BUFFALO WOMAN KILLED

Joseph W. Gray, who says he is from roronto, was arrested on Saturday night in Buffalo, charged with murder. The prisoner is about 40 years of age and states that he was a hostler and coachman here and left the city about two weeks ago in search of work. The crime he is charged with is the killing of a Mrs. Thomas Sibbald, whose husband conducts a restaurant at 10 Main-street. Gray claims to be something of a veterinary surgeon, and carried with him several bottles of various lindments, which are claimed to be cures for the many alments of horses. When Gray reached Buffalo he took up his apartments at the Sibbald residence, and Mrs. Sibbald, on complaining of a sore throat was advised by Gray to use some of his liniment. She did so and swallowed several doses, and a few minutes afterwards was taken sick and removed to the hospital, where she died shortly afterwards. It is not thought by the police that Gray gave the deceased the poissonous fluid with any wicked designs, but that she took it inwardly instead of rubbing it on the afflicted parts. An antopsy will be held on the body today, when the direct cause of death will be determined. In the meantime Gray is held, awaiting the result of the proceedings. of work. France will not be asked to vacate the Island of Obok, at the entrance of the Red Sea.

Lord Salisbury lays claim to a British sphere of influence in Central Africa, extending to the shore of Lake Tchad, and, in return for this, France would be granted a trading access to the White Nile.

While these African differences are being settled, the disputes between the two countries in the far East, namely, Siam and China, will be considered. The Premier has also notified the French Ambassador that the French opposition to the Anglo-German agreement concerning the partition of Portuguese East African possessions will be ignored. 

THE INCREASE IN DOLLARS 700.000.

Stock Business Has Been Unexpectedly Good During the Holidays-The Year Reviewed.

Rossland, B.C., Jan. 1,-(Special.)-Stock ousiness has been unexpectedly good during the holidays. There are now 35 working properties, with a pay roll averaging \$1250

The showing made by the mines of the camp during the past year is very satisfactory. There was a production of 116,607 tons of ore, which returned values aggregating \$2,804,758.12. This is against 68,000 tons and an output of \$2,100,000 in 1807, an increase in dollars of \$700,000. 



He generously donated us this amount eighteen months ago, and not "on the eve of the election." as erroneously stated by Mr. Gurofsky, in his letter to you.





On same date in 1898 the quantity affoat was only 7,700,000 bushels, all of which is for the United Kingdom.

Broomhall cabled on Treader.

Broomhall cabled on Tuesday: Argentine harvest progressing favorably. Liverpoo stocks lacreased 300,000 bushels last week. The Continent was buying some of the cargoes off coast. The Corn Trade News reports the world'shipments of wheat and flour last week 8,870,000 bushels. The Chicago estimat was 7,035,000 bushels.

The same paper says: Rosario cable stated that harvesting in Argentine was progressing rapidly, and that car goes for shipment were more freely offered

Big Western Receipts.

The receipts of fleur and wheat at the Western primary markets during last week were 286,179 barrels flour and 6,050,246 bushels wheat, compared with 124,807 barrels flour and 3,801,275 bushels wheat in corresponding week of last year. The receipts at these markets during the 21 weeks—July 30 to Dec. 24—have been, in wheat and flour, 30,600,060 bushels more than in same period in 1897, about 6,500,000 bushels of the increase being in flour.

Russia Holding Her Wheat New York wires: Exporters are loading here one steamer with wheat for Sieily, and one for Spain, and at Galveston one for Trieste. All these ports are in proximity to Russian southern ports.

It is evident that Russian exporters are only shipping such inconsiderable parcels as have been sold under former contracts.

Indications are that we are not only in a position to put screws to the foreigner, which has been plain enough for some time back, but that there is going to be speculative interest enough in our market to do it, and that the foreigner recognizes his dependence on us. The taking of nearly a million bushels yesterday for export, after our sharp advance, adds the keystone to the arch. At harvest time every-body supposed there would be so much wheat this year that buyers would make the price, but our enormons' mipments abroad soon began to prove that we could put our prices higher if we would. Then the increase of speculation in our market indicated a disposition to do so, Now the good purchases by foreigners at the advance seem to make it plain that we can sell our wheat at the higher price' we' have thus established.
