ASHAMED OF THEIR POSITION

Many of the people who are supporting the corporation scheme to run Calgary of its lighting plants and other business, have given evidence that they are quite ashamed of their actions. They want it known publicly that they are not municipal ownership people at all right, but they say further that this proposition is better than municipal ownership.

This new corporation is possessed of no supernatural powers, even the Calgary Herald does not claim that for them. They have no occult secret for developing power, known to others. They have no rights or property. In fact no company is set in existence. They are simply proposing nothing, doing nothing that the city could not do as well, or perhaps just a little bit better.

That being the case how can these people continue to prate about their municipal ownership principles when on the very first occasion they are ready to abandon them?

The Calgary Herald announces that it is precisely in the same position as the Calgary Herald in its municipal ownership, though it has never on any occasion failed to denounce municipal ownership when the corporation scheme attempt to possess the municipal ownership of the city.

It has been cold, but cheer up, the winter is coming, and the Chicago always attends that.

The "something better than municipal ownership" that these persons have discovered is simply corporation ownership, though they are ashamed to admit it.

DIVIDING THE PROVINCE

The Medicine Hat News, in its modesty, asks for one constituency for Medicine Hat in the redistribution of seats in Alberta. Inasmuch as the unit of representation is approximately 26,500 and the population of Medicine Hat and district is 6,600, the request of the News is by no means a small one. It would be decidedly unjust to give it more than the province that Medicine Hat should be so favored. It is barely possible that one Medicine Hat person as a member of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta, but the Dominion legislators do not know that, and will have to be shown.

The distribution of Alberta into four fair districts is a matter that can be no gerrymandering, for Alberta is all Liberal, and with the increase in population the party complexion of any particular district may change in a month.

And fortunately the old question of north and south has practically passed away despite the vigorous efforts that have been made in certain quarters to resurrect it.

The question of dividing the western provinces has been left to a committee of the house. The Albertan has no information about either the results of this committee will reach in the division or the method which they will adopt to reach the conclusion. However, it may be assumed in the beginning that Alberta will be divided into seven constituencies and as nearly as possible of a population of 26,500.

It is almost certain that the divisions of the present local ridings will not be observed. They should not be observed, for the reason that very soon these ridings will cease to exist as they exist now. More than likely the township divisions will be observed.

Having regard to the population of the different townships, and beginning at the south, it will be found that the total population of the 11 townships is slightly less than the unit of representation, but not so very far removed to make such a division unfair. These townships take in all the Mormon country, the Pass country, Lethbridge and Macleod.

Starting from township 11 and continuing to township 23, which would be included, we get a second riding with about the required number. This district would take in Claresholm, Nanton, Staveland, High River, Okotoks, but it would also take in Medicine Hat city and the village of Gleichen should be in the Calgary division.

Calgary is in township 24. To form another division of approximately 26,500, Calgary city would be included and townships 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30 and 31. This would include everything west of Calgary on the main line of the C. P. R. and also all along the north line as far as Didsbury and taking in Didsbury, and of course the district to east and west. This would make a very good riding. The Albertan does not know the political complexion of such a division, and no person knows it.

The next division would take in Olds, Innisfail, Red Deer, Lacombe and Ponka, with the other villages along the line and the townships east and west.

This would leave three ridings in the further north, where it might be wise to make divisions north and south, instead of east and west.

THE STREET RAILWAY PROPOSITION

In another part of this paper the reason of the street railway in Calgary is described at some length. Editorially it is necessary only to point out that there is much more in Calgary than in Guelph, and that the Calgary railway would be easier than the Guelph railway, for

the reason that Calgary is almost absolutely level. The initial cost would not be very considerable, probably less than that of Guelph, for the reason that it is more than likely that with our present electrical equipment we could probably manage a street railway for a couple of years.

If a street railway can pay that city a dividend of eight per cent, it should pay the city of Calgary a dividend of 16 per cent.

CALGARY MUST NOT YIELD

If Calgary disposes of its power plant, Calgary will at the mercy of the Bow river and at the mercy of corporations.

If Calgary does not dispose of its power plant it must continue to pay both sinking fund and interest, and the offer of the power company will in no way cheapen the cost of power and light to the city.

Whatever this new company may desire to do, Calgary cannot run the risk of losing its light business, pecuniary which do the moment it disposes of its light plant.

So it comes around to the same thing. If Calgary is to be on the safe side all Calgary must reject this offer of the power company.

The question of a street railway then can be argued upon its merits, that being the case how can these people continue to prate about their municipal ownership principles when on the very first occasion they are ready to abandon them?

