THOUSAND ACRES CHANGE HANDS AT HIGH PRICES

Sales of Land East of Yonge Street, in Township of York, Continue With Unabated Activity—Hunt Farm Brought \$3000 an Acre—Somebody is Making a Big Coup.

And still the farms are selling on the east side of Yonge-street in the Township of York, and especially in the second concession east of Yonge. Four were sold last week, besides those already reported by The World.

George Chadwick sold his 100 acres, being the west half of lot 7, in the second concession east of Yonge-street, for \$12,000, or \$120 per acre.

Thomas Wilkinson, who owns 60 acres, the west portion of the north half of lot 3, in the second concession, sold for about \$700 per acre.

The 300 acres immediately north of Chadwick's farm have all been sold within the last two or three weeks.

Still other sales have been made in the block, all north of Leslie, and running north for two miles, but no intimation of the buyer has yet been given out.

WATER POWERS OF CANADA REVIEWED IN FULL REPORT

Leo. G. Denis and A. V. White Have Submitted Results of Investigations to Commission of Conservation.

With the present coal strikes and rumors of coal strikes, which are the worst kind of industrial and economic war, nothing could be more timely than the exhaustive consideration of the fuel and power resources of Canada. This has been brought before the nation in the 400-page report of the Commission of Conservation of the Canadian Waters, prepared by Leo G. Denis and A. V. White, and submitted to the commission on March 12.

The report is the result of the exhaustive investigation of the water powers of Canada. It is the work of Leo G. Denis, B. Sc., M. E., and Arthur V. White, C. E., and is submitted to the governor-general by Hon. Clifford Sifton, chairman of the commission. One of the most interesting features of the report is a student of the question is the very full bibliography by Mr. White, a recognized authority on the subject, which covers no fewer than thirty pages. Two years ago Mr. White himself prepared a highly important article on "The Exportation of Electricity." The article was submitted to "The University Magazine," Montreal, in March, 1910, but publication was delayed until the following October. Meanwhile W. K. McNaught, to whom the article had been submitted, prepared and published a pamphlet on "Ontario's True Policy in regard to Black and White Coal," and Mr. McNaught told The World that he was indebted to Mr. White's article. We are all now indebted to Mr. White for his share with Mr. Denis in the preparation of the present valuable and comprehensive survey of the water powers of the Dominion.

James White, secretary of the commission, in his presentation to the chairman, stated that the report is the result of nearly two years' work. Mr. Denis wrote the chapters dealing with the water powers of Quebec, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and the Northwest Territories; a chapter on the water powers of British Columbia was contributed by W. J. Dick, M. Sc., and one on "Irrigation in Western Canada," by George B. Hill, C. E. Mr. White, however, wrote the greater part of the report, including the introductory chapters, and those on Ontario, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick. Owing to scanty material Mr. White has determined to institute surveys in the prairie provinces and in British Columbia. Mr. Denis and Mr. White respectively have the direction of the work. The results are to be published later.

Develop Water Powers.

In a country like Canada, which has two and a half times the water area of the United States, and a greater natural reservoir of the great lakes maintains the most equable and the greatest single water power in the world in the St. Lawrence. It is natural that attention should be given to the problems of making good the deficiency in coal by the development of light, heat and power from the water resources. It is necessary, however, to get an accurate idea of what these resources are worth. It is pointed out that the water power available bears no necessary relation to the water area. A serious note of warning is sounded in this connection. An illustration of the case of Lake Abitibi is taken with nearly 400 square miles area. But the mean summer depth does not exceed ten feet. Pennsylvania has only 75 per cent of this area of water, but that state has installations of 300,000 horse power. To supply as much power would drain Lake Abitibi dry in a month. And what is true of water areas is correspondingly true of water-shed horsepower. The problem of estimating water powers is gone into carefully and some obvious but frequently disregarded points emphasized. The great point is that the minimum flow of the stream during the year is the basis of estimating the maximum power to be developed. Storage facilities may help to raise the minimum flow, and in some cases where certain types of industries permit it, a greater amount of power than the minimum might be used for nine or ten months in the year, while for the remaining time the supply had fallen away. It is thought that the available water power is much over-estimated. The conclusions arrived at in this chapter are of lasting and general interest. They are as follows:

First.—Water power is dependent primarily upon precipitation. Other interests such as municipal and domestic water supply, navigation, agriculture and irrigation are likewise dependent upon the same source. The subject of water powers, therefore, cannot be properly considered without making fair allowances for the demands of the other interests that have just claims upon water as a natural source.

