

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

EARLY CABLES.

WILL FLY TO-DAY!

HALIFAX, May 9. The departure of the American aeroplane is postponed until to-morrow owing to the renewal of four propellers. The aviators say they will get away to-morrow morning if present atmospheric conditions hold.

LESS FAVORABLE CONDITIONS.

WASHINGTON, May 9. Very favorable weather reports from the territory covered by the second 'leg' of the flight from Halifax to Newfoundland, was forwarded from Washington early to-day to the 'Cruiser Baltimore' at Halifax. The report said fair weather prevailed along this leg, with a 20-mile wind from a favorable direction for the fliers. It added that less favorable conditions were to be expected to-morrow.

WILL RENEW THE FLIGHT.

CHATHAM, Mass., May 9. The hydro-aeroplane N.C.-4, which was towed into the Naval Air Station here to-day, after having been compelled to land yesterday because of engine trouble while on the first 'leg' of the trans-Atlantic flight, probably will resume the trip to Halifax to-morrow, according to naval officials. Two of her four engines were out of order, but the mechanics are expected to be able to make repairs immediately.

GERMANY WILL NOT AGREE.

BERLIN, May 9. The people, though fairly stricken dumb by the Peace terms, are now recovering sufficiently to declare that Germany cannot and will not sign the compact now matter what comes. Strikes are increasing and Bolshevism and the Spartacan uprisings of the past two months have, if anything, made Germany immune to the possible horrors which are to be anticipated if they are again plunged into war, according to the best opinion here. There exists a small group of Germans, chiefly Conservatives, who prefer to see the Entente occupy the whole country than to have it Bolshevized, but they are in the dwindling minority.

TO WIPE OUT AUSTRIAN NAVY.

PARIS, May 9. The naval terms of the treaty with Austria wipe out the Austrian Navy. The disposition of the ships among the Allies will be adjusted later.

A BELGIAN PROTEST.

PARIS, May 9. The Belgian delegation protests in a note against mandatory for German East Africa being disposed of without Belgian participation after Belgium's sacrifices to insure the conquest of the territory.

ANTICIPATING TROUBLE.

DUBLIN, May 9. The military authorities have taken possession of the Mansion House, the official residence of the Lord Mayor. The Lord Mayor is Laurence O'Neill, who has been prominent in the leadership of the Sinn Fein movement. The Mansion House has been used as a meeting place for the Sinn Fein. There have been no recent reports of any unusual situation in Dublin affecting the Lord Mayor or his official residence.

CANADIANS AT VERSAILLES.

PARIS, May 9. Canadian plenipotentiaries arrived at Versailles promptly at three o'clock. Sir Robert Borden, accompanied by Hon. Arthur Sifton, sat next the British delegation.

MORE GERMANS ARRIVE.

VERSAILLES, May 9. Eight new members of the German delegation arrived to-day, but have not yet communicated with the members previously here.

WILL ANSWER WITH PROPOSALS.

PARIS, May 9. It is expected the Germans will answer the delivery of the Peace Treaty with proposals anent certain phases. A commission will examine the answer and notify the Germans of any necessary modifications, all of which will occupy several days. The pact probably will not be signed for twenty-five to thirty days.

A GERMAN OPINION.

LONDON, May 9. Herr Schuecking, the German delegation, says the League of Nations should include all signatures of the Hague Convention and the Pope, according to a Reuters Paris despatch. He regards the mandate for German colonies as annexations and regrets nothing is said in the treaty about the freedom of the seas.

AFTER A BITTER STRUGGLE.

COPENHAGEN, May 9. A despatch from Budapest states that Czech forces gained a footing in Weggassern after a bitter struggle.

SATISFIED IN THE MAIN.

PARIS, May 9. The Temps publishes interviews with representatives of Belgium, Den-

mark, Czech-Slovakia, all expressing satisfaction in the main with the Peace Treaty provisions.

A POSITIVE DENIAL.

PARIS, May 9. On high authority positive denial is made of the report that the Entente instigated or supported the Roumanian advance against Hungary.

A "MAILED FIST."

BERLIN, May 8. Hirsch, the Prussian Premier, in the National Assembly called the peace terms a "mailed fist" peace which would mean slavery for the Fatherland and fresh blood for Europe.

