LIFE ON MANITOULIN.

MR. WIPP IS APPOINTED TO AN IMPORTANT OFFICE.

The settlement of the... and Mr. Wipp is appointed to an important office.

Editorial: I have been elected to the important position of secretary of the building committee of the East Lake Presbyterian church.

We had a meeting in a school-house about three miles from this to consider the advisability of erecting a church, as the school-house is inadequate to accommodate the increasing congregations that assemble every Sunday for divine service, no matter what the weather is.

This is the only popularity of frontier life, the cause of which is my investigation at the meeting.

Mr. Wipp is a man of great energy and is a great help to me in the chair.

The meeting was unanimous in desiring a church, and as five-sixths of those present were Scotch or of Scotch descent, resolutions were passed that the church be a Presbyterian church.

He can't, shipmate. And, shipmate, I reckon the admiral of the port ain't going to ask me what ship I sailed on, provided I got into harbor all right, and my parchment shows that I have done my duty below and aloft as a light seaman should. That's how I look at it, shipmate, and I hope that when the bill goes for divalence on the deck of the Presbyterian flag ship, when the helm pipes all hands for muster by the gun, that you, Mr. Wipp, and all the shipmates here will be ready to lay off. I'm sure the officer of this here vessel (pointing to Mr. Wipp) will be there to make and trim and with gold stripes enough to make a flying jib. However, shipmate, this ain't the sack I intended talking about when I got up here to propose my friend and shipmate P. Wipp as pastor in this here business. Sometimes he comes to me, and sometimes he makes a mistake in his reckoning, as all on us are apt to do, but in other places, on other vessels, I have been on his side since he was a youngster, and I think he is just the man for the berth. Shipmate I believe."

Sam Jenkins seconded my nomination, remarking that "I wrote a pretty fair letter a good shagger, a good digger, and a dandy with a shovel on. My qualifications were deemed sufficient, and I was unanimously elected to the important and respectable position of secretary of the building committee of East Lake Presbyterian church. My companions in glory are J. McDermid, J. P. John, and the general, and the general, the two last being treasurer and chairman respectively. The judge keeps a general store, and the general deals in railroad ties, stove pipes, lamp look backs, and other products of our backwoods. Both are close on forty years of age, and teachers.

I do not know whether it is the same in other new countries, but in Manitoulin we have a great many nicknames, which the bearers seem to be rather proud of, and otherwise, and I notice that in some localities they are purely military, as drummer boy, sergeant, corporal, lieutenant, major and quartermaster. The quartermaster is a young storekeeper who will yet be one of the foremost men in Algoma. He has brains and energy enough for ten men. "Nifty," "Young fellow" (in a sixty) "Howl Right," "Daugh," "Trotty Vack," "Whisperer" (he talks loud enough to be heard half a mile away), "Vumbo" (the smallest man in the settlement), "Schlach," "Moshach" and "Abendog" (three brothers of a Jewish cast of countenance), are the names by which a few of my neighbors are known.

A good story is told of "Nifty" and the "Whisperer," who both were in a lumber camp shortly last winter. Nifty, who is fairly well and wonderfully well, does not like to be reminded of his infirmity, and is besides of a morose, irritable disposition, was one of the foremost men in the settlement, who, from the nature of their employment, cannot always be present at the regular meal hours in the shanty, and have consequently to be waded on by the cook whenever they can get to it. Nifty had an infatuation for the "Whisperer," who especially to the "Whisperer," whose snoring tones seemed to Nifty to be a constant reminder of his deafness. The "Whisperer" was one of the foremost men in the shanty, and Nifty generally came out second best in these encounters, and after a time he ceased to wrangle with his tormentor, and went about his work in dogged silence. It was the "Whisperer" who gave the boys a laugh however, he had only to watch until he could get Nifty's eye, then putting his hand to the side of his mouth without uttering the softest tone he would indicate that something and strange of a person yawning at the top of his voice. This always threw Nifty into a paroxysm of rage, and he would yell back: "What the devil are you yawning at? Do you think I don't hear you? There, do you, eat till you burst." He always wound up by throwing the table a supply of bread and meat, as he took it for granted that the "Whisperer" would not ask him for anything else.

I may state that the outlook for the early completion of our church is good. Pioneers as a rule are not half-hearted men, nor do they. Even old Barbara bridge is now being pulled up by the roots, and the Cremorne gardens (which might well have been preserved with their noble trees as a place of public recreation) have fallen prey to the speculative builder, and are now the "Cremorne estate" in small bits.

