week, and 15 per cent. increase in pay.

PEKING, March 17.
Reports received from missionaries describing the ravages of the White Wolf Band, say that 1,500 inhabitants of Lo Ho Kow, were killed and 400 tortured in order to compel them to disclose hidden treasures. Many women and girls were mutilated and murdered. Property to the value of millions of dollars was looted.

EDINBURGH, March 17.
Sir John Murray, the noted naturalist and oceanographer, was killed near his home in a motor accident, which occurred while his daughter, who was driving. Sir John served as one of the naturalists on the voyage of the Challenger during her scientific cruise lasting from 1872 to 1876. He was born in Coburg, Ontario, in 1841.

GLASGOW, March 17.
Dr. Devon, Prison Commissioner for Scotland, when attacked to-day by a militant suffragette, armed with a whip, took the law into his own hand, and knocked the virago down with a well-aimed left hand blow. She was picked up by a couple of policemen, and placed under arrest, but Dr. Devon refused to prosecute and she was released.

LONDON, March 17.
The Express, commenting on the announcement that the Mad Mullah has headed a raid into Berbera, says that there are two explanations. It is reported that either the remnant of the Camel Corps—about 150 strong—and men of the Indian contingent, 250 strong, stationed among the Shekhs, have been penned up, or they have engaged in a battle in the open and have been exterminated.

LONDON, March 17.
King George attended the distinction last night, of being the first reigning British monarch to witness a public exhibition of the art of self-defence. As a guest of the Second Life Guards, of which he is Colonel, he was entertained at a boxing and fencing tournament at the Regent's Park Barracks, when Bombardier Wells and Pat. O'Keefe gave a fast exhibition of sparring. Several clever amateurs also took part in bouts. In sporting circles a boom in boxing is expected as the result of the King's patronage.

Moving Pictures
Cure Stuttering

Paris, Mar. 11.—A new method of curing stuttering by means of the cinematograph was described to the Academy of Science yesterday.

Dr. Harage who devised it has found that stutters can be rapidly cured if their mouthing of words is shown to them on film. He takes a moving picture of a stutterer and a normal person sitting side by side and pronouncing the same sentence. This film serves as a model for a course of practice which leads to a cure.

Eskimo Have.
Extra Ribs.

London, March 11.—A curious discovery has been made by Prof. Charles Dawson, Fellow of the Geological Society, namely, that practically all the members of a certain tribe of Eskimau possess an extra pair of ribs. Exactly what they have got anatomically, is a thirteenth joint to the backbone, to which an extra set of small ribs are attached.

Normally the human body has 12 joints of the backbone. The number of these joints is somewhat variable in the apes, but hitherto it was supposed that man's frame had developed, by a process of evolution, into a fixed condition of the ribs. Among civilized races the extra ribs are so rare that their existence is unknown except to the professional chemist.

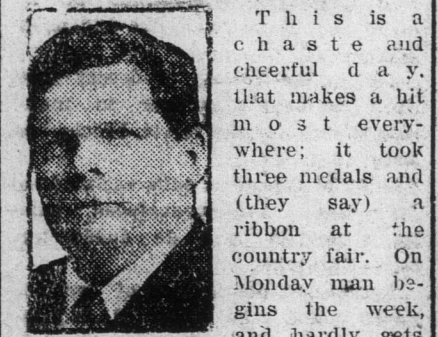
Prof. Dawson argues that the Eskimau developed their extra ribs by the law of the "survival of the fittest," the extra ribs enabling them to manage more skilfully and with less danger the shallow canoes, or kayaks, in which they do their hunting of marine animals.

"These kayaks," says Prof. Dawson in the Daily Express, "are without keel or ballast and can only keep their occupants from Davy Jones' locker by the marvellous dexterity with which he maintains his balance the tendency being immediately to capsize. In rough seas this occasionally happens, and it is only by an extraordinarily quick twist of the body and the use of his paddle that he is able to reverse his position at a time when small things count and not a moment can be lost.

"The muscles of the back and the flexibility of the waist are thus of extreme importance in the effective management of the kayaks. It is quite clear, therefore, that any advantage which might be deprived from the additional vertebrae in kayak hunting would lessen the chance of risk by death in such accidents and serve to perpetuate in the race a greater number of individuals possessing this advantage by reason of survival, natural selection and inheritance."