SPLIT REPORTED.

PARIS, May 9. A division among the German delegates regarding the peace terms is reported to-day.

THE VICTORY LOAN.

WASHINGTON, May 9. President Wilson to-day issued through Secretary of the Treasury Glass an appeal to the American people to make the Victory Loan "a great popular thank offering." The total of the loan to-day went above \$3,000,000,000.

THE GERMANS EXPECTED TO OBJECT.

PARIS, May 9. The German delegates in their answer to the peace terms, the newspapers say, will propose especially to assume the burden of making reparation only for damage caused in Northern France and Belgium. The papers say it is not unlikely the Allies will refuse the propositions. The German delegates, it is added, also intend to give battle over the question of the Saar Valley, Danzig, the former German colonies, and military occupation. Count Von Brockdorff Ranzau in a long wireless exchange with Berlin, the newspapers declare, expressed a desire to confer with the German-Austrian delegates on their arrival at St. Germain. In the lobby of the Chamber of Deputies yesterday the Peace Treaty was approved by the deputies, but some reservations were made concerning the financial clauses.

ITALIAN SITUATION NOT CLEARED.

PARIS, May 9. The Italian difficulty is as far from settlement as ever, according to the French press, which asserts that President Wilson maintains his position, and it is not believed he will depart from it in the slightest. He has not adhered to the proposed compromise by which Italy would administer Fiume as mandatory of the League of Nations until 1923, after which Fiume would revert to Italian sovereignty, three Jugo Slavo being given a port a few miles lower down the Adriatic, it is said the impression in French conference circles is that Italy is temporarily abandoning her claim to Fiume and will exact full execution of the pact of London which, as it involves not only Dalmatian but the Dodecanese Island, will raise the whole Greek problem and singularly complicate the situation.

THE AFGHAN TROUBLE.

LONDON, May 9. A Russian Government wireless message received to-day says that an Afghan mission has arrived at Moscow to establish relations between Afghanistan and Russia. This is in violation of the treaty between Afghanistan and Great Britain under which Afghanistan is not allowed to enter relations with any foreign country except Great Britain.

STUNNED BY PEACE TREATY.

BERLIN, May 9. The Parliamentary leaders of all factions who are in Berlin to attend committee meetings admit that they were stunned by the severity of the Peace Treaty. Beyond casual comment, however, they declined to discuss the Entente's conditions or details or to forecast the assembly's probable attitude. A leading member of the Independent Socialists declared the peace offered was wholly dictatorial and that its revision was possible only through a world revolution.

EAST AFRICAN PROBLEM.

PARIS, May 9. After Paul Hymans, head of the Belgium delegation, had discussed the rights of Belgium in German East Africa to-day, David Lloyd George, the British Prime Minister, telegraphed Viscount Milner, Secretary for the

World's Most Famous Document.

The Peace Treaty Presented--Allies Insist on Full Reparation by Germany -- Other Enemy Countries to Have Separate Terms.

SECTION IX.
OPIMUM.—The contracting powers agree, whether or not they have signed and ratified the Opium Convention of July 23, 1912, or signed the special protocol opened at the Hague in accordance with resolutions adopted by the Third Opium Conference in 1914, to bring the said Convention into force by enacting within twelve months of the peace the necessary legislation.

RELIGIOUS MISSIONS.—The Allied and Associated Powers agree that the properties of religious missions, in territories belonging to Germany, shall continue in their work under the control of the Powers, Germany renouncing all claims in their behalf.

SECTION X.
CANALS.—Belgium is to be permitted to build a deep draft Rhine Meuse Canal, if she so desires within 25 years in which case Germany must construct the part within her own territory on plans drawn by Belgium, and similarly the interested Allied Governments may construct a Rhine-Meuse Canal, both, if constructed, to come under the competent International Commission, and Germany may not object if the Central Rhine Commission desires to extend its jurisdiction over the lower Moselle, the upper Rhine, of lateral Canals. Germany must not object if the Allied and Associated Governments certain tugs, vessels, and facilities for navigation on all these rivers, the specific details to be established by an arbiter named by the United States. Decision will be based on the legitimate needs of the parties concerned, and on the shipping traffic during the five years before the war. The value will be included in the regular reparation account. In the case of the Rhine, shares in the German Navigation Companies and property, such as wharves and warehouses, held by Germany in Rotterdam at the outbreak of war, must be handed over.

