Lloyd George is Denounced by the Morning Post.

Another Earthquake Shakes Japan—Halifax County Elects Black by Big Majority—200 Results of British Elections To-night.

200 DECLARATIONS TO-DAY.
LONDON, Dec. 5. Of the two hundred declarations which will be all the election results announced Thursday night, the most interesting of all will be Winston Churchill's fate. Premier Baldwin, Lloyd George and Ramsay MacDonald will be uncertain of their success till Friday as no announcement as to how they fared will be made until the day following the election.

LOYD GEORGE'S APPEAL TO LONDON.
LONDON, Dec. 5. Lloyd George followed up his appeal to the electors of London at Camberwell to-day by a letter to the Liberal Evening Star saying: "London, the greatest city in the world, is in danger. She lives by trade as no other city in the world lives by it and trade if it is to grow must be free. London does one-third of the overseas trade of Great Britain and receives more than one-third of her imports on the basis of this great trade itself a gift of free trade. London has become the financial centre of the whole world and the source of the development of our mighty Empire. To limit these activities by tariff would deal a deadly blow to the work and wages of the citizens of London."

MORNING POST ROUGH ON LLOYD GEORGE.
LONDON, Dec. 5. The Morning Post, the only London journal which has been behind Premier Baldwin to the utmost in this election, is just as extreme against his prominent opponents. In an editorial depicting Lloyd George as the arch villain in the political crisis the Post says, during his term of office there was no British interest in

the Allies' regime. There is no idea of evacuating the Ruhr at present and French troops will maintain their existing strength but will be taken off the streets. The principal measure of relief for the occupied district will be the release of many political prisoners and permission to expelled persons to return home.

ASQUITH NOT ACCEPTING A PEERAGE.
LONDON, Dec. 5. Mr. Asquith was asked last night if he intended accepting a peerage, thus causing a bye-election in a few months in Paisley if he is re-elected to-morrow. He replied "I have no intention of doing any such thing."

BLACK ELECTED.
HALIFAX, Dec. 5. W. E. A. Black, Conservative, head of the steamship firm of Pickford and Black, was elected here to-day to represent Halifax city and county in the Federal Parliament in the vacancy created by the appointment of Hon. A. K. Maclean to the Presidency of the Exchequer Court of Canada. George A. Redmond, Liberal, his only opponent in the bye-election, was defeated by a majority of about sixteen hundred votes. This is the first break in the solid Liberal representation sent to Ottawa at the general elections in 1921.

FRENCH EASING UP ON THE RUHR.

"Well, I haven't much use for people who say one thing to one person and another to another."

A friend of mine said that to me with great indignation yesterday.

Here is the experience that caused my friend's indignant remarks.

Long or Short.

We were talking about the new long skirts. While I hope we shall never give up the freedom of short skirts for street and sport wear, I am not at all averse to the return of longer skirts for dress up, as I think they look better on most people. My friend likes short skirts for every purpose and hopes they will stay.

In the course of our discussion she quoted a mutual friend, whose taste we both admire, as saying to her that she thought the new dresses were awfully uncomfortable and awkward. I countered with the fact that when I said I thought they looked much better on most people, this friend had enthusiastically agreed with me.

Whereupon my friend made the above declaration—that she didn't have much use for people who say one thing to one person and another to another.

And the funny part of that is that she herself is exactly that sort of a person.

For that matter, who isn't in some degree? I don't mean that we are all hypocrites. Far from it. I simply mean that we all, in greater or less degree, change our personalities to fit the person we are with.

She Wanted To Please.

If you look over what our mutual friend said to each of us, you will see that she did not exactly change her viewpoint, she simply modified it to please each of us. She may have thought the long skirts awkward and uncomfortable to wear, and yet graceful to look at. She appeared to agree with each of us and that pleased us and made us like her—which was what she subconsciously was trying to do.

And what most of us are consciously or subconsciously trying to do all the time.

