


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

Highly ornamental vases are attractive in themselves, but as flower holders they may be said to be partial fail-ures, as they do not serve their purpose to the fullest extent. They at-tract attention to themselves rather than set off the blooms for which they are designed.

A vase of plain material or color, or one on which the design is obscure, is more to be desired, as it presents the flowers in their full beauty, and does not distract one's attention. In the same way a vale of luster ware, of a shade that blends with the flowers it holds, is far more attractive than one of contrasting color. Vases that are to be used for all

kinds of flowers might better be green, of a dull shade, as this resembles the plant coloring and is not noticeable.



***** Food Being the Human Fuel,

F recent years there has been a fasting fad. Some people have asserted that bodily health was promoted by going without food for considerable lengths of time.

It cannot be said that the medical faculty has ever indorsed this remarkable notion. The view held by physiologists generally is that such performances are dead against nature and impose a dangerous strain upon the human system.

Fasting Proves Injurious,

Per contra, Dr. Tanner, most famous of all fasters, died only the other day in San Diego, Cal., at the fairly ripe age of ninety-one: He had a theory that health and long life could be improved and lengthened by extended periods of food-deprivation. The most famous of his fasts ex-tended more than forty days. He was tended more than forty days. He was carefully watched during the per-formance to make sure that he ate nothing. Barring the sucking of cas-ual oranges, it fould not be dis-covered that in that period he touch-ed anything that could be called food. More recently there have been scientific studies made of this prob-lem. Dogs and other animals have been the subjects of most of them. But the Carnegie Institute, not long ago, employed for the purpose an ago, employed for the purpose an Italian named Succi, who was a pro-fessional faster. He did it for a liv-

ressional raster. He did it for a liv-ing, the pay being high. Succi's best record was thirty days of a fast, at the end of which there set in certain "ante-mortem" symp-toms which persuaded the scientists in charge to quit the experiment. Manifestly he was a weakling; for a Paris faster named Morietti hort the Paris faster named Merlatti kept the thing up for fifty days. How long would it take you to

starve to death if unsupplied with any food? The answer, so far as ex-perimental observations would indicate, is that it depends mainly upon

how fat you are. If you are a skinny person, you would not last long. You see, the human body is an en-gine and food is is fuel. When the food supply is cut off the engine must for fuel draw upon the tissues of the body and burn them. body and burn them.

The fat stored in the body is under such circumstances the fuel most available. Therefore, as one observes, a starved person becomes rapidly thinner, losing weight. Suppose the starvation is to con-tinue. Then, when the fat has been

1

used up, the muscular and other tis-sues are drawn upon for fuel to fur-nish the energy required to support the mechanism of the body and keep it in operation. But this is vasily page expensive physiclogically more expensive, physiologically speaking, because it takes about welve pounds of muscular or glandular tissue to make an equivalent (as fuel) for one pound of fat. Experiments have shown that in a

Experiments have shown that in a twenty-six day fast the muscles lose 42 per cent. of their weight, the skin 28 per cent, the brain and spinal cord 22 per cent, the blood 48 per cent, the liver 50 per cent, the kid-neys 55 per cent, the stomach and intestines 30 per cent, the lungs 29 per cent, the kidneys 55 per cent. and the heart 16 per cent. The human body in starvation pro-cures its supply of energy by the de-

cures its supply of energy by the decures its supply of energy by the de-struction of its stored fat and "pro-tein"—the stuff that, when eaten in food, makes muscle and blood. If the deprivation be kept up long enough, it succumbs. Death ensues. What is the immediate cause of death in such cases? This is a point that has not been fully settled that has not been fully settled.

Who the Esthonians Are.

Esthonians, or Esths, are reported to have repulsed attacks from the Bolsheviki. The Esths are a Finno-Ugrian people, once savage and adventurous, terrifying the Baltic with their piracy, constantly attacking and attacked by the Danes and Swedes. Their final subjection by the Brothers of the Sword and their en-forced acceptance of Christianity crushed their spirit and rendered them serfs to the German masters.

them serfs to the German masters. The Esths outnumber the Germans in the old province of Esthonia 29 to 1; yet nine-tenths of all the land is held by Germans. In the former Province of Livonia the Esths com stitute nearly half the population, while the Germans are less than one-fifteenth. There the Fand is divided into estates, averaging over 10,000 acres in extent, none owned by an Esth or Lett, but almost invariably by a German. The Russian Govern-ment at times endeavored by agra-rian laws to alleviate the condition of the peasant. Such efforts failed the peasant. Such efforts failed against the stolid resistance of the

against the stolid resistance of the great proprietors. The Esths have clung devotedly to their national language, the sole in-heritance from their past. They love poetry and song. Their physical char-acteristics are Finnic; their faces short, broad, beardless; their fore-heads low, mouths small, arms long, legs short. Despite their extreme poverty education is relatively adpoverty, education is relatively ad-vanced. All but 4 per cent. are Luth-

eran Profestants. Since the sudden universal awak-ening in 1918 the Esths, or the land owners, have been insistent upon national recognition. But ownership in the land is their greatest need.



