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REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS, WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

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169 172 The regular meetings of the Executive were held during the year, also two special meetings to hear the report of the General Superintendent on his inspection of Japan Missions, and to consult with the Executive of the General Society, respecting missionary legislation for the General Conference.

CHINA.

Dr. Anna Henry, of Markdale, who was in April accepted and appointed to China, is now waiting to be sent to her field of labor.

JAPAN.

Miss Hattie Jost, who at the last Board meeting was expected soon to leave for Japan, was delayed by family bereavement. She reached Japan about the first of March.

In June, Miss Lambly, after four years of service, was obliged by the state of her health to come home. She accompanied Miss Crombie who was returning on furlough. Miss Veazey's year of rest expired in July when she returned to Japan. Letters were received early in the year from the different mission stations, showing the harmony and co-operation between our missionaries and the native pastors.

Two more workers for Japan were advertised for.

A special joint meeting of the two Executives was held in July to hear the report of the General Superintendent on his visit to the Japan Mission.

The points touching the work of the Woman's Missionary Society were afterwards informally considered by your Executive, and, at a subsequent joint Executive meeting, the following was adopted:

1. As to tenure of land.—As outside of concessions it can only be held by Japanese trustees, writings shall be taken from them acknowedging the trust, duly sealed.

2. Tabernacle work, Hongo.—Agreed that one or two native Bible-women be appointed in joint session of the two councils to be under the direction of the Foreign Missionary at the Tabernacle, the

missionary to furnish the Woman's Council annually with a report of the work of the Bible-women and send bills for their salary—the W. M. S. to pay said salary.

3. That the relation of the wives of foreign missionaries to the work be the same as that of the wives of missionaries at home.

4. That the W. M. S. will supply women workers when requested by the joint Council, as far as available workers and funds will permit.

5 and 6. Joint meetings of councils should not be at the pleasure of either council. They should meet for co-operation and advancement of work and for spiritual power. A joint meeting shall be held at least once in the year at a fixed time, and joint meetings of their Executives when practicable, reports of such meetings to be sent the secretary of each Board. In cases where the councils are not able to agree upon matters within their powers they shall refer such questions to the Home Boards for final decision. For purposes of agreement a majority of each council shall be necessary.

7. The relation of the W. M. S. agents to the native Church is satisfactory as far as known to the Woman's Executive. Recommended that they (W. M. S. agents) be urged to be loyal to the missionaries of the General Society, giving them all the support possible.

8. As to co-operation between the missionaries of the two societies, it is believed that present arrangements, with suggestions in previous paragraphs, are sufficient to meet the case. In all cases the interests of the work at large shall be considered paramount.

9. The Foreign Missionary shall be regarded as a leader.

It was also resolved "That the Sunday Schools in Japan, conducted in the homes of the people by the W. M. S., shall be reported in the Minutes of Conference as under the control of the W. M. S."

CHINESE WORK IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

As the taxes on the Chinese Girls' Home were omitted from the appropriation at the last Board meeting, the Executive appropriated \$88.67 for the purpose.

The former owner of Quai Shing (Elsie), one of the rescued girls in the Home, appealed to the Supreme Court to regain possession of her. The appeal was dismissed, Dr. J. Maclaren, appearing for the W. M. S.

Word was received of a difficulty in arranging the work in connection with the Home. Subsequent letters showed that affairs were adjusted, and suggested that the work might now be accomplished by two missionaries and a Chinese Bible-woman.

Miss Bowes tendered her resignation in June, and it was accepted on the recommendation of the Advisory Committee, but subsequently a request was received from that committee for Miss Bowes' resignation not to

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As the W. M. S An ex tion not to take effect until after the Board meeting. This was agreed to.

Mrs. Gordon Grant was appointed a member of the Advisory Committee.

In view of the time Miss Churchill devotes to the work of the General Society, a request was sent that they pay at least \$150 of her salary.

INDIAN WORK.

In June, Miss Elliott, of Toronto, was sent to the Crosby Home as:

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An account of \$100 was paid for insurance on the Home, and an extra appropriation of \$400 was granted for maintenance. A request having been received from the Advisory Committee for additional desks and stoves, a committee was appointed to get estimates and report to the Board.

Miss Spence returned in June to her post at Port Simpson, taking with her an outfit of nurse's instruments provided by our society at

a cost of \$42.61.

The need of a small organ at Crosby Home and at Coqualeetza Institute having been brought before your Executive, advantage was taken of an opportunity to secure two at a very small cost, and they were shipped in May.

The expenses of the Coqualeetza Institute having exceeded the appropriation by \$238.86, the W. M. S. share of deficit was paid.

A memorial was received from the B. C. Branch asking for the \$500 conditionally appropriated for work on the Upper Skeena at the last Board meeting.

The officers of the General Executive were consulted, and stated that their society finds it impossible at present to undertake work on the Skeena. It was therefore decided that your Executive could not comply with the request.

The B. C. Conference's endorsation of placing the Kit-a-maat work

on a permanent basis was received.

CANDIDATES.

In addition to the candidates referred to who have been appointed to fields, the applications of nine others have been considered by your Executive, four of whom were provisionally accepted. One of these, Miss Wiggins, has since been appointed by the General Society to a position in the Brandon Institute.

GENERAL

As the French Institute exceeded its appropriation by \$150 the W. M. S. share of the deficit was paid.

An extra appropriation of \$10 was also made to Palm Branch.

The \$500 conditionally appropriated by the last Board to the Newfoundland Orphanage was paid after receiving a report from the Treasurer showing the need of the money.

To economize space in the *Outlook* it was decided to omit the publication of the missionary roll and of the standing committees.

To ensure uniformity in the information given to the Annual Conferences, a draft of an address was prepared for the use of the representatives of our society to the Conferences.

The Field Corresponding Secretary also gave a report of our work to the General Conference, which with the Treasurer's Report for the quadrennium, was sent to the Committee on Missions for consideration.

Forms for the use of foreign fields in making their annual reports to the Board were also prepared by the Field Corresponding Secretary and adopted.

An invitation was received from the American Board of Commissioners of Foreign Missions asking the W. M. S. to send two or more delegates to a ten days' convention to be held in New York, commencing 20th April, 1900—a Woman's Conference to be held in connection with it. Your Executive referred the invitation to the favorable consideration of the Board, and agreed to become responsible for \$5 postage in connection with the convention, as requested.

In pursuance of a resolution of the last Board, your Executive appointed a sub-committee of five to meet a like committee of the General Executive, and confer on the enlargement of the *Outlook* and other matters of mutual interest.

In consulting about the *Outlook* it was learned that the circulation is 8,500 to 9,000; 1,500 free copies are sent to ministers; \$140.45 was the cost of publishing the December issue of 9,200. There are practically no subscribers outside of Auxiliary lists. It pays its way, but there are no profits.

The following is the report of the joint Committee:

As during the past year the question of a separate paper for the Woman's Missionary Society has been under consideration, this joint Committee is of opinion that one paper to cover the interests of both societies is preferable for many reasons. But to this end it is necessary that the *Outlook* be enlarged so as to afford sufficient space. We therefore recommend our respective Executives and Boards:

1. To authorize the enlargement of the Outlook, but retaining the price as at present.

2. To appoint a small joint Committee of Publication to settle all matters of detail.

3. That the two societies share equally in profits or deficit which may result from the publication of the Outlook.

4. That after the present year the free list be discontinued.

5. That in the event of enlargement it is recommended that, if practicable, the Campaigner, the Palm Branch and the Monthly Letter be included in the Outlook.

Dr. Dav who has fo there, was Board and unfortunat This report was adopted by your Executive. It afterwards came before the General Executive and was adopted in substance with some additions, as follows:

Paragraph 1. Twenty-four pages specified.

2. Two members from each Executive to be associated with Editor-in-Chief and Editor of Woman's Department.

5. Referred to committee provided for in paragraph 2.

The joint Committee also recommended the following clause as a substitute for the missionary clause in Epworth League constitution

in the Discipline:

"To have a share in all the missionary work of the Church and to become familiar with its varied lines of enterprise, this Committee shall seek to interest the League in all missionary topics and shall promote the interests of the General Missionary Society, and the Woman's Missionary Society, equitably dividing between them any funds that may be raised."

Also that the words, "In foreign fields," be prefixed to Sec. 5 (a) on

page 195 of Discipline.

These two recommendations were adopted by your Executive, but no report has reached your Secretary as to the action of the General Executive.

The granting of furloughs to missionaries on Indian fields was also discussed by the joint Committee, but no recommendation adopted, the General Society adhering to its policy of granting no furloughs to its agents on Indian fields, special cases being considered on their merits.