I do not think there is any more common motive in the world than the desire to be liked.

Sometimes it causes us to do kind, commendable things, and then again it makes us do things we have no right to do.

Charles Lamb once said, "Hang it all,—how I do like to be liked—and what I will not do to be liked!"

He knew his own weakness. Most of us don't.

When We Go Too Far.

Everyone likes to find people who agree with his opinions. Consequently, there is no surer path to liking than the habit of agreement and complaisance. And inevitably this is one of the commonest ways in which we yield up our principles on the altar of popularity.

In a mild degree there is no harm in it. One doesn't need to say all one thinks on every occasion. The truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, is all right for the witness box, but in casual converse we can surely have a little more latitude about what to leave unsaid.

But there is a point where amiability and complaisance pass into hypocrisy. Look out lest you pass it, you who have to a high degree that amiable weakness, the wish to be loved.

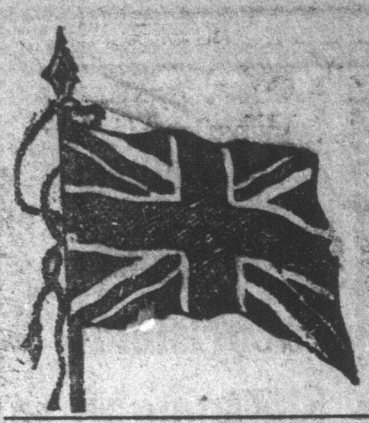

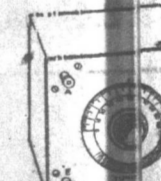

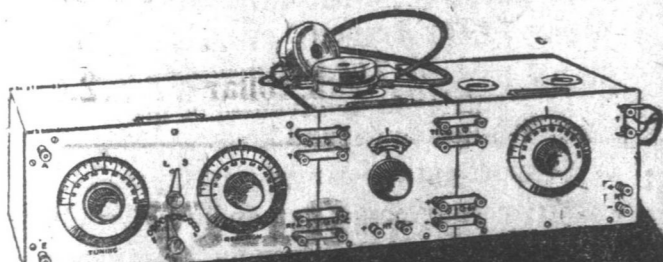

"All Fuss and Feathers"

(By W. K. CHANCEY of Grand Falls.)
Yes, we're no "Yokohamas", we have no "Yokohamas" to-day. We have Leghorns, Anconas, and maybe "Lanomas". And all kinds of hens that pay. We've some good Barred Rock chickens, that lay like the dickens; But yes, we've no "Yokohamas", we have no "Yokohamas" today.

During the week of the Annual Poultry Exhibition put on by the Newfoundland Poultry Association, a few words relative to the heading of this article may be in order. The term has been applied in the past by critics not over kind in their criticism of Poultry Shows in general.

If a considerable amount of work for the greater part of the year on the part of both exhibitors and officials to further a worthy industry in Poultry, if seeing that friend and foe alike get fair treatment and the worth of the admission fee is Fuss, let us admit the word Fuss justifiable.

And "Feathers." Very natural for birds to be feathered at a Show of Live Stuff, is it not? Excepting of course where a section for Market Poultry is instituted. Tell a feather critic that he may have any bird he cares to pick from your flock for his own, and you can give odds that he will pick a good looking every time. But the word that sticks in ages past and will for years to come, is the word All. To the initiated that word "All" brands his statement "All Fuss and Feathers" as an untruth.

The exhibits are judged in accordance with the rules laid down in The Standard of Perfection, and granted the Judge knows his business the carcass under the feathers must measure close up to what is laid down for the breed the particular exhibit he handles is supposed to represent. Top line and under line, and typical shape may be apparent from the side, skillful conditions can do many things with "feathers," but the 1923 Standard makes it more emphatic than ever that the Judge must handle specimens and get the knowledge of the body shape that is under the feathers.

