Synco, Aged 40, A Native Of Poland, Sentenced To Serve Two Year Term For Assault --- Crazed Man Strikes Down Fellow Prisoners With Crowbar, Then Launches Attack On Guard.

DORCHESTER, N. B., March 15.—Shot in the leg after he had struck down three fellow prisoners with a crowbar and was running in a mad frenzy towards the guard in charge of the gang George Synco, 40 year old inmate of Dorchester penitentiary died in the prison hospital yesterday of what was officially termed 'shock.'

Details of the prisoner's death were not available to the public until after the inquest begun in the peniten-tiary this morning, had finished in the court house this

afternoon.

In their verdict, the jury exonerated N. P. Ward, the keeper, who felled Synco with a revolver bullet in the leg. He used no more force than was absolutely necessary to give the necessary protection to himself and the other prisoners in his charge, the verdict said,

We experted the keeper of all blame and from any intent to kill." One of the three men felled by the crowbar in Synco's hands is still in the prison hospital, receiving treatment for head injuries. The other two men were injured only slightly about the head and shoulders and soon recovered. The keeper was not

harmed. Synco, who was born in Poland, and never naturalized, as a resident of Canada, had worked as a laborer at Sydney, N. S., until he was sentenced last December at Sydney to two years in the penitentiary here on a charge of assault, causing grievous bodily harm. He has no relatives, so far as is known. He will be buried in the prison cemetery here. It was said at the inquest that previously he had been a

He had a police record, having been arrsted on several occasions charged with drunkenness and, about two years ago had to appear in court to answer to a charge of assault laid against him by a fellow compatriot in the Pfer district.



The name given the bridge by Londoners has a little flavor of history, and it is thus recorded in the Sunday edition of The Observer:

"The sword of Damocles has fallen, and we are to have a new Waterloo bridge which will at once realize Mr. Morrison's ideas of the beautiful and the useful. Presumably, it will still be called Waterloo. The village gave its name to the bridge, and the bridge to the station and the road, so that it would be unfair now to break the chain of associations. Whatever the official decision, the name would stick, from pure force of habit.

"It was, indeed, the voice of the people that gave the existing bridge its name. It is well known that the original intention was to call it the Regent bridge, but even before it was completed, it was popularly known as the Strand bridge, Shelley, writing to Thomas Love Peacock, in 1818, spoke of a Roman structure at Rimini as 'not unlike the Strand bridge.' After the battle of 1815 the demand was overwhelming that the bridge (opened two years later) should take the name of Waterloo."