Dr. Davidson Macdonald, who recently returned from Japan, and who has for years been the true friend and kind counsellor of our ladies there, was invited by your Executive to attend the meeting of the Board and to give an address at the public meeting, but was, unfortunately, not able to accept.

The seventeenth annual meeting of the Board of Managers of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church was held in Sydenham Street Church, Kingston, on Tuesday, October 18th, and the three following days.

Mrs. Carman, Vice-President, presided at the opening session, and was assisted in the devotional exercises by the officers of the Board.

The privileges of the Convention were accorded to the returned missionaries, the same courtesy being extended to Mrs. Thomas Crosby, of Victoria, B.C.

The reports of the Secretary and Treasurer showed an annual membership of 14,693, an increase of 462. Life-members, 916, an increase of 74. Mission Circle and Band members, 7,223, an increase of 747.

Receipts from Auxiliaries, Mission Circles and Bands and Epworth Leagues, \$38,031.11—increase, \$1,575.79. Total receipts, \$40,824.96—increase, \$1,691.44. The Bequest account has, in addition, a balance of \$4,105.73.

Reports of Branches and Newfoundland Auxiliaries, of the Executive, of the Literature Department and of the Supply Committee were presented to the Board and appear elsewhere.

The Nova Scotia Branch announced its union with the separate Auxiliaries of Newfoundland, the name henceforth to be the Nova Scotia and Newfoundland Branch.

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The New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Branch reported that a missionary scholarship which had been established at Mount Allison College, is now held by a W. M. S. candidate from that Branch.

Official letters from the different mission fields were received and

their financial reports adopted.

Miss Brackbill requested the appointment of another Secretary-Treasurer for the mission in China, as she may find it necessary to return home. The time for her furlough has come, but if her health will permit, she wishes to remain until the workers are reinforced.

A list of drugs needed for the medical work was received and

ordered to be purchased.

It was decided that Dr. Anna Henry, who is under appointment to China, should spend the time until her departure in acquiring

practical knowledge which will be useful in her work.

As a new building is necessary for the Azabu Girls' School, Tokyo, Japan, it was resolved to erect one suitable to the needs of the work, \$3,500 to be appropriated now, and the balance paid next year. It was also resolved that a new site be purchased for the school, as the present one belongs to the General Society which needs it for the extension of its work.

The W. M. S. has had the free use of this site since the Girls' School was first built. The funds to the credit of the bequest account

are to be applied towards the purchase of the land.

The Kanazawa work is also in need of new buildings, but in view of the pressing demands in Tokyo, the request for an appropriation for that purpose could not be granted at present.

The next Easter thank-offering is asked for the new buildings and sites necessary in Japan, the offerings from Mission Circles and Bands to be especially devoted to the orphanage in Kanazawa.

The Board was memorialized to establish Schools of Industry in Japan, to save girls from being treated as articles of merchandise. While sympathizing deeply in this object, it was decided that the Society was already doing all that its funds would warrant in that line of work.

In accordance with the desire of Herbie Bellamy, the money raised by the Moose Jaw Mission Band is to be given to the Kanazawa Orphanage, sufficient being retained for the student now supported by that Band, as long as this is recommended by the Mission Council.

Two more workers for Japan were provisionally appointed, one of them being Miss Morgan, of the Chinese Girls' Home, Victoria.

A constitution was adopted for Mission Councils in foreign fields, which will be found under "Instructions to Missionaries."

The Committee on Indian Affairs recommended the following:

Kit-a-maat.—That \$300 be granted for matron's salary, \$400 for maintenance, and \$500 towards building.

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g: 00 for Upper Skeena.—In addition to the \$500 appropriated last year, that \$500 be granted for maintenance.

That an assistant nurse be provided for Port Simpson hospital.

White Fish Lake.—That the grant of \$300 be continued.

Norway House.—That until a properly equipped hospital is erected, provision be made for a trained nurse, with medical outfit.

These recommendations were adopted, the appropriation for a nurse at Norway House being left to the Executive, as, in any event, one could not leave until spring.

The staff of the Crosby Girls' Home being much overworked,

provision was made for a matron's assistant.

The question of a conditional re-appropriation of \$500 to Bella Bella was left for the Executive to decide.

A request for help at Clayoquot on the west coast of Vancouver Island, was not granted, owing to demands on the funds, though sympathy was felt with the object.

The estimates for the year for Coqualeetza Institute amount to \$9,000. It is expected that the income will meet the expenditure, but a suggestion was made that each society appropriate \$500 for a possible deficit. This was also left to the Executive.

A list was received from Morley Institute of furnishings purchased with the grant made by the Board for that purpose last year.

It was intimated that the friends of the Newfoundland Orphanage hoped to carry on the work in the future without asking for a grant from the Board.

The changes in the Constitution, which were considered last year and left for the Manitoba and British Columbia Branches to endorse, were adopted; also some changes recommended by the Editing Committee of the Report (see by-laws, resolutions, etc.).

The following resolutions, of which due notice had been given to the

Branches, were considered:

That Art. V., Sec. 1 of the Constitution be amended so that delegates to the Board shall be elected in the proportion of one to every thousand members. Not carried.

That Art. V., Sec. 1 read "one to every eight hundred members."

Not carried.

That Branches numbering five hundred members or less shall be entitled to send a delegate to the Board in case the President or Corresponding Secretary is not able to attend. Carried.

That Branches have only two Vice-Presidents. Not carried.

That names of Auxiliary members be omitted from the Annual Report. Left for each Branch to decide.

A memorial from British Columbia Branch, asking that their District Organizers and Superintendents of Proportionate Giving be made members of the Branch, was referred back, being within the jurisdiction of the Branches.

MINU

That Art. VII of Constitution for Mission Circles and Bands be changed to provide that the funds shall be remitted quarterly through Where there is no Auxiliary they shall be sent the Auxiliary. direct to the Branch Treasurer.

That the Mission Band Schedule formerly in use be again adopted. That Auxiliaries be responsible for the presentation of the work of the W. M. S. to the Epworth League once a year, and that this be

a by-law for Auxiliaries.

That Mission Circles and Bands and Epworth Leagues entitled to representation at the Branch Meeting be notified of the meeting by the Branch Mission Band Corresponding Secretary, and that she be instructed as to this duty.

That the programme for Mission Bands be published in Palm

That Art. IV. of Constitution for Auxiliaries be amended by inserting "by ballot without nomination" after "elected."

That Auxiliary By-law 10 be amended by inserting "by ballot

without nomination " after " elected."

That Art. V. of Constitution for Auxiliaries be amended by striking

out all words before "the officers."

That when change of Constitution is requested notice shall be sent to the Home Corresponding Secretary, who shall send a copy to each Branch before its annual meeting. The notices shall also be published in the Outlook as soon as practicable.

That Branch Corresponding Secretaries meet an hour before the Board meeting to classify memorials, record the findings of the

Branches and report to the Board.

That certificates be furnished life-members without extra charge.

That 3,500 Annual Reports be printed.

That the W. M. S. furnish a room in the new Deaconess Home and Training School for the use of missionary candidates, and that it be called "The Rebecca Williams room."

That the W. M. S. found a scholarship in the Deaconess Home and Training School for the benefit of missionary candidates, and that it

be called "The Strachan Scholarship."

That the course of study for missionary candidates be revised.

That the furlough salary of our missionaries be \$300.

The W. M. S. Editor of Outlook was again authorized to condense auxiliary and district reports. Subsequently a resolution was passed directing that auxiliary reports for publication be sent to the Branch Recording Secretary who shall prepare a summary for the Outlook.

Other resolutions considered were:

That schedules for the annual reports of Auxiliary Corresponding Secretaries and Treasurers be amended to harmonize with that of the Home Corresponding Secretary. Referred to the Executive Committee.

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rresponding that of the utive ComThat Branches prepare and present their own report of the work of the W. M. S to the Annual Conferences. Referred to the Executive Committee.

That the Literature Committee provide for the study of the Annual Report in the suggested programme every month. Left to discretion of Literature Committee.

That subscriptions to the Monthly Letter begin in January. Not carried.

That Mission Circles and Bands with twenty-five members, or contributing \$25, be entitled to representation at the Branch Meeting. Not carried.

That a number of Supply Committee reports be published for distribution at the Annual Conferences. Not carried.

The Board was memorialized to enter a protest against the decision of the General Conference *re* Women on Church Boards. Not entertained.

A resolution was adopted expressing regret that a licensed canteen for the sale of liquors in Canadian camps and barracks is permitted by the military authorities, and praying that its presence may be speedily and totally abolished.

Miss Palmer was requested to prepare a leaflet on the duty of officers.

Mrs. Strachan was appointed a member of the Programme Committee for the World's Missionary Convention, to be held in New York in 1900.

