R E P O R T .

To the Representatives in Grand Division assembled:

BROTHERS—Since the last assembling of this body, it has pleased the Great Patriarch above to bless our exertions and labours with a large amount of success. I have assurance through the reports of my deputies, that throughout the whole limits of our work, with very few exceptions, the order is advancing with vigor and energy.

My own observations, supported by advices from all sections of the Province, sustain the conviction that, without as well as within the pale of our order, the principles of legal prohibition have been rapidly gaining ground, so much so, that, with the exception of those immediately interested in the traffic, there are few men of intelligence and substance who are now prepared to array themselves against us, in this great struggle in which we are now engaged; nearly all men being prepared to admit that the principle of legal prohibition being carried out, must alleviate much suffering, and tend largely to ameliorate the condition of mankind. Nevertheless, there are those of our fellow creatures who are so wedded to the fashions and long established usages of what are usually termed the better classes of society, that they remain deaf to the cry which misery, nakedness and famine are still sending forth from the drunkards abode.

There are in the Legislature, as at present constituted, a large number who have really given to the principle of legal prohibition its proper place. I must, however, regret that where there are so many professed admirers, there are so few who are willing to give effect to their principles at the expense of party ties and party predilections. The soundest lessons of wisdom are drawn from experience. It were well, perhaps, if we should draw from our recent experience the lesson, that the best, if not the only safe guarantee for the integrity of our parliamentary representatives, is to be found in their antecedents.

That it is desirable to apply this rule, whenever practicable, there can be little doubt; the safety of the application will depend entirely on our strength. My own impression is that we are sufficiently strong to apply a severer test to those who hereafter seek our suffrages than a simple declaration that they are generally favorable to the enactment of the measure desired.

I am induced to offer these suggestions at this time, by the consideration of the fact that there is now before parliament a bill which will probably become law during the present session, to add to the Legislative Council forty-eight members by election, twenty-four for each section of the province.—These members will be elected for two, four and six years, it behooves us, therefore, to exercise great caution in their selection.

You are aware that shortly after the annual session, I caused circulars to be addressed to the several Subordinate Divisions, recommending organizations for the purpose of agitating the country on the subject of a Prohibitory Law. In many sections I am advised that much good has resulted from this agitation.

During the early part of the winter an individual was sent to the State of Maine to collect evidence against the successful working of the Maine Law in that and other States where the law had been enacted. The result of his labors were published.

In order to counteract the effect of such a publication, and for the purpose of diffusing reliable information on that subject, I commissioned the Rev. Hannibal Mulkins to proceed to those of the New England States that had enacted the law. The report of this gentleman has been laid before the Temperance Committee of the Legislative Assembly, and I do not doubt will have great weight; but the chief object of such a report is to inform the public mind out of Parliament.

This report will be laid before you, and you will be able to judge with what integrity, zeal and ability, the Rev. Brother has acquitted himself of the task imposed upon him.

Simultaneously with my sending the Commissioner of this body, the "Prohibitory Liquor Law League" dispatched their President and Secretary on a like service, and I doubt not their report will be a valuable document, well calculated to enlighten the public mind on this great question.

I recommend a careful examination of these reports with a view to their publication for gratuitous distribution, should they be found worthy of that distinction.

Shortly after re-assembling of Parliament, after the recess, in obedience to the desire of this Grand Division, I proceeded to Quebec to watch the progress of the law. In this duty I had the very efficient assistance of our esteemed and highly respected Brother Farewell, P. G. W. A. We had several interviews with the Temperance Committee, and with Mr. Felton, who had charge of the Bill. We consented to several amendments of the Bill suggested by some who were opposed to the measure, in order to render it less obnoxious to them; taking care, however, that the efficiency of the law should not be thereby affected.

On a careful canvass of the members, we ascertained that there were in the house a majority of upwards of thirty members pledged to support the law. I regret, however, to have found several of the professed friends of the law, were friends through fear of their constituencies. And it is quite unne-

ecessary for me to inform you that but little assistance can be expected from such friends. After spending some time in Quebec and meeting with innumerable disappointments and interminable delays, and when I believed my remaining there longer useless, I was very glad to be able to return to Upper Canada.

