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
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
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

### CONSTITUTION.

#### I.

The Society to be called the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

#### П.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-law, Rule, or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled or altered, except at a meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said meeting.

#### III.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Annual meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary meeting, of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at some previous meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

#### IV.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment shall be proposed except by a member qualified to vote at the Anniversary meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes of the Secretary, together with the said proposition. Po ann per tha Mee yean . scri cedi

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The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same a Member of the Society. Provided, that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such meeting.

#### VI.

#### OFFICERS.

1. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.

2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society, and the Bishop Coadjutor and Archdeacon, if any, shall be the Senior Vice-Presidents; and any Life Member may, at any meeting of the General Committee, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee; and in case of death, resignation or removal from the Province of any such officer, the vacancy shall be filled by the Executive Committee at its next or any subsequent meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he sees fit, call a special meeting of the Executive Committee for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

#### VII.

#### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee to be composed of the following members, viz:

The officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop and subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound: to be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee;

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nt shall on the position. provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday in January; on the day next following the Annual Meeting; on the first Wednesday in March; on the first Wednesday in June; and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October; or on such day in the week of, or in the week following, the aforementioned days, as may be approved by the President, or, in his absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society.

4. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or, in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but, so far as may be, alternately at St. John and Fredericton.

5. The Executive Committee shall have all such right and power in and connected with the management, control, and disposal of all lands, real estate and property whatsoever, which is now or may hereafter be vested in the Society, and with respect to the use of the Corporate Seal of the Society, as the General Committee or any General Meeting of the Society would have in session, and shall further be authorized to depute all and any such powers to any sub-committee of such Executive Committee.

#### VIII.

#### BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

There shall also be a Board of Home Missions, to be composed of the following members, viz.:

1. The President, Treasurer, Secretary or Secretaries, of the Society, and the Bishop Coadjutor and Archdeacon, ex officio.

2. Five Clerical and seven Lay members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member by two members of the General Committee, together with one Clerical or Lay representative chosen by each Deanery and resident within the same, whose name shall be certified to the Committee by the Secretary of such Deanery, as having been duly elected at a regular meeting. po and app the or j Ger

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3. The Board of Home Missions shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule. and carrying the same into operation and effect, and the appropriation and disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Resolution, Bye-law or Regulation of the General Committee.

4. Five members of the Board, three of whom shall be Layman, shall be a quorum.

5. The Board of Home Missions shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer, or Secretary, of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

#### IX.

#### OBJECTS.

The Society shall embrace the following objects and none other, viz.:

1. Missionary visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships, and assistance, when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.

3. Aid to Sunday and other schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.

4. The supply of such books and tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a fund towards making a provision for such Clergymen as may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.

9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.

10. The formation of a Fund for receiving money or securities as special Trusts.

11. The creation of a Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy.

X.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary service without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

#### XI.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

#### XII.

#### LOCAL COMMITTEES.

1. The members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of such Parish, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop) may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Farish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to elect two Lay Delegates and two Substitutes at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

5. The members of the Society, attending the public services at the Cathedral in the City of Fredericton, shall have

The meeting for the election of the said Delegates to be held annually at such time and place as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese may direct; and the said Delegates, upon being so elected, and their election duly certified by the Lord Bishop or other person presiding at the said meeting, shall be taken to be, and shall be thereby qualified as, members of the General Committee.

#### XIII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and St. John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year, unless the place of such Anniversary Meeting shall, by resolution of the General Committee or Society, be otherwise arranged.

2. A Special Meeting of the General Committee may be called at any time by the President, or, in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks' notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and St. John respectively.

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#### XIV.

#### THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following members, viz.: The Lord Bishop of the Diocesc, who shall be the Chairman; the Vice-Presidents of the Society; in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present, and if none be present, from other members of the Committee; the Secretary or Secretaries, who shall also serve in that capacity at the meeting of the General Committee; the Treasurer and the Auditors; the Rector and Missionary of each Parish, or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish, and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees, as before provided; all such persons being subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee to be the certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The members of the Executive Committee shall be ex officio members of the General Committee.

3. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriations of the Funds of the Society and a report of the proceedings of such meeting shall be made at the Anniversary meeting.

4. The order of business in General Committee shall be as follows:

Firstly.—Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly.—Secretary's Report to be read, and also a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly.—Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly.—Such appropriations or dispositions of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meeting for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary Meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; and to determine by like vote the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held; provided that in every such case a report of such adjournment, and the cause therefore, shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

#### XV.

1. The Clergy are requested to preach annually two sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the general purposes of the Society.

2. The Clergy are further requested to take up annually, in their respective Churches, a collection for the special funds of the Society, which collection shall, unless otherwise provided for, be equally divided between-(1). The Widows and Orphans Fund. (2). The Aged and Incapacitated Clergy Fund. (3). The Children of the Clergy Education Fund. The Divinity Scholarship Fund. Provided that any such (4). special collection may, at the option of the congregation from which the same shall be received, expressed through the Rector or Missionary at the time of forwarding the same, be limited to some one or more of the Special Funds or Purposes of the Society, in such proportions as they may direct; and provided also that the yearly collection required by the rules of the Widows and Orphans Fund, in the case of Clergymen joining such Fund, shall, in such cases, be considered as the special collection hereby requested to be made, but shall be applied as such rules shall direct.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

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#### BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

Whereas, it is desirable for the better provision for the ministrations of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries: therefore resolved,—

1. That in order to encourage the established Missions to become gradually self-supporting, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including stipends secured to any of the elder Clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the General Purposes of the Society.

2. That all grants made by the General Committee be made subject to these resolutions, and be distributed under the direction of the Board of Home Missions, who shall have at all times all such and like powers and rights with respect to the same, or any of them, as the General Committee of the Society would have if in session.

3. That the Board of Home Missions annually present to the General Committee of the Society, on the first day of their meeting, a full and detailed account of all business transacted during the expired year, and also a list of grants recommended for the ensuing year, with the conditions to be annexed to each, and shall also report to the Executive Committee at each quarterly meeting thereof.

4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing resolutions, and subject to the following regulations:

(a) The Board of Home Missions (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop) shall forthwith, after the annual meeting, communicate with the Wardens or other Lay Members of the Church in each Mission, requiring them to enter into engagement (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Mission for the year.

(b) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 15th day of August then next, they shall communicate with the Missionary, requiring him to give each of his congregations notice (B) of withdrawal of all payments as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Soclety on first October then next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(c) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 1st of October then next, all payments to the with

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Missionary's salary through the Society shall be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof. Provided that should the Missionary see fit to resign his cure, he shall, if stationed for the remainder of the year by the Lord Bishop in any vacant Mission which may be willing to comply with the terms required of the defaulting Mission, be entitled in respect to the services to be rendered in such new Mission, to such stipend as may be agreed upon between such Missionary and the Board, not exceeding that provided for the continuation of his services in his former Mission, and upon the like terms and conditions. Provided, also that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Board, on special application, to draw on 1st of April for a sum in their discretion; but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(d) Where such engagement is entered into, the Board shall forthwith notify the Missionary, who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society for the full amount of his quarterly salary, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission itself.

(e) The amount required from the Mission may be paid either in money or produce, and shall be so paid by equal quarterly instalments at least one month before the last day of each quarter. If paid in money, the same to be remitted direct to the Treasurer; and if paid in produce, such produce to be furnished to and received by the Missionary, and his receipt, in lieu of money, forwarded to the Treasurer within the time aforesaid. Provided that, if necessary, the Mission may have one month's grace to complete the payment.

(f) Should the Missionary give any such written receipt for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him after he shall be debited with such receipts in the Treasurer's books,

(g) Should neither the money nor receipts for produce to the full amount required for the quarter, be received by the Treasurer by the last day of the second month of the quarter, it shall be the duty of the Treasurer at once to send to the Missionary and to each of the persons who shall have signed the engagement, the notice (C), and should neither such money or receipts have been so received by the last day of the quarter, the grant of the Society shall thenceforth cease, and it shall be the Treasurer's duty at once and in like manner to send the notice (D). If, however, the arrears be subsequently paid the grant shall be thereupon *ipso facto* renewed, unless the Board order to the contrary, in which case the Board shall notify the Mission and state the reason for such order.

(b) In case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Board shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any such voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

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tisfaction hts to the (i) It shall be optional with the Board to permit any Mission to make a quarterly; half-yearly or yearly payment at any period in advance, and these regulations, *mutatis mutandis*, shall thereupon apply generally to any such Mission.

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(k) The Board shall have full power and authority to make all such further bye-laws, rules and regulations as in their opinion may be required for their guidauce, and from time to time to alter or amend the same as they shall see fit.

5. That every clergyman receiving a stipend through this Society, shall be required to make to the Secretary of the Society, according to such form as the Board of Home Missions may from time to time require, a yearly return on the first day of May in each year, showing—

1. The estimated number of the members of the Church of England.

2. The number of Churches, Chapels of Ease and Missionary Stations respectively.

3 Whether or not there is a parsonage house belonging to the Mission or provided by the people.

4. The number of public services on Sunday and in the week respectively.

5. The average congregation in each place of worship at Sunday services

That the clergy who do not receive stipends through the Society be requested to forward the same return, as far as possible, to the Secretary on the first day of May in each year, in order that a complete statement of the Diocese in these particulars may be published in the Annual Report of the Society.

7. That all the ciergy of the Diocese be requested to forward to the Board of Home Missions on the 1st January in each year a statement for the year ending 31st December, showing—

1. Communicants (counting all those who, having had opportunity, have communicated within the year),

2. Income from Local Endowment for the support of the clergy.

3. Income from Offertory Collections.

4. Income from Pew Rents.

5. Income from other donations for Church purposes—including the assessment and all other suns given for the maintenance of the Church in the Parish or Mission (exclusive of the offertory collections or pew rents), and also all sums given for the support of the Church in the Diocese.

6. Income for Church purposes from other sources — including income from Church Lands (not Glebe), and income on any moneys invested for the use of the Church.

(The above statement is required by the S. P. G., and their grant to the Diocese depends upon its being satisfactory).

8. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, shall appoint deputations of Clergymen and Laymen for each Deanery, which each deputation shall visit, for the purpose of holding Missionary meetings in the several Missions, and taking up collections thereat, not interfering, however, with the usual semi-annual collections and annual canvass of the Mission on behalf of the Society; and further, of making enquiries as to the power of the Mission to contribute towards the Clergyman's support; such deputations reporting to the Board, and through them to the General Committee of the Society.

9. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, may further appoint special deputations to enquire into the causes of any deficiency of contributions or other pecuniary difficulties in any Mission; and shall have power to call for any returns they may think proper from any of the Parishes receiving aid from or through the Society.

10. That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these resolutions to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, requesting their concurrence therein.

11. That the Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, to make any grant that the funds may allow, in aid of any Missiou not already receiving aid, upon such conditions as they may arrange; such grant to terminate, in every case, on the first day of July next ensuing.

12. That a certificate be added to the parochial agreements, which shall be signed by the representatives of the Mission, declaring that the amount given by the Mission is a *bona fide* contribution, and that no

part is derived from the rent of glebes or the interest of investmentsthe property of the Mission.

13. That the Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, if there be available funds, to make a grant, not exceeding \$100.00, to aid in the building of any Parsonage House, when it shall be certified that such grant will complete the building free of debt.

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

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#### THE DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS FUND.

1. The Divinity Scholarships Fund shall consist of the amount already appropriated thereto, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely for the purposes of the second object of the Society, as hereinafter provided.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund in all other respects shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Board of Home Missions.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1,200; nor shall the grant or grants thereafter be made to exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Every such grant shall be a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, and shall be tenable for such a period, upon such terms or conditions. and at such collegiate institutions as the Board of Home Missions shall, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, determine.

6. The choice of Divinity Scholars shall be made by the Board of Home Missions, subject to the Lord Blshop's approval.

7. The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions shall be the Secretary of this Fund, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Board may direct.

8. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

#### THE INCAPACITATED CLERGY FUND.

1. The Fund for the assistance of Clergymen who are incapacitated by mental or bodily infirmity shall consist of the capital sum of \$3,000; being the amount heretofore specially appropriated from the Fund belonging to the seventh object of the Church Society, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections and other contributions given to the Society for this special object, and the interest only of this Fund shall be applied to the relief of disabled Clergymen of the present Diocese of Fredericton

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest any surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

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3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in a Committee to consist of the Bishop and the Bishop Coadjutor (if any) of the Diocese, and of three Clergymen and three Laymen, to be appointed annually by the Executive Committee, at the July meeting thereof.

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4. Any Clergymen duly appointed as Rector, Missionary or Assistant Curate in the Diocese of Fredericton, and being unable to discharge the duties of his office through mental or bodily infimity, and wishing to participate in the benefits of this fund, shall make application, in writing, to the Committee appointed under Rule 3, who shall determine each case on its own merits, and shall have power to grant such yearly pension, not exceeding \$400, as they shall see fit. The application shall also state the annual value of any private property, pension, or income of which applicant may be possessed, or which is directly or indirectly available for his benefit. In all cases, an application for a pension shall be accompanied by a recommendation from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

5. Should the Committee refuse to entertain the application, an appeal may be made by the applicant to the General Committee.

6. In the event of an application being favorably considered, a pension shall be granted only on condition of the applicant first resigning his cure with all its emoluments.

7. The Committee may, at their discretion, alter or withdraw any of the pensions subject to an appeal to the General Committee.

8. If any pensioner shall be able to undertake any clerical duty for which he shall receive any stipend, the pension shall be reduced, or shall cease, at the discretion of the Committee, as long as he continues to discharge such duty.

9. No Clergyman shall receive any benefit from this Fund unless he shall have served at least seven consecutive years in the Diocese of Fredericton.

10. If any pensioner reside out of this Diocese, sufficient proof of his continued disability shall accompany his draft for the pension.

11. Pensions shall be payable quarterly, and proportionately for any part of a quarter, on the first day of January, April, July and October in each year.

12. No alteration or amendment to the above rules may be made except by the General Committee, and upon notice of the proposed change given in writing, at the next previous annual meeting.

#### THE INCAPACITATED CLERGY SPECIAL FUND.

(Rule adopted by General Committee, July 1886.)

That the Special Fund be kept separate and untouched, and that all interest derived from it be allowed to accumulate, until it shall have reached the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, and that then the whole amount be transferred to the ordinary Incapacitated Clergy Fund of the Society, when the income may be applied to the purposes for which the Fund is being raised. oy is, ljutor en, to seting

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#### THE CLERGY WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Fredericton in the Province of New Brunswick, shall have a special Fund to be called "The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund," which shall consist of the present capital held by the Society for this object (subject to its present liabilities), of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, devises and bequests, and other contributions given and paid to the Society for this special purpose, and of all payments received under these rules; and this Fund shall be applied to the assistance of the families of deceased Clergymen, in accordance with these rules, and to no other object.

2. Every Clergyman in this Diocesc, duly licensed, whose widow is not already entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, wishing to share in the benefits of this Fund shall, within six months, from July 5, 1871, or within one year from receiving Holy Orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secretary of the Fund for a certificate, and shall thenceforth pay annually the sum set opposite his age in the annexed scale. Any applicant after such period of time shall only be permitted to receive a certificate at the option of the Executive Committee of the Church Society, and upon such terms as they shall direct.

3. Every Clergyman being a member of this Fund shall make and forward to the Secretary a yearly collection from every congregation in his Parish or Mission. Assistant Curates serving under a Rector, or other Assistant Clergyman, shall not, however, be required to make a collection, but shall forward only their own annual payment.

4. All payments and all congregational collections shall become due on the first day of January, in each year, and must be paid within thirty days. If this rule is not complied with the certificate shall be considered as forfeited, but may be regained at the option of the Committee: and the applicant shall pay for the new certificate at the rate payable at the age when the same is taken out, according to the annexed scale, together with such sum as the Executive Committee may require in lieu of payments and subscriptions in arrears.