A communication was received from the Registrar of the Women's Medical College, stating that on account of loss of revenue entailed, the discount hitherto allowed to missionary medical students would be discontinued.

A cordial invitation which was extended by Mrs. Strachan, on behalf of the Centenary Auxiliary, to hold the next Board meeting in Hamilton, was heartily accepted.

The thanks of the Board were sent to Mr. Fred. Roper for his kindness in auditing the treasurer's books, with a request that he act as auditor next year.

At the closing session word was received of the death of Mrs. Rosebrugh, of Hamilton, a former treasurer of the Society. A letter of sympathy was directed to be written to her son.

The report of the joint Committee re Outlook, as it appears in the report of the Executive, was adopted, except the item referring to the amalgamation of Palm Branch. The Monthly Letter is to be published in the Outlook, but, in addition, if practicable, some are to be struck off for circulation as at present. Miss Wilkes and Mrs. Kerr were appointed members of the joint Committee of Publication. The editor of the W. M. S. half of the Outlook is to be called the Associate Editor.

MINU

The Committee on Japanese Industrial Work reported:

Receipts from sale of embroideries, \$509.05; By duty, embroidery silks, patterns and postage, \$80.42; Net proceeds, \$428.63, an increase of \$271.67 over last year.

The Candidate Committee recommended three candidates from the Hamilton Branch, two to be placed on the reserve list and one to be appointed to Japan.

The acceptance of a candidate from the Toronto Conference Branch for evangelistic work in China was confirmed.

A candidate from the N. B. and P. E. I. Branch, now holding the missionary scholarship in Mount Allison College, was recommended for acceptance.

The Committee also recommended that the resignation of Miss Bowes be reconsidered, and that she be retained in the Chinese Girls' Home. The report was adopted.

The Courtesy Committee submitted a resolution of thanks to the pastors, trustees, and choirs of the Sydenham and Queen Street churches; to hosts, and hostesses, for the generous welcome extended in their homes and at the reception of Tuesday evening; to the Press, and to all who had contributed to the success of the Board Meeting.

Greetings were given to the returned missionaries present, and sympathy and appreciation to our missionaries in Home and Foreign fields. The Newfoundland Auxiliaries were welcomed to the sisterhood of the Branches, thanks presented to the Executive and the editors, and loving sympathy expressed for the beloved President of the Board.

These reports were adopted.

On Thursday afternoon Mrs. Williams, President of the Montreal Branch, conducted the testimony meeting. It was preceded by "Remarks from Missionaries," including Mrs. Thos. Crosby, and Miss McGivern, a missionary candidate. At the close, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by the Rev. E. B. Lanceley, pastor of the church.

A tea and reception were tendered the Board in Sydenham Street Church on Tuesday evening, by the Sydenham and Queen Street Auxiliaries, followed by a public session, when greetings were given from the two Auxiliaries and from sister societies. Dr. Bolton and Rev. Thos. Crosby delivered addresses.

The public anniversary was held on Wednesday evening in Queen Street Church, when Miss Smith, of Chilliwack. and Miss Crombie, of Japan, spoke of the work in their respective fields. Mrs. Carman presided at the evening meetings, the devotional exercises being conducted by the pastors of the churches, assisted by the Rev. R. Whiting.

REPORT OF FIELD CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF THE W. M. S., 1897-98.

As the tribes of Israel went up yearly to the feasts of the Lord in Jerusalem, singing psalms of trust and gladness, ever recruiting their ranks on the way, thus adding to their enthusiasm and sense of unity, always bringing a younger member of some family to introduce to the courts of the Lord; always regretfully leaving behind some aged pilgrim, whose heart, but not whose steps, are with the joyous worshippers; so we from the east and west gathered in our annual meeting with thanksgiving to God, and in loving fellowship with one another.

The fifteen "Songs of Degrees," as sung by the pilgrims to Zion, were not more appropriate to them than to us.

"In my distress I cried unto the Lord, and he heard me."

"I will lift mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help."

"I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of the Lord."

"Unto thee lift I up mine eyes. O thou that dwellest in the heavens."

"If it had not been the Lord who was on our side," etc.

"They that trust in the Lord shall be as Mount Zion, which cannot be removed but abideth forever."

"The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad."
"Except the Lord build the house they labor in vain the

"Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it."

"Blessed is every one that feareth the Lord, that walketh in his ways."

"Many a time have they afflicted me from my youth, yet they have not prevailed against me."

"Out of the depths have I cried unto thee, O Lord."
"Lord, my heart is not haughty nor my eyes lofty."

"For the Lord hath chosen Zion, he hath desired it for his habitation."

"Behold how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity."

"Behold, bless ye the Lord, all ye servants of the Lord."

"The Lord that made heaven and earth bless thee out of Zion."

Surely in these Psalms we can find expression, as individuals or as a society, for all varieties of our experience, from the depths of affliction to the heights of deliverance and triumph; from trembling fear to unshaken trust; from self-abasement to the shout of those clothed with salvation and crowned with victory; from those shrinking under impending trouble to those who have escaped; from those who have sown in tears to those who have reaped in joy.

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"What shall we render unto the Lord for all his benefits?"

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Shall we make known in part what He has been accomplishing through the varied, yet united, agencies of this Society; for all connected with it have had a share, from the devoted earnest missionaries to the youngest child that has carried home the truth taught, and has thus, perhaps, been the last link in bringing the parents to come and hear for themselves "the Gospel of the blessed God"; from our honored and beloved President to the youngest member of a Mission Band; from Newfoundland on the east to far-away western China on the borders of Tibet.

Unitedly we say, "Now, therefore our God, we thank Thee and praise Thy glorious name, for all things come of Thee, and of Thine own have we given Thee."

Taking in the whole scope of our work we can thankfully report advance in membership, in resources, in stations, in pupils.

JAPAN.

All our schools being conducted on strictly Christian lines, that is, with the Bible daily taught and intelligently studied, with the atmosphere of prayer to God, and with kind forbearance and helpfulness to one another, we are not surprised to learn of a deepening spiritual growth. For coldness of heart they find, as we do here, that earnest work is an excellent remedy; hence those who have accepted Christ are encouraged to seek others, and are taught how to work and win.

The Sabbath is made especially attractive, and former pupils esteem it a great privilege when they can return from their homes, where they perhaps stand alone as Christians, and can spend a Sabbath in their old school home, and thus gain strength and courage.

The three schools in the cities of Tokyo, Shizuoka and Kofu have 138 boarding and ninety-three day pupils. Of these eighty-seven are attending class, five having been baptized this last year. Studies are carried on both in English and Japanese; three have graduated in the former and seven in the latter the past season; also two in the sewing department.

As evidence of the intimate relation between educational and evangelistic work, thirty-five students assist in specific religious effort, and eleven trained native helpers, besides six Bible-women; but the great difficulty is to find suitable and qualified workers. However, special effort for the evangelization and instruction of women is made by our lady missionaries in twenty-four stations. Six hundred and sixty-four meetings for women have been held, while every Sabbath, in the sixteen Sunday Schools under our care, an average of 485 children are taught concerning the Saviour of the world.

What effect must this have not only on the children themselves, but on the homes where they repeat what they have learned? In

addition, 112 children's meetings have been held with a good average attendance, which is increasing.

Among the women 5,322 visits have been made, and as a gracious reward twenty-seven have been received into the Church and baptized. How much this must mean to those who have patiently met with these women, perhaps half a dozen at a time, and, after "line upon line," have watched the gradual awakening of interest and intelligent grasp of a portion of the truth, to be treasured and pondered until the next time when a little more would be received.

The King's Daughters' School reaches out to sixty-four poor children who otherwise would receive no intellectual or spiritual training. This, too, furnishes a fine outlet for the zeal and effort of the Christian girls.

We must not forget to visit the two orphanages in Tokyo and Kanazawa, which shelter and train children until they are old enough to be apprenticed. There are now twenty-nine whose tiny fingers are taught such industries as they can compass.

In Kanazawa there are also day and night schools for the poor and industrial classes. Through giving employment, instruction and Sabbath privilege are thus afforded them. In this city it is urged that land be secured, a home built for our missionaries where they could have more direct supervision of the work, and come in closer contact with those whose lives they are trying to brighten.

Various other lines of activity indicate but little rest or recreation for these Canadian young women who so faithfully carry on the work of the Woman's Missionary Society—classes for young men, for policemen, for Bible-women, for other workers, visits to hospital, etc.

Of late permission has been granted in Shizuoka and Kofu to hold short meetings in two or three cotton and silk factories—long desired and so much needed—where the busy wheels are whirling seven days in the week, and the tired women and girls have to keep pace with them from 5 a.m. to 7 p.m. What chance for body, mind or soul?