Had we been disposed to consent to the measure being withdrawn for the present Session, it was intimated to me that the Government would adopt a suggestion which I had made to them early last fall, to appoint a commission to proceed through those of the neighbouring States which had enacted the law, and enquire carefully into the working of the law, and the effect it had had upon the country and society, where it had been fairly tested.

In offering this suggestion to the Government, one object I had in view was to produce reliable information for the use of the public, which should carry with it the extrinsic weight of having been collected and compiled by authority; but my chief object was to commit the Ministry to some line of policy in relation to the law. I thought that a determined official opposition to the law would be more desirable than their present anomalous position in relation to it. Indeed I was persuaded that should the Government come out boldly and oppose the law, they must be ousted out of office, and I was persuaded that once committed to some decided course, they must have chosen to adopt the measure as a ministerial one.

In the event of a defeat which I anticipate during the present Session, I am in hopes the Government will still adopt this suggestion, but I did not feel myself justified in consenting to the withdrawal of the measure, although at the time I felt very grave doubts as to the course most desirable to pursue.

I have received communications from Mr. Linton, of Stratford, and Mr. Becket, of "The Temperance Advocate," on the subject of gratuitous distribution of the "Advocate" and "Prohibitionist." I am impressed with the advantages which would doubtless result from the gratuitous distribution of publications of a character so reliable and respectable, but I did not feel myself justified in incurring so heavy a responsibility without the express sanction and direction of the Grand Division.

I beg to call the attention of the Grand Division to the necessity which seems to me to exist for a more perfect Constitution for Degree Divisions.—Some complaints have been made as to confining the degrees to Sons of Temperance of a certain age. I can see no necessity for being more stringent than the Constitution of the National Division requires, and I recommend that the Constitution be so amended that "Sons" of the age of eighteen years shall be eligible to receive degrees.

I beg to call the attention of the Grand Division to the necessity of a continued and energetic system of agitation.

Although the movement has passed that stage where the public point their finger at our efforts, there are large masses who are yet unmoved. Attempted legislation has no doubt done much to lead the public mind to reflect upon the movement, and the great blessings to result from the success of our efforts.—Still much requires to be done; new efforts must be put forth, the dull and careless members of society must be reached, and their minds aroused to a sense of the miseries which surround them. There never was a time in our history when active and energetic exertions were more necessary than they are at present.

A successful issue to our labors and exertions can only be achieved by a firm, determined and united course of action. All minor differences must be forgotten, and our whole strength concentrated on the attainment of this one great end. By this course our neighbours have succeeded, and by a similar course must we deserve success.

For the financial affairs of the order, I beg to refer you to the report of the Grand Treasurer, and for the statistical particulars of the state of the order, to the Report of the Grand Scribe.

I will avail myself of this occasion to acknowledge the obligations under which the Grand Scribe has placed me and the whole order, by the activity, zeal and efficiency with which he has discharged the onerous duties of his office.

R E P O R T .

OFFICE OF GRAND DIVISION, C. W., }
KINGSTON, 17TH MAY, 1855. }

To the Officers and Representatives Grand Division, S. of T., C. W.

In compliance with the Constitution, I herewith present the following report of the important affairs of this office during the term, and I have great satisfaction in being able to state that the order within this jurisdiction is in a sound and efficient condition.

The subject of Prohibitory Liquor Law has engrossed much of the attention of the order, and petitions have been forwarded to the Legislature from many Subordinate Divisions, praying for the immediate passage of such a law for the Province, but I regret to observe that several Divisions have been inattentive to this important duty.

From the schedule of petitions to Parliament, for session ending December, 1854, I find that only 82 Subordinate Divisions had at that time availed themselves of this great privilege, and from said schedule we learn that upwards of 160,000 persons, through their representatives and individually, had petitioned that a Prohibitory Liquor Law should be enacted, and probably during the present session as many more petitioners have prayed for the passing of that righteous law.

The Grand Division will feel disappointed at the rejection of the Prohibitory Liquor Law by the House of Assembly. The trick by which we were defeated has but few defenders, even their *ardent* admirers who were glad to avail themselves of its merits, are heartily ashamed of the forlorn scheme resorted to, to throw the bill over on an obsolete point of order, and that portion of community more intimately identified with the order in promoting the temperance reform, view the manner in which the measure was defeated as a gross insult to their religious and moral feelings.