5. Upon compliance with the above rules the Diocesan Church Society undertakes to pay out of "The Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund," a yearly pension of Two Hundred Dollars to the widow of each Clergyman holding a certificate, during her widowhood. Provided that in case the income should at any time be insufficient to pay the full amount of the pensions for which it may be liable, such pensions shall be reduced by the Executive Committee pro rata; provided, nevertheless, that in no case shall any pension be reduced below the sum of \$100.

6. If the widow dic or marry again, the pension shall be paid towards the support of such children of the deceased Clergyman as may be under the age of eighteen years. In this case, when the youngest child shall have attained this age the pension shall cease.

7. The Trustees named in the will of the Clergyman shall be recognized by the Committee in the event of the death or marriage of his widow, and shall receive the pension to be applied by them for the support of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act; or if Trustees should not have been named, then the Bishop of the Diocese shall himself act, or in writing appoint a Trustee to act, in the application of the pension.

8. If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the limitation as to age expressed in Rule 6.

9. No certificate shall be issued to any Clergyman over the age of sixty years, who is not already in the Diocese at the time of the formation of these rules; but any Clergyman already in the Diocese, over the age of sixty years, and whose widow is not entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, shall be admitted a member of this Fund. on making the annual payment for the age of sixty years, and otherwise complying with the rules

10. If a Clergyman removes with the Bishop's consent from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than ten years, he shall be allowed bis claim upon the Fund, on continuing his yearly payment, and the sum of \$6 in lieu of the collections from his Parish or Mission.

11. If a Clergyman is unable to continue his public ministrations, through sickness or accident, upon the production of a medical certificate testifying the same, he may continue his connection with the Fund, upon making his yearly payment.

12 Any Clergyman degraded or suspended from the ministry, or any widow or orphan who shall not be in communion with the Church of England, shall be entitled only to such payments as the Executive Committee shall prescribe.

13. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall be Treasurer of this Fund, and shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Loan Committee, invest every hundred pounds of surplus money, and add the same to the capital of the Fund. A yearly detailed statement of the income, payments and invested money, shall be published in the Annual Report of Diocesan Church Society.

14. The pension shall be payable half yearly, on January 1st and July 1st, in each year, the first payment to be calculated for the interval from the death of the insured to the day of payment.

15. The secretary of this Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and it shall be his duty to issue certificates, receive payments, donations and collections, which he shall hand to the Treasurer every quarter, or oftener if required by him.

16. None of the above rules shall be altered, except at the Annual Meeting of the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

#### WIDOWS AND ORPHANS SPECIAL FUND.

30

1. The Fund to be kept on deposit at interest in some chartered bank, or otherwise invested in securities which may easily be realized, and the interest received to be added to it from time to time.

2. Applications for grants from the Fund to be made to the Lord Bishop and the Board of Home Missions, and to be determined upon by them; any grants made to be reported to the General Committee at its next meeting.

3. The application of the Fund not to be limited to the cases of widows or relatives of clergymen serving in the aided Missions, but to extend to all cases throughout the Diocese, occuring after its formation and requiring help.

4. Each such grant to be made from the capital of the Fund, until the same shall be exhausted, and not to exceed one hundred dollars in the case of any one clergyman's decease.

5. The application of the Fund to be limited to the two cases a lowing:

(a) Where the clergyman deceased shall not have been connected with the Widows and Orphans Fund, and satisfactory evidence shall be submitted to the Board that the widow, or the orphan children or other relatives of such clergyman, under the age of eighteen years, dependent upon him at the time of his decease, are not in receipt of an income from all sources exceeding \$300 per annum.

(b) Where, though the clergyman deceased has been connected with the Widows and Orphans Fund, satisfactory evidence shall be submitted to the Board that such widow, or orphan children or dependent relatives under the age of eighteen years, are not in receipt of an income from all sources [except such Fund] exceeding \$200 per annum.

6. That it is to be understood in all cases that such grant is not intended for the payment of any debts or liabilities incurred by such clergyman before his decease, but to be available to an extent not exceeding \$100 in any one case to meet the inevitable expenses falling immediately upon the widow or helpless relatives of the deceased when they are not provided with private means of their own to defray them. TH

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#### THE EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY FUND.

1. The Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy shall consist of the amount now specially appropriated thereto (being \$1,425.79), of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions, given to or applied by, the Society for this special object, and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely to assist in the education of children of Clergymen duly licensed in the present Diocese of Fredericton, or of children of those who may have died, or retired with the Bishop's approval on the ground of age or infirmity.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, who if they shall think fit, may vest such management in a sub-committee at their discretion.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1,200. nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Applications for grants from such Fund shall be made in writing through the parents or guardians of the applicant, to the Secretary of the Fund, and every such application shall be accompanied by a statement of any and all private proverty, pension or income, of the parent or parents, if living, or directly or indirectly available for the support and education of such applicant, if the parent shall be deceased. The Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, may, in any case, require further statements which shall thereupon be furnished for their Information.

6. Each case shall be determined on its own merits by the Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

7. In the event of any application being favorably considered, the Executive Committee, or its sub-committee, shall determine in each case, the amount of the grant, which shall be made in a single year only, but may, at the option of the Committee, be continued for one or more years, but not after the recipient shall have reached the age of eighteen years.

8. A Secretary of the Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Executive Committee or its sub-committee may direct.

9. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

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## **RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.**

#### APPLICATION FOR GRANTS.

That in future no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously.

#### ABSENCE OF MISSIONARY.

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion to pay him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission.

#### YEARLY GRANTS.

That all grants by this Committee for Missionary Salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made and shall expire with it.

#### VOUCHERS.

That all vouchers for the payment af any sum of money, whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

#### CONDITIONS OF GRANTS.

That in future, grants from this Committee will be made mainly with reference to the ability of the members of the Church in the several Parishes to support their own Clergyman, the amount of local contributions for Church objects in such Parishes, and the sum paid in aid of the general objects of the Society.

#### BEQUESTS TO BE FUNDED.

That all bequests made to the Society be funded, as heretofore, and the interest only applied to the general or special purposes for which they are bequeathed. Sc be

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#### RETURNS FROM PARISHES OR MISSIONS.

Whereas, In consequence of the limited means at the disposal of the Society, and the great necessity for new and extended work, it has become of great consequence that all local glebes, and other endowments of Parishes should be fully utilized.

lands, and other investments, yearly or oftener, as they shall see fit. 2. That if it shall appear that any part of the income from the glebes or investments held for the Rector's use, is taken to make up the sum required by the Society from the Mission, the Board may forthwith increase the amount required in proportion thereto; and in case of neglect on the part of the Rector or Church Wardens to collect the interests or rents, the Board be authorized to enquire into the matter, and if there be sufficient cause, suspend the grant to the Mission, until the management be made satisfactory to the Board of Home Missions.

#### CONTRIBUTIONS - HOW CHARGEABLE.

That the Secretary of the Diocesan Church Society be requested to furnish the Treasurer with a minute of contributions reported from every Parish or Mission, specifying the amounts payable to general and special funds, that the amounts so returned be charged by the Treasurer to each Parish or Mission in a book to be kept for the purpose, and that a detailed statement of all contributions then remaining unpaid be rendered by the Treasurer to the Executive Committee, for their action in the matter at the October meeting, and each meeting thereafter, so long as any amount shall continue in arrears.

#### SECRETARIES OF LOCAL COMMITTEES.

That every Missionary be requested to furnish annually, to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society, the name of the Secretary of each Local Committee.

#### CERTIFICATES OF LAY DELEGATES.

That the certificate of the Lay Delegates be sent to the Sccretary at least ten days before the meeting of the General Committee, to enable him to report to the meeting at its opening the names of those qualified, and that his report shall be accepted as *prima facie* evidence of qualification.

#### PRINTING OF RULES AND REGULATIONS.

That all Rules and Regulations made by the General Committee be printed in the Annual Report.

#### MISSIONS BECOMING VACANT.

That when any Mission now receiving aid from the Society shall become vacant, the grant from the Society shall therefrom cease, and shall only be renewed upon application to the General Committee, or to the Board of Home Missions, and upon such terms as to assessment and grant as they, or either of them, shall consider equitable.

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#### PRINTING STATEMENT TO S. P. G.

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That the statement made by the Board of Home Missions to the S. P. G. be printed in the Annual Report of the Society.

#### TRAVELLING OUTFITS.

#### Passed July, 1884.

Whereas, It is very desirable that some provision should be made whereby men commencing work in this Diocese may be entitled to purchase the requisite travelling outfit without becoming involved in debt for the same; therefore

*Resolved*, That when a man commences work in this Diocese in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the Diocesan Church Society, a sum not exceeding \$250 may be advanced to him for the purchase of the necessary travelling outfit, upon the following conditions:

1st. That he undertakes to serve at least three years in a Parish or Mission receiving a grant from the Society.

2nd. That during these three years his stipend shall not exceed \$700, out of which the Treasurer of the Society shall be authorized to retain \$25 per quarter till the sum advanced be paid.

3rd. That in case, for any reason, he ceases to do such work before the expiration of three years, he shall refund such part of the grant as may still be unpaid.

#### INSURANCE ON PARSONAGES.

#### Passed July, 1887.

That all the grants made to Missions by the Diocesan Church Society be upon the condition that insurance on Parsonages be maintained as heretofore required.

#### CONTRIBUTORS' NAMES.

#### Passed July, 1889.

That the Clergy be requested to report the names of all contributors to the funds of the Society for publication in the Annual Report.

#### FREE GRANTS OF BOOKS.

#### Passed July, 1889.

That the Book Depository Committee be authorized to make, at their discretion, free grants of books to Parishes or Sunday Schools, out of any surplus funds which may be on hand, applications for the same to be made to the Secretary of the Committee.

#### RENEWAL OF GRANTS.

#### Passed July, 1890.

That upon a Mission becoming vacant, the grant from the Society may be renewed upon such terms that the stipend shall not exceed \$700, with a parsonage, or \$780 without a parsonage. be h Dece 3. appoi other differ mitte

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#### MEETINGS OF COMMITTEES OF D. C. S. AND SYNOD.

#### Passed July 1891.

1 That meetings of all Committees having business to be transacted be held quarterly, in the first week in March, June, September and December, respectively.

3. That the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society appoint one member of a committee of two (the Synod to appoint the other member) who shall arrange the time and place for meetings of the different Committees, on application of the Chairman of such Committees respectively.

## **RESOLUTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.**

A committee shall be appointed to be called "The Glebe Land Committee," with full and absolute power and authority to demise and lease, by public auction or by private agreement, for any term or terms of years, with or without covenants for renewal, and upon such other covenants and conditions as may be deemed advisable; and to sell at public auction or by private sale and convey in fee simple, subject to such limitations, conditions and restrictions as may be deemed advisable by the Glebe Land Committee, all and every or any, the lands, tenements and hereditaments vested in the Society under Chapter 76, 34th Victoria, or any part thereof, not heretofore conveyed by this Society; and for such purpose to advertise in any manner the said lands, or any part thereof, for sale or to lease, and also to cause and direct the seal of the Society to be affixed to the same; also to receive the proceeds of all or any sales so made: all things to be done under this resolution, however, to be in accordance with the terms, conditions, provisions, and stipulations of 48th Victoria, Chapter 36, ss. 50, 51, 52, 53, 54; and all proceeds of all or any sales and rents of lands leased under this resolution, to be handed over or paid to, and received by the Treasurer of this Society for the time being, to and for the uses, trusts and purposes set forth in the last mentioned Act.

#### Resolution passed July 2, 1886.

That the Glebe Land Committee be instructed and authorized to take such steps and bring such sults as they may think necessary to retain possession of, and recover all lands and property connected therewith, vested in the Society under the 34 Vic., Chap. 76, subject always to the consent and approval of the Lord Bishop.

# REPORT.

## 1893.

During the past year the Society has suffered an irreparable loss in the death of its beloved and revered President, the late Lord Bishop of the Diocese and Metropolitan of Canada.

It may be truly said that from the day of his arrival in New Brunswick to the close of his life the Society had no truer friend or more generous supporter.

The Society was yet in its infancy when Bishop Medley came to his Diocese in 1845 as its first bishop. Less than nine years before, viz., on September 8th, 1836, a meeting of the Clergy had been held in the City of Fredericton in accordance with a suggestion of Bishop John Inglis, at which "The Church Society of the Archdeaconry of New Brunswick" was duly organized. Speaking of this movement, the Rev. Ernest Hawkins (for many years the indefatigable Secretary of the S. P. G.) in his "Annals of the Diocese of Fredericton," says: The organization of this Society is memorable as the *first* systematic attempt in a British colony for the more full and efficient support of its own church.

At the time of Bishop Medley's arrival it was, however, still the day of small things with the Society. A number of the more wealthy and influential parishes had as yet manifested little or no interest in its well-being, and its funds were in consequence but limited.

At the annual meeting held in February, 1845, the Executive Committee, rightly anticipating the beneficial results about to follow, affirmed that the appointment of a Bishop

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e Execual results a Bishop for the Province is "an event which cannot fail to promote the progress and usefulness of the Church Society which will be henceforward the Church Society of a Diocese, and one from which it is not to be supposed that any clergyman or any parish will stand aloof." This anticipation on the part of the Executive Committee was abundantly realized. On the arrival of the Bishop the number of Parishes contributing to the Society was at once increased from fifteen to twentyfive, and the amount of contributions from \$1,013 to \$3,836. How closely the late Bishop identified himself with the work of the Society is known to all who know anything of the history of the Church in New Brunswick. His heartfelt interest in its welfare was in some measure indicated by constant attendance at all meetings, both of the Society and its Committees and by generous donations to its funds. During an episcopate of more than forty-seven years he was absent from the annual meetings on but four occasions. In the year 1862 and again in 1865 he went to England in consequence of the grave crisis that had arisen in the financial affairs of the Church in New Brunswick through the contemplated withdrawal of aid rendered by the S. P. G., and in both instances he was successful in staying the hand of the governing body of the venerable Society for the time being and securing their kindly consideration for the increased and growing needs of the work in his Diocese. The other occasions of the Bishop's absence were in the years 1878 and 1888, when, in obedience to the invitation of the Archbishop of Canterbury, he attended the meetings of the Lambeth Conference in England. The late Bishop's appreciation of the invaluable work of the D. C. S. in building up and sustaining the Church in this Diocese is apparent in the fact that during his life amongst us he contributed by annual donations alone nearly \$5,000 to the general purposes of the Society, besides generous offerings in behalf of its special funds.

The wisdom manifested by the founders of this Society is clearly apparent when we consider the simple fact that twentyfive years ago the Diocese of Fredericton was in receipt of an annual grant from the S. P. G. amounting to very nearly \$14,000, and that this sum has been yearly decreasing in accordance with the policy of the venerable Society until at the present time the amount actually available for the missionary work of the Diocese from this source is only about Meanwhile the Church has largely extended her \$3,000. work in the Diocese by the opening of new missions and by the multiplication of Churches and stations in the old established missions. True, the prospect at present of maintaining the services of the Church in all the existing missions is by no means a bright one, and the prospect of extending the work in the near future seems even less encouraging, in view of the summary reduction of the S. P. G. grant with which the Diocese is now threatened. Nevertheless, when we consider the position in which we might be at the present day but for the forethought which planned and the wisdom which nurtured this Society, we have ample reason for thankfulness. Through the agency of the Society investments amounting in the aggregate to about \$133,000 have been made, the income from which is available for the work of the Church in the Diocese, of which the greater portion is devoted to the work of the Home Missions, but the capital of the Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy-now \$28,000, and of the Incapacitated Clergy Fund-now \$20,000 (special I. C. F. included), are very valuable in their way.

But not only has the Society been the instrumentality of accumulating these valuable endowments, it has also increased the contributions in the Diocese to a degree that has borne fruit both in the opening of new missions and in the increase of self-sustaining parishes.

Many of the older and richer parishes are to-day nobly helping the missions that are in part dependent on external aid for maintaining the services of the Church. Other parishes might reasonably be expected to do more than they are doing. th

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ay nobly external Other nan they In the first year of the late Bishop's episcopate Fredericton gave \$748 to the D. C. S.; last year it gave \$1,598, an increase of \$850. The City of St. John (including Portland and Carleton) gave for the same periods \$1,760 and \$2,360, an increase of \$600 only. St. Andrews gave for the same periods \$86 and \$200; St. Stephen, \$97 and \$150, and other places show a corresponding increase.

