#### Lambton County Apples at Ontario Agricultural Exhibition

The exhibition which closed Saturday, Nov. 18th, was the most successful in point of exhibits ever held in the history of the Association. The most remarkable feature were the exhibits from various counties, there being twelve counties represented. Of these county exhibits represented. Of these county exhibits the most striking undoubtedly was the exhibit from Lambton County. It is acknowledged by all authorities to be the best commercial box display of apples ever seen in the city of Toronto. The following comment from the Mail and Empire gives an idea of the arrangement: "Lambton County has probably the most striking exhibit of the whole show. On a slanting stage thirty feet high, which accommodates sixteen boxes on end from top to bottom, and twenty-two boxes wide—three hundred and fifty boxes in all—a huge map of the county is constructed with red apples and the words "Lambton County" stand out in green apples. A corner of Lake Huron is shown in green apples, and the counties that bound Lambton are indicated by accommodates sixteen boxes on end from apples wrapped in white paper. The work is exceedingly well done, and the fruit ranks with the best in the building,

Porter, assistant to the District Representative, and is again on exhibition to the thousands of citizens of the city of Toronto. Thus the county is getting a double advertisement from the exhibit. 

McCormick's Speech. IN THE LEGISLATURE ON THE BUDGET DEBATE.

The speech made by R. J. McCormick, the member for East Lambton, on the budget debate in the Legislature, on Feb. 9th, 1911, was reported in The Globe as follows:—

When Mr. McCormick got to his feet to continue the debate the little member from Lambton had to wait—as he always does—until the members tired of pounding their desks. Then he went right for Grigg, the member from Algoma, who preceded him.

preceded him,
"He did remarkably well," remarked
Mr. McCormick, "If you let him have
his own way. He showed that this
crowd of ours amounted to nothing at all, crowd of ours amounted to nothing at all, that the Government before was no good whatever—but," and here Robert John squared his shoulders, "that stirs up a little Irish in me. I say, that if it had not been for the late Government's work on the boundry he would have been out of the Province altogether, and I don't know if it would have mattered very much," he added, while the members roared with laughter at the sally.

Mr. McCormick took a rap at the Provincial Treasurer for running up his ex-

Mr. McCormick took a rap at the Provincial Treasurer for running up his expenditures. The Provincial Treasurer used to criticise expenditures amounting to \$4,000,000, but now he thinks nothing of asking for \$10,000,000.

He paid a compliment to Hon. A. G. MacKay for the amount of work he did. "It puts me in mind of a County Conncil I used to be in," he remarked, "Another man did all the work and I had a little fun running around. That's the way it is now."

way it is now."

The veteran Liberal then turned his attention to his favorite subject, the model schools. "They say," he said, smiling, "Oh it's time for McCormick to drop it." I can't drop it, I feel that it is too important a matter for the whole province for me to drop it. The poor province for me to drop it. The poor people can't get their young ones edu-cated as they used to do. They are leav-ing the farms and going to the cities or

"As fair-minded men," he continued addressing the front benchers, "I want you to do something. Call it something else, but give us something similar to the model schools, so that the poor classes of people will get educated."

Mr. McCormick declared that many teachers were without contification and

teachers were without certificates, and gave a number of instances in his dis-trict where the teachers had come right trict where the teachers had come right from the high school. He warned the Minister of Education that if something was not done the house would look difterent after the next election.

"If you don't," he declared, "that first aisle won't divide the Grits and the Tories. We'll run right to the other end of the House. And remember that," he wound up, waying his hand at Hon. Dr. Pyne

up, waving his hand at Hon. Dr. Pyne.
Mr. McCormick sent the House into hysterics by the way he handled J. Wesley Johnson's suggestion that the department bring out teachers from the Old

ment bring out teachers from the Old Country.

"I tell you it won't do," he shouted.

"You'll bring out Irish and Scotch and English and French, and they'll all want to use their own language. The Irish will want their own. The Scotch will want Gaelic and the French will want French. That"—and the little member became eloquent—"will never do in an English talking country like we have. We want only one language in our public schools." This was the signal for a general laugh at G. H. Ferguson, the author of the bilingual resolution.