Let us consider a few things from the Scale of Points laid down by the Standard for the practical breeds from a useful point of view apart from the fancy feather question, viz: shape, weight or size, condition, color. Shape making the breed, color or in some cases type of comb the variety. No doubt the Standard makers had in mind a niche that could be filled advantageously by the different breeds and varieties admitted. No one breed or variety possesses all the requirements for every purpose. Each has some advantages and disadvantages. Each has commendable points for certain special purposes too lengthy to take up here. Shape, as laid down by the Standard Revision Committee, and Weight, is doubtless that which experience has taught them to be the most useful for the purpose in mind for the breed under consideration, as well as giving it as good an appearance as possible. It is difficult to illustrate briefly and concisely, but the following may convey a faint idea that Shape and Weight laid down by the Standard are useful qualities as well as tending towards the symmetrical.

Shape. Yes, a nice plump, well meaty breast on the Wyandotte broiler you put below deck to-day, or maybe it was the heavily meaty thighs of a Cornish Igótan Game. A student of the Standard breed that most just where it ought to be for the purpose you used it. Fine grained with little connective-tissue kill a scrub and compare with the Standard product and you will then appreciate he gave you more feathers. Some of the Standard terms such as "Rather long broad back," "Rather deep and full breast," "Long keel bone and large thighs," etc., define sufficiently the utility quality of Standard bred poultry from the meat point of view. Meat is bred on and is not a question altogether of feed alone. Then again the Standard shaped body in the so-called egg laying breeds and general purposes breeds permits of plenty of room for the egg machinery, and capacity to assimilate food and stand up under the strain of production. No tight through the saddle and crow headed weaklings, and extraordinary low producers, if the flock is culled close to Standard shape for the breed.

Weight. Let a so-called egg breed and a general purpose breed serve to illustrate as briefly as may be possible, using Leghorns and Plymouth Rock Standard weights. For all varieties of the Leghorn Breed the Standard weight runs 5 1/2, 4 1/2, 4, 3 1/2, for Cock, Cockerel, Hen and Pullet respectively. Here is a breed whose size will permit you to store roughly one hundred in the same size house that you would only be safe in putting seventy-five perhaps of the general purpose breeds such as Plymouth Rocks in, and giving the birds equal room and comfort as to floor space, etc.--the smaller bird not requiring quite as much of either roosting or square feet of floor space per bird in laying flocks. They will consume approximately about six lbs. of feed less per bird for a year than the larger breeds, and while perhaps not laying more eggs than equally well bred strains of Plymouth Rocks, Rhode Island Reds, or Wyandottes, they produce them more economically or in other words at less cost per dozen.

They fill the niche for the Commercial Egg Farmer, who has little or no requirement for any poultry product beyond eggs. Breeding the layers much above Standard weight is in practically all cases followed by lowered egg production. Some claim that birds slightly under Standard prove the best layers, but there is danger of stock running out in time and eggs becoming smaller in size if birds much under weight are bred from as a general rule. Here is a specific breed for a specific purpose that according to all unbiased opinion does best and pays best at Standard weight. I leave to any one to judge if Standard weight appears to be purposeful and useful in this case.

Plymouth Rock Standard weight for all the different varieties be they Barred, Silver Pencilled, White, Buff, or Partridge, or Columbian run as follows: For Cock, Cockerel, Hen, and Pullet, 9 1/2 lbs., 7 1/2 lbs., 7 lbs. Here you have a general purpose breed that fills a niche for the farmer who likes some meat as well as eggs, he has hatches that may give him as high as 80 per cent. Cockerels. What he does not need for his table he can fatten and make a profit on, while the Leghorn man is lucky to get rid of his as squab broilers and break even. The breed also is adapted in a commercial way to the man who wishes to cater to both Market Poultry and Market Egg trade. His eggs may cost him more per dozen, to produce than the Leghorn man's cost him, but he has two outlets, and he not only has a larger carcass to market but the meat being of much higher quality than Leghorn flesh, he gets a much higher price per lb. than is obtainable for the latter in good markets. Breeding Plymouth Rocks much above Standard weight will tend to Leghornize them. Egg production may be satisfactory to some degree, but the quality and quantity of carcass will not be there for the market end of it. You will be giving a dual purpose fowl a single objective. If there is a penalty in this case for wandering far in either direction from Standard weight, and it means dollars and cents, again I leave it to some one to decide if Standard weight is useful.

