





Jake Gettman Again the Star Ties Up Game With a Homer

Tokio, June 8.—Another crisis in the relations of Korea and Japan is impending. Unfriendliness of Koreans of the ruling class toward Japan is evidently increasing instead of diminishing.

It has developed that the privy council, composed of princes, elder statesmen and those who were formerly ministers, recently adopted a resolution prohibiting the employment of Japanese officials. Tho the privy council is powerless to carry out this project it is significant.

Prince Ito, the Japanese resident general, summoned the ministers and the state and prefectural governors and delivered a vigorous pronunciamento, declaring that if present conditions are allowed to continue the country will be lest. The Koreans, he said, raised wanton cries for repealing the Japanese Korean agreement, but to do so without sufficient national strength would mean less independence, naively reminding the Koreans that they must not forget they were once under the rule of China.

Several changes in the Korean cabinet are announced, the most important leing the transfer of Song Plungshun.

ROYAL TRAIN TO-DAY Germany is Said to Fear the Anglo-Russian Entente-Precautions

This is the first railway journey of any length that the emperor has taken since he made the trip to Samara on July 9, 1904, to review the troops going out to the Russo-Japanese war in Manchuria.

Meanwhile the press here pursues a more than ordinarily active propaganda, which is evidently inspired in the Wilhelmstrasse. The Norddeutsche Zeitung says the Anglo-Russian entente cannot harm the old friendly feeling between Russia and her neighbors. The Tageblatt says:

"We must be on the alert. Since the coming together of England and Russia the Russian press has taken up an anti-German tone, but we will show her how to weather the storm."

The Rundschau, in an editorial, openly last week discussed the possibility of war with Germany, ventilated in the English and French press, and in unlimited German hatred which appears in the Russian newspapers. The paper adds:

"We understand fully that the Anglo-Russian entente is aimed against Germany and is not peace-bringing but peace-stirring. King Edward is pursuing a policy of straining our relations, which in the long run will become unbearable, and the tension which will follow when the deceptions of an imaginary brotherhood are realized, will end in bitterness, which will lead to a fight for life or death. The European hatred for Germany has become a scandal."

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

Premier Whitney, at the banquet tendered to him by the Borden Club, at the recent great demonstration at London, and at Friday's big meeting in Massey Hall, was made aware by the spontaneous and strikingly fervid applause on the mention of the Niagara power policy, that the people regard it more dearly than any other item on the Conservative program. No other factor has weighed so heavily in the campaign. The Liberals have lost ground to the extent that Hon. A. G. MacKay endeavored to discredit the government's efforts and methods. They have gained influence in the few instances that Grit candidates have earnestly advocated the adoption or the support of Hon. Mr. Beck's ideas.

The government has an optional contract to supply power to the municipalities at a price which is really a bargain counter figure. The municipalities are thus enabled to take power at cost if they want it. If they do not want it that is their lookout. All the municipalities know their liability to be side-tracked if they do not get on equal terms with their neighbors. Consequently it is only in a few instances where party feeling has run high that any serious opposition has arisen to the scheme. Much has been made of the cost of transmission. As the transmission system will be paid for by the municipalities, out of the tolls charged customers, and will revert to them as their property on the redemption of the bonds, it will be seen that each year the line becomes a more and more valuable asset. The price of power would, of course, be reduced when the plant is paid for, as it never would be under private ownership, and the increasing number of consumers will also constantly tend to the same result.