But we are neither ruined nor dismayed, and with renewed zeal and iron determination are prepared to renew and continue the agitation upon the subject, until our great object is accomplished. Some thorough system of active agitation must at this session be devised, and I feel rejoiced to learn that several valued Brothers have already proffered their assistance, and are again willing to take the field for a month or more, to arouse that section of the Province in which they reside, and where they are known and appreciated.

Shortly after the annual session it was deemed indispensably necessary that immediate action should be taken to enlighten the public mind with reference to the working of Prohibitory Laws, and the evils accruing from the

liquor traffic, and to dispel the illusive narratives of a certain class of men behind their day, our worthy G. W. P. therefore appointed the Rev. H. Mulkins to visit the Maine Law States to collect information and statistics bearing upon Prohibitory Law and the liquor traffic, and I feel satisfied that the G. D. will appreciate the indefatigable labours of your Commissioner, and the valuable information procured during a tour of three weeks.

The G. W. P. will further inform you respecting this mission, and the contemplated publication of the Rev. H. Mulkins' report.

I have much pleasure in submitting the Rev. Commissioner's Report.

Although so many Divisions have become defunct, yet the state of the order and its efficiency is by no means unsatisfactory, especially after the sifting and weeding process which the order has endured the past year, consequent upon the alteration in per centage to a capitation tax. The vigour of the Divisions may be inferred from the promptness displayed in making their Quarterly Returns. Thus at Bytown Session, 1854, 186 Divisions had reported, and previous to this Session no less than 223 Divisions had duly rendered a Report for March Quarter, which compared with the corresponding period of May, 1852, we find that the Grand Scribe reported only 100 Divisions that had duly reported out of 385 Subordinate Divisions, shewing for this session an excess of 123 prompt and efficient Divisions, which have attended to this particular duty.

Your Committee to whom was referred the Report of the G. W. P., beg leave to report.

Your Committee would express their pleasure and satisfaction at the encouraging character—as it respects our order—of the report, and they would join their grateful acknowledgements with the G. W. P. to the great giver of all good, for the success which attended the labors of the order during the past six months.

Your Committee deeply regret the failure of their expectations in the action of the Legislature, and would earnestly urge the necessity of united and determined measures to prevent any future betrayal on the part of our government of the trust so frankly and confidently reposed them.

Your Committee would recommend that the members of the order be instructed to be true to this great cause of humanity, should they be called upon to exercise their rights as British freemen in the election of the proposed members of the Legislative Council.

Your Committee believe that the interests, not only of the order, but also of our common country, required that the G. W. P. should adopt some course to neutralize the false and injurious influence made upon the public mind by the report of the commissioner appointed by the proprietor of the "Toronto Leader," to visit the States where a Prohibitory Law was in operation, and we further believe that he was fortunate in securing the services of one so well qualified for so arduous and important a duty, as the Rev. Bro. Hannibal Mulkins, to visit the Eastern States and present to our country the whole truth of the matter.

Your Committee have, as far as time would permit, examined the full and well arranged report of the result of said visit, presented to this Grand Division by that Brother, and pronounce it a most valuable document, one that will meet the now pressing want of the country, being full of valuable statistics respecting every feature of the traffic, both in the States visited and in our own land.

Your Committee would recommend that the report be published, if the funds of the Grand Division will permit, and if not, that an abstract of its valuable statistical contents be published and circulated gratuitously broad-cast throughout the land.

Your Committee believe that it would materially aid the noble cause in which we are engaged, could a large number of the "Prohibitionist," of Albany, and "Temperance Advocate," of Montreal, be circulated both among the members of our Divisions and those who are as yet opposed to the work so ably advocated by both of these periodicals, and would recommend that the Subordinate Divisions be requested to subscribe largely for those papers.

D. deems it expedient to declare the use of cider as a beverage whether *fermented* or *unfermented*, a violation of the pledge." Your Committee therefore are decidedly of opinion that the appeal should be sustained.