This last year a new city (Nagano) has been entered. A few pupils have been taught and meetings held in several surrounding places. Two Sunday Schools have been opened since March, and two women baptized. Providential leadings are being carefully watched that the best line of work may be adopted.

The mother school in Tokyo, from which such strong healthful influences have emanated, and whose impress for good has marked so many youthful lives during these past fourteen years, finds itself in urgent need of new quarters. The land so kindly loaned by the General Missionary Society is now required for the use of the Boys' School to enlarge their playground. A good part of our building has become very much dilapidated, and it will be a question for this Board to decide on the advisability of securing a most advantageous lot in the neighborhood, now offered for sale, and erecting a building suited to the present and prospective needs.

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This review of the work in Japan would be sadly lacking were there not some regretful reference to the withdrawal from the mission staff, owing to ill health, of Rev. Dr. Macdonald, who, from our entrance on that field sixteen years ago, has never failed to be the sympathizing friend, the courteous gentleman, the patient and wise counsellor, the practical helper, the skilful and untiring physician both to teachers and pupils, and very often, in times of discouragement and perplexity, has proved himself "the shadow of a great rock in a weary land." Our missionaries, and we as a Society, owe to him and his kind companion a debt of gratitude which cannot be repaid, but will not soon be forgotten.

CHINA.

In China we have four representatives—two teachers, one lady doctor and a nurse—now comfortably settled in their convenient and cheerful home. The dormitories have been completed, and we rejoice to report fourteen little boarders with, of course, unbound feet. A second day-school or class has been opened on the premises and a capable woman placed in charge. Forty-three day pupils have been enrolled.

The "Jennie Ford" Home, providing for fifteen, has been finished. It must surely be a sort of heaven to the five little rescued waifs. One of these has already been transferred to the heavenly home, and the kindness and respect shown to such a young child by Christians has made a deep impression on the neighborhood. This is the first one to greet her in whose memory the Home was established.

Every Sabbath about sixty-five children are taught in the Sunday School conducted by our missionaries, and some fifty women at the same hour come to hear the story of redemption. Tuesday afternoon the Rev. Mr. Hartwell conducts a meeting for women which is well attended.

Medical work is also being carried on, although our ladies have tried to follow the advice so earnestly given to devote the first year chiefly to study. Four pleasant rooms in the hospital have been lathed and plastered, other wards have board partitions, the wall around the compound has been freshly plastered with lime and soot. Eighty treatments have been given since the dispensary was temporarily closed, and several cases of measles were under care at last accounts. It was expected full medical work would again begin in November.

Tracts and leaflets have been distributed liberally, with prayer that the Spirit of God might use the printed page in opening the mind to the reception of the truth. Many opportunities have to be unused through lack of workers, native and foreign, or through inability to use the language.

CHINESE HOME, VICTORIA, B.C.

The history of this home during the year has been varied and somewhat depressing at times, owing to the restlessness of some of the girls. One who had gone away was, however, glad to return after an absence of some months. Another, whose case had been brought into court several times (always resulting in her being continued in the care of the Home, and this being confirmed when an appeal was taken to the Supreme Court), still remains an anxiety and a great care. Of late she has been allowed to attend the public school and has seemed more contented. For a time there were three Chinese and three Japanese in the Home, but two of the latter have left and so the scene changes.

During the summer one of the married girls, Daisy—after an operation in the hospital for appendicitis—passed away, we believe, to the better land, the first of our band in Victoria. care and toil have been the portion of the Home-Mother, but she has not been without evidence of the Lord's presence and acceptance of The Friday meeting has had an increased attendance and has proved a great spiritual help to the Chinese who come there

to worship and to be instructed.

A Mission Band formed in the Home has awakened an interest for others, and quite a liberal offering has been made. The evangelistic work has continued both in Victoria and other places, sixty-one homes having been entered, and where formerly admission was denied, a welcome is now given; 1,011 visits have been made, and at intervals trips have been taken to the mainland. The Home girls have been taught, and a meeting on Sabbath afternoons, averaging

sixteen in attendance, has been "a real joy."

Both among Chinese and Japanese, literature has been distributed and Gospel seed scattered wherever opportunity offered. During the year a day-school has been opened in the Home. Seventy have been enrolled with an average attendance of thirty-six. A flourishing night-school has been for some time carried on at the Chinese chapel under the General Missionary Society, and forty-seven of these boys have also availed themselves of the day-school. Bright and tractable, they have shown unvarying kindness to their teacher and several have become Christians.

INDIAN WORK.

PORT SIMPSON, B. C.

The Crosby Girls' Home, situated in this the prettiest and most advanced Indian village on the Pacific coast, has had a good record this past year. The number of pupils has reached forty and gratifying progress has been made in all departments. An increased love of reading made, and earnestne on the or one. A g in charge

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The co removed name, w of reading has been manifest, a creditable display of needlework was made, and improved lives and deportment have evidenced a deeper earnestness of spiritual conviction. Five girls have received lessons on the organ, a new instrument being welcomed in place of the old one. A good deal of sickness has added greatly to the care of those in charge.

We are glad to note that the Institution is gaining in the confi-

dence of the parents.

HOSPITAL.

The two nurses maintained here have been unremitting in their devotion to their arduous duties, ministering to the sick both in the building and among the villagers, also at Port Essington on the Skeena. Miss Spence has been most heartily welcomed back after her furlough in Ontario, taking with her a nurse's outfit in the way of surgical and other appliances, which will be of great service especially in the absence of the doctor.

COQUALEETZA INDIAN INSTITUTE, CHILLIWACK, B.C.

No longer does this make a heavy financial claim on our Society, but we rejoice in its increasing prosperity. Nearly one hundred pupils have been in residence, and not only in their studies but in industrial lines they are progressing. This last year, among the girls, has been marked by quite an advance in their already proficient sewing department, over \$120 having been earned by dressmaking.

It is a busy family both in the house and out in the fields, in the laundry and in the shoe shop, in the dairy and at the carpenter's bench. Healthy, intelligent, useful Christian citizenship is the aim

of the earnest teachers in charge.

KIT-A-MAAT, B.C.

The grant made to Rev. Mr. Raley has enabled him to keep some thirty Indian children, training them in morals and leading them to better lives than their parents knew. Here sickness has added greatly to the care of those already heavily burdened with all the daily demands which such a household brings.

The common-place, unnoticed duties of these faithful toilers, so far removed from the privileges of Christian civilization, done in His

name, will not lose their reward.

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FRENCH WORK.

The French Methodist Institute, Montreal, has had in attendance fifty boys and forty-two girls. General good health has prevailed. Harmony and hard work have been characteristic. The religious life of the pupils has deepened, and twelve new names have been added to the membership of the Church.

EVANGELISTIC.

The East and West End schools, with an enrolment of seventy-two and one hundred respectively, supplemented by the visits of the Biblewomen, have continued their beneficent work and have had a quiet influence for good on many lives.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

The Methodist Orphanage in St. John's continues its much-needed aid to those deprived of their natural guardians, but the friends in that city who are so notably generous in our Methodism have signified their intention of trying to do without the grant given for several years by the Woman's Missionary Society.

After thus glancing over our various fields, what can we say?

"Who is sufficient for these things?"

From every station our workers send the plea, "Pray for us." As we read their letters from month to month shall we not follow each individual mentioned with a prayer? In our several perplexities and labors we are "workers together" with one another and with God; and may we not confidently expect the fulfilment of His assurance, "My grace is sufficient for thee, for my strength is made perfect in weakness."

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HOME CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT, 1897-98.

In reviewing the work of the year we are sorry to note, for the first time, a decrease in the number of Auxiliaries.

We report 679 Auxiliaries, a decrease of one, with 14,693 annual members, an increase of 462, and 916 life-members, making a total membership of 15,609.

The number of Mission Circles and Bands is 279, increase 2, with a membership of 7,223, an increase of 747.

We are thankful for the help given, and the interest shown by the young people of our Church, the amount contributed by them, through the Circles and Bands, being \$6,198.96, an increase of \$344.53, and from Epworth Leagues, \$638.08, making a total of \$6,838.04.

Great interest has been manifested in the special support of children in the boarding school and Jennie Ford Orphanage, West China. The Walsingham Centre (Ont.) League has assumed the support of a girl in the school; the Junior League of Waterdown. Ont., of another, and the Mission Band of Goderich, Ont., of a third. A Sunday-morning class of girls in the First Church, London, has taken charge of one of the little ones in the Orphanage, the leader, Mrs. Eccles, becoming responsible for the amount necessary during this year.

The Epworth League of Avon, Ont., has undertaken the support of a Bible-woman in Japan; an Auxiliary, that of another; and a third is being supported by a private member of an Auxiliary. These are the additions during the year to the previous list.