Condition. As referred to in the Standard and given due valuation in the Scale of Points practically means the state of the fowl exhibited as to its general health, vigor, cleanliness throughout or vice versa. Birds in good condition have the best chance of winning, other points being fairly equal. Vermo infested birds or those with scaly legs, apparently diseased birds or those with soiled and bedraggled plumage and unclean generally are either disqualified, perhaps ordered from the Show Room altogether, or at best heavily handicapped with a big cut for condition being very bad. Do you want eggs or meat from the clean, healthy bird for use on the table? The Standard compels the Judge to reward the bird with points for good condition, to penalise severely for lack of it. So again in the Show Room stress is laid on something useful if cleanliness is of any value or desirable in food products.

Color. The Standard rules that good color must be rewarded in the Show Room according to the requirements laid down for each variety. Apart from being a distinguishing mark of a variety, and its near perfection in a specimen a sort of good finishing touch, (and a football for critics in general) who knows the Standard makers did not have something useful in view at the same time, with a purpose in mind as well as for shape, weight or size, and condition previously reviewed? If things were all of the same color what a monotonous planet we would be living on. Folk indulge their fancy in color of clothes and other commodities essential to life on this mundane sphere so why not indulge in it as regards birds or animals one gets the possibility? Looks like getting back to "Feathers" now, eh? No! The broad gauge useful track still remains in sight and I will try to shunt a few ideas as to color along it.

(1) An old colored man once told a Judge before whom he was brought for chicken stealing, and who asked him the kind of chicken he preferred, that "The white ones am de easiest to find Judge, but the black ones am de easiest to hide aftah yo catches them."

(2) A white variety dresses well for market purposes with no dark objectionable feathers. White feathers bring about forty cents per lb. in some markets against thirteen cents for colored.

(3) Dark varieties are more suitable for backyard flocks as they do not show soiling so easily. Where hawks abound a farmer is less likely to lose so large a percentage of his flock as if they were of a white variety. The lazy man does not have to tub them as he would a white bird before exhibiting it.

(4) In some part colored varieties the males may be told almost as soon as hatched. That is why Barred Rock fowls apart from the excellent qualities of their flesh, are favored by those catering to the Capon Markets. The males can be detected early, and Caponized before too far advanced for best results.

Color has too many uses to dwell on here, and if foreign color should be allowed to pass unchallenged altogether, not only would breed characteristics be lost, but a great many

George Street Church Jubilee

ADDRESS BY HIS EXCELLENCY SIR W. L. ALLARDYCE AT A MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY, DEC. 4th.

A Jubilee is, as a rule, an occasion for rejoicing, and when your minister headed a deputation to me on the 24th October and invited me to be present at the Jubilee Celebration of your Church, I gladly acquiesced. Before the interview was over it was brought home to me that I was expected to deliver a short address, and Mr. Fairbairn in explaining that the words "Wesleyan Church" were written over the main entrance, unconsciously gave me the keynote to what I am about to say.

Although you no longer call yourselves Wesleyans, but Methodists, your Church owes a debt of gratitude to John Wesley which will I trust never be forgotten. And in this connection I could not help remembering last month, when presiding at a meeting in the Methodist College Hall at which those two gifted Health Welfare workers, Mrs. McIntyre and Miss Hall, gave most helpful and instructive lectures on health culture, that it was John Wesley who said, "Cleanliness is next to Godliness." He likewise urged his followers to adopt numerous health rules.