RAILWAYS.—Germany in addition to most favored nation treatment on her railways, agrees to co-operate in the establishment of through ticket services for passengers and baggage; to insure communication by rail between the Allied and Associated States; to allow the construction or improvement within 25 years of such lines, as are necessary; and to conform her rolling stock to enable incorporation in trains of the Allied or Associated Powers. She also agrees to accept the denunciation of the St. Germain Convention, if Switzerland and Italy so request, and temporarily to execute instructions as to the transport of troops and supplies, and the establishment of postal and telegraphic service, as provided.

CZECHO-SLOVAKIA.—To assure Czecho-Slovakia access to the sea, special rights are granted to her north and south, towards the Adriatic.

THE KIEL CANAL.—The Kiel Canal is to remain free and open to all merchant ships of all nations, at peace with Germany, and subjects, goods and ships of all States are to be treated on terms of absolute equality, and no taxes are to be imposed beyond those necessary for upkeep and improvement. If Switzerland and Italy so request, Germany is to be responsible. In case of violation or disagreement as to these provisions, any State may appeal to the League of Nations, and may demand the appointment of an International Commission. For the preliminary hearing of complaints, Germany shall establish a local authority at Kiel.

SECTION XI.
AERIAL NAVIGATION.—Aircraft of the Allied and Associated Powers shall have full liberty of passage and landing over and in German territory, and equal treatment with German planes as to the use of German airfields, and with most favored nation treatment as to international commercial traffic in Germany. Germany agrees to accept Allied certificates of nationality, airworthiness, competency of license, and to apply the convention relative to aerial navigation, concluded between the Allied and Associated Powers, and her own aircraft over her own territory. These rules apply until 1923, unless Germany has since been admitted to the League of Nations, or to the above convention.

SECTION XII.
FREEDOM OF TRANSIT.—Germany must grant freedom of transit through her territories by mail or water to persons, goods, ships, cargoes, and mails, from or to any of the Allied or Associated Powers, without customs or transit duties, under

State participating. Each Government may either enact the terms into law; approve the principle, but modify them to local needs; leave the actual legislation in case of a Federal State to local legislatures; or reject the convention altogether without further obligation.

The International Labor Office is established at the seat of the League of Nations, as part of its organization. It is to collect and distribute information on labour troubles throughout the world, and prepare agenda for the conference. It will publish a periodical in French and English, and possibly other languages. Each State agrees to make to it, for presentation to the League of Nations, which also may arrange for a general international waterways convention.

The Elbe and the Oder are to be placed under International Commissions to meet within three months, that of the Elbe is to be composed of four representatives of Germany, two from Czecho-Slovakia, and one each from Great Britain, France, Italy, and Belgium; and that for the Oder composed of one each from Poland, Prussia, Czecho-Slovakia, Great Britain, France, Denmark, and Sweden. If any Riparian State on the Niemen should request of the League of Nations, a similar commission shall be established there. These commissions shall upon request of any Riparian State, within three months, revise existing international agreements.

THE DANUBE.—The European Danube Commission resumes its pre-war powers; but for the time being with representatives of only Great Britain, France, Italy, and Roumania. The European Danube is to be administered by a new International Commission, until a definite station is drawn up at a conference of the Allied and Associated Governments, within one year after the peace. The enemy governments shall make full reparation for all war damages caused to the European Commission; and shall cede their river facilities to surrendered territory, and give Czecho-Slovakia, Serbia, and Roumania any rights necessary on their shores for carrying out improvements in navigation.

THE RHINE AND THE MOSELLE.—The Rhine may be placed under the Central Commission to meet at Strasbourg within six months after the peace, and to be composed of four representatives of the Allied Powers, in addition select the President, four from Germany, and two each from Great Britain, Italy, Belgium, Switzerland, and the Netherlands. Germany must give France on the course of the Rhine, included between the two extreme points of her frontiers, all rights to take water to feed canals, while herself agreeing not to make canals on the right bank opposite France. She must also hand over to France all her drafts and designs for this part of the river.

