



The Well-Knows Lawyer and Promoter Passes Away at Cobourg.

News reached here yesterday of the death of Hector Cameron, Q.C., ex-M.P., one of Toronto's oldest and best-known legal gentlemen. Deceased had been down at Cobourg for about six

News reached here yesterday of the death of Hector Cameron, Q.C., ex. M.P., one of Toronto's oldest and best and been down at Cobourg for about six months interesting people in a railway from Peterboro to Cobourg. Mr. Cameron had not been in the best of health for some time, but his death was somewhat unexpected, as he had sent word to friends in the city that he was better. Since returning from the Old Country he had become very feeble. Deceased was a descendant of the Glen Dessery branch of the Clan Cameron, of Invernessshire, Scotland, and was born in Montreal in 1832. He was educated at King's College, Dublin, and Trinity College, Dublin. He afterwards took the degree of M.A. from the University of Toronto. In 1860 he married a daughter of Mr. William Boswell. He was called to the bar in 1854, and was created a Q.C. in 1872. He was a director of the Huron and Quebec Railway. He has a son in the English navy, but none of his children reside here.

In the general elections of 1887 he unsuccessfully contested South Victoria for the Dominion Parliament, and was again defeated in 1874, when he contested North Victoria. He was returned for the latter constituency in May. 1875, when he ran against Mr. McLennan, who had been unseated.




MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.