Acting on the suggestion given by the Board last year, the Newfoundland Auxiliaries have affiliated with the Nova Scotia Branch. We hope this union may prove to be of mutual benefit, and pray that Auxiliaries and Branch may be abundantly blessed in their coming together. And so will we ever pray, "Establish thou the work of our hands upon us; yea, the work of our hands establish thou it."

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REPORT OF LITERATURE COMMITTEE.

The work of the Literature Committee has increased so steadily that it has this year been found necessary to departmentize it to some extent amongst the members.

At the close of last year the Woman's Missionary Society books were revised and a new set brought out, the Committee deeming it advisable to print only two—one for the Recording Secretary and one for the Treasurer.

An envelope for monthly offerings has been provided, consisting of one envelope containing twelve smaller ones.

Arrangements were completed by which the Committee now issues the Missionary Pins, a royalty on each being paid to the owners, which sum eventually returns to our Woman's Missionary Society. Gold pins for both Auxiliary and Mission Band life members have been issued, and a silver pin for Mission Bands. These are all very pretty and we think have found favor with the Society.

The leaflet "Origin and Work" was revised and added to by Mrs. Willmott, Mrs. McKay and Mrs. Strachan, and now appears under the new name of "Organization and Work of the Woman's Missionary Society."

In response to a memorial from Brampton, received at the last Board meeting, the Committee has under preparation a little Missionary Hymnal, words only, which we hope to issue this autumn.

More attention this year has been paid to helps for Mission Bands; we find, however, this class of literature very difficult to obtain. "Bricks for Builders," by Mrs. Gayfer, of Hamilton, is a very valuable addition to our Mission Band literature.

Twenty-one thousand envelopes for Auxiliaries and eight thousand for Mission Bands were sent out for the Easter Thank-offering, containing "An Appeal" prepared by the New Brunswick Branch.

The Cycle of Prayer has been revised and subjected to some alterations and improvements.

The Committee has under consideration the preparation of slides for lanterns giving views of the Homes, Schools, Hospitals maintained by the Woman's Missionary Society and other points of interest to members of our Society.

The issue of the *Monthly Letter* is 13,000 copies. We hope to receive some valuable suggestions concerning it from the papers given at the various Branch meetings on the subject.

We are pleased to state that the establishment of Branch depots has not interfered in the slightest degree with the business of Room 20, but rather the reverse.

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SUPPLY COMMITTEE.

Many times since this Committee was organized have we been led to say, "How wonderful are thy ways, O Lord," and in this year as in the preceding ones our faith has been inspired and our labors lightened by the knowledge that we were following the divine Many times have we received letters asking for special articles, and sometimes before such requests came to us, and at other times almost immediately after, would be received letters, offering the very things that were asked for.

Very little idea of the work done can be conveyed to you by merely mentioning the fact that over \$5,000 worth of goods have been distributed during the year, and that assistance has been given in as widely separated places as Oka, Que., and Port Simpson, B.C. We would like for a moment to bring you into touch with the hundreds of women and young people all over our fair Dominion who are interested in this department of our work.

By many the work is planned for months ahead—thought over and prayed over—and such being the case, can we wonder that we get letters from the receivers of our boxes saying, "Surely God must have put it into your hearts to send us just what we most needed but hardly dared ask for." You will be glad to know that some of the Leagues are doing splendid work in this way, as in many others, though it is no new thing to find our young people engaged in such errands of mercy and help, and with sunny face and cheery voice, in sick rooms and hospitals, or with well-filled baskets of food or clothing and a few kindly words of sympathy relieving the strain of some poor heart and bringing sunshine into many homes. This is the work being carried on all over the Dominion by members of our Auxiliaries, Bands and Leagues.

A Junior League in one of our cities has become so much interested in a missionary's family through loving work for them, that they say they have adopted them, and as long as such help is needed intend to supply them with good and useful gifts. A letter received from one of our missionaries says, "It was very cheering after a fortymile drive, facing a blizzard with the thermometer thirty-five below zero, to receive your letter, and to know that someone is thinking and planning for our comfort. Words fail to express our thankfulness and joy when we opened the case sent to us-surprise after surprise awaited us. If you had been intimately acquainted with our circumstances you could not have supplied our needs any better. It was a happy day for our little girl, for the boxes arrived on her birth-day, and in the first case we opened we found a beautiful cloak for her and a box containing a cradle and a doll."

Another letter says, "It was with feelings of great thankfulness to God as well as pleasure and delight that we unpacked and looked over the beautiful and useful articles sent. We felt that God had sent them. It was a great boon to us to have so much ready made up, as after doing the house-work, including bread and butter making, washing, etc., and taking care of my little ones, I have very little time or strength for sewing "

Still another letter says, "I cannot adequately express our gratitude for the box so kindly sent. It showed so many tokens of the spirit of Christian brotherhood and of kindly consideration for our needs in its contents. Could we have enumerated them we could not have been better provided for. It contained the things we needed most, and how to obtain these had given us some anxious thought and had been included in our petitions to the Father before we had any expectation of a box being sent to us."

We do not confine our gifts to the North-West, but in the lumber regions of our own Ontario many homes are brightened, burdens lifted, hope renewed, and comfort given by these silent messengers conveyed through us by our brethren on their fields of labor. following extracts of letters will tell you of some of the families helped in this way. One family consisting of mother, father and three children-the mother laid up with abscess under her arm-father getting only an occasional day's work—living on potatoes chiefly, with beef feet as the only meat—not sufficient clothing in house to keep out frost—had to tear a blanket in two so as to have part under and part over the children—rags sewn together for shoes—children unable to attend school or church. To these were given quilts and clothing which was absolutely necessary to them. Result—able to get out to service and school regularly. Another family of five drove eight miles to the Christmas tree, received quilts, clothing, etc., of which they were in great need. I wish you could have seen the light of joy that beamed in every one of their faces as they started for home that Christmas eve, for although they were present at the

entertainment, they were scarcely presentable.

This practical exercise of charity has been a great help to the churches in these districts, and it is not a little thing that by the distribution of clothing from a box sent by Auxiliary or Band that many members have been added to the Church.

In addition to these places, we have sent a considerable amount of goods to the far distant missions in the North-West where the Indians are very poor. At one of the reserves one-half of the Indians sleep on the floor of their log-houses with one quilt over them, all through the winter; half of the others nail up a kind of shelf made with rough boards, to sleep on; the best have cheap bedsteads. Even those who are better off than the rest, live from hand to mouth. All kinds of clothing are thankfully received. Many of the children are a pitiable sight, attending school daily with scarcely sufficient clothing to cover them.

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Last Christmas at the Industrial School at Brandon was the most delightful ever spent at that Institute. Kind friends from the eastern portion of the Dominion, from Grimsby in the west to Montreal on the sea-board, sent practical expressions of their interest, accompanied with words of cheer and hearty wishes. Why Christian people who had never seen the pupils should care enough for them to send them gifts was a source of perplexity as well as gratification to the little people in the Home. How the eyes beamed when some boy or girl received the first gift ever taken from a Christmas tree: Smiles and tears blended with astonishment and tenderness when the anxious girl received her first doll. Sometimes stillness prevailed until a pin-drop might have been heard, then a surge of wild enthusiasm swept the house until one could hardly hear himself speak. It was a long time before any thought of sleep came to the minds of the happy children, and among the many things that the principal and staff had to be thankful for was the pleasing fact that not one of all the pupils was absent from the gathering, and there was no cot in all the Home over which the clouds of disappointment

There are Indians nearer to us than those in the North-West who are just as grateful for the good gifts sent to them. A letter of appreciation from the missionary to one of the Auxiliaries says: "Every article sent us was so useful, and just what we needed to supply their wants. The Indians often say, 'How do the white ladies know what we want? And yet it is so good, they have sent just what we wanted most.'

"It is a precious Gospel lesson to them, for we can tell them that you are the daughters of the King, and the Lord makes known to you their needs, and this is the reason why they receive articles so suitable

"In unpacking and in examining your box we thought of all the hard work on the beautiful quilts, of the persistent stick-at-it-iveness to complete so much, and the thought might well come, Where are they going and what use is it?

"1st. They are a comfort to God's children of the forest, who have not one-quarter the comforts we have. Some of His aged saints are wrapped in your cozy quilts, protected from the cold blast of winter, in homes where the snow can be seen through the cracks in the walls.

"2nd. Never forget that it is treasure laid up for you in heaven.
"While a woman was trying on one of the garments we were praying that it might be made a blessing to her, when she turned round and said, with tears in her eyes, 'It seems to me as if Jesus' arm is round me as I pull this garment on.'

"My sisters, what an honor is yours to be the instrument of leading a poor woman to feel by your gifts 'The hand-touch of Christ.' Many of them are this year realizing the loving tenderness of Jesus as they never have before.

