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following motion was introduced by Sir Michael Cashin to move for the appointment of Select Commitee of the House, consisting of five nembers, "to enquire and report upn the appropriation and expenditure of public money in 1920 for the purchase of Fish and Salt, and into all matters concerning the charter of vesgels, the hiring of stores, the purchase and sale of Fish and Salt, and the whereabouts of the said Fish and Salt, and the control and management thereof; with power to employ Counof to take evidence on oath, and to send for all persons, papers and things necessary to the said enquiry; with instruction to the said committee hold an enquiry in public, and to have the evidence taken stenographically, and to publish the same from day to day in the newspapers of this city." In introducing the Motion Sir Michael said it was not necessary to go into details concerning it. An normous amount of money had been taken from the Treasury and an explanation should be given. If the Government's hands were clean in the matter there was no reason why an enquiry should not be courted. It was seconded by Mr. Bennett.

The Prime Minister did not think the Motion was necessary as the maters it referred to could receive a searching enquiry when the House goes into Committee on Supply, Ways and Means, etc. The motion would mean a vote of want of confidence in







BERLIN, May 10. Germany has accepted the Allied ltimatum. The Reichstag, to-night, v a vote of 221 to 175, vielded to the inal demands of the Allied Powers and in so doing agreed to fulfil terms of the Treaty of Versailles to the apacity of the nation to do so. Dr. Wirth. Centrist leader, finally suceeded in forming a Coalition Cabiet, composed of Centrists, Majority locialists and Democrats, which, confronted by grave necessity, speedily ecided that acceptance of the ultiatum was the only course. In making this announcement to the Reichstag, the new Chancellor asked for an mmediate decision by that body, and in the voting which followed, the Government was sustained. The Allied ultimatum required a definite reply, based "yes" or "no," no conditional reply would be entertained, expire on the night of May 12. The upon to pay, is 6,750,000,000 pounds. In view of the termination of time limits, I must ask you to express your opinion by an immediate decision. There is no possibility for it other than acceptance or rejec-The victors have so decided, and acceptance means that we declare our readiness to bear in voluntary abor the heavy financial burdens denanded year by year. Refusal would however, mean surrendering the pasis of our entire industrial activities, and as a consequence the disarmament of our economic body, already so greatly weakened, and the hackling of our entire industrial life."


