THEY BLEW OPEN THE SAFE
Professional Cracksmen at
Toronto University.

THE VAULT BADLY WRECKED

About \$1500 in Cash and Other Valuable Part of the Plunder.

A surprise for Burnard Smith and Accountant Hoare yesterday morning—The robbery has been committed while the officers and students were celebrating Halloween on Saturday night—No clue to the thieves.

There are about two days out of the 365 when there is any large amount of money in the business office of Toronto University. On October 31 is one of these. On that day the half-yearly fees of the students are due, and are generally paid. When Accountant Hoare locked the vault on Saturday there was \$1500 in cash and about the same amount in cheques. When he reached his office Monday morning there was nothing to show for it but a dilapidated vault. Some time between 7 o'clock Saturday evening and 9 o'clock Monday morning burglars got away with all the valuables.

Entrance was gained by forcing the window of the office, which faces Toronto University. The burglar made a hole in the building. The manner in which the vault door was tackled shows that the work was done by professional cracksmen. A hole was drilled through the outer iron plate just above the lock. Into the space between the outer and inner plates a gunpowder was dropped, and evidently in small quantity, judging from the crack which formed when the powder was used, as part of it was found on the floor. The operators evidently retired to await the effects of their work, and returned subsequently for the plunder.

Mr. Hoare thought that the men who did the work must have been posted by someone well acquainted with the interior of the building and that they must have had a large sum that would be in the vault, and also of the favorable opportunity that would be given for a robbery by the absence of the university. It is thought that the robbery occurred on Saturday evening between 7 and 10 o'clock, as there were no witnesses about the vault. When Beadle Spencer returned at 10 o'clock everything was quiet, and special watches were sent around until 10 o'clock Sunday morning to prevent students from committing any break. Besides the University loss Burnard Smith lost two diamond rings and Mr. Hoare some valuable documents. The police were immediately notified, but as the thieves left no clue they have a difficult task before them.

HAVANA THREATENED.

Maximo Gomez said he is concentrating his forces and marching westward toward the capital.

New York, Nov. 2.—A despatch to the general from Key West, Fla., says that without assuming the role of a prophet, it would positively be announced today that Havana would be besieged by Maximo Gomez within the next thirty days. Gomez has not been heard from since his attack on the town of Casimiro, and subsequent engagement at Desnayas, plantation, where he defeated Gen. Jimenez Castellan. The ominous silence of Gomez is said to be the result of a series of attacks on the principal position of Harbor Commissioner while so many of his men are left out in the cold. "We never born to rule," said a French Liberal to World correspondent.

MAD JEALOUSY.

Scott Linton shot "Doc" Gray and Her Rammer and Then Killed Himself.

Wheeling, W. Va., Nov. 2.—Jealousy caused a terrible tragedy at Georgetown, Ohio, three miles from this city, all of the parties being from Wheeling. Scott Linton shot Doc Gray, a resident of a house of ill-fame, who is said to have been his wife, and also William Metzger, who had been caught here. With both his hands and feet he fired a bullet into his own left eye and almost immediately the bullet will probably recover, but Metzger will die.

PRISON STATISTICS FOR OCTOBER.

During the month there were discharged from the Central Prison 50 prisoners; conviction 44, second conviction 10, more than 2 convictions 10, 1 American, 4 Canadians, 5 English, 2 Americans, 4 Irish and 3 Scotch. From the jail there were 47 females. Of these 44 were convicted for their discharge. The Association assisted after the Central Prison 15, and from the jail 10. During the month 38 persons were received at the Central Prison, 10 from the jail and 28 from the reformatories. Employment was obtained for 1 discharged male prisoner. From the reformatories 7 women were discharged during the month, of whom 1 was from the jail and 6 from the country. The Bible women made 21 visits to the Ball Court, 9 visits to the jail and 3 to the reformatory during the month. She also made 82 calls on the 244 personal interviews with female prisoners. Boots or clothing were supplied to 8 female prisoners and work was done for 4. The Central Prison Night School (secular) conducted for four nights a week. The average attendance of juniors and seniors for last month was 60.

A Pointer for Mr. Elmer.

Editor World: I was much interested in your report of Mr. A. Blue's recent trip over the route of the Ironville, Newburg and Ottawa Railway, as I am familiar with part of that country. Had Mr. Blue excepted his trip a little farther and into the Township of Darlington he would have seen one of the most, highly mineralized townships in Eastern Ontario, not to extend into the neighboring parts of Quebec in Darlington extensive deposits of iron ore, both hematite and magnetite of the very best quality, ascertained as high as 90 per cent, and 96 per cent of metallic iron; also iron pyrite, sulphur ore, its distance from the rails at present alone preventing it from being profitably worked.

THE GOLIATH OF ANARCHY

In the Way an Englishman Refers to the Possible Success of Bryan.

New York, Nov. 2.—The Sun's London special says: Even in the most exciting days of the civil war Europe did not witness the affairs of the American republic with greater interest than she does at the present moment.

The struggle of a generation ago did not particularly concern the Old World except as a terrible spectacle. Now, however, it has suddenly become a matter of interest to the people of England, France, Germany and other countries.

It is remarkable that within scarcely more than a few hours Englishmen have appreciated the importance to themselves of the campaign which is being waged in the United States.

The public interest here is now based upon the broader socialist issues of the campaign. The tariff long ago ceased to figure in public estimation.

England to-day does not care for a rap what happens to the American tariff. Moreover, what is still more significant, only those directly concerned are any longer following much interest in the free trader issue.

The question is always asked in a spirit which shows recognition that the danger, not to the American Republic merely, but to society at large, is in the frequently accompanied by expressions of fear that the people of the United States may be blinded by smaller and more technical issues.

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There is a popular misapprehension in this country upon this point. It has been little known in the vast amount of matter sent to the English press from the United States.

It is a privilege to be able to point out the fact that genuine sympathy has been manifested within the past two or three days by our countrymen against the forces of anarchy that have seen in nearly every year past expressions of fraternal or country feeling in times of crisis between the two countries, but decent Englishmen are not of two minds in this matter.

One of two minds in this matter. One says to me to-day with the warmest emphasis: "I haven't liked America in some things, while I see her action in the Venezuelan case. But if America will destroy next week this Goliath of anarchy, I'll cry 'God bless her' and I'll cheer the Stars and Stripes with as much affection as the Union Jack."