The measure of success that has attended our efforts in the past ought assuredly to arouse every member of the Church in the present emergency. The missions of Aberdeen, Albert, Baie Verte, Campbellton, Bathurst, Dalhousie, Canning, Douglas and Bright and Simonds are vacant, and there are not at the present time sufficient funds to re-open them all unless the contributions to the general funds of the D. C. S. be largely increased.

The question we have to face is simply this: Are the members of the Church of England in New Brunswick prepared to allow the doors of the Churches in these vacant missions to be boarded up, the Parsonage houses deserted and the congregations scattered as sheep having no shepherd? It ought not so to be, and it need not be so if all the members of the Church will arouse themselves in this exigency and work together loyally and heartily to avert what must otherwise inevitably occur and which would be nothing short of a calamity.

## ANDOVER - REV. L. A. HOYT, B. A.

It has been my custom at the first report after the publication of the census to take note of the comparative growth of the Church and of the whole population in this section of the Diocesse during the previous decade. In this comparative statement I shall include only those Parishes which have been wholly, or in part, under my control during the last decade, stating, however, in passing, that the report of the addition of only one Church member to the population of Madawaska County is owing to the loss of Church population in St. Leonard's Parish, where few or no services were held during the decade preceding the taking of the census.

GRAND FALLS.—The larger part of this Province lies in the Mission of Andover, and the increase has been 9.6 per cent, while the increase of population has been 4.1.

DRUMMOND.— The larger part of the territory of this Parish lies in the Mission of Andover, while about half of the Churchmen live in New Denmark. The increase of the Church has been 70 per cent, while the increase of the whole population has been 34.7 per cent.

ANDOVER.—The increase has been 12.3 per cent, the increase of population has been 1 per cent.

PERTH.—Increase of Church population, 41.6 per cent; increase of whole population, 6 4 per cent.

Gordon and Lorne had not been under my charge for nearly two years previous to the census enumeration. The increase of the Church in Gordon is reported at 46.6 per cent, while the general population decreased .05 per cent.

The Church population in Lorne trebled during the decade, not a very extensive growth when we consider that it began in 1881 with the number of fourteen, but very satisfactory in connection with the fact that the general population decreased '02 per cent in the time.

In the Mission of Aberdeen the Church population decreased during the decade, except in the Parish of Peel, where I held services monthly for some years.

In this Parish the Church population has increased 22.2 per cent.

These figures show that where Church services are regularly held, even though not so frequently as one would desire, the Church will strengthen her influence in the land.

The work of the Church in this Mission has progressed quietly during the year.

The building at Glenboune which I reported last year as having been blown down has been restored and is in a very satisfactory state of advancement.

The congregation at Four Falls is in an especially encouraging condition. The singing classes are largely attended, the att

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buragd, the attendance at Church services is large, the people devout, and at the request of some parishioners I recently established a Sunday-school under very encouraging conditions. A ten days' mission was held during Advent in Bairdsville, to which section of the Parish of Andover the Rev. H. B. Morris has been giving another year of his valuable services, and for which I feel I can never thank him sufficiently. The result of this mission has been very gratifying, and as one of its developments a class is being prepared for confirmation, to be presented to the Bishop the coming autumn.

I will ask you to allow me to say one word respecting a matter not immediately within my Parish work. I refer to the sympathy which we all must feel with the incumbent of the neighboring Mission of Grand Falls at the loss of his wife. Having known Mrs. Richards from infancy I felt that her strength of devotion, her never-ceasing trust in a higher power, her simple faith must have made an impression for good wherever her lot would be cast. Scarcely a year had passed since her marriage, when all the prospects of her usefulness in this world were blighted, and she was called to a higher work in Paradise. We who remain, bow our heads to the mysterious decree of Divine power and in all humility and submission say, "God's will be done."

In conclusion I wish to say a few parting words respecting my mission work in this part of the Diocese. For twentytwo and a half years I have performed the work which the Bishop sent me to do. Hardship and self-denial have been my lot ofttimes. I have been discouraged almost to despair; sometimes I have been ashamed of the smallness of my labours. But I plodded on, feeling that as I had been sent here by my Bishop, it was my duty here to remain, and always recognizing the principle that labour is mine and the results belong alone to God; and I am thankful, deeply thankful, to say that God has blessed my work with gratifying results.

The Mission of Andover, as it was in 1870, communicated to the Society its inability to pay the required assessment of \$200. The Bishop sent me there as a "forlorn hope."

The territory which then could not pay \$200, now includes districts appearing on the Schedule as paying \$1,875. In this territory there were three Churches, there are now six, with three more ready for consecration and a Mission room in course of construction. I do not speak of this as altogether my own work. The Rev. Messrs. Almond, Flewelling, Shannon, Dr. Eastman, Hoadley, Jones, Hansen, Armstrong, Hooper, Parry, Richard Hopkins and Morris, have each had a part, smaller or larger, in producing the results. And now the Mission of Andover has been reduced from the unwieldy district of a hundred and thirty miles long and sixty broad to one about the size of an average country Mission. The financial condition is encouraging. The possibility of their raising the assessment is, I think, within sight, and I feel sure that they would have done it for me this year. I hope that they may do it for my successor, for the Bishop has appointed me to another field.

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I have always held the theory that it is unfair to make a Bishop responsible for the success or failure of a Diocese while his Priests go and come when and where they please.

No general would be held responsible for the success of his campaign if his officers were allowed at their own sweet will to take charge of any company which might elect them, to go to any part of the field which might seem more safe or more desirable, or to leave his service altogether.

The sentiment of the poet-laureate was echoed with enthusiasm when he said it was the glory of the English army that they felt it —

> Theirs not to reason why; Theirs but to do and die.

And this should be the principle of action between Bishops and Priests if we expect any success to the Church or any blessing upon our work.

Acting upon this theory I have accepted the appointment of the Bishop to the Parish of Simonds. Asking from the Society that on my behalf they may use the prayer of Solomon, "That 1 may have an understanding heart to discern between good and bad," for who is able for so great a work?

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## CAMBRIDGE - REV. E. P. HURLEY.

The Parish of Cambridge has, during the year now passed, gone through a series of successes and reverses similar, I presume, to those experienced by other country Missions in this We have suffered severely by an exodus to other Diocese. localities of many members and attendants, both young and old, some of whom had, in the ways for which they were best fitted, taken no small interest in the welfare of the Parish. The material edifice of the Church has, notwithstanding, made some considerable progress. On the shingling and other improvements of St. John's Church, at Mill Cove, we have expended the sum of \$34. On the painting and clapboarding of St. Luke's Church, at Waterborough, we have laid out the sum of \$98, and on the Rectory and grounds of the same at Lower Jemseg we are presently carrying on improvements to the amount of \$170. When these additions will have been completed we shall then owe a debt of about \$70 in all. Let it not be thought, however, that the financial standing of the Mission is such as to yield all this money; so very far from it that we have here to record our deep gratitude for aid and encouragement from many outside friends, including his Lordship the Bishop, who made us a generous donation. The truth is the financial standing of the Mission is surely, though it may be slowly, diminishing all the time, and this will be evident when I state the fact that within the past year we have lost through the death of an old Church member to whom it had been loaned many years ago, and who died unable to pay it, the sum of \$100, bearing interest at six per cent, and another sum of \$20 per annum yielded formerly as a rent by the present Rectory grounds. But we struggle and toil on in hope and are not depressed, though the spiritual advancement of the Mission is much less satisfactory than we could desire; and if this were the time and place I would gladly enter into a detailed explanation of the causes, which, in my judgment, operate to retard the spiritual growth of God's kingdom in this extensive Mission of Cam-But a word or two must suffice. First, the people bridge. have been too many years in the habit of attending dissenting places of worship with the same facility and the same apparent conviction of moral obligation as moves them to present themselves at the public services of their own Church. This practice begets confusion of thought about the doctrines and liturgy of the Church of England, which is utterly subversive

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of spiritual advancement on the lines of Church teaching. Second, an almost complete absence of the dissemination of healthy Church literature among our people, while their neighbors of other denominations supply them with papers of their respective Churches. The spread of Church literature in the form of weekly or monthly readable papers, abounding in Church news and doctrine, is. I am persuaded, one of the most effectual means of advancing the Church's cause, and one which, if neglected, will prove detrimental to the Church in this Diocese. No other subject could more advantageously occupy the time of the D. C. S., and on none could money, that now, perhaps, is foolishly wasted, be more wisely expended; and though it is not for me to dictate to the wise heads of the D. C. S., nor to pry into the wisdom that directs the legislative body of this Diocese, still I cannot forbear remarking that topics may have been overlooked, whose discussion is sorely needed and whose practical issues would much better occupy our time than many upon which random and, it may be, fruitless discussions are perpetually cropping up.

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### CANNING.

Vacant.

The Rev. E. P. Hurley, Missionary at Cambridge, writes: During the year I held thirteen services in different parts of the Mission of Canning with what profit remains to be told by the invisible Ruler of all. This Mission has certainly few, if any, prospects before it. Rationally, I cannot see how they can have any hope there of supporting a Missionary in the near future, and the rising generation, few indeed in numbers, mnst, I fear, be all lost to the Church. At present they have, I believe, on hand about \$36.00, proceeds of Glebe property, which might be appropriated for services during the next three months if the Society deem it wise to send a student or lay reader thither. This year, therefore, the Mission ought to be able, with the money on hand and what they can and ought to subscribe, to afford to pay for a lay reader the usual amount of \$50.00.

## CHATHAM - REV. CANON FORSYTH.

There have been no events of special interest in the work of this Parish during the past year, with the exception of the placing of a furnace in St. Mary's Chapel. The cost was \$295.17, which has been paid by offerings and subscriptions and an appropriation from St. Agnes' Guild. During the severe test of cold weather last winter the furnace proved to be a great comfort and an improvement upon the old method of heating. Further steps have also been taken in the direction of the restoration of St. Mary's Chapel. The Committee to whom was entrusted the duty of collecting subscriptions, have reported that thus far about \$800.00 have been subscribed, and that they have yet to call upon several members of the congregation. This amount is regarded as sufficient, together with the other funds now in hand, through the efforts of the Ladies' Guilds, to justify proceeding with the restoration of the interior of the Chapel as soon as arrangements can be made for so doing. It is also hoped that the exterior repairs may be made without any considerable delay, and then the holy house will be more worthy of Him who has set His name there.

The contributions to the Diocesan Church Society, comprehending \$61.08 in annual subscriptions and \$20.90 in Lenten Offerings from the children, total \$81.98, were \$31.98 more than was promised from this Parish last year. The collections for the present year are now being made, but whether any more than the \$50.00 promised, according to the Schedule, will be forthcoming, I am unable at present to say. If a due sense of the importance of a liberal support of our Diocesan Missions and of the blessedness of cheerful giving to God's work prevails, the amount will not be less than usual, although local wants are pressing and business d pression is severely felt.

A number of our faithful people give liberally and cheerfully, but no doubt some might, with spiritual advantage, devote more of their substance to the glory of God. In a self-supporting Parish, without any considerable endowment, with few able to give large contributions, it is needful that all who can give anything should do their best. Steps have recently been taken in the direction of a more thorough use of the envelope system, with a view to encourage more systematic giving through the offertory on the first day of the week, according to St. Paul's rule. I am thankful for the valued assistance and co-operation of the members of the vestry who have undertaken to further the object in view.

Forty-eight Children's Mission Boxes were distributed last Lent, and the returns, which are somewhat more than last year, will be duly reported.

The customary offerings in aid of Domestic and Foreign Missions have been made also in response to the Epiphany and Ascensiontide appeals on behalf of these objects.

The ladies of the Guilds of the congregations of St. Mary's and St. Paul's have continued their worthy endeavours with more or less regularity during the past year, and we trust that in the future, as now, the memorials of their labours of love will remain in the improvements in the house of God which they have aided in accomplishing.

Our Sunday-school work goes on as usual, although not without its difficulties and drawbacks. We have been more or less without the aid of *men*, although the work is so important and blessed. Unhappily, parents allow too much irregularity in the attendance of their children and neglect of preparation of the lessons, and the place of faithful and regular teachers is not always to be supplied.

We must hope, however, that notwithstanding these difficulties, the lambs of Christ's flock may, in some measure at least, be fed. 'The accustomed daily and Sunday services have been held regularly during the year with the usual average attendances. Although some might doubtless make more use of these inestimable privileges, we hope that as they witness to the continual providence of God so they may abound in blessings to all who make use of them.

During the past year I have baptized ten children, solemnized three marriages and performed nine burials.

I am now in anticipation of the administration of confirmation during the coming autumn, preparing a class of candidates for the reception of that sacred rite.

I cannot conclude my report without reference to the lamented death of Charles Sargeant, Esq., for many years a Vestryman of St. Paul's corporation, a constant attendant and communicant at the Parish Church, a regular contributor to the Parish Funds, a sub-delegate to this Society and an este he in j

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the rs a and r to an esteemed citizen of Miramichi. The public testimony is that he did good in his generation, and we believe that he departed in peace and now rests in hope of a blessed resurrection.

With thankfulness to God for strength to work in the field of this venerable Society's operations, I beg its acceptance of this report of another year's labours in the cause of the Holy Redeemer and His kingdom.

## DALHOUSIE.

#### Vacant.

Rev. James Simonds writes: The services were regularly maintained in this Parish until the end of the ecclesiastical year. I resigned the Rectorship in consequence of the Wardens and Vestry having stated that they could no longer guarantee to raise and forward the amount required by the Society. Being compelled to make a move, and having heard of no other work at the time, I accepted an invitation to take charge of a Parish in South Carolina.

## DORCHESTER - REV. J. ROY CAMPBELL.

We are unable to present a report of any striking moment, but we have verified Keble's words,—

> "The trivial round, the common task, Will furnish all we need to ask; Room to deny ourselves,—a road To bring us daily nearer God."

Trinity Church Guild still continues to do its work usefully and happily, but we have to record the loss of our invaluable Secretary-Treasurer, Miss F. S. Chandler, the larger sphere of the Saint John Book Depository having presented a genial opening for her exceptional ability to serve the Church in that way.

I regret to record the removal by death of E. V. Tait, Esq., a life-long friend of the Society, and a very Nestor of New Brunswick Church organists, he having been connected with Trinity Church choir for half a century.

As there can be no better way that I know of, outside of individual sense of duty and privilege to work for the Church, to encourage those who labour therefor, than to prove in some way that their work is appreciated, it is a pleasant duty to record the fact that after thirty-five years connection with Trinity Church Sunday-school as its Superintendent, the teachers and scholars presented the Hon. Mr. Justice Hanington on Easter Day with a very handsome set of Church service books, consisting of Bible, Prayer Book, Psalter, Hymn Book and Chant Book, all uniformly bound in morocco and suitably inscribed, in recognition of his life-long service to the school.

We have a class of about twelve who have been in preparation from the beginning of the year, and whom we hope to present for confirmation after his Lordship's return to the Diocese.

We have spent nothing on ourselves as a Parish during the past year, on our Church or school buildings, so we send you not far short of \$200.00 for the General Purposes of the Society.

### GAGETOWN - REV. N. C. HANSEN, M. A.

The past year has probably been, in some respects, one of the most remarkable in the history of this Parish. Since the last report to this Society the Church here has entered upon the second century of its existence. The hundredth anniversary was celebrated on the 19th day of July. A special service was held in the Church at 11 a. m., at which Rev. Mr. Parkinson, of St. Mary's, preached an appropriate and interesting sermon. In the afternoon of the same day we had a re-union of Loyalists from all over the Province in memory of the Loyalists who had built the Church. Historical speeches were made by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, Sir John C. Allen and many other distinguished Loyalists. In the evening we had a conversazione in the Temperance Hall. A W. gab

A valuable historical paper was read by Rev. W. O. Raymond. Instrumental and vocal music was provided by local and foreign talent, and ice-cream and cake were passed round by the ladies of the Church. On the morning of the 20th we had a special centennial celebration of the Holy Communion. One permanent feature of the centenary is a tablet in memory of the Rectors who served in the Church during the first century of its history. This tablet is a beautiful piece of work, done by J. & J. D. Howe, St. John. It is made of quartered oak and has carved on the face of it a Latin cross and the names of the six Rectors, three on each side of the cross. The tablet has been put in a conspicuous place in the Church and is a great ornament.