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Rev. Mr. Hunter threatens Calgary with destruction as Jonah threatened Nineveh. But Mr. Hunter would doubtless object to being called the Jonah of Calgary.

A Calgary weekly paper mildly suggests that we might give this year proposition a trial for 35 years, and if at the end of that time it is not satisfactory we can cut it out.

The only building that remained uninjured in Kingston, Jamaica, was a newspaper building, which is proof that, unlike the rain, the earthquake is not equally considerate to the unjust and the just.

There is little interest in baseball this year, despite the fact that they are in the big league. Last year we played two games of ball in January and this year not a single game has been scheduled.

Four Liberal members of the Ontario legislature are mentioned for the Liberal leadership, and the general public is wondering at the discrimination and why the other two do not have a look in.

One effect of the government's telephone policy appears to have been to convince the Bell people of the new and growing reason why the Bell Telephone Co. should lose no time in endeavoring to supply that demand.—Edmonton Bulletin.

A Toronto paper calculates the great value of the timber output in that province if all the timber could be sold for wooden legs, which calculation is lost on us here in Alberta, where they are chopping up wooden legs for firewood.

The Edmonton News says that the manager of the Edmonton baseball team is saying little but saving wood, which is an intimation that when Deacon White really gets going that the Edmonton papers will have to devote the fourth page, also to Edmonton baseball gossip.

The Herald announces that it will support the corporation power scheme if it pays better than municipal scheme. That is an open confession and it is safe to anticipate the result because the public would not stand for the municipal company paying a newspaper or any person to favor any scheme.

"And this company is asking for a franchise for only 35 years," is one reason given for supporting the Budd & Alexander proposition by one of its supporters, when all these "municipal ownership advocates" without any additional "information" would have been just as ready to support it for a thousand.

Controversy About Heaven Through these columns a debate has been going on for the last few days upon the subject of Heaven, principally between Mr. Burgess and Mr. Brown. The letter which appears today is the third by Mr. Burgess, who started the debate. Mr. Brown has written two in reply. This should exhaust the subject, and the Albertan does not expect to publish any more letters in this controversy at the present time.

An Explanation Last week Mr. Cosgrove sent in a letter to the Albertan in reply to a complaint which he said a weekly paper had made of the sermons of Messrs. Crossley and Hunter.

The Albertan is always ready and anxious to publish letters from correspondents, but declines to do all respectable newspapers, to permit correspondents to abuse contemporaries. This is done in the editorial and not in the correspondence department. The Albertan, however, did not desire to lose the letter entirely and in place of the first few paragraphs substituted or intended to substitute the following: "Mr. Cosgrove writes the Albertan in answer to a weekly paper complaining of the literary etc. Unfortunately a mistake was made and the explanation appeared like this: "Mr. Cosgrove writes the Albertan com-

plaining of the literary," etc., which was quite a different matter. The mistake was quite unintentional and of a nature which occasionally occurs in any newspaper, unfortunately. That part of the letter which followed plainly indicated the mistake that had been made. The Albertan takes this, the first possible opportunity since the mistake was called to its attention, to make this explanation.

Question of Heaven

Editor Albertan: In answer to Mr. Brown's (1) I conclude that he is either arguing for the mere sake of it, or for the good of others, or he is canvassing for my further thoughts because he says he does not hold either the views he gives or the views I have taken. He is, by trying to sit on two stools, sitting on nothing. I am earnest in what I advocate because it is what I believe.

(2) There are two translations of the Bible printed by the University Press of Oxford, the "Authorized Version" of 1611 and the "Revised Version" of 1881. I quote from the revised version because it is the best translation of the two.

(3) The thief on the cross asked as a favor from the Christ in His dying moment, "Remember me when Thou comest into Thy Kingdom," and Christ replied, "I will." As the Christ has not yet come to His Kingdom the promise to the thief has not yet been fulfilled, but will be. The thief sleeps still, as he fell asleep that day, and as the Christ also died the same day, I conclude that the paradise referred to was death with the hope of life in the resurrection. The words, "this day shalt thou be with Me in paradise," were merely an expressed thought of Jesus and not an answer to the thief's question. The words "I will" were the answer. The word paradise is derived from the Greek paradisos meaning a garden. Perhaps by this Christ meant they would both be buried in the same garden—I say perhaps.

(4) If Christ did not rise from the dead He could not have ascended into heaven with the body that was laid in the tomb. If I doubt the resurrection I must therefore doubt the ascension.

(5) I cannot explain anything that about the angelic heaven. It may be or it may not be a place. I cannot locate it. I am, however, clear that Christians do not go there when they die.