Colonel Meredith was one of the old-er Federal officers of the civil war. It was some ten years after its close that the colonel, then an old man, concluded to go south and take up his residence there. His reason for doing so was that, being in poor health, he thought the climate would agree better with him than that of the north.

The colonel took up his abode in a beautiful town in one of the cotton states. That period was too soon after the war to admit of his being received with especial friendliness by all the people of the place. Some welcomed him, some ignored him, and some-principally women-treated him rancorou ly. One group were disposed to admit the colonel to citizenship on equal terms. These were the Confederate veterans who had fought for the lost cause and dropped it forever at Appomatox.

north. He began a covert but annoying fire upon the object of his displeasure, such as that officer had during his term of army service often been subjected to, though the missiles used had been lead instead of type metal These articles were so worded that though no direct reference was made in them to Colonel Meredith every one

knew that they referred to him.
One branch of the Meredith family had lived in the south, the colo nel's sister having married John Turn lee, a Louisianian. Her husband had fought for the southern side and bad Richmond. After the war was concluded the president of the United States had appointed the Confederate soldier's son, Edward Turnice, to a cadetship at the United States Nava academy. While Colonel Meredith was beginning to suffer the annoying articles in the Banner young Turnlee was completing an education to fit him for an officer in the service of

Colonel Meredith, who had fought both in open fields and behind breast works, was not to be dislodged by in nuendoes. He paid no attention to the petty shots in the Banner. Indeed, he was so advised by a few of the citizens with whom he was on good terms They remonstrated with the editor, but the people were not yet united on the treatment that should be given a northern man, and Morrill found those to egg him on in his attacks upon the

Finally an article appeared casting reflection on Colonel Meredith's good name. The object of the attacks had thus far listened to the suggestions o his friends as to what course to take with regard to them, but now he decided to take the matter into his own hands. He wrote a polite note to the editor requesting him to prove his al-

The colonel was by this time more than seventy years old. His eyesight was defective and his heart had not been improved by his sojourn south. Besides, he was suffering from the effect of wounds received in the late war. He was not a proper person to be pitted against a young man in any form of encounter. Morrill resolved to continue to harass his antagonist. If the colonel insisted on satisfaction he could decline to give it on the ground that his challenger was not a proper adversary for one in the prime of life. Since he could not prove his charge he replied to the colonel's note that the colonel was not warranted in presuming the article referred to him. Several notes passed between the two, in the last of which the colonel said that if they were in northern territory he would sue the Banner for defamation of character Such a course at the time in the south would be impracticable. prig and a fool he would have seen that his adversary, though living among a people still smarting under the effects of a war in which he had opposed them, was sure in the end to get the advantage. Instead of having such discernment his consummate egotism led him further in his idiotic course. He conceived the idea of getting rid of the colonel by ridicule. He would accept his challenge and turn the affair into a mockery.

He succeeded in convincing some of his friends that this was the best and only way out of the matter both for Colonel Meredith and the town. He persuaded one of his friends to offer his services to his enemy on the ground that he felt that the colonel was right in demanding satisfaction and should have fair play. The colonel accepted the offer, and in this way the editor controlled both seconds so far as making the affair a sham was concerned, though the colonel's second had been assured that the plan was merely to satisfy the colonel without resorting to bloodshed.

The intention being to make the affair an imitation duel, it was not hurried, as such matters usually are. Indeed, some of the Confederate veterans, hearing that a duel between the ex-Federal officer and the editor was about to take place, went to Morrill and protested. Morrill told them that no harm was to be done the colonel and the proposed fight with blank cartridges was the best and only way to settle the matter. The veterans withdrew and held a consultation. Finally one of their number, who had become more friendly with Colonel Meredith than the others and knew more about him and his affairs, said:

"Leave the matter to me." This was done, and as a body the veterans took no further action.

On the morning the duel was to come off Morrill was in fine feather. No one except the two seconds and one or two of his intimate friends knew that the affair was to be a sham. The editor intended after it was over to put himself right in the matter of fighting an old man by pub-

meeting, announcing that there had really been no fight at all. He had written the article, into which he had thrown all his ability as a comic writer, and had it locked in his desk

At 8 o'clock in the morning he arose, dressed himself, bid a mock heroic adieu to his aunts, to whom he told his secret, and in due time a carriage drove up with his second, and the two men went to the place ap-pointed for the meeting.