SECTION XIII.
INTERNATIONAL LABOR ORGANIZATION.—Members of the League of Nations agree to establish a permanent organization to promote international adjustment of labor conditions, to consist of an annual International Labor Conference and an International Labor Office.

The former is composed of four representatives of each State, two from the Government and one each from the employers and one each from the workers, and each of them may vote individually. It will be a deliberate legislative body, its measures taking the form of draft conventions or recommendations for legislation, which if passed by a two-thirds vote must be submitted to the lawmaking authorities, every

Germany agrees not to put forward any pecuniary claims against any Allied or Associated Power, signing the present Treaty, based on events previous to the coming into force of the Treaty.

Germany accepts all decrees as to German ships and goods made by any Allied or Associated Power, and the Allies reserve the right to examine all decisions of German Prize Courts. The present Treaty, of which the French and British texts are both authentic, shall be ratified and the deposit of ratifications made in Paris, as soon as possible. The Treaty is to become effective in all respects for each Power on the date of deposit of its ratification.

of the Treaty's period of peace and addition, conventions, to be concluded by the Allies and Associated Powers, with the Powers allied with Germany, to agree to the decisions to be taken as to the territories of Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey, and to recognize the new States in the frontiers to be fixed for them.

On complaint that any Government has failed to carry out a convention to which it is a party, the governing body may make inquiries directly, so that the Government, in case the reply is unsatisfactory, may publish the complaint with comment. A complaint by one Government against another may be referred by the governing body to a commission of enquiry, nominated by the Secretary General of the League. If the Commission report fails to bring satisfactory action, the matter may be taken to a permanent court of International Justice for final decision. The chief reliance for securing enforcement of the law will be publicity, with a possibility of economic action in the background.

Legislative Council.
 The Council met at 4 o'clock yesterday. The Tenancies Bill was read a third time and passed. The following Bills were read a second time and will be committed to-day:

An Act Respecting Spreading of Insects, Pests, etc.; An Act Respecting Second-Hand Stores; An Act dealing with Central and Hr. Grace District Courts; and an Act for the Protection of Domesticated Deer.

The Council meets again at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

GUARANTEES.—In Western Europe, as a guarantee for the execution of the treaty, German territory to the west of the Rhine, together with the bridge heads, will be occupied by Allied and Associated troops for fifteen years. If the conditions are faithfully carried out by Germany, certain districts, including the bridgehead of Cologne, will be evacuated after the expiration of five years; certain other districts, including the bridgehead of Coblenz, and the territories nearest the Belgium frontier, will be evacuated after ten years, and the remainder, including the bridgehead of Mainz, will be evacuated after fifteen years. In case the International Reparation Commission finds that Germany has failed to observe the whole or part of her obligation, either during the occupation or after the expiration of the fifteen years, the whole or part of the areas specified will be reoccupied immediately. If before the expiration of the fifteen years, Germany complies with all the Treaty undertakings, the occupation forces will be withdrawn immediately.

EASTERN EUROPE.—All German troops at present in territories to the east of the new frontier shall return as soon as the Allied and Associated Governments deem wise, if they are willing to abstain from all requisitions, and are no way to interfere with measures for national defence taken by the Governments concerned. 

What Right Has Aviator

And What Have Those Below—Puzzlers for the Future.

A writer in the Little Rock, Arkansas, Gazette discusses with considerable interest and genuine knowledge some of the troubles and trials of the earth-dweller when flying becomes a common method of locomotion.

For instance, it may be asked, what rights has the owner of a house against an aviator flying over him? Again, "if a chauffeur can be arrested and fined for driving his noisy car past your bedroom windows with his muffler open, why should an aviator not be forbidden to fly over your roof with the sleep-waking rattle and bang of his engine running without a muffler?"