Much of the great success of our centennial is due to Rev. W. O. Raymond and Mr. Ira Cornwall, who labored indefatigably to make it a memorable day.

During the year the Church has been re-painted on the outside;  $\varepsilon$  much-needed horse shed, 41x20, was built, and a long talked-of ventilator was purchased and placed in the roof.

Fifty dollars worth of books have been added to our Sunday-school library.

Considering that almost all the money for ecclesiastical purposes has to be supplied by the Church people in the little village of Gagetown, I think the above is a record not wholly unworthy of the centennial year.

Our Sunday-school is in a flourishing state. There has been quite an addition made to the roll this summer. One great obstacle to its success, however, is a lack of competent and regular teachers. Our thanks are due to Miss Frances M. Hamilton, of St. John, who, during her six months stay here, was a devoted worker in the Sunday-school, and also helped us in many other good works. No one has as yet been persuaded to take her place permanently. The fields are already white to harvest, but the labourers are few.

## GREENWICH - REV. D. W. PICKETT, M.A.

During the past year the usual services have been regularly held in both churches with but few exceptions. The average attendance and collections have been larger than before, notwithstanding the continued removal of younger members of the congregation to other places. Since last Advent a third service has been held every Sunday in the Sunday-school room at Round Hill with an attendance very little below that of the churches. At Speight Settlement the school-house is opened for service on alternate Fridays, where a few are found willing to leave for an hour the labours of the field to join in the public worship of God.

The register shows that there have been twenty baptisms — thirteen infants and seven adults — five marriages and ten burials.

In addition to the sum raised to meet the current expenses of the Church in the Parish, contributions have been forwarded to the Parochial Missions to the Jews Fund, to the Synod Contingent Fund, to the Bishop of Newfoundland, the S. P. G. and the D. F. M.

We desire to render our thanks to the Young Women's Guild of Trinity Church, St. John, for a very handsome donation of books sent to our Sunday-school last Christmastide.

## HAMPTON-REV. WM. BURNS.

It is always pleasant to report the bright side of our Parish life, but a faithful report should give an account of both sides. We have had a busy year and have tried to make the work move along satisfactorily. It has been a difficult task, owing to the number of places of worship in the Parish. There is great need of concentration in the Parish in order to make the work tell more effectively.

The measure of the working of the spirit we leave to God. We neither report nor judge by any man's standard. We rest our hope in the Lord that He will bless the seed sown according to His will.

We have had three services every Sunday during the year, and a weekly week-day service. Our baptisms numbered nineteen, marriages one and burials ten. Holy Communion has been celebrated twenty-three times with an average attendance of about forty communicants.

The Woman's Aid Society of Hampton Village and the Sewing Circle of Hampton Station have been working steadily during the year to reduce the debt on the Chapels in the respective places.

We have three Sunday-schools which are doing very well under an efficient staff of thirteen teachers, rep

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Much other work has been done which it is impossible to report definitely.

Contributions to D. C. S. objects amount to \$64.50, and to other objects outside the Parish, \$24.20.

Sixteen candidates have been prepared for confirmation, but his Lordship the Bishop is unable to visit us until October.

## HARDWICKE – REV. WM. J. WILKINSON, M. A.

In delivering my report to the Society I must first of all express my thankfulness to Almighty God for giving me health and strength to carry on my work during the year.

The extensive repairs upon the outside of the Parish Church were finally completed last autumn, and this historic Church now stands upon a good, solid foundation, and besides having a new roof and being re-shingled, it has received two coats of paint, and now presents a bandsome appearance, as far as the outside is concerned. I wish I could say the same as regards the inside, but I hope that · before long the congregation will be able to make this sound and beautiful in every respect, as we would all wish to see the interior of God's house. Since I presented my last report, we have lost two of our members by death, and several have left the Parish for the United States, including one who has for many years been a regular contributor to the Society, viz.: Charles Anthony. It is cheering and encouraging to hear from some of the young people who have left us, that they have not forgotten the teaching which they had received, but are regular communicants in their new homes.

Several new names have been added to the communicants' roll since last July, but on account of the removals referred to, the number of communicants is about the same as last year. I have a good number of candidates for confirmation whom I have been preparing for some time, and whom I hope to present to the Bishop as soon as he can visit our Parish. I have carried on the work in much the same way as in former years. Owing to the circumstances of the Parish, we have not as yet been able to form many parochial organizations. The Ladies at Bay du Vin, who are only able to meet at the Rectory at certain seasons of the year, by their zeal and perseverance, realized from the sale of their work, and from a picnic which was held at Bay du Vin, about \$140.00, and \$40.00 was also raised in the winter, which amounts were placed to the credit of the repairs on the church account. They have now a lot of work on hard, and I believe they are contemplating another sale shortly. I catechize the children once a month at one or two centres of my work, and I endeavour to make up for the difficulty of regular Sunday-school work by detaining the children for a few moments after service, and by catechizing them in the school after hours and at their homes. We have a Sunday-school at Bay du Vin, which is at present taught by Mrs. Wilkinson and Miss Nellie Williston.

I have tried my best to explain to my parishioners the position of the Church in the Diocese with regard to finances, and to urge them, both publicly and individually, to give as liberally as possible in order that they may continue to enjoy the Church privileges which they at present possess. In several individual instances, my appeal has been listened to, and persons have been induced to increase their contribution; but I find that although I do my best in bringing the matter before the people, yet the sum total of the contributions remains about the same each year; for the increase in individual cases is counterbalanced not only by the death and removal of old subscribers, but by those who fail altogether in their duty in this respect.

The appeals from the Foreign and Domestic Missionary Association of the Church in Canada were read, and responded to by the people, and also the Bishop's circular on behalf of the Bishop of Newfoundland Fund.

I cannot conclude without referring to the many acts of kindness which I frequently receive at the hands of the people. Last winter many of the men, with their horses, brought the greater part of my wood to the Rectory, and others have very kindly driven me to my different stations on Sunday, and in other ways have assisted me in my work.

## JOHNSTON - REV. C. P. HANINGTON, B. A.

There is little to report from this Parish this year. We move on our way quietly, with much to make us anxious, and also much to give us encouragement. The services have been kept up regularly throughout the past year, and have been well attended. Since July 1st, of last year, 26 have entered the Church by baptism. Several of our prominent

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vear. We anxious, vices have and have 6 have enprominent members have departed from us, being called into the unseen world. We may name three, whom we shall miss not a little. Richard Pearson, of English Settlement; John Crawford, Sr., of Goshen; and Mrs. Charles Cody, from the Lake. The latter will be especially missed by very many, including the Missionary. She ever took a deep and active interest in the welfare of the Church in the Parish, and was ever distinguished for her sincere and unostentatious piety and love for her Lord, and for her kindness of heart and hospitality. After a tedious and painful illness, she was taken to rest during holy week, and was buried, all that was mortal of her, on Easter Sunday.

We can report but little progress in connection with our new Church at Bagdad. The frame has been raised, and has been boarded in : all the work being given free of charge by friends interested. We have some money on hand with which to continue the work ; but would like very much to be able to add \$100.00 to our present sum. This will enable us to complete the exterior, and then we shall at once begin to use the building for services ; as for the interior, we must put up with its roughness for some years to come, probably.

It is with difficulty that we raise the sum of money required from us. The population of the Parish has rather decreased than increased: perhaps it may be said to be at a stand still—deaths and departures about balancing births; and the people mostly poor; so that we may be regarded as having reached our limit of assessment, as far as we can judge from the present state of things.

There are two prosperous Sunday-schools—one at English Settlement, of which Mr. T. Heavyside Pearson has been for years the faithful and diligent superintendent; the other, at the Lake, carried on by the Misses Cody, and which has been larger the past year than ever before. The other Sundayschools are not quite so satisfactory—lack of teachers being the cause.

The new Church at the Rapids has helped our services there very much; and things are moving in that section of the Parish more satisfactorily than formerly. Very much is due to Mr. John Ingledew, for his active interest and his readiness to assist in Church work to the best of his ability.

Because we cannot speak of great doings in our Parish, or of remarkable occurrences, does not cause us uneasiness. There is a saying quoted approvingly by Carlyle in his "French Revolution," that "happy are the people whose annals are tiresome." In this aphorism, says Carlyle, there is some reason; for "the event, the thing which can be spoken of and recorded, is it not in all cases, some disruption, some solution of continuity?" And then he adds, "stillest perseverance were our blessedness: not dislocation and alteration—could they be avoided." We trust, then, that because our annals are tiresome,"—it may be "vacant"—yet, that this is a sign, not of apathy and atrophy, but of health and true vitality.

## KINGSCLEAR - REV. H. MONTGOMERY, M. A.

The report from this Mission is not as encouraging as one could wish for, chiefly owing to the fact that the Church population within the past year has sadly been decreased. Three Church families have removed from the Parish since my last report, not to say anything of individual souls who have gone away to other parts of the Province or Dominion, to make new homes for themselves.

I have also to record the death, by a terrible accident, of one of our most energetic and enterprising parishioners-the late Mr. Chas. Murray-a man universally esteemed and respected in the Parish. All these losses effect us very seriously, not only in the way of subscriptions, but in the ordinary work of the Church. The outlook at present is not bright; but we cannot always have sunshine, and can only look forward in hope for the clouds to be dispelled. Apart from the depopulation of the Parish, the Church is as strong as ever; and as is the case in every Parish, there are a faithful few who are doing their best for the Church's progress and welfare. There are a few bright spots, however, which must be remembered in the records of another year. A confirmation class of seven male and six female candidates were presented on Palm Sunday to His Lordship the Bishop, for the sacred rite of "laying on of hands;" most of whom have become regular communicants. We have also received the gift of a bell for St. Mark's Church, Upper Kingsclear, presented by Mrs. Maunsell, of Fredericton, and other kind friends who have also undertaken to have a new bell turret built, and the bell put in place at their own expense. It is chiefly owing to Mrs. Mauusell's kind interest in the Parish that this generous gift and work has been given us. Nor must I forget to mention that the parishioners in a most substantial manner gave their parson a token of their good will and kindliest feelings at Christmas, by replenishing an almost empty larder-filling it

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We look forward in hope for a brighter future for the Parish—trusting only in Him who doeth all things well, and in whose hands we leave the result.

## KINGSTON - REV. H. S. WAINWRIGHT, B. A.

The annual report from the Parish of Kingston I will endeavour to make as brief as possible. A glance at the "return" to the 1st May, 1893, shows that the Sunday services have been kept up with remarkable regularity, with one or two breaks, owing to inclement storms and snow-piled roads of last winter.

With the valuable aid of my friend and brother, the Rev. D. I. Wetmore, during the year past, there were held in the four Churches, 201 Sunday services; of which 47 were taken by him. He has also been holding fortnightly services just outside the Parish limits in the Parish of Westfield—twenty in all—making altogether for the year past, 221.

The attendance at all the services has been good; though I regret to say that there are many who do not avail themselves, as they certainly ought to do, of the blessed privilege of worshipping God in the midst of the congregation. But this, I fear, is an evil not confined to Kingston alone. With respect to Sunday-school work: This most necessary feature in church work, for very many reasons, is not as satisfactory as I should like to see it. The school at Clifton, however, is doing good work; the teachers and scholars, living near at hand, are able to attend without any inconvenience. This is an essential feature in successful work. We hope to be able to give a more promising report of the school in Kingston next year.

During the year, another memorial in the shape of a Font has been placed in All Saint's Church, a special children's service being held on the occasion. I might mention, as being somewhat interesting, that the first child baptized therein, was born on the natal day of her in whose memory the Font was given.

Last year also, St. James' Church was painted, mainly through the exertions of the ladies of that Church, and now presents a very creditable appearance. The other Churches are in a fair condition; and I hope will require no extensive repairs for some time to come. A new fence, however, is very much needed around Trinity Church burial ground.

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Immediately after the great fire in St. John's, Newfoundland, a special appeal was made in three of the Churches, in aid of the fund for re-building the Cathedral. All Saints' Guild, by three of its members, collected from

## LUDLOW AND BLISSFIELD-REV. H. MONT-GOMERY, M. A.

There is not so much of interest to report from this Mission as in the few years past, when Ludlow was known as a neglected and deserted Mission of this Society. There is nothing new or startling beyond the ordinary report from well established missions since the work in Ludlow and Blissfield, so far as your Missionary is able to carry on that work, has now become settled in the track of regular routine work, similar to that in other country Parishes. We have no more new Churches to build in the Mission at present. The third one usually known as the Mission Church at Carrolls, is not yet completed, and will require about \$100.00 to finish But inasmuch as the Diocesan Church, upon and furnish. the application of the late Rev. James Hudson, Missionary on the Miramichi, made a grant of £15, or \$60 Canadian currency, according to the reckoning of a pound in those days, for the purpose of building a Church; and inasmuch as the pe will A new Church vfoundches, in Saints'

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grant has never been paid, owing to the fact that it never was called for, we hope that now the Church built near the spot where the late Mr. Hudson proposed building the Church for which he asked for this grant, that the Society will not consider the claim to that grant outlawed or in anyway forfeited, but will order it to be paid upon regular application for the same. No interest will be demanded. The people in the vicinity of this new Church building are as poor, if not more so than in the year 1847, when the grant was made, and their need of financial aid just as great. And as the sum will just about complete the Mission Church, we shall be very grateful in receiving the payment of this grant by your Treasurer. During the summer months, we were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. M. E. Mott, a divinity student, who did much efficient work for the Church in this Mission. I am thankful to say, that we have been able to secure the services of Mr. Mott for this summer also, which means more frequent services in the Churches, and useful help in the way of preparing candidates for confirmation. It is with great sorrow of heart that I have to report the sad loss sustained by the Church in Doaktown, in the death of Mrs. Robert Swim. In our last report, we congratulated ourselves upon the acquisition of such a useful and helpful member of the Church. But God, who knoweth best, did not permit her to remain long with us. During the short period of her life in Doaktown, she did a noble work for the Church. She gathered the children of the place together, and organized a Sunday-school, which she carried on most successfully. She lived the useful life; and her influence for the good of the Church will, no doubt, make itself felt for many years hence.

There are some earnest candidates being prepared for confirmation; one of whom is patiently awaiting that sacred rite -from the fact that for the past year, he has read every book he could get hold of in the way of Church history and doctrine, and is, as he says, a Churchman now solely from conviction, and deeply regrets that he was not one long ago. On the whole, we may report fair progress in the growth and life of the Church in this Mission. The one great need in the Mission is a resident Clergyman who can give more time and attention to the work than it is possible for me to do. We are truly thankful to the Great Head of the Church for the success and good results with which He has blessed our feeble efforts in the Mission; and to Him alone be all the praise and the glory.

## MAUGERVILLE AND BURTON — REV. HORACE E. DIBBLEE, M. A.

I have little of a special character to report this year concerning the work of the Church in these Parishes.

It must not be inferred, however, that we have passed through a year of inactivity. Such is not the case. More services have been held during the year than previously; while the average attendance has been somewhat increased. The total offertory fund is also considerably in excess of that of the last few years.

There has been an increase of 10 per cent. in the number of celebrations of the Holy Eucharist; the rule now being a celebration upon every Sunday after Matins; and we look forward, hopefully, to the time in the near future, when even in these country districts, every Holy Day in the year may be fittingly observed by a celebration. I may add, that it is a matter of no little encouragement to me, that with the increased number of celebrations, there has been a proportionate increase in the number of communions made—there being 123 more than during the previous year.

From a material point of view, it is my privilege to report most encouragingly. Upwards of \$75.00 have been expended in restoring the Mangerville Rectory. St. John's Church, Oromocto, has been newly painted, and also re-roofed; while very shortly, at the expense of the Burton Branch of the Women's Aid Society, the old wooden platform at the entrance to the Church will be replaced by free-stone steps. Speaking for the congregation of St. John's Church, as for myself, I wish to put on record our fullest sense of gratitude to Mrs. Shuttleworth, for her generosity in defraying all the expenses incurred in painting and re-roofing the Church.