Governor Leaves

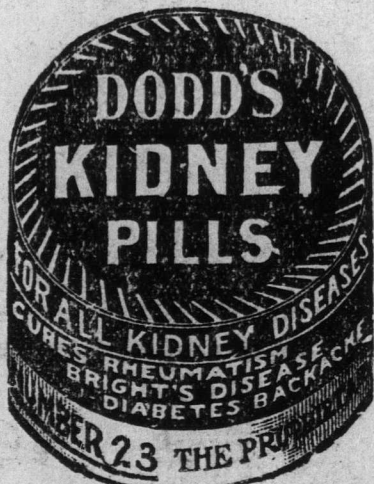

No More Concessions.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 16. The British Government will make no further concessions. This announcement was made in the Commons to-day by Premier Asquith. That the ministry believes the Unionists will finally accept the concessions offered is indicated by the following: "If proposals for the exclusion of Ulster for a limited period," said the Prime Minister, "are accepted by the Unionists, there must be adjustments of the measure, especially of those clauses relative to finance and administration. These are now being carefully worked out. We are not prepared with a cut and dried speech at the present time, to cover all grounds. If the proposals are rejected it will be a waste of time to discuss auxiliary and consequent points. The proposals have been made because the Cabinet believed them to offer the best method of dealing with the question, and a logical attempt to try and reach a basis of final settlement." Mr. Asquith put the issue directly up to the Opposition, when he said: "I now ask the Unionists if they are prepared to accept the principle of the proposals outlined here last Monday. We do not know whether to go any further or not." He declared that he was ready and willing to debate the Home Rule and Ulster exclusion question with Bonar Law, with the Opposition or any others at an early date. The Premier's speech was received with little enthusiasm by the Opposition benches, and on several occasions murmurs of disagreement were so strong as to force him to pause. After he had delivered his statement, Mr. Asquith submitted to interpellations. He said that the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland would not continue his duties over any part of Ireland which excluded itself from Home Rule, nor could the Dublin Parliament be able to impose taxes on these districts. It would be necessary to increase the amount of the allowance to the Irish Exchequer, and other adjustments would also be necessary. The Unionists created uproar during and after the Premier's speech. Carson leaped to his feet shouting: "Do you not now recognize that the proposals are nothing but hypocritical shams?"

PARIS, March 17. Gaston Calmette, editor of the Figaro, was shot yesterday morning by Harriett Caillaux, wife of Joseph Caillaux, the French Minister of Finance, and died at night. Mme. Caillaux went to the office of the Figaro to carry out an act of vengeance against M. Calmette, who had been writing articles characterized by great venom against the Minister of Finance. She fired at least three times, the editor being wounded in the chest, side and abdomen. Whilst being treated in the hospital, he said repeatedly: "I have done my duty; I have done my duty." Having committed the deed, Mme. Caillaux submitted to arrest, and while the employees of the Figaro office were taking the pistol from her hands, said: "Since there is no justice in this country, I take upon myself an act of justice. Take me where you will." Mme. Caillaux was immediately removed to the police station, where she underwent a preliminary examination, the substance of which was communicated to the press at her desire: "I am sorry," she said, "for what I was obliged to do. I had no intention of killing M. Calmette. I would be happy to know that he will recover. I desired only to teach him a lesson." It is officially announced to-night that M. Caillaux has tendered his resignation from the ministry, but that Premier Doumergue withheld his decision until to-day. Mme. Caillaux is the Minister's third wife.

LONDON, March 17. Cyclonic gales swept over the United Kingdom yesterday from west to east. The wind reached a velocity of 70 miles and many vessels were driven ashore. The Channel Packet service was practically suspended. A tug foundered in the Thames with the loss of five lives. The big Dutch steamer Novdijik, was disabled off the Isle of Wight. Much damage to property inland resulted from the storm.

LONDON, March 17. So critical has the political situation become that a special Cabinet meeting has been summoned. One of the principal questions discussed was the vote of censure on the Government which the Unionists are planning. The Government has promised to set aside a day for the contemplated Unionist attack.

NEW ORLEANS, March 17. Five priests have been slain by rebel Mexicans in the State of Tamaulipas, since November 15th. Three held for ransom in a Convent, have been burned, and the Cathedral and a smaller church looted, according to two Catholic priests who have arrived here. Both have been driven from Victoria, Mexico.

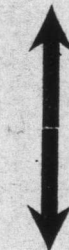