And still again, suppose an aviator "drops a monkey-wrench from five thousand feet in the air and cracks your child's skull—how are you to identify the owner of the plane or prove that the monkey-wrench was dropped by him?" An Inter-Allied Air Commission is working on aviation problems in Paris and will institute a system of marks for aviators, a meteorological service, and a system of education in air navigation. People interested in aviation have suggested a number of questions that must be settled by some authority and settled before long. The writer in the Little Rock daily calls attention to several of these interesting new problems:

- 1 How shall we fix the limit to be placed on a landowner's ownership of the air above his land?
- 2 Should not a property-owner have the protection of the law against the noise-nuisance of air-machines?
- 3 How can a man's legal privacy be protected against the prying eyes of air-machine passengers?
- 4 If the old rule is maintained and individuals and corporations own the air above their property and claim protection against trespass, should they be taxed for the air as they are for the land, and how much?
- 5 If several machines are flying at the same time over a man's land, and one of them drops a monkey-wrench or other object and injures him or one of his family or his property, how is he going to place the responsibility?
- 6 Can we regulate the use of telescopes and photographic apparatus by aviators flying over private property? The powerful photographic instruments now used by aviators give a clear view of intimate personal affairs that are happening on the earth miles below.
- 7 When a machine is flying high,

how is a landowner always to determine exactly and to a legal definiteness whether or not it is over his property and thus guilty of trespass?

8 The State can tax the land and take it for public use under certain conditions from private owners by payments of a reasonable sum. Can the State do the same with the air?

9 Assuming that the use of the air by airplanes constitutes trespass against owners of property lying beneath, what would prevent unscrupulous capitalists from buying a circle of land about every great city, thus isolating it and preventing air-machines from entering the city at all?

10 If a man owns a very narrow strip of land it is not considered trespass if a neighbor jumps over it. How much more a trespass is it if a machine flies over a proportionately wide strip?

11 If an aviator is flying with the wind, can he claim that he is in the same air that he was in when he started on his trip?

12 Is it admitted that railroads operating under franchises from the State endanger the safety of the public, but public interest justifies this. Can not the State give air-ships a similar right to navigate?

13 Shall hunting and shooting from airplanes of shore birds and animals that roam in the open be forbidden?

14 What provisions against crimes can be made in the matter of aerial navigation? In times of industrial or social disturbances, when it is necessary to keep watchful guard over such places as reservoirs, railway bridge-arsenals, and the like, could not a member of the trouble-making element drop poison or dynamite from a plane overhead and thus elude the guard?

15 If a man has a grudge against another, what is to prevent him making a night flight and dropping dynamite on his enemy's property, demolishing it, and probably killing the occupants?

16 What rules and regulations can be devised to make air traffic safe? What signals will be necessary? If certain air "highways" are not designated and followed, who in to prevent collisions in midair when planes become numerous?

17 What system of examination and licensing of pilots could be rigid enough to prevent danger to person and property due to accidents resulting from the over-confidence and carelessness of pilots?

18 What system of aerial policing could be devised for the apprehension of law-breakers in the air? Will aerial traffic stations be installed for the prevention of speeding and "joy-riding"?

Would it be possible to contrive such arrangement as the auto-trap? How can license numbers be shown large enough to be practical?

19 If the air police are inadequate or helpless to apprehend trespassers or marauders, shall landowners be allowed to have the protection of a cannon or machine gun, and thus take the law into their own hands, as in the practice on land?

20 If an aviator is firing high and commits a crime, how can we decide what county or State has jurisdiction over him?

21 If a man sees a machine in the air and is certain it is over his land, how can he have the pilot arrested?

22 Probably property-owners in New

York and other large, congested cities would not consider themselves trespassed upon by aircraft, inasmuch as all that the pilots and passengers could see as the machine passed over the city would be chimneys, church steeples, and roofs with washings hanging out. On the other hand, farmers, mercantile establishments with part of their plant in the open, stock farms, and such would consider it trespass. Where is the line to be drawn?

23 A ship in distress at sea can, if necessary, discard any or all of its cargo, and only the fish are affected, but what would the result be if a cargo-carrying ship of the air were in similar predicament?

24 If airplanes and dirigibles are to be allowed free and unregulated passage through the air, what is to hinder the owners of apartment blocks and houses near ball-grounds, race-tracks, etc., from allowing capacious captive balloons to be hitched to their buildings while the occupants watch the sport?

25 What provisions can be made for the protection of lumber-yards, munition-factories, and the like against fire due to neglect or design on the part of air pilots? In taking preventive measures against fire or explosion would it be necessary to place "Keep Off" signs in clear view of approaching planes? —McLean's Magazine.