We also gratefully acknowledge three very beautiful pulpit banners; two (red and violet)—the gift of Miss Margaret Jaffrey; and another (white), the gift of Mrs. Harrison Kinnear.

To Mrs. George Currie, gratitude is due for her gift of a handsome altar service book for St. Paul's Church, Burton. Personally, I again have cause to be very grateful to my parishioners and friends for a kindly feeling towards me which has been manifested in a very certain and taugible way.

All, however, has not been sunshine with us; great clouds of sorrow have gathered about us, as now and again some of the "tried and true" have fallen in our ranks. yes ma res des an up Sh

Wilmot, for more than twenty years the efficient Vestry Clerk of Burton—a loyal Churchman and a beloved friend—has entered into the Church at rest. The Church in Maugerville sustains a severe loss in the death of  $M^r$  D. A. Sterling, for many long years a zealous and c size member. And s in gain, we have been called upon to lame... the removal of an carnest Churchman—James Shields—who after a period of great suffering, was taken to his rest.

Our contributions to the General Purpose Fund will equal, it is hoped, those of last year.

## MONCTON - REV. E. B. HOOPER, B. A.

I am happy in being able to report that the year gone by has been one on which we can look back with much thankfulness for the many signs of church activity and progress granted to us.

Progress may be seen both in the material and spiritual work of the Church.

To speak first of things spiritual, I have to report :

1st.—That the Sunday congregations are uniformly good, and often tax to the utmost the seating capacity of the Church.

2nd.—The number of communicants has most satisfactorily increased. At our last Easter Festival, no less than 127 persons communicated; this being the largest number in one day in the history of the Parish.

On November 14th, last, the Bishop of the Diocese administered the rite of confirmation to 16 candidates, 8 males and 8 females—nearly all of whom have become communicants. These things I know are merely indications of a healthy progress in the spiritual life of the Church. But they are among the only signs of which men may judge; and as such I thankfully record them, praying that those things which are only open to the All-Seeing Eye may correspond, in some measure, with the good indications open to the judgment of man. Passing on to consider the aspect of material affairs in the Parish, I have to report the satisfaction felt by every member of the congregation when the Church Wardens reported a few weeks ago, that the debt which has been hanging like a heavy and wearying burden over the Parish for several years has at length been entirely obliterated. This happy condition was attained by the general and voluntary liberality of the people, and by the persistent and successful efforts of the

guild of Willing Workers. In addition to this, I am happy to may that the large, blotched, and unsightly window, which was the one thing that marred our otherwise beautiful Church, has been taken out and replaced by a window, equally large, of beantiful stained glass. The work was done by Spence & We in Moncton are beginning to realize Sons, of Montreal. that it is now unnecessary for Canadian Churchmen to go to the States or even to the Motherland, when we desire to adorn and beautify God's sanctuaries; for nearly every want can be supplied, and well supplied, by the manufacturers of our Dominion. Following this principle, we had a pipe organ built by F. A. Peters, of St. John, and it has proved satisfactory in every respect. In September next, the last payment of \$50.00 will be due, and I understand that there are sufficient outstanding subscriptions to pay it.

The debt on the Rectory is also a thing of the past. The **subscription** list for the general purposes of the D. C. S., is, **I regret**, not completed. I cannot venture to state what the **subscriptions** will amount to. While the strain upon our people **to accomplish** what I have reported has been great, 1 yet have **a food** hope that neither the ability nor the will to give in **support** of dear Mother Church have yet been exhausted.

Before closing, I would mention the organization of a Corps of Cadets in connection with the Sunday-school. This organization has proved most successful—46 boys are enrolled. They are provided with a neat uniform, and meet for drill once a week. We are deeply indebted to Lieutenant W. D. Forster, who has taken charge of the Cadets, and is most prinstaking in his work with them.

My report is, I am aware, of a cheerful character, I do not, however, wish it to be inferred that we have nothing to disconrage and make us anxious. I have put the best side foremost; because I feel that the discouragements are those which are the lot of every priest, and would be of no service or interest if mentioned.

## NEWCASTLE AND NELSON-REV. J. H. S. SWEET.

My annual report to your venerable Society must thus year be necessarily a short one and of a general nature. My absence in England during the past twelve months precluder me from entering into the many details of parochial work which your Society naturally looks for in the report of its missionaries. In a general way, however, I am in a position to give a most satisfactory and encouraging report of the work carried on in the Mission during my prolonged absence in the mother country. My very able locum tenens, the Rev. W. Herbert Smythe, of the Diocese of Ontario, carried out my usual routine of services in a very conscientious and acceptable manner. My greatest comfort when away was the thought that I had left the Mission in such able hands. Since my return this impression has been confirmed by what I hear on all sides. By his general interest in the Parish, by his love and courtesy, by his genial and social qualities. ar well as by his able ministrations in the churches, he succeeded in endearing himself to all classes of the people. I trust, and have every confidence in feeling, that his faithful ministrations have been blessed to many souls. I owe him a deep debt of gratitude for all he has done for the Mission under my charge.

The Mission, however, has suffered from death to an almost irreparable degree during the past twelve months. One after another has gone away; and in this, my first report. after her death, it would ill become me to omit all mention of one to whom the Parish of Newcastle owes so much. refer to Mrs. Thomas Maltby. She fell asleep after many years sickness a few weeks before my return. In days gome by she was a very "mother in Israel," always ready and willing to go to the succour of any in their hour of trial and sorrow. Whenever sickness and bereavement entered the house of a neighbour, the first thought was always to sead for Mrs. Maltby, and no one ever went in vain by day or night. In this respect, I owe very much to her myself. She was a faithful and true Church woman, and, when in health, was never absent from her place in St. Andrew's Church, either in the pew or at the Holy Table. She dearly loved the sweet little Church which she had seen grow up under the fostering care of the lamented Father Hudson. One of her greatest regrets during her long illness was the enforced absence from the public services of the Church. She never

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do g to side hose vice omitted, however, to say over the psalms and service for each day. In the early days of the Church in this Parish she was ever foremost in the collecting of money for Church work. She has gone to her reward, and there are many who call her blessed. A report such as this would be incomplete without mention of the good deeds which she did.

Neither can I close this report without allusion to yet another great loss which the Church has sustained in the death of Mr. Charles Sargeant, of Chatham Head. Though not actually living in the Parish, he was a very regular attendant at our services and a most valued member of the St. Andrew's choir. He will be sadly missed by all, and by none more than by myself. He was always ready to respond to any appeal made to him in behalf of the work of the Church in the Mission. He assisted me to a very large extent in the building of St. Mark's Church, Nelson. I never remember appealing to him for help and being refused. More than this, one always felt that what he gave, he gave cheerfully and ungrudingly. He was one of those men-good all round-whom the Church can ill spare. He was "a good man," and nothing more need be said. God saw he was ready to go and He took him. May "the God of all comfort" cheer up the sad hearts who are left behind.

Other deaths, too, have occurred, but these two seem to call for special mention, as to them both the Church owes very much.

In conclusion, I wish to express my gratitude to God for all His mercies to me and mine during the past year, and for restoring me once more to my dear people, renewed in body and mind. May my restored strength be spent in faithful and conscientious ministrations among the flock committed to my charge.

## NEW DENMARK – REV. N. M. HANSEN.

The year since my last report has been a year of great blessings, but also a year of trials.

On the 18th of October, His Lordship Bishop Kingdon held his first confirmation in New Denmark—at the same time consecrated our graveyard. Twenty-five young persons were confirmed. The Church was crowded, and 97 partook in Holy Communion, with a few exceptions all Danes. Shortly after, the ladies made an effort to raise money for a Chu

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gdon same rsons took anes. for a Church bell, and now it hangs in its place calling the people to the house of the Lord. The ladies intended to paint the Church, too, but were disappointed, as the bell took more funds than was expected; therefore we were pleasantly surprised by receiving a letter from Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Wilmot, Fredericton, offering to paint and decorate St. Ansgar's Church in "*Memorial of our late beloved Bishop*." The Church is finished now outside, and is beautiful to look upon; the inside will be still more beautiful, and will be finished in a few days—all at a cost of \$228.00. This was to us a great joy and blessing.

The trials I referred to were some party strife and quarrels which caused some falling off in Church attendance, and probably will result in the emigration of some of the best Church people to Portland, Maine, and thus weaken the Church here. Moreover my health has failed greatly of late, and if not soon there is a change for the better, I will be compelled to retire.

I hope that this good example set by Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Wilmot will be followed by many Churchmen of means, benefiting poor Missions throughout the Diocese; and I have no doubt that the Memorial in New Denmark will strengthen the Church here, which at present is much needed.

## NORTON — REV. E. A. WARNEFORD.

In the last year there has been nothing of any import to relate. The services have been duly administered, and the congregations pretty much as usual, the average attendance at each service having been about 50.

I very much regret to say that early in the year we lost one of the best of our few parishioners—Mrs. Oscar Wetmore, who was ever ready in all good works; not only an irreparable loss to her own family, but to the neighbourhood in which she lived, for she was ready at all times to lend a helping hand in any thing needed.

The Sunday-schools have been well attended : one under the supervision of Mr. Geo. Raymond, the other under that of Miss M. Fairweather.

## PETERSVILLE – REV. W. B. ARMSTRONG, M. A.

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During the past year the usual routine of Church work has gone on in this Parish. On Sunday, the 21st of August last, our Bishop visited us, confirming sixteen candidates — five at Petersville Church and eleven at Welsford. In the former Church a large congregation assembled, about 400 in number, and there were about 100 outside who were unable to find seats within. In the afternoon his Lordship gave a very practical address at Armstrong's Corner, on the 91st Psalm, which was much appreciated.

On the 21st of September we had a very successful pic-nic in the centre of the Parish, which was largely attended. The sum of \$171 was made, clear of all expenses. This sum was equally divided between the Church, which needed some painting and repairs, and the rectory. The latter building has been painted outside this year, and last year it was thoroughly painted within, so that it is now in good order.

Our congregations at Welsford are always good both in winter and summer. During the summer we have a number of visitors who, I am glad to say, always attend the services and help to swell our offertories. During the last year we have got a new Dominion organ, the greater part of which has been paid for, and which we find is a great help in our services. In the upper part of the Parish, where many of the families live at quite a distance from the Church, it is of course harder to maintain a regular attendance, the weather often proving a serious drawback.

Within the last three months I have been called to pass through the greatest loss that a man can sustain, namely, the loss of his beloved partner and help-meet in life. Such a loss only those can estimate who have passed through a similar affliction. Yet we may trust that light may shine even through this dark cloud, and that earthly affection may cling more to the unseen and unchanging One. Not the least benefit of such afflictions is the sympathy which is thereby gained for many hearts who are bowed and crushed by similar losses.

My parishioners, knowing the serious additional expenses which such a time of sickness and death involve, very kindly presented me with a purse of \$40, accompanied by a note conveying their warm sympathy for me in my great loss. Such expressions of kindly thoughtfulness are a great help to a Clergyman in his work, and tend to draw closer the bond that unites Pastor and people.

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## PETITCODIAC - REV. CHAS. H. FULLERTON, B.A.

After a year's work in this Mission I find that it contains very few families that may rightly be termed Church.

Our Church people are scattered over a large tract of country which renders Parish work laborious and oftentimes unsatisfactory.

Divine service is held every Sunday in the Parish Church, Petitcodiac, and in the outlying churches every alternate Sunday. The Holy Communion is administered once a month in each of the four churches of the Missiou.

I cannot give encouraging reports of the attendance at the services. The congregations as a general rule are small, but I am thankful to say that all who are really Churchmen are quite punctual in their attendance.

There is much that tends to discourage me in my work, but realizing, as I humbly do, that I am doing God's work as a Priest of His Holy Church, I know that all I am endeavouring to do is not in vain in the Lord.

Though I have not great results of Mission work to report to you, I trust that I have succeeded in keeping the torch of Divine truth burning in the hearts of the few Churchmen committed to my pastoral care.

The Church has lost largely during the past few years from removals to other places, and at the present time the outlook for an increase in the number of Church families is not of a very promising nature.

I am compelled to mourn the fact that the young people, outside the Parish Church. have not as yet had the advantage of good training in the Sunday-school, but I hope in time to have schools established in every part of the Parish. The great difficulty I find is to get teachers to carry on the work. I regret exceedingly that it is utterly impossible for me to conduct them myself — a work which I would gladly engage in if I had not so many services every Sunday and long drives as well.

In several of our churches there is great lack of musical talent, and in one the greater part of the time we have had no organist, and so no choir.

I am thankful, however, that I can report that the subscription to the D. C. S. has so far been quite promptly paid. My people have shown me much kindness, for I was very generously remembered by them at the New Year.

I think they are doing nobly in the matter of supporting

their Clergyman, since very few of them are well off in this world's goods.

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I cannot close without mentioning that the Church people at Havelock, as well as myself, owe a debt of gratitude to Mrs. Medley, who provided us with a beautiful red frontal and antependium, as well as hangings of the same colour for pulpit and lectern.

## RICHIBUCTO AND KINGSTON-REV. H. HACKENLEY

I have nothing of special interest to report in connection with the work of this Parish. Services have been held with regularity with a few exceptions, when the roads were almost impassable. On the 9th of November, 1892, we had a very interesting confirmation service, when 16 males and 22 females were confirmed. I hope to be able to commence another confirmation class shortly. During the year there have been 16 baptized, (2 of whom were adults), 3 marriages, and 13 burials.

## RICHMOND – REV. A. W. TEED, M. A.

All matters brought forward at the Easter Monday meeting were found to be in a satisfactory state, and all were much pleased and took fresh courage for the future.

Mrs. Medley has most kindly presented to St. Paul's Church an altar-cloth and frontal, for which the congregation is very thankful. An antependium for the lectern has been purchased, and these furnishings have added much to the interior of the Church.

The Sunday and week-day services have been held with regularity. I can report a large increase in the numbers attending the Sunday-school, which is again under the superintendence of Mr. H. N. Jameson, who is assisted by three other teachers.

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## SACKVILLE - REV. C. F. WIGGINS, B. A

Regretting that I am unable to be present to make my report in person, I write a line just to say that we are still in existence as a Parish, although the struggle at times seems of doubtful issue. We have suffered severe losses during the year in the way of removals diminishing our little band (of 250 all told) more and more. We were cheered and revived in heart by a visit from our Bishop for the purpose of confirmation. His Lordship was good enough to select Sunday, 11th of June, for his visit, and although there were only four candidates presented, the service was most impressive and enjoyed by a large congregation. Our contributions to the D. C. S. will be up to the standard of last year—\$35.00.

# ST. ANDREWS AND CHAMCOOK – REV. CANON KETCHUM, D.D.

## ST. DAVID – REV. J. W. MILLIDGE.

The past season was one of severe strain financially in this Mission. The crops were poor, the hay crop especially short, the winter very cold, and in consequence many of our farmers were obliged to purchase hay this spring when its price was The young men found very little employment and high. were compelled to go to the United States in large numbers. Nevertheless, something has been done towards keeping our churches in repair. A new foundation wall of very excellent stone has been placed under Christ Church, St. Patrick. The work was done under the supervision of our Churchwarden, Mr. J. H. Dyer, in a very creditable manner. The new church at Beaconsfield is now finished so far as the joiner work is concerned, but it requires oiling and varnishing. A chancel carpet, stove, and other furnishings are much needed. The work so far is all paid for, our invariable rule being never to attempt anything unless the money is on hand to pay the bills.

# SAINT GEORGE AND PENNFIELD — REV. RANALD E. SMITH, M. A.

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There is nothing special to report from this Mission for the past year. 'The attendance at both Churches has been very good. During the summer months the Church at Pennfield is well filled. Last Christmas the members of Christ's Church, Pennfield, presented me with a very handsome fur coat, which protected me from the cold during the winter. I may say there is an increased interest in both Churches at the present time.

The Sunday-schools are doing a good work. Lately, two male members have been taking an active part in St. Mark's Sunday-school, St. George, and have encouraged us very much. Our communicants' list is large in proportion to the congregations, and we have a very good attendance on Friday evening, when we have a regular service, consisting of litany, hymns, and an exposition of the second lesson for the evening. The attendance at this service is very good. Altogether the Church prospers in this Mission. Our contributions will be at the least the sum required by the Society.