"Our poor Indian people, when looking over your excellent gifts, say, 'White ladies must be angels to send us such good, nice things.' We say, 'Yes, God's ministering angels.' It is a real boon to a poor Indian family in an old log-house, with little wood to keep it warm, to get a good, heavy quilt.

"One old woman, 93 years of age, to whom a woollen blanket was sent, pointed her hand heavenward and said in her native tongue, 'I

thank my God for this; I know He told them to send it."

Many of the Indians are dying every year for want of proper clothing. They only buy cotton underwear. The children in some reserves hardly know what it means to have a pair of mitts, and seldom see anything but cotton rags for stockings, even in the coldest weather. Those who have obtained a fair education are intelligent enough to appreciate the effort made to better their condition, and a desire is manifest among them to help each other. Those who are better off will repair their old clothing, and are often seen helping their less fortunate neighbors.

Sixty-five Missions have received help through this Committee, and 165 places sent over \$5,000 worth of goods for distribution. The Government has refunded \$107 which had been paid on freight to Indians in the North-West. The freight to British Columbia and Ontario has to be met by the different societies sending the goods.

REPORT OF SUPPLY COMMITTEE, NOVA SCOTIA BRANCH.

For six months of last winter and spring this Committee has had the very pleasant work of distributing the various articles given to them.

We have appraised and packed goods to the amount of about one hundred and forty dollars (\$140.00), and have also sent out more literature than in former years, with pictures and texts (many framed); then, too, pretty work baskets and small gifts, which cost little, but mean much more to those shut in sick-rooms or isolated places. In all, fourteen different parcels have been sent out. The account of what one illuminated text wrought for a dying man would make a valuable leaflet for our work. One worker writes, "I am not ashamed to say that I laughed and cried over the box you sent me. I have a place for every paper and every magazine."

Some of our efforts aided a few of God's own, who in times past had not dreamed of needing such help. Had we not received particularly good supplies from some of our donors, we would have been powerless in such cases. During the winter a case was reported of a little country boy who required surgical treatment, but who had far as p

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no suitable clothing for the journey to a hospital; his wants were as far as possible attended to.

Let us not forget that links of fellowship created by our Supply Committee may be part of an everlasting chain of mutual ministry and joy.

JAPAN.

REPORT OF THE ELEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE COUNCIL OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA IN JAPAN.

The Council met in its eleventh annual meeting at Karnizawa, July 18th, 1898.

Members present—Misses Blackmore, Cunningham, Preston, Munro, Hargrave, Hart, Robertson, Belton, Wigle, Alcorn, Sifton, Washington, and Jost.

The devotional exercises were led by Miss Cunningham. The minutes of the Executive Meetings held during the year were read and special committees appointed, after which the following reports from the various branches were read and adopted:

Токуо.

School.—During the year in missionary gatherings, social or business, perhaps the chief topic of conversation has been mission schools—their conduct and their success, or failure. We ask ourselves, does our school attain the highest success?

It is directly and aggressively Christian to endeavor to regulate our lives by Bible teachings and to train our pupils, teachers and servants to do the same. When our pupils and native teachers enter the school they are usually indifferent, occasionally prejudiced; ere long this gives way to curiosity, interest, desire, repentance, faith. While they remain with us they manifest an earnest desire to obey God's law. When trouble comes they find a Christian's comfort. Even the little ones give evidence of their faith in His guardian care, and of their endeavor to do right. When they leave the school, some enter the work and their surroundings continue the same; others return to their homes. Then comes the testing time. Do they stand the test?

Of some who were under our care but a short time we have lost all trace. None, as far as we know, sink back into idolatry, but many grow cold. Some continue to keep the fire of the Christian life burning in their own hearts, teach their children to believe in and

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obey the one true God, and when opportunity offers show themselves on the side of right. Some, with husband's permission, teach in Sunday School, help in women's meetings, are organists, or leaders in the singng in church services; one has attained success as a translator of Christian stories and biography; one under Mrs. Large's fostering care, is developing into an able writer for the press, her theme—one which her husband, though not a Christian, heartily endorses—temperance and social purity; one is editress-in-chief of the Woman's Temperance Magazine. In these we triumph. How great their victory only God, who sees their environment, knows.

Some see and mourn their own growing coldness. Christian work outside of their own home is all but an impossibility for the young Japanese housekeeper, yet Christian work in which they can attain some measure of success seems to be the remedy. Each must be guided and thought for separately. Oh, for wisdom for this! Some confess their coldness but are indifferent—almost dead spiritually. By God's help we must prevent the former class from falling back into the latter class, and both must be helped into the first class so that they too may be aggressive for Christ. We who have been their spiritual guides in other days ought to be able to help them now. We come to them with a certain right to speak; our words though they may be unwelcome, cannot be considered an intrusion. That they are not so considered we know. During the year a number of this class have given to us urgent invitations to call, and, when we have had time to accept these invitations, have returned the visit and invariably tell of it to others and speak of the good it did them.

For these reasons we conclude that our school is a success, but can, and by God's blessing *shall*, become a greater success.

This seems rather a report of need than of work done, but the need and the difficulty of meeting that need seem so great that they quite overshadow the work accomplished. The regular work of the school continues as in the past. We have at last secured a matron who gives promise of developing into a very efficient worker. There has been a great deal of sickness during the year, diphtheria, of which there has been two cases, being the most serious.

King's Daughters' School.—As many of our poor people have wished to obtain entrance for their boys into this school, in April we decided to open a school for poor boys, using the same building. Our youngest girls attend from nine to twelve, the more advanced from one to four. The school-room is then swept and aired and is ready for the boys, who attend until six. The ages of the children range from five to eleven. They are taught God's Word every day, but we consider them too young to be baptized when their homes and all their surroundings are heathen. While at school they are taught to know the true God and to pray to Him. When they return to their homes they are taught both by precept and example to fear and worship false gods. Our

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lost all many an life in and work in this school and in our Sunday Schools is indeed "casting. brread upon the waters." Good wheat and tares will grow side by side Ours to sow, His to give the harvest.

Dispensary.—Much of the help given this year to the sick poor can scarcely be reckoned under the head of proper Dispensary work. For instance, when the work began in September, the teacher of the King's Daughters' School reported to me that two new pupils had entered, whose faces, hands and heads were so covered with sores that it was impossible to teach them properly. Taking a lesson from an experience of last year, I decided to try the curative power of hot water and soap. But I found that in their poor home, even hot water was too expensive a luxury to be used freely; so I gave the grandmother a piece of "Seafoam" soap and the few sen necessary to secure entrance to the public bath, for herself and children. She was instructed, after using the soap freely, to take the children to the school, where the teacher, who was provided with a little vaseline, saw that the sores were thoroughly anointed. This treatment was continued daily for two weeks and effected a perfect cure As attendance at the King's Daughters' School insures a certain amount of attention to hands, faces and hair, there has been no return of the trouble. In another case—that of an old man—a hot bath was the only remedy ordered by the doctor consulted. It was effective. In other cases, a glass of milk or an egg, daily, has been prescribed in addition to some simple medicine, and it would be hard to say which was the most beneficial—the medicine or the extra food. In fact, the majority of cases of sickness among the poor, with which we have come in contact this year, have arisen largely from either insufficient food or want of cleanliness; and hot water, milk and eggs are excellent medicines. One old woman, in sending us her thanks, said that always before when she had been sick she had been unable to work for a long time after through weakness, but this time she could go to work at once. The actual help given has been very slight, reckoned in dollars and cents; but it has meant much to the recipients, whose daily food depend upon their daily work.

Orphanage.—During the year one of our little ones has been called to the heavenly home. Her parents had died of consumption, so when O Yasu San was "too tired to go out to play," I consulted Dr Macdonald at once. He examined her and prescribed treatment, but saw from the first that it was only a matter of making the few remaining steps of the little life-journey as easy as possible. In less than three months, assuring those about her of her happiness, she entered into the life that knows no weariness. With this exception, we have had no sickness in the Orphanage until this summer, when one of the children developed a mild form of whooping-cough. Fortunately it has not spread to others. Natori San, who has been with us as matron since the opening of the Orphanage five years ago, is still the

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faithful "mother" of the Home, and much of the well-being and well-doing of the children is due to her untiring care.

Evangelistic.—We have had a number of changes through the year among the workers. First, Shimadzu San was sent to Nagano to work, and Inoye San taken on in her place.

Then Kaneda San had to give up work for a time, because of poor health, and finally it became necessary for her to withdraw from the work entirely. Just at that time Shimadzu San returned to Tokyo, as Mrs. Tomiyama, and having a good deal of leisure time, asked if she might work with us as a Bible-woman until the summer, but said she did not wish to take a full salary. We were very glad to have

her take the place left vacant by Kaneda San.