**DISSEMINATION IN FRANCE.**  
New Frenchmen and Frenchwomen look upon wine with a different eye. The King and Queen of Sweden have as good as joined the Blue Ribbon army. At least so Mr. Axel Gustafson informs me. I see so much of the evils of Asaomir in Paris that I hardly venture to term the prohibitionist zeal of the temperance societies intemperate or wanting in discretion. The King of Sweden has been brought into Mr. Gustafson's views by a careful examination of the petitions he has received; since he came to the throne, for revivres, commutations and pardons of convicts guilty of heavy offenses. The queen, who has long tried to render the world a little better than she found it, has busied herself, as far as her bad health will allow her, in trying to reduce "the army of vice." She, too, finds that intemperance is a great recruiting agent. Daughters of the Frenchman are almost sure to join the ranks of Blue Ribbons, because they are weak of will, afflicted with bad nerves and ill-reared. Mr. Grey told me some time ago that he once saw a Frenchman drunkness down as an excruciating punishment in the case of a felon whom he was asked to pardon. Mr. Bartholmey St. Hillary, a few weeks back, said to me, "A Frenchman in half a dozen words might be passed by the chambers which would have passed the republic and France. It would be wise to suppress every drinking shop in which alcohol is retained by the glass, no matter what form." Drunkenness is the destruction of the vices by physicians, the manufacturers of brandy out of beet-root and potato, the cause of all the mischief and misery of the cafes and the drugged wine, the race is going to the dogs in the town. That ability which makes the Frenchman a great artist renders him unable to resist the noxious effects of alcohol on the nervous system. When the artist ceases to be a man, he begins with a sip of vermouth or absinthe, which is as noxious as a irritant and a stimulant. Then he drinks half a litre of "manufactured" wine, in which there is not a drop of grape-juice. After his coffee he takes a glass of brandy, and then a glass of brandy, and finally a cognac. The cognac is all that remains in the chariot of brandy. The sugar remains at the bottom. At the bottom of the glass, a dozen different kinds of wines are served; and there is not a drinker or leading deputy or senator who does not drink four or five times a week. Formerly, there used to be a small genuine wine to be drunk with water, and then Bordeaux and Burgundy, which had had time to grow mild in the cellar. "None avens change tout cela." This ordinary is a rough, strong beverage from Lorraine. It is followed by a very fine vintage of the sherry or Madeira type, which is twice offered. This became the Orleans brandy, which has been trying to displace the sherry. It is served with the glass, and afterwards filled with Bordeaux, Burgundy, hook champagne and Lorraine. The champagne is a fifteen cases out of twenty, is heavy Voxyray. California champagne—also very heavy—is making the way at Parisian banquets. Gambetta used to leave no drinker out of his story when he dined on wine. He used to break down when he could find himself to be old Bordeaux, and took very little of it. I have often at observed young ministers and observed that they, too, ran the gamut of all the

seven or eight wine glasses that flanked their plates. They were not apparently anything the worse for it in leaving halls, and nobody would have thought of charging them with intemperance because they drank of all the vintages offered them. But it must have told on mind and health in the long run, and perhaps would account for their laziness in keeping electoral promises. French women are not often guilty of the sin of intemperance. I never saw one drunk or tipsy or in any way the worse for wine, although at grand dinners they do as ample justice to the vintages set before them as any rising statesman. The old French statesman is generally sober. Champaigne is a water drinker, which perhaps is why he has never yet broken faith with his electors. I heard it said that the French sea do not promote temperance. Liqueurs are served at them and at 6 o'clock there is a mild liqueur up by ladies, who attend them at fashionable entertainments, and notably at the cake shop in the Rue d'Elvillol facing the Bodegas. The fair dealers are of slips. I should in justice add, are more often foreign than native. One of the British duchesses, who often follows the swallows, patronizes this cake shop.

**DRESSED BEEF AND LIVE CATTLE.**  
The trunk line roads have now handled the dressed beef and live cattle traffic between Chicago and the seaboard for over a year upon the rates named by Judge Cooley. They find that the three great dressed beef monopolies produced some growth; that the live cattle interest is dwindling out, and that under Judge Cooley's decision it is only a question of time when the huge dressed beef concern will not only control the railroads, but the producers and consumers of beef as well. It is true that many a live cattle shipper from the vast territory west of Chicago doing business here at the yards has already felt the grip of the dressed beef monopoly. As an evidence that the seaboard railroads have been discriminating in favor of the dressed beef trade as against the live cattle shippers, it is only necessary to point to Mr. G. F. Swift as one who has been lifted into wealth and power through the generosity of these same roads. He now slaughters nearly one-third of the entire receipts of cattle in Chicago. It is not to be wondered at, then, that the live cattle shippers are unable to receive from the trunk line railroads an equitable rate on live cattle as compared with dressed beef, this vast live cattle trade in which the consumers and producers of beef are alike interested, will fall entirely to the hands of the dressed beef monopoly. If you kill the live cattle trade at the Chicago yards, live will be the country product of cattle fare at the hands of the producer who he desires to sell his cattle. Of course, others may go into the dressed beef business here in Chicago, but no man could compete with the present rulers of the trade unless he was backed by millions. They would understand him at any point he might select as a market.