In reference to the appeal of H. Wade, of Brantford Division No. 99, Your Committee report as follows: that according to the following resolution adopted by the Grand Division, "A brother withdrawing his Card, can neither demand re-admission as a member to his former Division, nor to any other Division unless consent is given by a vote of the Division, in strict accordance with Article 5, Sect. 3, of the Constitution of Subordinates, and Section 23rd of Article 5, of the By-laws of the G. D., and that therefore the said appeal cannot be sustained, neither is it in order for the G. D. to re-instate the Brother, as requested in his communication.

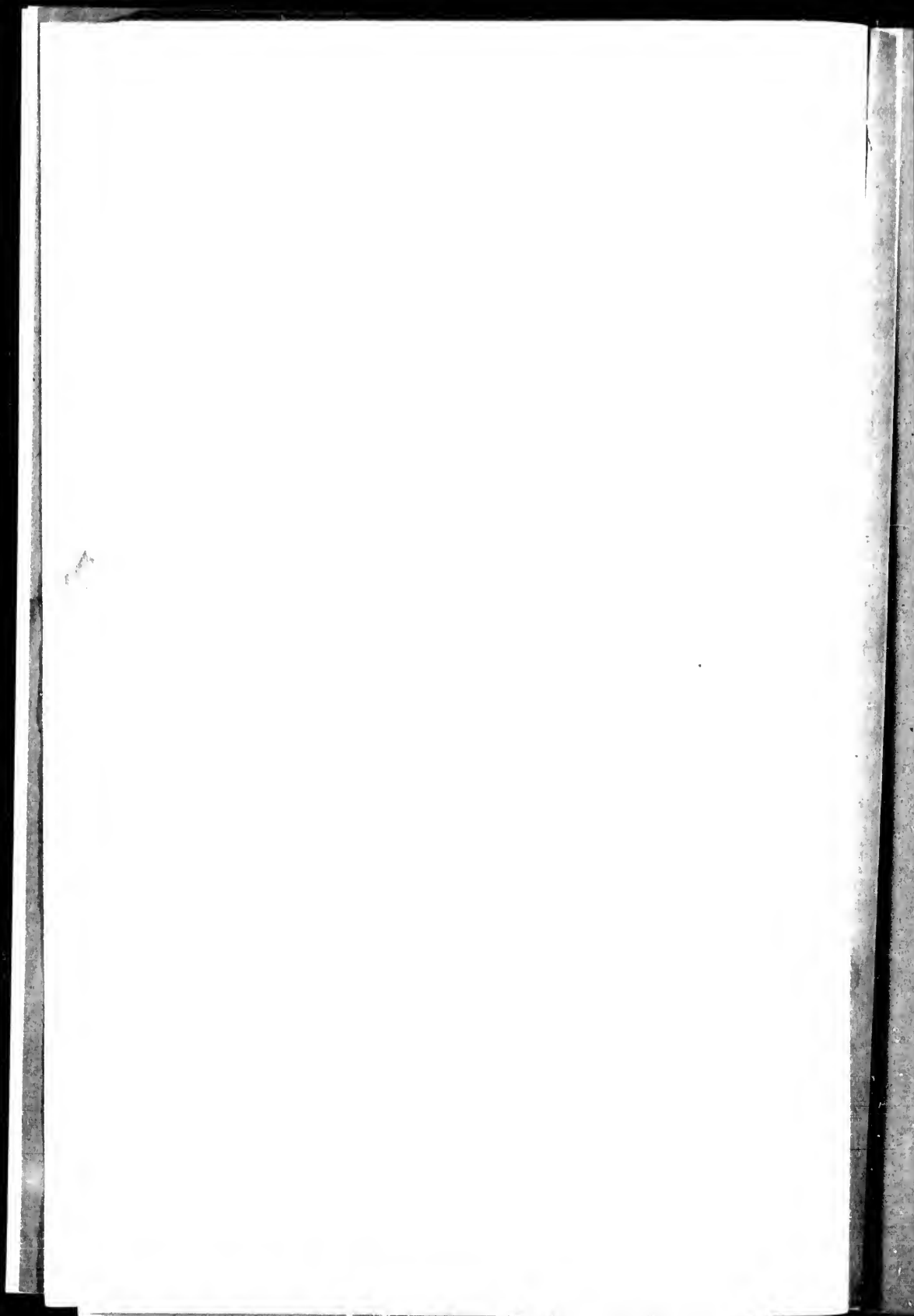

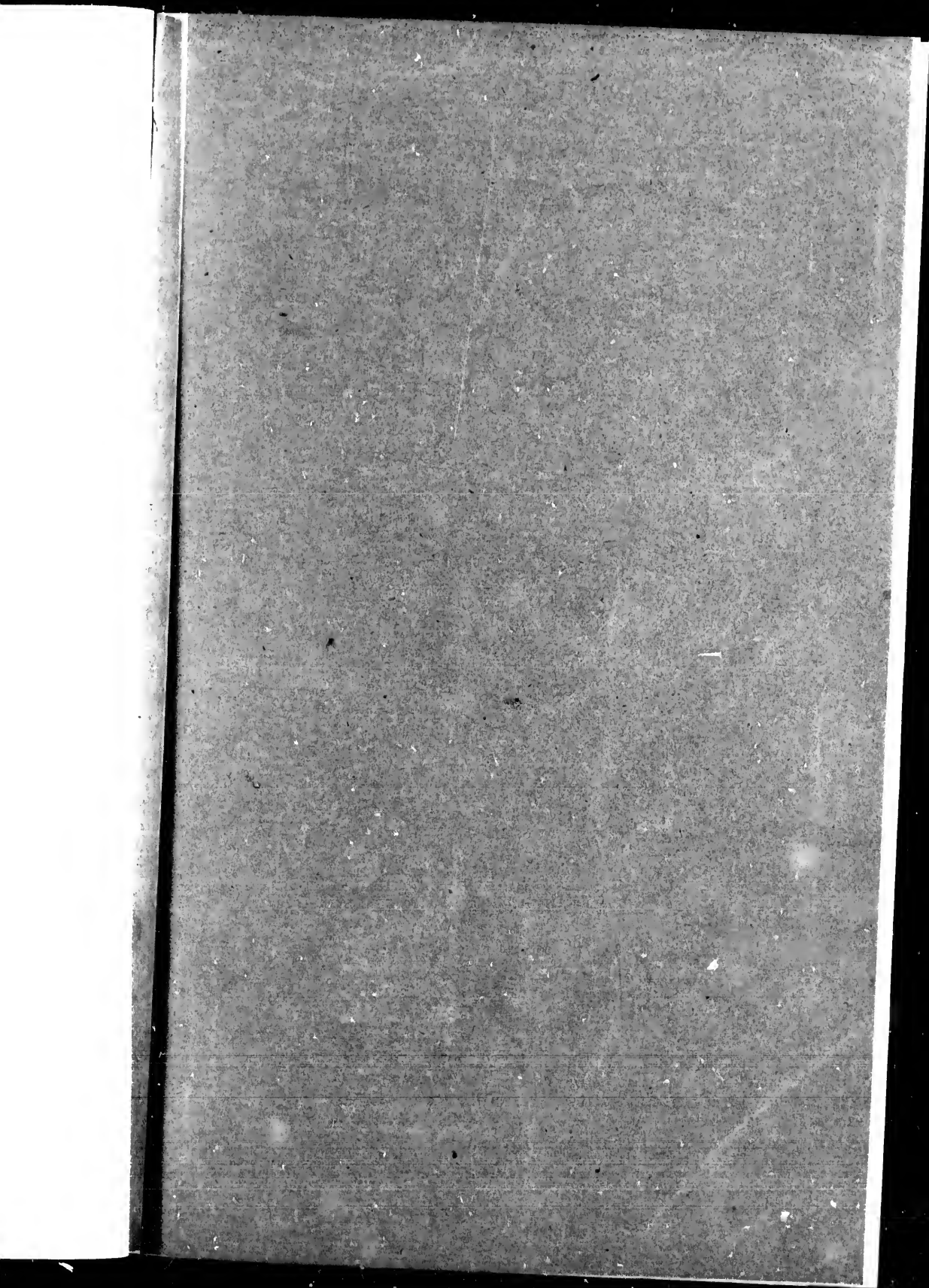