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About Xmas time Kubo San's eyes gave her more trouble than usual, so I consulted an eye specialist, who said he thought he could help her if she could go into the hospital for a few weeks. It was found that she had cataract on both eyes, and that they would be much more difficult to operate upon than the first examination showed. On account of Kubo San's age, the doctor thought it best to operate on one eye only. Even that has taken a good deal of time and Kubo San has been able to do very little work in Negishi since New Year's. But she has made good use of her opportunities in the hospital, talking with those around her. The head nurse, who is a missionary, says that Kubo San has been a great help to her. She, herself, has been very glad to help in that way, for she found it very hard to keep from worrying over being away so much from her regular work. She has gone home for the summer, but will need to go into the hospital again for a short time next fall.

Sabashi San was laid up for about two months this spring, and thought that perhaps her life's work was done, but said if the Lord saw best to spare her life she would gladly spend it in His service. She seems quite well again, and although age is telling on her strength, is anxious to do all in her power.

Shimeda San, Hayashi San, Sumiya San and Inoye San have enjoyed good health and have made good use of time and strength. There has been much to try and discourage the Bible-women; also

occasional cause of rejoicing and encouragement.

In one district it has seemed a year of beginnings; just as the new women gathered in began to be really interested, they had to move away. Others were reached and became interested; they, also, for one reason or another, had to move, or were prevented from attending meetings or receiving calls from the Bible-women, and so it has been all through the year; but we trust the good seed sown will still bring forth much fruit, though we be not allowed to see it.

Although the average attendance at our meetings for the year has not been large, we have had a very good attendance at most of the meetings; but during the early spring, many of the meetings came on stormy days, when it was not fit for women to walk any distance. At such times there would be but one or two present.

In some districts we have rejoiced to see a deeper spiritual experience among some of the Christian women, as shown in their lives and conversation, and we also rejoice in the fact that a few women who have for some time not only been unwilling to hear Christian teaching, but who have done all in their power to prevent others from hearing, have of late become interested in the old, old story.

Two of the church members, who have been a great help in the meetings nearest their homes, have been married and moved from Tokyo. One became the wife of a most promising young man—a Congregational minister; the other the wife of one of our own young ministers. So, although we shall miss them very much, we must rejoice that they are where they can do even more than in the past, and trust they will be a great strength to their husbands.

There have been some deaths among our number during the year. The last was that of a candidate for baptism, but who was called home before the rite had been performed.

Miss Wigle has had a class of young men on Sunday afternoons, in connection with the Azabu Sunday School. She has been delighted with the interest shown in the lessons and the regularity of attendance. I have continued to attend the Negishi and Shitaya Sunday Schools, spending about twenty minutes in each school, teaching the children to sing Christian hymns, and Miss Sifton has done the same in the Kobiki Cho Sunday School.

The policemen's class reported last fall has been continued during the year. The number in attendance has been smaller, owing to extra work, sickness or removals, but the interest shown at the first has continued, and for some time a few of the men have been attending church whenever possible.

During the year we have continued the special class for the Biblewomen three times a month and the usual workers' meeting once a month.

The average attendance at our Sunday Schools in Azabu has been much larger this year than last, and a few weeks ago two of them became so large we were obliged to hire other rooms and divide the schools.

SHIZUOKA.

School.—Since April, the beginning of the school year, forty pupils have been in regular attendance. It would appear that the number of native teachers is very large for a school attended by only forty pupils, but many of these teachers are specialists—teachers from the Normal and High schools, who give from one and one-half to three hours a week to teaching in our school (as a special favor) and receiv-

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Evan couragi compete in our Shizuok drawn the wor Christia longing Bible-w Christ to women upon the ing salaries ranging from one dollar to four dollars per month. Others again teach in the school, and also assist in the evangelistic work.

Among the sixteen attending class, only three have not yet received baptism. We have a few in the school who, coming from Christian homes, were baptized as children, but who have not yet expressed a desire to attend the class-meeting. As our school and evangelistic work is so closely connected, and as the greater number of our native helpers come from the school, a good deal of time has been spent in training some of the older girls along evangelistic lines. Miss Alcorn, especially, has given much time and thought to this work. It has been a great pleasure to us to watch our girls growing in womanliness and Christian character, and to note an increasing interest in the outside evangelistic work. We have tried to impress upon them what a privilege it is to be permitted to have some little part in the work of leading others Godward.

Some of our younger girls are becoming very much interested in Christianity. Two, especially, are longing to become Christians, but have not yet reached the point where they can believe that God is able to keep them true in their homes. They could be Christians in school, they say, but in their homes it would be almost an impossibility. How nearly impossible it would be, is hard for those born in a Christian country to realize.

On Sunday we come into personal contact with every girl in the school. A class-meeting for the older girls and teachers is held from four till five in the afternoon. The middle-class of girls, who are especially interested in Christianity, go to Miss Alcorn for personal, religious conversation, from half-past six to seven, during which time the younger girls come to me.

In looking back over the year we feel it has been one of growth and progress—a year of greater nearness to the Father. With stronger faith we look forward to the future, hoping for still greater things, because we believe "He is faithful who promised."

Evangelistic.—At the beginning of this year the outlook was discouraging. It seemed impossible to carry on our work without a competent Bible-woman. But with the aid of the Christian teachers in our school, we have been able to do personal work among our Shizuoka women. Coming thus in contact with them, we have been drawn very near together. At some of our last monthly meetings for the women, we have noticed with thankfulness a deepening of their Christian experience. Among the older Christians there is a greater longing for Bible study. Our women themselves feel the need of a Bible-woman to visit new homes, and to bring those who do not know Christ to our meetings. We hope for the time to come when our women will feel the responsibility of the souls of their friends resting upon them. We are trying to lead them to feel it is their privilege

Our work in Yokouchi and Hirono has continued as usual Fujieda, owing to removals, has not been as promising as in former When time permitted, we have held meetings at Bancho. These have been well attended, and we hope in time to establish a

regular work in that part of Shizuoka city.

Takeuchi San's work among the poor in Ansai District has been untiring. The work is growing. Now that she has been released from her teaching in the school, she has gathered a few of the children in the mornings for the purpose of teaching them sewing and reading. We are feeling our way as to the advisability of opening a poor school in that district. Some of the mothers come to the children's meeting held every Saturday, and Takeuchi San is being admitted to some of the homes.

Our work in Shimada has increased in interest. In January, owing to removals, sickness and deaths, we discontinued our regular woman's meeting. Through the influence of our evangelist, we were allowed to teach the women in the cotton factory. Before commencing work, the overseer invited us to visit the factory to see for ourselves how ignorant the women were. Passing up and down among them as they worked, we could feel how tired and heart hungry they were; our hearts were filled with love and pity for them, and a longing for them to know the only true Comforter. We felt a little doubtful as to the attitude of the overseer toward us, he had so carefully stipulated that we only tell the women stories of great men and thus enthuse them to better living. After having taught several Bible lessons, we were thankful to receive a request to come twice in the day in order to give the night workers a chance to hear also. We have great hope in this work. Our average attendance has been forty-four.

Since November, we have held a monthly meeting in Horinouchi. At that time we received several invitations from the pastors and evangelists in Shizuoka Province to come and work among the women. As we could only take one more meeting, and Mr. Harazaki's request seemed most urgent, we commenced work in Horinouchi. He himself was converted in San Francisco, and since his return has worked among the people in his employ. When we go, he opens his home and invites his friends and neighbors in. While the "old, old story" is to us a simple story, yet it is not easy to present it to those who have never heard of "these things." The people listen well, and at our last meeting showed signs of beginning to understand just a little.

The Sunday School work has not been as promising as formerly. The children have to bear persecution if it is known they listen to Bible teaching. We feel this very deeply, for beginning with the children for a fa come.

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merly. sten to ith the children is in many cases gaining an entrance to the home. We ask for a faith to keep us steady and firm when the discouraging times come.

KOFU.

School.—Since September of last year one hundred pupils have been enrolled. The present term closed with eighty-eight belonging. Of the twelve who have withdrawn nearly all have given satisfactory reasons for doing so.

With a change of principal there must of necessity be many changes in the working programme of the school. It speaks well for the girls that through the past year, alterations have been kindly met and helpfully carried into effect. Among the older girls a deepening of spiritual interest and development of character have been manifest.

Seven girls were graduated from the Japanese course and two from the special sewing course at the close of the regular school year. Nearly all of the former graduates come to the closing exercises, all seemingly delighted to get back to the old familiar home once more. As much as possible intercourse with former pupils is kept up. Little detachments of three or four come occasionally during each term to stay over night, or spend Sunday with us. In many parts of the province their homes are open for visiting and many of them for Christian teaching.