# ST. MARTINS-REV. W. LEB. McKIEL, B. A.

The work in this Mission has been conducted on the same lines as previously mentioned, with some slight alterations. The rule is—three services every Sunday in Holy Trinity Church, St. Martins, and in addition a fourth service in the afternoon on two Sundays in the month at two of the stations in the country. There are also two week-day services in every month at two of the stations, and every Friday in the Parish Church. A new station has been opened at Wood Lake. There is a weekly celebration of the Holy Eucharist, and also on all the Holy days throughout the year. The Sundayschool is in a flourishing condition; and the zeal and faithfulness of all the teachers is worthy of all praise. A new library is much needed.

The Sanctuary of Holy Trinity Church has been much improved by the voluntary offering of Mrs. Arthur Foster who gave two handsome and suitable chairs. The chairs were made to order in St. John, and are of ash and black walnut, upholstered in crimson plush—thus harmonizing with the wood of the altar, etc.

We hope that others may be stimulated to make similar offerings.

The Rector will gladly make known our needs to any one who desires to make an offering to God's House, and will thankfully acknowledge any gift.

In the statistical report on another page, will be found the summary of the work during the year.

# ST. MARY - REV. W. O. RAYMOND, M. A.

Contributions will amount to over \$100.

# ST. STEPHEN — REV. O. S. NEWNHAM.

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The work of the Church in the Parish of St. Stephen has gone steadily on during the year with but little interruption. The services have been regularly conducted, and the Sundayschools regularly held. The Mite Society still continues its good work. A Young Women's Guild has been formed since last year with a good membership. We are talking just now of organizing a chapter of the "Brotherhood of St. Andrew" for the young men of the Parish.

In the spring of this year the Mite Society was able to sheathe the ceiling of the nave of the Parish Church with wood at a cost of over \$200. This work, which was greatly needed, has much improved the appearance of the church. We have been able to put in place another memorial window. This one to the memory of the late Mrs. Dowling.

His Lordship the Bishop visited the Parish after Easter of this year and administered the apostolic rite of confirmation. Twenty-one candidates were confirmed — twelve in the Parish Church, and nine in St. Peter's Chapel, Milltown. Nearly all of these have since become communicants.

When Church work was begun in Milltown a year or two ago, we had but three communicants in the congregation, one of whom has since been called to his rest. We have now twenty-five, nineteen of whom were present at an early celebration on Sunday morning last. We have now 120 communicants in the Parish. I have been fortunate in obtaining the services of Mr. C. N. Vroom as Superintendent of the Sunday-school in connection with the Parish Church. There is a steady increase in the attendance at this school, and also at the school in Milltown. From the Sunday-schools nearly \$30 was raised for the Society by Lenten Boxes. We hope to send to the General Purposes Fund of the Society an amount equal to that of last year — \$150.

# SPRINGFIELD - REV. A. J. CRESSWELL.

There is not much of special interest to report from this Mission. The usual routine of work has been done, and the regular services of the three Churches have been kept up with four celebrations of the Holy Communion every month.

On two of the Churches some repairs and improvements have been made this year.

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The Parish Church has been thoroughly painted, and the grey, weather-beaten building now looks very respectable in appearance. Next year (D. V.), we hope to put in new windows similar (in shape) to the chancel window.

At Belleisle Creek, SS. Simon and Jude's Church, has had a new roof. I am thankful to say, that the services at this Church are well attended and hearty,

The few families who attend St. Luke's Church, Norton Station, have been faithful in their attendance at public worship. A great improvement is perceptible in the responses and singing. We are fortunate in having a good organist in Master Ernest Lawson, who has also shown considerable interest in the weekly choir practices; while his mother kindly acts as our Superintendent in the Sundayschool.

We have three Sunday-schools which are in a fair condition, but I hold to the opinion that more children would attend if the parents would only take more interest in the moral culture and spiritual training of their children. We possess three good, active Superintendents.

Last autumn the ladies of Trinity Church started a branch of the Women's Aid Association, and regular meetings have been held in the Rectory. By means of sales of fancy work, etc., they have been enabled to accept the kind offer of Miss B. Scovil, of St. John, who generously offered us \$100, if we would collect a similar amount, which is to be called the "Endowment Fund."

During the year, I have had 15 baptisms, 11 burials, 4 marriages.

Among the departed are several staunch communicants, and one priest, the Rev. J. W. Hickson, M. A. He was appointed in November 1891 by the late Metropolitan to the Mission of Douglas and Bright, which he held nine months. In the early part of last summer his health began to fail. In July he decided (with the Bishop's consent) to go home to rest, hoping to be strong enough to return to his work in the autumn. But God ordered otherwise; for after four months' illness he was called to his true rest, dying December 6th. His report which was read before the General Committee last year, gives indication that he had—in the words of the Exhortation in "Ordering of Priests"—clearly determined by God's grace to give himself wholly to the office of the Priesthood; and although he has passed early to his rest, yet his work was earnest and held in affectionate remembrance among those to whom he ministered in holy things. R. I. P. Before ending this report, I desire to mention the many acts of kindness which have been shewn toward me by my parishioners.

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# SOUTHAMPTON AND QUEENSBURY — REV. SCOVIL NEALES, M. A.

If any one will read over the annual reports from this Mission for the last six years, he will have a pretty good idea of what the report for this year will contain-for the work here partakes of one character. There are in this Mission eleven stations where I hold regular services, which large number necessarily gives but very few services to each place in the month, and yet occasions a great amount of driving. In fact (although I know that in the present state of finances it would be useless to mention it) there is more than enough work here to keep two Clergymen busy. For though I now hold less than three services on a Sunday (with a drive ranging from 30 to 45 miles), yet in no one place can I have more than two services in the month; and to get over the long roads, one has to travel in this Mission, holding services and making sick and pastoral visits, which is very trying both physically, mentally, and spiritually. Of course, it sounds very large at the end of the year to say that one has travelled considerably over 5,000 miles in performing his pastoral work. But what does this mean. It simply means that your Missionary is simply leading the life of a stage-driver; and that during the time spent in covering the roads he can be doing nothing else. With regard to Sunday-school work, I regret that I cannot give as encouraging a report as I would like to. We have, however, a good Sunday-school in Temperance Vale, which is, I trust, doing excellent work. At Maple Ridge I have a substitute for a Sunday-school in the shape of a weekly Bible-class which is generally well attended. At Bear Island, the Church which we have been building for the last two years, has been in use since the beginning of January, and we hope before long to have it consecrated. In regard to the number of communicants in the Parish, the increase is something which is very cheering. Where six years ago the number of communicants returned was 29, now there are 103 enrolled.

STANLEY - REV. A. B. MURRAY, M. A.

Throughout the year the services in this Parish have been regularly conducted and well attended. In Lent special weekday services were held in St. Thomas' Church, at which stirring addresses were given by the brethren of Fredericton Deanery on certain distinctive features of the Church. These have done much in arousing an interest among the people. During the summer months of 1892, owing to my having the valuable assistance of Mr. P. M. Raymond to assist me as Lay Reader, the people of Tay Creek enjoyed weekly instead of the usual fortnightly services, and at Cross Creek. Williamsburg and Woodlands fortnightly services were held instead of monthly; also Maple Grove, which I usually serve on week days, had fortnightly Sunday services, and for the first time I was enabled to visit the Portage on Sunday to administer the Holy Communion.

The Sunday-schools are in a flourishing condition, though I regret to say on account of not having a well qualified superintendent the school at the Portage has been closed since Miss Bell's departure last year. Twenty-five dollars has been spent for library books for Sunday-school; and at about same cost Hymns Ancient and Modern, have been introduced in St. Thomas' Church.

The W. A. A. has sustained its interest, and during the year has received over \$140—to be applied to the building of the Church at Cross Creek. On Easter Monday, for the first time, the people were induced to assume the management of the finances of the Parish, and we have every hope that at next Easter Monday finances will be square, and that we will be able to meet our obligations more promptly than in the past.

I cannot close this report without reference to the loss we have sustained in the death of Thos. Douglass, Esq., who for over twenty-five years was Church Warden, and always afforded the people a noble example of a true and consistent Christian character.

### UPHAM AND HAMMOND - REV. S. J. HANFORD, B. A.

I am thankful to report that, under the divine blessing, I have been able to carry on my work much as usual during the past year. I am free to own that I am quite willing,

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after more than forty-seven years' service, to give way to younger workers, were there any to take my place; but in the face of so many already vacant Parishes and Missions, I am content to go on, the Lord willing, as best 1 can.

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The work in the Parish of Hammond is not altogether satisfactory. The church some fifteen or sixteen miles distant, and stations twenty-two and ten miles, from the parsonage, render some change necessary, and I cannot but think it must come. Just of late circumstances have been more favourable, yet I am not satisfied as matters stand. In fact, were the church building removed from any cause, it would not be replaced.

So far as I can see, there is no Mission or Parish that has been less directly benefited, and, at the same time, more injured, by the running of the I. C. R. than this one that I now occupy. The lumbering business gave employment to the people formerly; but as this order of things is fast passing away, and there is nothing from an agricultural point of view to keep the people here, nor, so far, anything to bring in any one to fill the vacancies, no wonder that now, after more than thirty-three years' occupation, we are not as well off as when I was sent to this Mission.

Perhaps I am repeating only what others have to tell; but it is in no complaining or dissatisfied spirit that I write, but simply in order that some proper idea may be formed as to the true position of this Mission.

It is plain sooner or later that here, as elsewhere, a rearrangement of the bounds and limits will be absolutely necessary.

It would be a formidable undertaking, but I cannot see how it can be avoided. My collections for D. C. S. are not quite completed.

Returns for last year as follows: baptisms, 12; marriages, 2; burials, 18. Contributions, total, say \$708.64.

# VICTORIA - REV. R. W. HUDGELI.

On July 1st, 1891, I was appointed to the Parish of Victoria by our late beloved Diocesan Bishop Medley. During the two years that have just terminated, seventeen persons have been received into the congregation of Christ's flock by the sacrament of holy baptism, and four persons have been joined together in the holy estate of matrimony. way to ; but in ssions, I

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The services of the Church have been duly and regularly performed, and have been well attended, and until the 5th of February last, weekly celebrations of the holy communion were held.

It is my painful duty to record the loss of the beautiful church of St. Jude by fire on the morning of Sunday, February 5th. The night preceding the calamity was a cold and stormy one, and it was with much difficulty that the sexton succeeded in getting the temperature sufficiently high to hold the usual eucharistic service at 8 a.m. It is generally supposed that one or more of the bricks in the chimney became dislodged by the rocking of the church, and that the sparks escaped therefrom to the roof. The fire was first discovered by a neighbour about 10 a.m., and by 11 a.m., the time for matins, the sacred edifice was one mass of blaze. The church was insured for \$2,200.

Circumstances have since transpired to make it desirable for me to resign this Parish, yet during the two years of my rectorship I have conscientiously striven to do my duty to God, to man, and to the Holy Church, to the best of my ability and so far as the circumstances of the case permitted.

Special offerings and donations have been made in this Parish towards the funds of the Diocesan Church Society and other Church purposes.

It is confidently hoped, that in view of the serious decrease in the Church population through exodus, and our chronic state of financial depression, the Society will not increase our assessment.

#### WESTMORLAND - REV. D. M. BLISS, B. A.

Contributions this year amount to \$26.80 for the general purposes of the Society, being slightly in excess of the amount reported last year.

#### WICKLOW – REV. J. E. FLEWELLING.

Services have been regularly held at the two Churches and three stations during the year, with one month's exception, due to illness of the Rector.

The ladies of Sewing Guild at Centreville have succeeded in their laudable efforts of procuring a furnace for St. James' Church, which has been put in position and gives general satisfaction. Some internal improvements have been made in St. Barnabas' Church. The services at East Florenceville continue to be bright and hearty. The friends there have placed their Rector under deep obligation to them by their handsome donation to him on June 22nd. The people in other parts of the Mission, particularly Centreville, have donated various sums to their Rector in addition to his stipend, so that it may be reported that *financially* this has been the most flourishing year since the advent of the Rector eighteen years ago. And spiritually we trust the Mission is no worse off.

On the 19th of June the Bishop visited this Mission and confirmed eleven at Greenfield—one adult being baptized; thirteen at Centreville—three adults being baptized; three at East Florenceville; the Bishop very kindly confirmed one sick person at her home, making in all twenty-eight. The communion roll has been largely increased, more having communicated the past year than in any previous year. The three Sunday-schools are well attended, and the Rector is rejoiced that good work is being done by his willing workers.

During the year two warm friends of the Rector and willing abettors have crossed the river " and are not."

Mrs. Margaret Ritchie, of Grcenfield, was ever a warm supporter of the Church, a yearly subscriber to the Society's funds, and a regular communicant of the Church since her confirmation seventeen years ago. The Rector's heart was pained when he was called upon to commit her body to the grave.

James G. Balloch, of Centreville, who died in May, was a liberal supporter of the work of the Church in all its branches, and was a Vestryman of St. James' Church since its consecration eight years ago. He will be greatly missed by the Rector and the Church. Canon Neales buried him in our little Churchyard on May 5th, his early and sudden demise being regretted by all.

## WOODSTOCK, WAKEFIELD AND NORTHAMPTON-REV. CANON NEALES, M. A.

Of the events of interest which have transpired the past year in this Mission, the first in importance though not in time, is the visitation of his Lordship the Bishop on the 18th of June, when twenty-three persons (fifteen males and eight females), received the holy rite of confirmation, to go forward, it

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he past not in he 18th d eight ward, it is hoped, to share the still higher privileges and blessings of membership in the Church.

Since November last, Mr. Elias W. Gardner, from the Diocese of Newfoundland, has been rendering very faithful and acceptable assistance in the Mission as Lay Reader, and we hope to have him with us for a still longer time.

At Epiphany a new Parish hall was completed and opened for use for Sunday-school and other parochial purposes.

St. Luke's Church has lately received a new coat of paint, all the materials having been generously given by W. F. Dibblee & Son.

Since October last the services at St. Mary's Church, Benton, have been taken chiefly by the Rev. C. A. S. Warneford, the majority of the congregation residing in his Parish, and the church being reached much more easily from Canterbury than Woodstock.

I am fortunate in having much grateful and willing help given in the Parish, especially by the younger members of the Church, which adds much joy to one's ministry and is one of the best evidences of the love for the Church in her children.

# WATERFORD AND ST. MARK'S — REV. ALLAN W. SMITHERS, B. A.

During the past year, notwithstanding many obstacles of a discouraging nature, the general work of the Church in these two Parishes has gone slowly but surely forward.

One of the most discouraging features of the work, is the steady decrease in population. Since my last report to the Society, five families have removed from the Mission, and a large number of our young people have left us to seek a livelihood in the United States. In the face of this numerical loss, it is not possible to report any notable progress, as decrease in population necessarily entails financial distress. It affords us, however, a kind of melancholy satisfaction to know, that while their departure is a distinct loss to us, they will prove a source of strength to the Church in their new homes. Having dwelt upon the dark side of the picture, I now gladly turn to the brighter side.

The communicants' roll, which I regard as the truest index to the spiritual condition of a Parish, is larger than ever before in the history of the Mission. On Easter-Day 93 communicants received the blessed sacrament of the body and

blood of our Lord, and the Easter offering reached the very creditable sum of \$50.00. The services of the church are well attended, and new Missions have been opened at Little Salmon River, Goose-creek, and at Church-side, Albert Co. A small band of candidates for confirmation constitute the first fruits of work attempted in Albert during the last few months. Our Sunday-schools are in a more satisfactory condition than last year, and it is with great thankfulness that I am able to report the organization and successful working of two more Sunday-schools-one at Lisson Settlement, and one in Walker's Settlement conducted by myself. The great drawback to this valuable auxiliary to Church work is the lack of properly trained teachers and the great need of new books for our libraries. By means of that much abused institution, the Waterford annual pic-nic, we have been able to reduce the debt on the Rectory to the amount of \$156.00; and we hope soon to be in a position to claim the \$100.00 grant from the funds of the Society. The Parish Church has received some much needed repairs, and has been further enriched by the gift of a brass memorial cross, and an Easter offering in the shape of a handsome brass altar desk.

