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

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WIPED OUT A WHOLE FAMILY

One of the Bloodiest Affairs in the History of West Virginia Described.

THREE ITALIANS ARE IMPLICATED

Father and Son Dead—Two Sons and a Mother Fearfully Injured.

Stenleville, Ohio, July 5.—One of the bloodiest affairs in the history of West Virginia has occurred at Wheeling Junction last night, and three Italians left a trail of blood behind their knives, almost wiping out an entire family.

The dead—Jacob Eldenour, aged 80 years, stabbed in the heart; William Eldenour, a son, left jugular vein cut and stabbed in the heart.

The injured—Philip Eldenour, a son, stabbed over the eyes in the breast and on the side; Mrs. Jacob Eldenour, aged 55, stabbed in the left side; and Robert Eldenour, a son, cut on both arms.

According to Mrs. Philip Eldenour, the father, who was visiting Mr. Eldenour's parents, said, as they were leaving the home of Mr. Eldenour's parents, the father's family went on to the main road to see them off. Three Italians, part of a gang working on the road, saw them and one of them said something to Robert Eldenour, who called them a vulgar name. The three Italians then rushed at Robert, killing the father and son, and after stabbing Mrs. Philip Eldenour and Robert.

LABATT'S BREWERY.

One of the Leading Industries of Canada.

Established in 1852, its growth was slow at first, but in 1876, when the high commission medals and medals received at the Centennial Exhibition, Philadelphia, drew the attention of all consumers and the output increased rapidly. At this exhibition Mr. Labatt was awarded no less than four medals for the excellence of his products. He showed there the sparkling light beer, now so well-known to all ale consumers, lighter than the imported ale, but of so delicate a flavor and so palatable that it has been pronounced superior to any imported ale. Success at this exhibition was but the forerunner of many similar successes. Medals were awarded at Sydney, Australia, in 1877; at St. Louis, in 1878; at Chicago, World's Fair, in 1893, and at San Francisco, in 1894, not to mention numerous medals and diplomas from places of lesser importance.

The brewery and malt house in connection with it (for Mr. Labatt makes all the malt he uses) is very complete. All machinery and appliances are of the latest design. The water used for brewing, which comes from a spring on the premises, is most suitable, and the utmost care is taken to preserve and mature the goods properly. The draughtable collection of kegs, bottles and packers are kept busy, having, though the trade of the large cities of Canada is supplied from the other bottling depots.

A branch at 40 Elm Street, Toronto, which supplies the city trade, with both draught and bottled ale and porter, employs at the present time 21 hands. The building was specially constructed for the bottling business, and is complete in all its appointments. Mr. James L. Miller is the local manager.

A similar depot at 275 Kent Street, Ottawa, corner of Cooper Street, supplies that city and district. The building is a modern one, and specially adapted for the purpose, and like that in Toronto, an ornament to the neighborhood. Here a staff of 10 men with three horses are employed. The Montreal depot is situated on Desjardins Avenue, and the building extends from Mignonne Avenue to Albert Street. While recently located for the Montreal trade, Mr. Labatt has here 16 employees and three horses, who, with additional hands at times, are kept busy attending to the trade.

Mr. Labatt has his own depots at St. John, N.B., 51, 53, 55 Dock Street, where nine men are employed; at Quebec, at 35 Huggins Street, south, Hamilton, with seven men and three horses, and another at 3 St. Peter Street, Quebec, where six hands are kept busy attending to the city trade. In addition to the above, agencies are maintained at St. John's, Nfld., and Halifax, N.S.; Kingston, Ontario, and Brantford, Ont.; Three Rivers, Arkansas, River, La. and Lewis, St. Theresa, etc., in Quebec Province, and to the demand of the several localities.

RATHER A SCANDAL.

London, July 5.—It is reported that an examination of the accounts of the Camel Tobacco Company, Ltd., has disclosed a deficit of 14,000,000 marks. There are serious rumors that securities were twice pledged, and that the directors owe a large debt to the company.

BANK FAILURE AFTERMATH.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—In consequence of the failure of the Kharhoff Commercial Bank, the Commercial Bank of Russia has suspended payment yesterday. Its liabilities are 1,250,000 roubles.

TRAIN ROBBERS RECOGNIZED

Famous Curry Outlaws, With 'Kid' Curry Leader, Rifled the Great Northern Flyer.

SHERIFF'S POSSE HOT AFTER THEM

A Cow Puncher Meets Them and Tells a Story of a Wounded Bandit.

Harre, Mont., July 5.—The train robbers who held up the Great Northern Flyer Wednesday afternoon, near Wagner, have been recognized as the famous Curry outlaws.

Another is named Long Pole: the third man is unknown. All use the Texas dialect.

"Cow puncher" riding north from the Missouri River met the three bandits yesterday about 70 miles south of Malta, they asked the "cow puncher" to notify the men following them that they were being pursued.

The "cow puncher" had only gone about 10 miles when he met the three bandits with a posse of 45 men, comprising the best gun men of Montana. They were only about eight miles behind the robbers.

The posse is growing larger constantly, and their horses are being changed frequently. The "cow puncher" said the third man in the party had a bandage around his head. This man probably caused by one of two shots fired by Sheriff Griffith. It is now estimated at about \$55,000. It is now stated that Brakenwood is in the hands of the posse.