On this interesting and historical occasion when you celebrate your Jubilee, it occurs to me that it would be appropriate were we to try and realize for a few minutes what sort and manner of man this John Wesley was who founded this wonderful creed.

point to religious history, had really any conscious intention of producing those subsequent world-circling and stirring results which many of the deepest thinkers of the present day do not hesitate to give him credit for. At the time referred to, and indeed long after his death, Wesley was regarded by contemporaneous writers as a man of distinctly advanced views, while a certain section of the public during his lifetime went so far as to believe him to be a fanatic. To-day our focus is a very different one. Matthew Arnold has summed up the character of that great evangelist in the four simple words "a genius for Godliness." Wesley, by his example and his teachings, laid the foundations of a much-needed spiritual revival, and, at the same time, although probably unconsciously, became one of the main pillars of our national life, a veritable Empire Builder. To-day Methodism has over 56,000 Anglo-Saxon Ministers in its pulpits, and its adherents exceed 32,000,000. And not the least impressive and significant fact is this, that one hundred and thirty-two years after Wesley's decease the Church he founded is a hundred times stronger than when he passed away. But, immense and wonderful as these achievements are, John Wesley is responsible for something greater still. His work and ministrations from 1738 to 1791, when he died, created an awakening of the religious life of the people of England, which was to have the most far-reaching results. Wesley not only reshaped but he recreated the conscience of the country. By what methods, process, or means did he achieve this titanic and colossal result? He invented no new doctrine; he added no new truth to Christian knowledge. He himself draws aside the veil, and with a charming simplicity reveals the secret as follows:—"I simply teach the plain old religion of the Church of England," and added, "truth which were merely the common funda-

mental teaching of Christianity." Reviewing the life of the Great Evangelist one is at a loss whether to admire more those famous words of his "The world is my parish," or that thrilling message uttered shortly before he passed away, "Declare to all men that the Methodists are one people in all the world, and that it is their full determination so to continue." That dying declaration with its clarion cry has a special significance for each one of us gathered here this evening to celebrate the Jubilee of this old Wesleyan Church. But it has likewise a direct application to every Methodist wheresoever resident. It is an appeal that cannot be lightly set aside or disregarded, and I am satisfied that were it possible for John Wesley to be in our midst tonight he would at once recognize the trials and the needs of present day humanity, the outcome in great measure of the destruction, suffering, and misery, engendered by the Great War. Might he not even go so far as to tell us that not only all Methodists, not only all Christians of whatsoever denomination, but every human unit comes within the category of "one people in all the world," and that the antidote to our troubles is more brotherly love, more consideration for others, more service, more unity. And is there not encouragement to be obtained in the reflection that at the great Lambeth Conference of Anglicans in 1920, held 126 years after Wesley's death, the important question of the reunion of the churches came prominently to the front and a moving appeal was made by the Bishops to all Christian peoples, both within and without their communion, for a united fellowship. Is not the approach to such a fellowship or union by way of mutual deference to one another's consciences? At the late General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada the adoption of the report on Church Union was