The members of St. Margaret's Guild have met during the year with tolerable regularity, and have raised about \$25.00 toward the purchase of a bell for the Parish Church.

Of Jeffries' Corner there is not much of special interest to report.

The little Mission Room of St. Mark's has done nobly. Our people there raised during the year almost \$100.00, and have erected a fence about the old Church lot, at a cost of \$30.00.

The services are very well attended, and the Sunday-school is in a flourishing condition. We have a small amount of money on hand to be devoted towards the building of a chancel to the Church of All Saints, but for many reasons, chiefly financial, it has been determined to defer building operations until the spring, when the work will be pushed rapidly forward.

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# CONCLUSION.

To the foregoing reports it is needless to add many words. The record of the work of those engaged in the Home Mission field is again before the Society, and it is hoped it may be the means of impressing on the readers of the Annual Report the value of their labors.

In the introductory part of the Report, the Secretary alluded to the great loss sustained by the Society in the death of the late Metropolitan and first Bishop of the Diocese of Fredericton.

At the time of his decease he was by many years the senior of any of his Clergy. The only other worker in the ranks of the Clergy whose loss we are at this time called to lament is that of the *junior* member, the Rev. J. W. Hickson, whose labors in the now vacant Mission of Douglas and Bright gave such fair promise of being abundantly blessed.

The members of the Society assembled at this Annual Meeting will miss the kindly face of their dear brother, the Rev. Canon DeVeber, absent through illness. Appreciating his valuable services in the past as a most loyal supporter of the Society, as well as one of its Vice-presidents, all will unite in the earnest wish and prayer that his health and strength may be speedily restored.

# To the Lord Bishop of the Diocese and the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:

GENTLEMEN,— In the year 1854 the Rev. Thomas W. Robertson died suddenly, leaving his wife and family with little to support them.

Canon Scovil, of St. John, William Carman, Esq., of Fredericton, and myself, collected from the good people of St. John and Fredericton the sum of \$2,400 for them.

We invested the money, giving them the interest, and from time to time portions of the principal. In the year 1866 we gave the son, James F. Robertson— of the firm of Manchester, Robertson & Allison, \$1,000 for the purpose of establishing him in business. I may add that before his mother's death he returned this money to her.

We all know that he has been deservedly successful; and exhibiting that praiseworthy philanthropy so characteristic of the man, he has placed in my hands as the only surviving trustee the amount we collected, with the request that it be placed to the credit of the Widows and Orphans Special Fund, to be distributed according to the rules governing that fund.

He suggests that the name of any person receiving a donation from the fund be not published in the Report.

I hérewith enclose his cheque upon the Bank of New Brunswick for the amount named.





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# ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Thursday, July 6th, 1893.

The Anniversary meeting of the Society was held in the Church Hall at 8 p. m. this date, the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, President of the Society, in the Chair.

The following Vice-Presidents were present:

The Venerable, the Archdeacon. The Reverend Canon Ketchum, D. D. Wm. M. Jarvis, Esq. Geo. A. Schofield, Esq.

The Hall was well filled with a large and representative gathering of members of the Society.

Prayers.

The hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," was very heartily sung, the Rev. A. F. Burt presiding at the organ.

The Lord Bishop briefly addressed the Society, explaining the nature and object of the meeting.

On motion of the Secretary, seconded by Judge Hanington, it was

Resolved, That the Minutes of the last Anniversary meeting, as printed, be taken as read and confirmed.

It was moved by the Rev. Canon Ketchum, seconded by Hon. Judge Fraser :

That the following minute be entered upon the records of the Society :

"The past year is deeply marked in the history of this Society by the death on the 9th September of the most Reverend John Medley, D. D., the first Bishop of Fredericton, and at the time of his death Metropolitan of Canada. From the period of his arrival in this Diocese in June, 1845, the late Bishop ever took the most lively interest in the work and objects of this Society.

He afforded wise counsel in everything relating to its proceedings, and he contributed most generously to its funds. Never save in four instances, when absent on duty elsewhere, did he fail to attend the meetings of the Society.

In the chair as President, he was always most courteous, patient and impartial. Under his management, all party feeling was discouraged and the confidence of the members of the Church in the Society was extended and increased.

During the lengthened period in which he filled the office of President, his course met with the approval of the members of the Church. He was always ready to entertain proposals made at the meetings having in view the advancement of the interests of the Church, and when convinced of their importance, he gave them his hearty assent.

This meeting is assured that in rendering an expression of deepest sorrow for an irreparable loss, such an expression will be that of every member of this Society;

Further Resolved, That the Secretary of the Society be requested to present a copy of this minute to Mrs. Medley with an expression of deep sympathy on the part of this Society."

The motion on being put to the meeting was carried unanimously by a standing vote.

The Annual Report of the General Correctee was presented by the Secretary.

Moved by Hon. Judge Fraser, seconded by Rev. O. S. Newnham, and

Resolved, That the report now submitted be received and printed under the direction of the Executive Committee.

It was moved by the Reverend C. W. McCully, seconded by Mr. Wm. M. Jarvis, and

Resolved, That gratitude to Almighty God for his blessing upon the Society, and for many undeserved mercies, should be shown by each member of our Church by increased zeal for its maintenance and extension. the

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blessing , should sed zeal It was moved by G. A. Schofield, Esq., and seconded by the Rev. Dr. Williams, and

Resolved, That the withdrawal of the grant of the S. P. G. in order to extend the Kingdom of Christ in India, the Corea, and other heathen countries, should stimulate us to more self-demying efforts for its advancement in the destitute places of this Province.

Mr. W. M. Jarvis gave notice of motion for the next Anniversary meeting of the Society: "That the proposed union of the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick with the Diocesan Synod be approved, and that it be referred to the Executive Committee in conjunction with such Committee as may be appointed by the Synod, to take the steps required to carry the same into effect, with authority to petition the Legislature for the passing of the necessary Bill in the name of the Society, and to affix the corporate seal of the Society to such petition."

The Lord Bishop having retired during the course of the proceedings, the Venerable the Archdeacon took the Chair.

The hymn, "The Church's one Foundation" was sung, during which a collection amounting to \$18.65 was made for the funds of the Society.

On motion the Society adjourned.

The Committee met at St. John, in Trinity Church School House at 10 a.m., July Sth, 1892. For an abstract of the proceedings at this meeting, see 57th Annual Report of the Society, pages 115–123. The usual quarterly meetings of the Committee were held during the year, and a summary of the proceedings at these meetings is now submitted.

#### ST. JOHN, N. B., October 5th, 1892.

The committee met at the Society's room in Pugsley's building, at 4 p. m., the Rev. Canon Ketchum, D. D., Vice-President of the Society, in the chair.

The warm interest he always took in the work and wellbeing of this Society, his generous offerings, his punctual attendance at its meetings, his kind and judicious direction in the chair—will be very long and gratefully remembered with the deepest feeling of regret at the irreparable loss the Society has sustained in so many ways by his death. That the chairman  $\exists$  requested to enclose a copy of this resolution to Mrs. Medley, with the assurance of warm sympathy and respectful regard.

The chairman reported that the resolution passed at the last meeting of the Committee relative to the death of the late Lord Bishop of the Diocese has been duly forwarded to Mrs. Medley, from whom he had received the following reply:

The Treasurer was desired by the Committee to call the attention of the Rev. J. J. Parry who was about leaving the Diocese, to the balance of the "Outfit Grant" not yet returned to the Society in accordance with the regulation passed by the General in Committee, July 1884.

Resolved, That the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop, Rev. Canon Brigstocke, G. E. Fairweather, W. M. Jarvis, G. A. Schofield, and T. B. Robinson, be a Committee to whom all applications for grants from the fund for "The Education of the Children of the Clergy," be referred with power to act.

Mr. J. Roy Campbell reported on behalf of the committee appointed to confer with the Council of the Church of England Institute, respecting renting and occupancy of rooms for the use of Standing Committees of the Synod and Diocesan Church Society, that the Committee having fully considered the matter, now recommend the Executive Committee of the D. C. S. to lease for three years from the Church of England Institute, the larger room in the rear of the second flat of the Orange Hall building, on Germain Street, in the city of St. John, at an annual rental of \$125.00, to include heating and light; it being understood that other rooms in the building may be used by the D. C. S. and Synod, if not at the time required by the Institute.

It was, on motion,

Resolved, That the recommendation of the Committee be received and adopted.

#### FREDERICTON, N. B., March 1st, 1893.

A meeting of the committee was held at 11 a. m. at the residence of the Bishop. The Committee on the Incapacitated Clergy Fund reported that at a meeting of the said Committee, at St. John, October 24, 1892, an application from the Rev. Mr. Weeks was duly considered, and the Committee unanimously

Resolved, That the Rev. Mr. Weeks be allowed the sum of \$200 per annum, the grant to take effect from October 1st, 1892.

An application from the Rev. A. J. Cresswell for admission to the benefits of the Clergy Widows and Orphans Fund was read, and it was, on motion,

Resolved, 'That the Rev. Mr. Cresswell's request be complied with, and that the certificate be granted on the usual conditions, the certificate to date from January 1st, 1893.

The Treasurer's quarterly balance sheet was presented and read; and on motion, ordered that the same be received and placed on file.

Mr. W. M. Jarvis presented and read a report from the Finance Committee, a copy of which is appended to thi report.

It was, on motion.

Resolved, That the report of the Finance Committee be received and adopted.

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St. John, N. B., June 7th, 1893.

A meeting of the committee was held this day at 4 p. m., in the Society's room in the Orange Hall building, the Rev. Canon Ketchum, a Vice-President of the Society, in the Chair. In the absence of the Secretary, Mr. J. Roy Campbell was appointed Secretary, pro tem.

The Treasurer presented and read his quarterly balance sheet, and on motion, the same was received and placed on file.

A balance of \$2.50, unpaid subscriptions to the funds of the Society from the Parish of Dorchester, was, on motion, written off.

Unpaid subscriptions from the Parish of Fredericton, amounting to \$9.50 and \$15.00 respectively, were on motion, written off.

The Treasurer reported that all the subscriptions to the funds of the Society for the year 1892-3, as published in the last Annual Report, have been paid with the exception of the sum of \$24.38, due from the Parish of Shediac.

On motion,

Resolved, That this matter be referred to the Rural Dean of Shediac, with power to act.

Mr. W. M. Jarvis, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented and read a report from that committee, a copy of which is appended to this report.

On motion,

Resolved, That the Report of the Finance Committee be received and adopted.

Mr. T. Barclay Robinson, on behalf of the Committee to whom was referred the matter of making appropriations from the fund for the Education of the Children of the Clergy, reported that a grant of \$100.00 had been made to the Rev. Cecil F. Wiggins, for one year, from the first day of April, 1893. On motion, the report was received. confirmed, and ordered to be entered on the Minutes. The Secretary read a letter from Mr. M. B. Dixon, Secretary of the Church of England Institute, submitting a memorandum of lease from the Church of England Institute.

4. The sum of \$181.30 has been received from the Robinson Trust, Canterbury, being two amounts of \$83.77 and \$105 respectively, less \$7.47 for registry fees and charges.

5. A sum of \$100 has been received from the Executors of the late Lord Bishop of Fredericton, towards the Incapacitated Clergy Fund.

6. Miss Bailey has paid \$100 on account of principal of mortgage.

7. The Trustee of the S. K. Foster Estate, has paid \$500 on account of principal of mortgage.

8. The sum of \$324.67, has been received from the Sarah C. DeWolfe Estate.

9. The committee resolved to recommend the Society to execute a quit claim deed of land at Stanley, York Co., to the party or parties claiming the same, on the payment of the balance of \$50 to the Society.

10. The sum of \$3,000 has been deposited in the Bank of Nova Scotia, St. John, at interest.

11. A lease from E. I. Simonds, to Isaiah Holder, comprising lands under mortgage to the Society, has been confirmed.

12. The Committee have had before them a proposal from Mr. Jonas Clarkson, to hand over to the Society a sum of about \$2,000, on condition of the payment of annuities to his two daughters, and the survivor, but have felt unable to recommend acceptance of the same.

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# APPENDIX C.

#### Report of the Board of Home Missions for the year ending 30th June, 1893.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Uhurch Society:

The Board of Home Missions submit the following report:

Grand Falls and Madawaska.—Soon after the meeting of the General Committee last July, letters were received from Mr. M. Dayton and Mr. T. M. Richards, stating that Madawaska was not able to contribute the amount required to maintain it as a separate Mission, and asking that it might again be united to Grand Falls. As his Lordship the Bishop was about to visit the Mission, the Board left the matter in his hands; and later on they confirmed an arrangement made whereby Edmundston was to pay \$200, Grand Falls \$160, and Limestone \$100; total, \$460; and the united Mission was to receive a grant of \$780.

Westfield.—The grant to this Mission having been referred to the Board by the General Committee, a deputation was appointed to visit the Mission, and on their report the amount required was reduced to \$300 for the first six months.

Weldford.—Application having been received from this Mission for a reduction in the sum required, a deputation from the Board visited the Mission, and on their report the amount required was reduced to \$200 for the year.

Baie Verte.—Application was made to the Board for a grant to this Mission, the work to be united with work at Tidnish in the Diocese of Nova Scotia. The people of Tidnish agreed to contribute \$100, the Diocese of Nova Scotia, \$100, Bay Verte and Port Elgin, \$200; the Missionary to be under the jurisdiction of the Bishop of Fredericton. The Board having ascertained that the arrangement had the approval of the Rector of Westmorland, made a grant of \$500. on condition of the contribution of \$200 from Baie Verte and Port Elgin (being the places in this Diocese included in the Mission) the \$200 from Nova Scotia being paid direct to the Missionary.

The Board regret that so far no one has been found to take up this work.

Canning.—The Board made a grant of \$50 to the Rector of Cambridge for his expenses in giving a regular week-day service in this Mission, once every three weeks—from October, 1892, to July, 1893.

Bathurst.—During the year his Lordship the Bishop visited this Mission, and met the Church wardens and several parishioners, and upon his report the Board agreed to accept the sum of \$50 in full settlement of the old balance of \$118.75 due by the Mission to the Society. The \$50 has been paid to the Treasurer.

Lay Readers.—The Board has placed \$150 at the disposal of his Lordship the Bishop, for the expenses of Divinity Students to work in the Diocese during the summer, and has also granted \$25 towards the expenses of a Divinity Student to work in the Mission of Baie Verte.

Divinity Scholarship Fund.—\$100 of the income of this Fand was granted to Mr. G. F. Scovil, Divinity Scholar at King's College, Windsor.

Committee on the Needs of the Diocese.—Under authority of the General Committee, the Board appointed a Committee on this subject, but no report has been received.

Annual Statement for S. P. G.—The Board submit herewith a copy of the statistical statement furnished to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel for 1893. Returns were not received from thirteen Missions, three of which were vacant.

S. P. G.—This grant for the year 1893 was reduced  $(\pounds 250)$ two hundred and fifty pounds, and the Board has received notice from the Secretary that it will again be reduced one hundred and fifty pounds  $(\pounds 150)$  in 1894; and that the Diocese must be prepared for a gradual reduction, so that it will cease within about seven years.

The reduced grant for 1894 will amount to eight hundred and fifty pounds (£850); of which only six hundred and fifty pounds (£650) is available for Missionary work, as two hundred pounds (£200) is for pensions of the S. P. G., for which this of an A sent b hund that dersta time o Th

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ht hundred d and fifty two hundfor which this Diocese is not responsible, but which has to be paid out of any grant the S. P. G. makes.

At the request of the Board a strong remonstrance was sent by the Bishop to the S. P. G. against the reduction of two hundred and fifty pounds (£250) for 1893, but the answer was that it could not be re-considered. And the Board now understand that rapid reduction and final extinction in a short time of the grant for missionary work is inevitable.

This is a serious matter for the Society to deal with; but the Diocese cannot say that no warning has been given, or that in the past the Venerable Society has not generously aided the work here.