Presentation to Bishop White.

TOWNSMEN HONOR PRELATE.
A very unique and interesting event
took place last night, when the Trin-
itarians residing in this city met in
the Synod Hall to do honor to their
illustrious townsman, Bishop White,
and to present to His Lordship an
Episcopal ring. While the old town-
smen of Trinity has given of her best
to almost every avocation of life in
this city, more particularly in the
"Ye Ancient Colony," more particu-
larly in this so of the sacred Ministry
of the Church. No part of the Dio-
cese of Newfoundland can claim so
many sons now serving, who have
served in the priesthood as can be
claimed by Trinity Bight, among
whom we readily recall the venerable
Canon Smith, Canon Lockyer, the
Reverend Messrs. Arthur and Henry
Pittman, Nicholas and Hugh Peacy,
James J. White, Geo. Hall, E.
Theodore, Geo. H. Maidment, Chaplain
to H.M. Forces, and H. Vivien, late Na-
tional Chaplain. But among them all
stands out pre-eminent the first
Newfoundlander who has been called
to rule over the See—one who is first
and last a Trinitarian "ray of the
sun" (as son of a no less noble father,
who is still remembered lovingly as
"the old Doctor")—the Rt. Rev. Wil-
liam Charles White, Doctor of Divin-
ity, Lord Bishop of Newfoundland.
The Presentation, which formed the
chief event of the evening, was pro-
posed and planned at the time of His
Lordship's consecration, but owing to
delays in locating the scattered Trin-
itarians and in importing the Ring,
it was found impossible to get the
event off at that time. But as the
splendid gathering proved it all turned
out well, an effort was made to
have a more enthusiastic meeting. At
8.30 the chair was taken by Arthur
Hiscock, Esq., (more popular, if possi-
ble, in St. John's than in his birth-
place), who in a speech adorned with
dignity and joviality, set the keynote
of the evening—"Honor to whom hon-
or is due." After complimenting His
Lordship on attaining such a high
position, in which the whole Domini-
on and Trinity in particular are also
honoured, he read the following:

ADDRESS

To The Right Reverend WILLIAM
CHARLES WHITE, D.D., Lord
Bishop of Newfoundland.
Your Lordship:
It was with feelings of real pleasure
that we, your fellowtownsmen, now
residing in St. John's, learned of the
very high and distinguished honour
that had come to you by your elec-
tion to the Office of Bishop made vac-
ant by the resignation of the late
reverend and saintly Bishop Jones.
It was thought by us that we as
Trinitarians would be very remiss as
Churchmen and fellowtownsmen, if,
on the occasion of your election and
consecration, we failed to show to you
in some tangible way the high regard
in which we have always esteemed
you and collectively to extend our
congratulations.
Most of us can remember with a
great deal of pleasure and profit, your
visits to your native town as a young
priest, and what an inspiration and
help your preaching was to us in those
by-gone days.
The old and historic town of Trinity
has produced many honoured sons,
and among them your Lordship now
ranks first. Your past life, exemplary
in steadfastness of purpose and faith-
fulness to duty, will always be an in-
spiration to the boys and young men
of Trinity. We realize it to be an
honour to the town as well as to your-
self personally that the first native to
be consecrated Bishop of our beloved
Church of England in Newfoundland
should be a Trinitarian, and we feel
sure that the same characteristics you
show in your past life will be still
further exemplified in the high and
holy office of Bishop.
We deem it a great privilege to be
afforded the opportunity of presenting
you with your Episcopal Ring, and in
doing so we pray that Almighty God
will abundantly bless your Episcopate
and through it the Church Catholic
in Newfoundland.