carried, I understand, by a two-thirds majority. Is this not likewise encouraging? There is no evidence to show, so far as I am aware, that Wesley ever formally left the Mother Church. It is not really material to the question of unity and I merely mention it as an interesting historical event. What is of far, far greater importance is the vision of unity depicted by the dying Evangelist, and I venture to think that we as Christians, of what soever denomination, shall best serve our time and generation by remembering not only that the Master made of one blood and all nations of the earth, but that each in his individual way has a sacred duty to perform to his fellow man, that no one has a right to live to himself alone, and that the highroad to happiness and contentment is through service to others. One word in conclusion. It may be that there is someone in the large assemblage gathered here this evening that does not often enter a place of worship, but to whom the occasion of the Jubilee of this church has awakened memories of the past, touched a chord that has long remained unstruck, and brought back the remembrance of days of yore when with his 'ain folk' he attended service regularly. Or it may be that the voice of conscience, or even idle curiosity, prompted him to be present on this occasion. But whatever the cause or influence that brought him, he hopes, although he himself would be the last to admit it, that he may hear something helpful and practical, something that may fit in with his particular case and afford him the opportunity to pick up the old trail. It is not improbable that he may have an intense yearning to get nearer to nature and in surveying the miraculous works around him feel that he is getting nearer to the Great Creator Himself. Should there be such an one here to-night, permit me on this, the Jubilee of this Wesleyan Church, to repeat the advice given in a book called, "We of the Never, Never," by an Australian authoress, Mrs. Aeneas Gunn. The scene is laid right in the heart of the Great Australian Continent. It is Sunday, no Church or Minister within a thousand miles. The Boss and his wife, a few camp hands and others, are lounging in the sun-flecked shade of the embodiment of lazy contentment. There is general agreement with Dan, the stockman, that "Sunday wasn't a bad institution for the man had no objection to doing a loaf now and then." Conversation had become spasmodic, and not worth the energy required to utter it. The cattle grazed, the Bromeli kites hovered and wheeled in the sunshine, the sweet scents and rustling sounds of the bush became fainter and fainter, as half-absorbed thoughts melted into a semi-unconsciousness. The silence, however, was again broken by Dan who, lazily altering his position, said "Never was much at religion myself, but Mrs. Bob was the one to make you see things right off. Can't exactly remember how she put it; seemed as though you'd only got to hoo your own row the best you can, and lend others a hand with theirs, and just let God see after the rest." Did not that stockman set the air vibrating with one of the grandest and noblest principles of Christianity? "To anyone to whom it may be helpful I repeat, "Hoo your own row the best you can. Lend others a hand with theirs. Let God see to the rest."

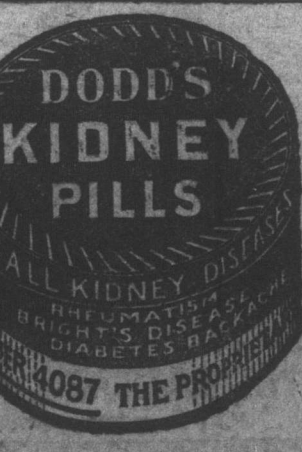

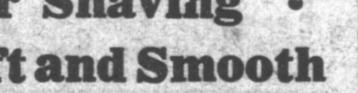
Fined for Breaches of Customs Act

"What has the League of Nations done? It has prevented war in few cases. It has built up a great anti-war organization. It has built up a great secretarial organization. It has brought into being the International Court of Justice to which twenty nations have acknowledged jurisdiction.

"In some quarters," the speaker maintained, "there has been a lot of discussion as to the enormous cost of keeping up the League of Nations, and it has been said that the results obtained have not been worth the money expended. The absurdity of this statement will be seen when I tell you that the cost of the League for one year is about equal to the maintenance of one modern battleship for the same period.

World Conditions.

Referring to world conditions, Sir Robert declared the aspect at present was anything but propitious. He remembered the night before he left the Peace Conference, counting up with Smith and Booth, 18 or 19 different fronts in Europe and Asia, on which fighting was in progress and the Peace Conference had been in session for more than three months. Since then conditions had not improved to any considerable extent. "I have thought if that Peace Conference had been a little shorter and Germany allowed to be heard on the question of reparations, perhaps world conditions might be easier today.

"If the arrangement which the United States and Great Britain made as a guarantee to France during a certain number of years, had been carried out, perhaps the difficulties facing us to-day would not be so momentous. But it was never ratified and consequently the treaty which Great Britain made, to the same effect, never became effective, and therefore, France to-day is without a guarantee of which she believed herself to be possessed when she left.

Feeling of Depression.

"We left that conference, and all that turmoil, in the spring of 1919, with a certain feeling of depression about conditions in Europe and that feeling of despair has never entirely left me, although I have always been hopeful and still am, because the world has a habit of lifting itself out of chaos.