The Board felt that, with our decreasing population, and certainly not increasing means, it would probably endanger a large part of the Mission work of the Diocese, if any very heavy additional sum were at once required from the aided Missions. They have, therefore, requested his Lordship the Bishop to ask the Synod to appoint a Committee to take steps for the better arrangement of the Missionary work of the Diocese. The idea being that stations or Missions may be so grouped together, that some services may be secured for each place, though perhaps of necessity they must be fewer than hitherto.

When all this is done, however, quite a considerable sum must be raised if all the Missions are to be supplied. It will be seen from the financial statement that over three thousand dollars (\$3,000) a year, additional, must be raised to carry on all the work as at present arranged. For this next year until the Synod can formulate some plan for re-arrangement —the Board recommend the adoption of the Schedule as in force during the past year, except that each Mission be required to pay ten dollars (\$10) additional, in lieu of the same amount which the Deaneries were asked to pay last year. That plan has not been successful. This will apply to all aided Missions, except those in the Deanery of Woodstock, and one (Lancaster) in the Deanery of St. John, which were increased ten dollars (\$10) each last year.

The estimate of income and expenditure for next year, and the returns and minutes of business of last year accompany this report. Respectfully submitted,

The committee appointed to consider the proposed plan for the Union of the Diocesan Church Society and the Diocesan Synod, beg to submit the follo ving report:

They have conferred with the committee appointed by the Diocesan Synod for the like purpose; and recommend that no action be taken at the meetings of the Church Society in the present year, beyond the giving of any notices that may be necessary to enable the questions involved to be considered and decided in 1894; but that the Clergy and the lay delegates to the General Committee be requested to bring the subject to the notice of the next Easter Meetings in their several Parishes; and that this important matter stand as the first unfinished business to be taken up at the meetings of the Church Society in July, 1894.

They further recommend that the Committee already appointed to consider the matter be continued; that the Clergy and lay delegates be requested to send to the Lord Bishop as soon as possible, any suggestions they may wish to make as to the proposed union, in order that the same may be fully considered; and that the Committee be authorized to prepare such drafts for proposed legislative or other provisions as they may recommend; the same to be submitted in connection with the question of the union of the two bodies, as unfinished business, for consideration at the meetings of the Diocesan Church Society in July, 1894. All of which is respectfully submitted.

#### Report of Joint Committee on Statistical Returns.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Fredericton, and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society :

The Committee appointed by the last General Committee of the Society, to consider, jointly with a similar committee of the Diocesan Synod, how the several returns that are required from the Clergy could be simplified and unified, beg heave to report:

That circumstances make any marked change for the better very difficult, inasmuch as the several bodies concerned, that is to say, the Venerable the S. P. G., the Diocesan Church Society, and the Synod of the Diocese, have respectively their constitutional rights and requirements. The time for making the Return that is required from the Clergy by the S. P. G. is fixed by the rules of the Venerable Society, and is therefore, beyond our control.

As regards the D. C. S., the Return required from the Clergy seems to your Committee to be reasonably and timelily arranged.

With regard to the Statistical Return required by the Standing Committee of the Synod on Sunday Schools, your committee would suggest that if, in future, that Committee were to require their Return to be made at the same time that the Returns to the D. C. S. are made, viz.: the first day of May—clerical labor would be somewhat minimized, and later information be secured.

Committee on Interesting Sunday-Schools in Home Missions and on the Promotion of Sunday-Schools.

#### To the Lord Bishop of Fredericton and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society :

The Committee on Interesting Sunday-schools in Home Missions and on the Promotion of Sunday-schools beg leave to report :

That they issued this year an appeal to the children of the Sunday-schools, asking for their prayers and their Lenten offerings on behalf of the General Purposes of the D. C. S., and also of the Incapacitated Clergy Fund. They have received returns from fifteen Missions, reporting offerings amounting to about \$234.00, and have reason to expect that the full amount collected as the result of their appeal will be considerably larger than last year.

They would draw attention to the fact that an appeal to the Sunday-schools for Lenten offerings on behalf of Domestic Missions was issued at the same time by the Foreign and Domestic Missionary Society, signed by all the Bishops of the Province. This is, of course, confusing, and no doubt interferes with the success of the efforts of your Committee.

# APPENDIX I.

#### Report of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge Book Depository Committee for the Year ending June 30th, 1893.

#### To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:

The Book Depository Committee beg to submit their Nineteenth Annual Report :

Sales.—The sales for the year up to the time of stock taking amounted to \$470.02.

Importations.—There have been twenty-two importations of goods during the past year, all of which, we are glad to report, have been disposed of. Other importations, especially Sunday-school library books, have been ordered and are daily expected to arrive.

Dawn of Day.—This useful family, Sunday-school and parochial magazine has a circulation of nearly 800. We are anxious to increase its circulation. The Society have again enlarged it, so that it now consists of twenty pages of good and useful illustrated reading matter; the price, however, remains the same. A single copy, post free, 25 cents per year, or \$9.00 per year for 100 copies per month. The Committee recommend this publication to the Clergy and Sunday-school teachers as a valuable handmaid to their work, containing, as it does, much interesting and valuable Church teaching, besides being the cheapest and best periodical of its kind.

New Depository.—Your Committee would now especially draw your attention to the effort they have lately made to increase the sales and to enlarge the usefulness of the Depository and to make it of more practical use and benefit to the Clergy and Church people generally. On May 1st the Depository was removed from Messrs. McMillan's to a new and commodious shop which has been leased for three years from the Church of England Institute in their new rooms in Germain Street at an annual rent, including heating, of \$175.00. The books and various publications of the Society will now be found there on sale, and placed in such a position that all purchasers may easily see and examine the stock for themselves.

An efficient and competent lady has been engaged as Curator—Miss F. S. Chandler, of Dorchester. Your Committee, therefore, hope you will give the work of the Depository your careful attention, study well the circulars freely circulated throughout the hall and Diocese and patronize our Depository largely and frequently. The Clergy are earnestly asked to second this effort of the Committee, for we feel that with your aid this venture of faith will be successful purchase at the store yourselves, and direct all the patronage you can to it; in this way our work will be successful and prove a valuable adjunct to the work of the Church in your Parishes and to the Diocese.

Any publications on the Society's catalogues not in stock will be imported when ordered. It is now anticipated that our sales will once more equal, and, we hope, largely exceed, those of past years.

The Church in this Diocese is once more indebted to the Parent Society for its continued generosity and kindly interest in the welfare of the Church's work.

Money and book grants have been made to various needy Parishes applying for them.







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# CAMPOBELLO – REV. W. H. STREET.

Since my last report the work of the Church in this Parish has been going on steadily and satisfactorily. I hope I may be excused by our true and kind friend, Mrs. Robinson-Owen, the former owner of this Island, now residing in Wales, if I take this opportunity of correcting a mistake that inadvertently appeared in my last report, it should have read as follows: "That Mrs. Robinson-Owen has for many years continued to send regularly from England the following contributions, viz., \$25 to the D. C. S. and \$35 towards the assessment for the Clergyman's stipend; that is, she now contributes yearly \$60 to the funds of the D. C. S. according to the present scheme."

We are looking forward to a visit from his Lordship Bishop Kingdon after his return from England.

# DERBY AND BLACKVILLE – REV. C. O'DELL BAYLEE.

Church work in this Mission has been going steadily on since my last report, and the zeal of the Church people seems not to be slackening. Our congregations have been good, and the people have showed a great willingness to keep the assessment paid, while at the same time they have not forgotten to keep the Church property in good repair and insured, and have purchased a new organ and Sunday-school library for Holy Trinity, Blackville, and a Sunday-school library for St. Peter's, Derby.

During six months of the past year, with the assistance of a Lay Reader, I held six services every Sunday and opened a new station at Indiantown.

I regret that the B. H. M. raised the assessment for 1893 and 1894 to \$340.00. In 1886 the assessment was \$276.00.

I fail to see that in seven years our assessment should be increased and clergyman's stipend reduced.

I trust the B. H. M. will carefully look into the matter, and reduce rather than increase our assessment, and that the committee appointed by the Bishop to report next year on the re-arrangement of the Parishes and their bounds, will be a success.

I hope to be able to present a class for the sacred rite of confirmation in the autumn.

I must, in conclusion, bear testimony to the kindness and consideration of the Parishioners during the past year to myself and family, for which we wish to thank them very much.

While humbly thanking Almighty God for past mercies, I commit the future of this large Mission to His holy care.

#### GORDON AND LORNE-REV. J. R. HOPKINS.

I cannot express how every heart in my Mission values the privilege of having a regular place of worship. The Bishop of the Diocese knows the serious disadvantages with which, on coming to this Mission, I had to contend in obeying the apostolic injunction, "Let all things be done decently and in order." When I came here I had to hold services in log schoolhouses. Now I am very thankful to say, through the assistance of the Fredericton Women's Aid Association and other kind friends, we have four new churches in which regular services are held, and four new Sunday-schools established. I believe we are deserving of the sympathy and support of all "loval Churchmen."

I beg to remind those whose hearts may be moved to help us, that in helping us as individuals, they will be helping also to extend the true Church of Christ, which should be our greatest honour and glory. V Chur of of vario After unsat servic Churc I and ci good a

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When I arrived at my post, 1 found the affairs of the Church in a truly sad condition. What was supposed to be a Church settlement, I discovered was completely in the hands of others. Union services prevailing in these parts, the various district school-houses being used by all denominations. After a few months work, I came to the conclusion that this unsatisfactory state of affairs would not do, for these "union services" I believe to be fatal to the development of the Church of England.

I was very anxious to see a few churches built at suitable and convenient places. I knew it would give the Church a good start ahead of all the other religious bodies, and would supply a centre round which I had reason to believe many of their adherents would be glad to gather. Firmly believing this to be a matter vitally affecting the requirements of not only the present but of future generations, I was not going to lose an opportunity and let others take away a hold I had. I took prompt and immediate steps to prevent the loss of what no amount of regret in after years could possibly replace. I commenced an aggressive church work, the result of which was a strongly expressed desire on the part of the settlers to have churches erected. Our worthy people, although very poor, promised to give so liberally of their little, that I was induced to appeal with confidence to outsiders to help complete a work which we had not ourselves the means to finish. The settlers have done much, and are anxious to do all in their power to bring their respective churches to completion, but they are poor, and it is not possible for them to do all.

We have been labouring under a debt of several hundred dollars for quite a long time now. Our friends outside the Mission, either have not taken into consideration the great demand and increase in our work, and consequent increase in expenditure, or else have other needful parochial objects of greater interest to which they are contributing their Christian gifts.

If my work here were closed up, I think there would be some little feeling of sorrow and sympathy, and it is just this that I want. I regard it as of the utmost importance to the Church that this Mission should be well and firmly established.

It is a Mission of considerable importance. The Tobique is certain to become an important place in the near future, but we cannot build Churches without outside aid. For lack

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of substantial response to my repeated appeals for help, I have had to empty my own small purse rather freely, denying myself, to a great extent, the necessaries and comforts of life; also I have had the painful experience to go from door to door begging for assistance to build Churches and requisites for Sunday-schools, but I feel thankful that quiet work with the blessing and help of God, is telling in the district. I must be prepared for difficulties and discouragements in the field, I must try to be as "wise as a serpent and harmless as a dove." Carefully and prayerfully the work is to be pressed forward.

I have received repeated offers of other places of much more value pecuniarily, and regret has been expressed in many parts in consequence of rumors that 1 purpose going, but I have no idea of giving up. I don't think Almighty God is calling me to give up my great work on the Tobique. I find the services of the Church are very much appreciated, and well attended, and thus I am holding the fort here. The Church in Arthurette last Sunday evening was over-crowded.

In conclusion, I sincerely hope that this Mission will have the sympathy, prayers and liberal support of the Church generally. To God I commit my cause. The silver and the gold are His. If my appeals for help have failed, all I can say is, "It is well." He doeth all things well. And in His own good time I know he will yet open the windows of heaven and pour out His blessing.

During the four years I have been in charge of the Mission, 110 persons have been baptized, and 81 confirmed—many of the latter having come into the Church from other religious persuasions. At present, a large class is preparing for confirmation.

#### PRINCE WILLIAM AND DUMFRIES - C. T. EASTON.

For the last year there is little to report to the Society from this Parish.

A new organ has been placed in All Saints, Magaguadavic, greatly to the improvement of the services. Thanks for this boon are altogether due to the "Women's Sewing Circle," which has been indefatigable in its endeavours for the good of the Church in that part of the Mission.

I am glad to note that the fence of the new cemetery is painted to the great improvement of its appearance. Th

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The thanks of the congregation of St. Clements, Prince William, are due to Miss Emma Fraser for her kindness in conducting the musical portion of the services.

A Sunday-school has been opened at Blaney Ridge with every prospect of accomplishing much good. Monthly services are held here in the School-house, which are well attended. I may remark that the "Manual" is wholly used in this Sunday-school.

The work in this old Parish is mostly of a missionary character, which is its chief glory, for the Church has a message to deliver, which is none other than that of her Divine Head.

#### NEW MARYLAND.

The services of this Church have been maintained with regularity during the year past. I have been thankful for the reduction of the assessment, which has made matters easier both for priest and people, but am sorry to find from this year's schedule that the B. H. M. has repented itself of the very gracious abatement and gone back to its old demand of \$150, a sum, let me say, which, as time goes on, and death and removal take place, it becomes less and less possible to collect from the Mission, and to meet which the missionary has no alternative but to fall back upon his own salary.

By the kindness and liberality of a much esteemed member of the Cathedral congregation in Fredericton, we have been able to surround the churchyard with a new and excellent *picket* fence in the place of the old one of the "snake persuasion," which had done duty before. The thanks of priest and people are very warmly extended to the donor of this much needed and very generous assistance.

In May last, with many regrets, I passed, with the Bishop's sanction, the charge of this Mission into other hands — into hands, it is my joy and satisfaction to know, much better and abler than my own. I may express my humble hope that the well-nigh eighteen years during which the Mission has been in my care, have not been altogether without their fruits. I thank God for the great mercies of those years, and pray that the fullness of His blessing may rest on the labours of him who now succeeds me in the trust.

#### THE ENVELOPE SYSTEM.

As one means of increasing the contributions and lessening the difficulties of collection, the Board of Home Missions recommends that Weekly Offerings be substituted for Yearly Subscriptions, wherever practicable

The plan of Weekly Offerings upon the Envelope System has been found to work well in many parts of the Diocese where it has been tried.

The first step towards the adoption of this system in a Parish is to ascertain from all the members of the Congregation what sum they are willing to contribute at the Weekly Offertory; and this done—

1. Pledges will be received from the Parishioners for a fixed weekly sum, from one cent to one dollar and upwards, to be given in an envelope, at the services on each Sunday.

2. A package of envelopes will be given to each contributor, printed with blanks for name and amount of offering.

3. The Treasurer will enter the amount thus received each week, to the credit of each contributor, in a book to be kept exclusively for this purpose.

4. A stated meeting of the Vestry or Parishioners will be held quarterly: at which meeting the Treasurer will report all subscriptions in arrears, and at the close of the Parish year will also present all the last year's accounts of the Parish, which will then be audited and settled.

By the above plan the following objects are sought to be accomplished :

1. That not only heads of families, but all in the Parish, old and young, who have any means and earnings of their own, may contribute according to their ability to the support of the Church.

2. That they may, as regularly as possible, at the appointed time, bring their plcdged Weekly Offerings to Church, instead of paying them at the call of the collector.

[NOTE.—The principle of the Envelope System is not interfered with when, as in exceptional cases, it may be convenient to contribute ONCE A FORTNIGHT, or at any other stated period within the quarter.]

3. That the Parish revenue may not fall into arrears and debt be incurred.

4. That the income of the Parish may be materially increased, so that mainly from this source sufficient provision may be made for the support of the Clergyman.

All these objects may be easily attained if the Church Wardens be willingly and efficiently sustained in their efforts by those whose representatives they are.

The above plan has been adopted, with some variations, in a number of Parishes in several Dioceses, and has been successful.

It is hoped that it may receive serious consideration in every Mission in this Diocese, and that it may be generally adopted. A Beg