Second.—Knowledge of the circumstances intimately associated with the water powers is essential to an intelligent classification of them. It is an unreasonable not to differentiate between water powers as it would be not to differentiate between timber tracts, mineral lands, or the items of any other natural resource varying in quantity, quality and situation.

Third.—The accuracy of published data relating to water powers must be accepted with qualifications unless these data are based upon carefully ascertained facts obtained in the field.

Fourth.—General statements so commonly made, of vast numbers of existing water powers are misleading, and tend to disguise the fact that the number of water powers in Canada, at present desirable from an economic standpoint, is much smaller than is generally supposed.

Fifth.—Reliable data upon water-powers have definite characteristics. At the present time there is urgent need for such data and for detailed topographical maps.

Should Be Careful.

Sixth.—Certain steps are necessary to secure water power data that are reliable. Motoring stations should be established at carefully selected points on the principal rivers and streams, and accurate cross-sections of the river beds made at such stations. Permanent bench-marks should be established. A substantial gauge should be erected in an accessible place at each gauging or metering station. Carefully conducted discharge measurements should be taken from time to time during the

DIMINISHING WATER POWERS.

Nothing so important to Canada, and especially to Ontario, can be discovered as the water power resources of the country. For some years constant warnings have been sounded regarding the dangerous situation in which Ontario may find herself.

Only last week we have had the report on the water powers of the United States submitted by Mr. Herbert Knox Smith, commissioner of corporations.

With a coal strike imminent in the United States, which is likely to force Canada to rely more and more upon her own resources of fuel and power, the situation is sufficiently serious to make it desirable that the governments, both federal and provincial, shall give effect to whatever recommendations the conservation commission may deem advisable under the circumstances.

Whoever holds the fuel and power resources of the north country holds the nation in thrall. It is all very well to sing "Britons never shall be slaves," but it is idle music if it accompanies the bartering of the national birthright.

CANADA'S INGRATITUDE.

How long will Canada and Canadians continue unworthy of a place among nations by delaying to offer liberal naval assistance to the mother country in her threatened hour! To that British people who are giving us millions and millions of our railways, our shipping lines, our harbors and canals, for our loan companies and industries, our municipalities, our enterprises of every kind (at way less than bank interest) and who defend us at the same time from those that would wipe us out if they could, but for the British navy! As W. F. Maclean said in the house at Ottawa the other night the few workalovers now on strike (and many of whom do not average a dollar a day) pay for the defence of Canadians who do not contribute a cent!

Where would Canada be to-morrow if a great war broke out in Europe? Our money supplies would be cut off in a moment and our future that we want so much of would be like moonshine cut out by clouds!

And England at this moment, what with menaces from abroad, social disorders at home, cannot see twenty-four hours of clear sky ahead of her!

NO RESTRICTIONS ON QUEEN STREET.

Should a renewed effort be made to have that part of East Queen-street, originally in the old Town of East Toronto, and west of Balsam-avenue, included in the area under residential restrictions, the board of control and city council ought not to give the application any countenance. The bylaw imposing these restrictions and excluding Queen-street from their operation was passed at the instance of the Teachers' Association, has been in force for over a year and has been the basis for property transactions. On that ground alone the matter should not be reopened, and there is all the less reason now that the motion to quash the bylaw has been dismissed by Mr. Justice Middleton, who has thus affirmed its validity.