"The danger to our own civilization—the time has long since passed when any nation itself can live in a hermitage—lies in the fact that in any world affair, every nation is affected. The world is really one vast commonwealth under modern conditions, and I don't believe it would be possible to have another war without practically the whole world being involved.

"I don't know whether you have ever tried to realize what another war would mean. No one can tell what would happen. In modern warfare every nation engaged in a belligerent and therefore it is the duty of everyone to do his part to make for the future peace of the world by every means in his power.

"I was at the Washington Conference which succeeded by its employment of methods that are embodied in the League of Nations. It is the fashion in some parts of Canada—and I believe here—to sneer at the League of Nations. But if you are not going to have its influence on the world, what are you going to have? Are you going to go back to the days of diplomacy—often of the secret nature—that brought about the world war of 1914-1918. I venture to say that if the League of Nations, from its inception, has never done anything of a concrete character, it would have been well worth while to establish it merely as a means of bringing the nations of the world into closer communication and meeting in the case of emergency."—Montreal Star, Nov. 26.

Defends Idea of Nation's League.

SIR R. BORDEN CONSIDERS IT EFFECTIVE INSTRUMENT TO PREVENT WAR.

World affairs to-day, and especially European affairs, may easily drag civilization down to ruin and chaos, stated Sir Robert Borden, former Prime Minister of Canada, when he addressed the Young Men's Canadian Club at the Windsor Hotel, Saturday afternoon.

The remedy for this state of affairs, and the one that is nearest at hand, the speaker asserted, was the League of Nations.

"Though the League of Nations so far has accomplished little that is concrete," said Sir Robert, "its mere existence has been a constant reminder to countries faced with war that their differences may be settled without always resorting to the sword."

Prevented War.

"I believe that the League of Nations, in the three and one-half years of its troubled existence, has done more to assure the peace of the world and prevent war and to teach the nations the hope of conference than all the chancelleries of the world.

"Therefore, I bespeak from you the support of that covenant. How are you to assure the peace of the world? By force? No. The only way is to educate the nations of the world to settle their disputes by peaceful means. And the fact that they are called together yearly at Geneva is a great means of teaching them that habit.

For a number of years he gave faithful service in the employ of the late Rodger Downs, and some time previous to the 1892 fire he went into business for himself, opening a store on New Gower Street. About 20 years ago he retired. During his long career the deceased enjoyed excellent health, and it was only about a week ago that he began to fail. He leaves to mourn a wife and two daughters. Mrs. Blois, residing in Nova Scotia, and Mrs. W. Percival of this city, and a large circle of friends. The funeral takes place on Friday from No. 12 Freshwater Road, the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. W. E. Percival, at 2.30 p.m. The Telegram joins in expressions of sympathy to the bereaved family.

The Educational Side of the H. J. Crowe Enterprise

HAMPDEN, White Bay, Nov. 26th, 1923.

To the Editor Evening Telegram. In connection with the operations recently opened up here by Mr. Harry J. Crowe a most enthusiastic gathering assembled in the New School House to welcome Miss May Lowrie and Miss Macaulay who have been engaged to teach the children and carry on welfare work in this community of over seven hundred now comfortably settled for the winter in about one hundred and ten little houses or shacks built within the past six weeks. This is in addition to the large number of single men living in Mr. Crowe's logging camps. Mr. W. M. Balfour, the popular manager of Mr. Crowe's was chairman of the meeting and very ably executed his duties.

Never in the history of White Bay have the people shown such interest in the Educational advantages now offered their two hundred and forty-five (245) children of school age who have recently settled here from La Scie, Paquet, Fleur de Ile, Seal Cove, Harbour Round, Woodstock, Bryans Cove, and other places on the North Coast, many from destitute homes. At the close of the meeting the large audience gave vent to their feelings by a round of ringing cheers for the leaders of this movement.

