





Toronto Junction, July 5.—What is the matter with the Toronto Junction milk supply? of butterfat than 3 per cent. In Ontario there is no such law, but municipalities invariably test milk in order to see that patrons of the local milkmen are informed upon the quality of milk they are receiving. In Toronto the tests are made, but are not published. In Toronto Junction the tests are made monthly, and inserted in the local papers. The report handed to the board to-night was that for the month of June, a month which in former years has shown a fair average, and which is generally considered a good month for milk generally considered a good month for milk and butter. Mr. Chrysler had with him a book containing every analysis since he book containing every analysis since he was first authorized to make monthly tests, and on turning back to the month of June in last year it was quite apparent that the quality of milk is getting poorer. The milk supplied by one dealer tested 4.8 when the first analysis was made. Last month the same dealer's supply tested 2.6, and has been failing in quality every month since it was first tested. There were two dealers which only averaged 2.6, and one which tested 2.8. There were five dealers selling milk below what it should be. The board thought it was their duty to let the public know that they were not receiving milk of good quality from some of the milk dealers, but how, they did not know. 




