





The Good Civic Spirit of Moncton

The building of the Brunswick Re-tel at Moncton is an example of what ling to get behind an undertaking nd see it through. The Brunswick Hotel in Moncton is more than a useful adjunct of the city; it is a monunent to the good civic spirit of the

scheme was first mentioned Moncton needed a new and modern hotel. But the mere need was not sufficient to make the project successful. Scores of places there are where a new and modern hotel is very much needed and where the need may continue to exist until the orack of doom, unless

In the Brunswick, Moncton now has a hotel which is a great credit to the place. It is big enough to accommodate a large number of peo-ple (200 guests), is comfortably furshed, and its general service is ite metropolitan in its quality. This article, however, is not intended as an advertisement for the hotel, but merely to cite very briefly the way which it was obtained.

Mr. J. A. Marven, the president of he biscuit manufacturing company of Moncton, which bears his name, was president of the hotel company. He, with a small group of local men, assumed large financial obligations from the very beginning. That is to say they subscribed most liberally to the capital, or as Mr. Marven says him-self, they gave until it hurt. After that they asked the public to help, which it did quite generously. The total amount of money raised in the city of Moncton was \$190,000. Think of it, and Moncton is a place of only 18,000 people.

Two things it seems to us were reonsible for this success: One, the elief in Moncton that the hotel could e made to pay; the other, that in Moncton there is a strong disposition to support home efforts. Both were important, although the first might have been of no value if the second did not exist. It is not always so that things happen thus. In many communities when a local project is oposed, 50 per cent, of the people n these communities are willing to make an affidavit that it will surely be a financial failure; and of the remaining 50 per cent. who do see a change of succeeding, only a small portion of it are willing to back their belief with their money. In the case of Moncton, the promoters proved to be right. The hotel did pay. It is paying still. It now has assets in building and equipment of \$240,000, and practically no liability. The company, has paid the promised interest on its bonds since the day it was opened, so Mr. Marven told us, and except for a year when it was partially out of business, because of a fire, it has paid 7 per cent. annually on its common stock. Recently it pad a special dividend, making good half of the skipped year's dividend. Now this is about all that need be said at the present time about this Moncton example of team work in establishing a new enterprise. We have said it in this number, because this is our "Inspiration Number" of the year.—The Maritime Merchant.