(6) Elijah or Enoch may have ascended into the heaven of their thoughts "by faith," (Heb. 11:5), as did the Apostle Paul (II Cor. 12:1-4), when he meditated upon it, but to believe that these men really visited all the laws of gravity and of life itself, is to make Christ lie when He said: "No man hath ascended into heaven save the Son which came down from heaven." See Rev. 20:13, 14, 15. The lake of fire means eternal destruction and eternal death.

(7) Information in the Bible proves that Christ established the laws of the kingdom, but the real existing Kingdom of God is yet a thing of the future. When we meditate upon it in our imagination we can picture some of the beauties and wonders, and the satisfaction experienced from these thoughts make it possible for these words to be true: "The Kingdom of God is within you." Also, as the Kingdom of God is "peace, righteousness and joy," those who experience this state of mind experience the Kingdom of God at different periods. The dead in

Christ arise first and they that are alive at His coming are changed into the likeness of Christ. Then there is a reign of Christ on the earth, and some time after this there is another resurrection, this time not of Christians. The idea that all who have lived on earth will be raised from the dead is not in the Bible, so that the "standing room" will in this case not be so great as is perhaps thought necessary. It may be hard to realize, but one of our living statisticians recently announced the fact that if all the people now living upon the earth were crowded together on an open plain one man, with the aid of a speaking trumpet, could be distinctly heard by all in his addressing them. I have my ideas of what the resurrection is, but will not here state them. I will say, however, that it is not the raising of the body from the grave. I Cor. 15:35, 36, 37.

In the slow evolution of the human mind and soul there have been forces which have, on the whole, sought to check its onward march, but which, forsooth, have brought us nearer to the triumphant light of truth. I thank you again, Mr. Editor, and remain, yours sincerely,

made manifest in the flesh. We can't explain this again, but we have His own testimony; he claimed to be divine. If not, and I say it with all reverence, he is either a liar or a lunatic. Does anyone here believe He is a liar; the greatest scientists admit that He was the finest man that ever lived. The third mystery is that of the atonement; Jesus Christ tasted death for everyone present. That again can't be explained; but if you honestly test it and then find that it doesn't meet your particular case, you must be the greatest curiosity of the world has ever known; Barnum & Bailey never had such a freak. Fourth, the mystery of spiritual life. Christ can only come into your heart by your consciously experiencing it. Fifth, that of the eternal life. The heathens, although they can't explain this, believe it; we hear the Indian talking of his happy hunting ground, and the Hindu of the transmigration of souls. It is beyond us to define what heaven or hell may be, except in figurative language, yet we have an infallible universal consciousness that these states exist. The evangelist then asked all present to acknowledge Christ as their Savior by standing up and nearby the whole congregation responded.

The Central Methodist Church was packed yesterday evening to hear Rev. Messrs Crossley and Hunter. The partition dividing the church from the Sunday school room was raised to afford more accommodation and even then with this additional space the galleries were filled to overflowing, people even standing in the lobby to hear the evangelists. Prayers were specially offered for the two surviving members of the Ferdinand family at the Holy Cross hospital, an account of whose tragic death appears in this issue. Mr. Hunter chose his text from sixth chapter of Daniel. "The reporters often make me say things I don't mean to say. Early mouthed men are no good. I would much rather a man came straight up to me and said, 'Hunter I don't like you,' I would then make him like me." So the princes flattered the king and Daniel was removed from power. A little flattery will kill a woman. Whatdid Daniel do in his trouble; prayed to Almighty God. How many of you men are cowards and afraid to say your prayers, or when you take a meal at one of the hotels are ashamed to bow your head and thank God for your food before starting eating. Some of our greatest statesmen and most successful business men have openly confessed Christ. Washington, Lincoln, McKinley, Roosevelt were all men of God. "Boys cut out the 'gang.'" Some of you would be ashamed to tell your mother what you have been doing, or where you have been going. "If a man asked you to go to a place that leads to Hell, knock him down; you know where I mean without mentioning it more definitely. Mr. Hunter then went on to tell of the conversion of Sir John A. Macdonald, once Canada's greatest statesman. "If I had a message from King Edward for you this evening," said Mr Crossley, "you would all be pleased. Yet I have a message from the King's father to you. I mean the king of kings and the Lord of Lords. If your sisters were like you, you would be ashamed of them. Don't confess to your mother or sister, but cease to do evil. 4th—Parents. Train up your children in the way they should go and when they grow up they shall not depart from it.