Apart from this special objection to any alteration of the bylaw, it is preposterous to contend that any part of land under residential restriction, Queen-street is and will remain one of the most important of these thoroughfares, and nothing should be done to hinder its development in that capacity.

The extension of stores and business premises along its frontage is a necessary consequence of the place it fills in the city's economy, and it cannot be effectively diverted to serve any other purpose. The public interest requires that it remain free from artificial regulation.

NATIONALIZATION OF MONOPOLIES.

Events are moving steadily forward towards nationalization of all public services and those industries—such as coal mining—which lie at the base of national prosperity. Already influential newspapers in Britain, even some that usually show a Conservative bias, are pointing out that combinations of employers cannot be permitted to abuse their power to the oppression of the whole community.

Housecleaning Hints

CHICAGO, March 18.—Vague hints or trouble ahead for the British government set today to make a result of wheat up to date. As a result the market closed steady with prices the same as last night 1-8c advance. Corn closed with 1-8c to 1-6c of the closing figures of Friday. Speculations for the May option here ranged from 92 3/4c to 101 1/2c, with the close steady but 3-4c net lower at 93 1/2c. Cash grades were weak.

Timiskaming Declares 3 p.c. Dividend --- Porcupines Strong

Hollinger Scores Sharp Advance Whole List Follows the Lead

Resumption of the Upward Swing in Porcupine Stocks—Public Sentiment Favorably Affected—Timiskaming Higher.

World Office, Saturday Evening, March 16.

Porcupine stocks today showed a complete recovery from the tentative disposition to sag which put in an appearance yesterday with the coming of a profit-taking movement and the market resumed its upward march in no hesitating manner. Prices were advanced sharply through the general list, under the lead of Hollinger, which sold up to the twelve-dollar mark, and all the close showed gains running anywhere from one to three and two and three points in the cheaper issues.

The slight reaction yesterday, if it did nothing else, definitely indicated the healthy conditions surrounding the market at the present time. Profit-taking movements of similar nature, of course, is anticipated at recurring intervals, but as long as the demand is sufficient to take care of the liquidation so easily, there is no ground for any apprehension regarding a resumption of the recent scare. The public are undoubtedly displaying a renewed interest in the Porcupine securities, and it is to be expected that the developments of the next month or so in the mining camps will make stocks look more attractive to the outsider.

Hollinger in Lead

Hollinger, at its top price of twelve dollars, stood today at the highest level it has attained since the first week in February. The stock was in firm demand throughout the day, and the floating supply had been cleaned up pretty well earlier in the week. Sales were only attracted by sharp advances in the bid quotations. The shares at the close were up 40 points from the preceding day and 25 points higher than the previous top record established on this movement.

The upward turn in the leader was reflected in the cheaper list, and interest sustained by the demand prices were moved up in short order. Dome Extension added two points to its present advance, selling as high as 1-1/2; Crown Charter got up to 2-1/2, a jump of nearly three points for the day, and supplied the most outstanding instance of buoyancy in the cheaper stock list; Vipond sold at 48 1/2, and Jupiter at 49, a gain of 2 1/2 points. Pearl Lake was strong at 23.

The announcement of the resumption of dividends by Timiskaming was not made public until after the close of the market, but the sharp advance, nevertheless made a good showing on anticipations of a disbursement. The price got up above 40 and closed bid there. Otherwise the market was quiet and comparatively unchanged.

Sentiment is Bullish.

The market on the whole showed a decidedly buoyant undertone and wound up a most satisfactory week in splendid style. Sentiment was favorably affected by the advanced prices generally felt that, while tentative reactions were to be expected, prices would undoubtedly continue their upward swing and carry the recovery considerably further.

Three Per Cent. For Timiskaming

First Distribution of Profits for Year 1912 Announced.

The Timiskaming Mining Company on Saturday afternoon declared a three per cent distribution of profits. This is the first dividend since last October, and shows a healthy recovery in the mining industry. The directors recently bought the North Dome property at Porcupine, and still have money to divide among the stockholders.