His Lordship replied in part that it
was impossible not to be deeply moved
by such a Presentation, unique not
only for Trinity, but also for the whole
Diocese. He was especially pleased
that his fellowtownsmen should have
presented him with his ring, and he
pointed out in detail the significance
and use of this Episcopal Ornament,
showing that it is (1) an ancient cus-
tom of the Catholic Church, (2) a
sign of the attachment to his See, (3)
a token of the love he must bear to
the Church, (4) a symbol of the un-
ending priesthood of his office.
This particular ring was made by
the Warham Guild, a society of
Church Artificers in England, who are
devoted to producing Ecclesiastical
ornaments of the old English Church
pattern. On one side is carved the
Arms of the Diocese of Newfoundland,
and on the other the Bishop's own
Coat of Arms. The stone is a large
amethyst—the Bishop's colour purple
—and has been pronounced by an ex-
pert to be of the first water.
In conclusion His Lordship thanked
all those who were present or who
had assisted in organizing the presen-
tation.
The Chairman then presented the
Bishop with an ancient picture of the
Cathedral Choir, taken some fifty
years ago, when he (Mr. Hiscock) was
about fifteen years of age. The Bishop
in accepting this photo expressed his
highly he would prize this interesting
relic, a picture of many who were
his friends of his in days long ago.
At this juncture a very hearty vote
of thanks was passed to Mr. Hiscock,
through the kindness of Mrs. White
and a committee of ladies, the pro-
verbial cup of tea was then passed
around and thoroughly enjoyed.
During the evening speeches were
made by Messrs. Maidment, Burnell,
Grant, Hamlyn and Lockyer, and the
singing of the National Anthem
brought to a finish a most enthusias-
tic meeting. Great credit is due to
Messrs. E. G. Ash, R. Cross, W. J.
Bugden and others for the successful
way in which the whole affair was
organized and carried out.

I refer to the following words in Mr. Kelson's letter to Mr. Slade: "I hope you will dispatch one of the larger ones (vessels) pretty early for fear the John and Elizabeth might not return in time, as not to offer the least risk in remaining on board for six months."

It goes to show how careful they were in purchasing the fish, and how they expressed upon the fishermen through their agents, that nothing but first-class article would be received. The fishermen recognizing this established rule, took every care to earn out their voyage in conformity with the instructions. You will appreciate in previous letters how well upon the absolute necessity of Mr. Slade purchasing nothing but the best quality of salt and now often shipped Josh Carl "over the knuckle" or permitting himself to be taken in a few occasions by having an inferior article passed over to him by the dealers. It is clearly evident that in those far-off days there was no complaint about the fish being discolored to pink, because the fishermen were well aware that if they did not take any care and precaution to ship well-made fish their product would not be accepted as merchantable, and thus they would lose considerably at the winding up of the voyage.




Manned With Sailors.

Trinity, July 12th, 1814.

This with copy of No. 6 goes via St. John's per your Cosmopolite which craft is chiefly manned with sailors and has 248 qts. West India and Madeira fish and 430 bundles hoops. The George sailed on the morning of the 3rd inst. direct for Poole and had a fine time off the land. Enclosed is a Bill of Lading of her cargo. At present there is a fine prospect of a voyage and the planters in general have considerably more fish on shore now than they had at this date last year. We have a four-handed fishing punt out here, a constant baitskiff for ourselves and occasionally a cod seine and 6 hands. At Catalina a four-handed skiff, and at the French Shore the schooner Swallow and nine hands. But as soon as dry fish is to collect we of course must knock off some of our fishermen. The Mary, I could not raise a crew for and she is laid up here. If I hear nothing from you to the contrary I shall load the Alpha with our first fish for Spain or Portugal and bring back salt, as it is likely we may dispatch her sooner than either of the other vessels by a fortnight or three weeks. Elizabeth may soon make her appearance, and remain, Sir.

I have been considering on the probability reasons for the omission of leather gear, etc. by the vessels this Spring. It may perhaps (as you have remarked in No. 1 concerning the late arrival of my indent with you) have been occasioned by the impossibility of your orders to the different trades being completed in time. I see the impropriety of keeping back the whole of the indent until the remains are taken, which part of the business cannot be done until after the books are closed and the planters supplied again for the winter. For the future I shall send you a list of the principal articles wanting by the first vessel in the Spring, early in the Fall, say in October, in order to your having sufficient time to procure them, and although at that season it will be impossible to say exactly the quantities, still it will be better even to guess at the close of the business than to run the risk of our being disappointed as we are this season.

A partial indent early will certainly be better than no indent of any kind early, and the regular one at the close of the business can be sent as usual.