We certainly need better fire protection and if we had it our insurance rates would be much less than we pay now, as well as being a benefit otherwise and, futher-inore, if we have water works here it would be an inducement for manufactur-ing establishments to locate here. RAISE PIGS PROFITABLY Mustard Can Be Controlled by

Spraying.

Spray Should Be Applied on Calm, Clear Day as Soon as First Few Mustard Plants Show Flowers.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

NIMALS, no matter what kind, always put on weight the most cheaply when they are young and the younger they are the cheaper the gains. As a consequence of this it is essential that the man raising young stock realize this and give a reasonable amount of attention to the young animals he is expecting. A few days before farrowing the sow should be brought into the pen so that she may become accustomed to her surroundings. A close watch should be kept on her during these days in order to ward off constipation, which is the bug-bear of a great many swine breeders. Once this condition occurs very little can be done, so it is a matter of prevention rather than cure. When the animal is taken into the new quarter her feed should be sloppy and of a laxative nature, a liberal supply of roots and a small amount of linseed ofl meal helping to bring about this condition. The meal ration for a brood sow may consist of equal parts ground oats and wheat middlings.

At the time of farrowing the sow should be left alone but the atten-dant should be keeping a watch on her to see that no trouble arises. After farrowing the sow should not be disturbed for ten to twelve hours and her first feed should be little more than a drink of water with a little middlings in it. After this the ration may be increased to full feed, taking eight to ten days to do so. When the young pies are weened the When the young pigs are weaned the ration should be cut down to stop the secretion of milk and, if it is necessary, turn the sow in with the young pigs once a day for a few days. If, when the pigs are born, they are good and strong and vigorous they should be left alone for a while and as soon as the right time ar-rives they should be placed to the teat to suck as soon as possible. If

teat to suck as soon as possible. If the pigs are vigorous and healthy, nothing special need be done for them until they are two or three weeks old, by which time they should have learned to eat a little bit by picking around their mother's trough. At this time, if it is con-venient, a small trough, away from the large trough, should be provid-ed and the youngsters should be giv-en skim milk with a little middlings stirred into it. As the pigs grow older more middlings may be stirred into the milk.

into the milk. Outdoor exercise is very important for young pigs and every means should be used to induce the young pigs to take it, but precautions must be taken to protect the youngsters from cold winds and the hot sun. If the sow is turned out with the pigs she should not be given too much range at first unless the little fellows become unduly tired as a result of travelling too far. Boar pigs not intended for breed-ing purposes should be castrated before weaning to get the best results, though there is not much danger in castrating at a latter date provided care is observed in connection with care is observed in connection with the operation. Clean hands and in-struments and disinfectant on the wound will overcome all danger of infection.—J. McBeath, B.S.A., O. A. College, Guelph.



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

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Spraying With Iron Sulphate to Prevent Mustard From Seeding

Iron sulphate or copperas can be

Iron sulphate or copperas can be successfully used to prevent Mustard from seeding in standing grain with-out injury to the crop. Preparation of Solution.—A 20 per cent. solution should be applied. This can be prepared by dissolving 80 lbs. of iron sulphat in 40 gallons of water. Iron sulphate is dissolved guito readily in cold water. The soluquite readily in cold water. The soluquite readily in cold water. The solu-tion should be strained through a cheese cloth, as it is put into the spray pump tank. This will remove dirt and small particles that are apt to clog the nozzles. Time to Apply.—Apply on a calm, clear day just as soon as the first few plants in the fields show flowers. It is very important to spray early. If the plants are left too long the treatment is not nearly so effective.



How to Apply the Solution.—An ordinary hand-pump barrel sprayer, such as is employed to spray fruit trees may be used, or a potato spray-er can be rigged up to do the work. These are excellent for large area:, as they cover a wide strip at each round. Care must be taken to see that every mustard plant is covered with the solution in the form of a fine spray. 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

Among the items of the budget pre-sented to Parliament on Thursday last is greatly increased Income Tax, In future the tax will be as follows: For unmarried persons and for widows and widowers without children the exemption is now fixed at \$1,000. From that amount up to \$0,000 the incomes of such people are to be taxed at 4 per cent. For other people the exemption is \$2,000, and from that the exemption is \$2,000, and from that up to \$6,000 the rate is 4 per cent. On all incomes exceeding \$6,000 it is 8 per cent. with a surtax beginning at \$5,000, and advancing from \$6,000 to \$100,000 for every \$2,000. Upon incomes in excess of \$100,000 higher rates than those now holding are levied. The business profits tax applies to enterprises carried on on a tax applies to enterprises carried on on a capital \$25,000 and up to \$50,000, and takes one-tourth of all the profits exceed-ing 10 per cent, on the capital. Incor-porated companies with a capital of \$50,-000 and over have an exemption of pro-fits amounting to 7 per cent. and other than incorporated companies of like range of capital have an exemption of 10 per cent.[®] On profits in excess of the ex-emption, but not greater than 15 per cent. on the capital, such business must turn over one-fourth to the Government; when the profits range from 15 per cent. to 20 per cent. on the capital, the Gov-ernment gets one-half; of profits in ex-cess of 20 per cent. the Government's toll
