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

AUSTRIA'S SERIOUS PLIGHT. VIENNA, Aug. 22.

Chancellor Seinel's sudden visits to Prague, Berlin and Rome are said, in well informed circles here, to mean the determination of the Austrian Government to force events and bring the country's situation to a precipitate head rather than continue a drifting policy. It is understood the Chancellor will flatly in form the Premiers of these three countries that collapse is morally certain and imminent. He will point out the danger of this eventuality to the neighbouring states and ask them what action they are prepared to undertake, singly or jointly, when the crash comes; whether they will interfere, and if so how. Upon Seipel's return to Vienna he is expected to convoke the National Assembly and lay the whole situation before it. 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# The Murder of Michael Collins.

Story of the Assassination--The Culmination of Several Attempts.

LONDON, Aug. 22. Michael Collins, head of the Irish Provisional Government and Commander-in-Chief of the Irish National Army, was shot and killed at Bandon, County Cork, tonight, a few hours after he had been given an ovation by the people of Cork City,

who for the first time saw the Free State leader here in the uniform of a Commander-in-Chief. Several attacks have been made against the life of Michael Collins, head of the Provisional Government, Commander-in-Chief of the Irish Free State army The latest attempt was a bombins outrage when his car was ambushed last Friday afternoon on the Dublin side of Stillorgen. The official com this attack did not indicate whether Mr. Collins was in the machine at the time the driver was wounded and the car wrecked by a bomb, and more than a score of shots being fired in Dublin on April 17th. While Mr. Collins was on his way home after having addressed a meeting at Haas. County Kildare, he was attacked by a group of men, some with rifles, who rushed his car and opened fire. The Collins party returned the fire, and one of the asssailants was captured. Collins was not injured. Mr. Collins, in addition to being Commander-in-Chief of the Free State army, was