Example is better than precept, come to church yourself and your children will do likewise. 5th—Those who are not Christians God's strength made manifest in your weakness will be your strongest point. 6th—Those who are not total abstainers. At first you find wine exhilarating and go round singing, "We Won't go home till morning." You pay your money for the liquor and get the blues for nothing. The skin flat is the only man who can say "I can take a glass and leave it alone when I want to." 7th—The unconverted husband. If you are converted, your wife, if not a Christian, will soon follow you. If you are not converted, you are a hindrance to your wife bringing up your children as Christians and in the fear and love of God. At the conclusion of the service, Messrs. parents were sick. The little tots will not recover. Both are badly frozen, the older one, a little girl, more severely, the little one about the feet and legs. There is very little hope of recovery.

The horrible occurrence took a keen hold upon the Calgary public on Saturday—the distress of the unfortunate woman bravely fighting for her little ones, the pathetic picture of the deserted little ones in their cold and hunger—tears at the heart of anyone.

The sad occurrence was mentioned in most of the city pulpits. Rev. Dean Page last night intimated to his congregation that if the two little ones would recover, he had no doubt but that his congregation would come forward with needed aid.

Edward Ferdinand was employed at the Calgary tannery. An inquest was begun on Saturday afternoon. Coroner Crawford presided and the following jury was installed: Ald. Watson (chairman), W. J. Ferguson, Wendell Maclean, F. S. Freeze, Ald. Moodie, P. P. Craig.

The jury inspected the residence and looked at the bodies at the morgue of Messrs. Graham & Buscombe. Adjournment was then taken until this afternoon that a post mortem might be completed.

Japanese Crowding Into Mexico

Mayathan, Mex., Jan. 19.—Six hundred Japanese arrived here today on the Hokai Maru. The total landed here in six months amounts to 3186, but few remain in the country, as they gradually make their way north and enter the United States. The Mexican government has given them free transportation from Japan in order to get them to work on important industries which have been hampered greatly owing to the lack of labor, but for some reason or other, although the pay is good and conditions of life better than in Japan, they quit at the earliest opportunity and make for the United States. It is calculated that considerably over 2000 of them have entered the latter country during the last twelve months.

ed thieves had possession of. The American vice counsel has no knowledge of it. The store is close to a sunny spot and the officer of the post professes ignorance of the incident.

"I believe the police surveillance of the city is adequate for the protection of private property. I may remind your excellency that not long ago it was discovered that thieves had lodged in and pillaged the residences of some New York millionaires during their absence in the summer, but would not have justified a British admiral landing an armed party and assisting the New York police.

Governor Swettenham arriving at that moment, there was a brief private meeting, and the governor escorted Admiral Davis to his carriage.

Salutations were exchanged, and the governor, replying to Admiral Davis' regret that he was unable to do more for Kingston, said "all the more to your honor," adding a deep bow, evidently in reply to Admiral Davis' reference to his departure, and meaning that he would do the same if in the admiral's place.

Admiral Davis told the associated press that he deeply regretted the governor's attitude. He was still convinced that the governor was unequal to the task of relieving the distress, and that this was evident from the fact that the American field hospital had tended many sick and wounded, and that others were constantly arriving, having been unable to gain admission to the government hospital.

The American hospital was established in Winchester Park, the property of the Jesuits, Thursday under the American flag, and under the charge of the field surgeon, Morton of the battleship Missouri, and aided by sisters of Charity. The hospital received more than fifty sufferers, including persons with fractured bones, skulls, cases of blood poisoning which had resulted from neglected wounds, etc.

ed to the American hospital, saying there was no necessity for it, as all the wounded already had been attended to by the surgeons. Today the local medical men were ready to accept medical supplies but wished them not to interfere with the wounded.

Governor Swettenham's attitude towards a friendly American officers' assistance is greatly deplored by many of the residents of Kingston, some of whom even suggest that he be petitioned to resign. His action is construed by some as inspired by resentment of president Roosevelt's attitude towards Jamaica negroes on the Panama canal.

Others ridicule the governor's objection to the landing of American sailors armed or not armed.

Last night the streets of the burned district still reeked with the stench of decaying bodies. Today many bodies were recovered through the aid of vultures, which perch in flocks on the ruins beneath which their prey is buried. As fast as they are uncovered the bodies are thrown on the funeral pyres and slowly consumed.

The total number of known dead is about 450, and it is believed that there are at least one hundred and fifty persons who have not been accounted for. Food is coming into the city from country districts but a famine is greatly feared.

The conditions of the camps on the parade and race course, where thousands of persons are huddled under improvised tent roofs over and sheathed with palm leaves, causes great apprehension of an outbreak of typhoid fever.