Miss Lowrie addressed the meeting with deep feeling and referred to the call she received from Mr. Crowe to come to Newfoundland, as a cry from Macedonia to "Come over and help us". She thanked the people for their hearty welcome and demonstrated briefly in a fascinating way a few of the latest methods for training children in creating constructive thought and quickening their observation.

Miss Lowrie has a wide experience having taught in England a number of years, spent the last three years studying Canadian Methods in Ontario, Saskatchewan and Nova Scotia. Recently she has been lecturing and demonstrating Kindergarten, Primary Methods to teachers in Nova Scotia. Miss Lowrie brings with her to Hampden the most up-to-date methods and equipment for Kindergarten, Primary and also Senior Departments.

Miss Macaulay with a pronounced Irish accent made a most favourable impression in her address particularly to the mothers. She is a trained Welfare Worker from Ireland and has spent the last two years in Canada where she was Superintendent of a Social Service Association at Vancouver, B.C. Recently she has been actively engaged in welfare work in Toronto.

Miss Macaulay in addition to carrying on Welfare Work in the homes intends having a social evening each week for the men as well as the women when matters of Health, Home Economics, Demonstrations in Cooking, also Debates, Games and other Entertainments will make up the programme. The women met Miss Macaulay later and appointed their officers for carrying on their winter work.

Miss Lowrie and Miss Macaulay laid stress upon the importance of starting a new centre of the Scotch Knitting Industry among our women and girls. This work has been inspired by Lady Allardyce, wife of our much esteemed Governor. In referring to this work Miss Lowrie pointed out that the fisher girls of Newfoundland had earned four thousand dollars during the month of September. Needless to say the women of Hampden intend to be second to none in skill and production.

Messrs. Joseph and George Burton were chosen to speak on behalf of the people of Hampden. These men were leaders in the communities from which they came and since coming here have been so recognized in religious and social affairs. They referred to the failure of the fishery which forced them from their homes and with warmth declared that had it not been for the employment offered at Hampden many of them would have faced starvation during the coming winter unless the Government had sent them relief. What was appreciated more than anything else in connection with their employment at Hampden was the chance to work near their homes, thus enabling them to look after their families in providing fire wood, etc. It was for this reason they had brought their families to Hampden and if labour could not have been secured within easy

reach of their new homes they would have suffered. Messrs. George and Joseph Burton both spoke with deep feeling about the lack of educational advantages in their native villages which is evidenced by so many young and old who are unable to read and of not showing their gratitude.

Judging by the reception Mr. Crowe received on rising to introduce the new settlers of Hampden adding that never in all his experience in various parts of the island had he found a community so united in a desire to improve their conditions and with such determination to make good. He spoke of the assistance which the people of White Bay were endeavoring to give to the future of the children received an education through the modern methods of Miss Lowrie. He said the parents would make use of their power to present children who are the future of the country from being handicapped which they had because of being deprived of opportunities.

Mr. Crowe closed his remarks with an appeal to take better care of their bodies and went fully into the subject of the "consumption of flour, more white flour and less white flour which he noticed especially in White Bay. He said its food value and the effect on the body of so much of this kind and unenriching food—a mass of starch." He hoped that some of the efforts of the past year in White Bay and the past years of ever increasing educational work which he believed was carried on in this part of the Bay would be felt with benefit in all sections of the island. A campaign had been started for whole wheat flour with good prospects of success. Musical programmes which were highly applauded was as follows: Song—"Annie Laurie" by Lowrie.

Song—"When Irish Eyes are Smiling" by Miss Macaulay. Song—"Where the River Flows" by Mr. A. A. Poole. Mr. Poole was visiting here on business in the interests of the Mill Rand Company and made a contribution to the programme. Miss Lowrie also gave a recitation entitled "A Frenchman's Garden of Eden" which was met with laughter and applause. A very enthusiastic and successful meeting a red letter day for the den was brought to a close by singing the National Anthem.