Two of our girls are ill. One, a sweet, patient little girl from a wealthy home, may not be with us in the fall, the doctor having very little hope of her recovery. The other has consumption, is being cared for in the hospital where she finds work to do for her Master. One of the nurses hearing the story of salvation for the first time became so interested that she takes part of the very little time allowed her for recreation to come to the school for Bible teaching. Some among the patients have been interested through Akiyama San's conversation and literature which she has distributed. She is one of the brightest among our supported girls, was training for a Bible-woman and would have graduated year after next, when she was taken suddenly ill. We were greatly grieved, but here in her weakness there is work for her to do which shall spring up to bear fruit hereafter.

During the year three girls and one teacher were baptized. The sewing teacher had never before had any intercourse with foreigners nor heard any Christian teaching. She was much impressed with the kindness shown her and by the unselfishness she found in a Christian school. She attended the daily Bible lesson, became interested and finally asked for baptism. Another, an old gentleman teacher of Chinese, is also very near the kingdom. In a little while we hope to see him, too, receive the seal of his discipleship.

In the class-meetings, Wednesday afternoon services and King's Daughters' meetings the older girls showed much interest in things

pertaining to their Master's kingdom. May He grant them through the coming year a deeper knowledge of himself.

Evangelistic.—Once more the time has come for the annual report of our evangelistic work. The year has been a good one; in some of the meetings the attendance has not been good and it has been rather uphill work, but, generally speaking, it has been an encouraging year with a bright outlook for the future.

We have held 222 women's meetings with an attendance of 3,793 and an average of seventeen. To Christian homes 500 visits have been made; to non-Christian, 669, and fifty-one to new homes, making a total of 1,220 visits. For the children we have had fifty-two meetings with an attendance of 1,823 and an average of thirty. Seven women have been baptized.

We have rejoiced greatly at having the way opened for regular meetings in two factories, one a cotton factory and the other a silk factory. In the former place we have held meetings every two weeks, and thus have reached regularly not only a large number of women but a number of men. The work in the silk factory was interrupted by the silk worm season when new cocoons were being formed. We expect to resume our work there in the fall.

During the year our Bible-woman, Naito San, married a non-Christian man, much to our bitter disappointment. This left us short of workers. However, with the good help Miss Washington and others have given, we have compassed the work already established nicely.

In the spring a graduate of a Yokohama mission school came to us, and she and a young woman who is in the school, studying with the purpose of becoming a Bible-woman, have given some time to evangelistic work.

We have held a number of general meetings which have been well attended. They are very helpful in arousing interest and bringing in new members, while they give a decided impetus to the work in general.

In our six Sunday Schools we have had 239 sessions with an aggregate attendance of 7,190 and an average of thirty. We believe this to be one of the most helpful departments of our work, and through the year at least one woman has been led to study the truth, through the death of her only little one, a Sunday School scholar.

The English Bible-class for young men held on Sunday mornings has improved in attendance very much of late, the largest attendance having been thirty-three, and usually over twenty are present.

We thank God for His marvellous loving-kindness. The work is His and we know that He careth for His own. We would "give glory unto the Lord and declare His praise in the islands."

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KANAZAWA.

The work has gone on this year without much opposition, and in many respects we have much cause for gratitude. Visiting has been carried on among the women as regularly as possible, but the lack of an efficient interpreter has proved somewhat of a hindrance to this work, as the girl who is trying to fill this position is better suited to other work. The meetings have been encouraging, both as to attendance and interest. The woman's meeting at Daijime, which had been dropped, was reopened in November with good results. It is touching to note the simplicity and trustfulness of these poor women who come to hear the "old, old story" at these meetings. They have few pleasures and no luxuries in their lives, which are spent in hard work, poverty and ignorance, and it is surprising to see the interest they manifest in the lessons taught. Many of the Daijime and Kawakami women spend the day in carrying sand or stone for the builders, or in cutting brushwood on the mountains, or in doing equally hard and monotonous work in the fields. Returning home at dusk they prepare and eat supper and then come to our meeting. Surely they find in the teachings of Christianity something which helps and satisfies or they would not attend so regularly under these circumstances.

The Kawakami meeting has been changed from a monthly to a fortnightly one recently, and the attendance is quite as large as formerly. The girls employed in the embroidery work know much more about the Bible than the others who attend the meetings there. For some time past these girls have had a Bible-lesson three times a week, besides that which they receive on Sunday morning, and on two days a week they are taught to sing hymns and are told the contents of some good book such as "Pilgrim's Progress." They work from early morning until evening and have little time and less taste for reading. Indeed, few of them can read well enough to understand a book, but the promise of a new Bible to all who can read in it with a moderate degree of ease and intelligibility in September, has aroused their ambition and they are attending night-school regularly. One girl, we regret to say, had to be dismissed, but we hope to be able to take her back again after a few months. Their homes are of the poorest-mere huts in many cases-small, dark, and entirely lacking in cleanliness or comfort, and they seem very contented and happy in the school. But the embroidery teacher is not a Christian, and we feel that the best results can never be obtained from our work in Kawakami until we are brought into closer contact with the girls ourselves. This is one reason why we wish to build a dwelling-house as soon as possible. Besides this the price of land is rising every year; the cost of materials for building and the wages of workmen have increased very much recently, and we feel that the time has come for us to ask for a grant for a building. The railroad was opened in April, and soon afterwards we went to the nearest station, Matto, to see if we could find any opportunity for work there. The prospect seemed good, and a house in which to hold meetings has been secured. The people seem friendly, and meetings for women and children are now held weekly there.

The meeting for Christian women held in our own house has been very well attended, and a monthly experience meeting has proved successful, even the most retiring women taking part occasionally.

The Orphanage children are, on the whole, doing very well. Three of the older children were baptized by Dr. Carman in May, and all three show evidences of genuine Christianity. Two children have been received during the year, making a total of twenty, seventeen girls and three boys.

One thing for which we feel especially thankful is the fact that we are becoming acquainted with our immediate neighbors. Some of the children from these homes are coming to Sunday School, and two or three of the mothers have been to church and to our house occasionally.

One Bible-woman had to be dismissed during the year, but a member of our church here has been employed and is doing very well. A young girl from Nagoya was employed in April to help in Sunday School and language work. We have two Sunday Schools entirely under our own control, and help also in the two church Sunday Schools.

Personal contact with a number of women has shown that they are earnestly trying to understand and obey the truth, but it is with the deepest regret that we report no baptisms among the women this year, except two girls in the Orphanage, and another, the daughter of Christian parents. The seed is being sown but the harvest is not yet. We know it will surely come some day, however, for he that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON NEW WORK.

NAGANO.

School.—In presenting the school report I must ask your forbearance if I detail somewhat, as I think to do so will be more likely to ensure all having a more comprehensive view of the situation.

When our Society went to open work in Shizuoka and Kofu, it was with the approval of the General Society, and in response to an invitation from a number of influential gentlemen of those cities who

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were interested in woman's education, and who gave very material financial and other help in the first days, and in Kofu continue to do so.

We went to Nagano under very different circumstances, responding to an invitation, which had the approval of the members of the General Society, from the Conference to open a girls' school in Nagano Province, but the city was left for our Council to decide.

At our last annual meeting Miss Lambly and I were appointed to new work, with Miss Blackmore as a member of the committee.

As we had at that time no pastor or evangelist residing in Matsumeto (the second city in Nagano Province), and as the Methodist Episcopal Church had work established there, and the chairman of our district lived in Nagano city it seemed advisable for us to begin there.

Miss Lambly and I with a sewing teacher (who was one of the first two pupils who attended our Azabu school), a personal teacher (who was one of the first five pupils who attended our Shizuoka school), and a Bible-woman (who had been trained in our Azabu school), reached Nagano on the first of November.

Having found it impossible to secure Japanese teachers of the grade required by the Government, and after consulting with Miss Blackmore, we decidedly to go slowly, and do what we could to help

the general church work.

Mr. Hashimoto, the chairman of the district, however was very desirous of our establishing an "Eiwa Jo Gakko" (a girls' school, such as we have in Tokyo, Kofu and Shizuoka) at once in Nagano city, and we saw the church people had the impression that we had come for that purpose. Mr. Hashimoto believing it would be possible to secure the necessary teacher, we consented to go on and see what could be done in the way of establishing a school. The first step we took was to try and secure patrons among the influential gentlemen of the city, who would simply be asked to give their sympathy and influence in favor of the school, having no financial responsibility and exercising no control. First we went to the Christians; they made excuses. Then we went to the non-Christians; the most desirable ones declined to have anything to do with a Christian school on account of their connection with the great temple Zenkoji. However, we secured five what might be called second-rate men. We visited the Governor and Secretary, who were very cordial, but, of course, we did not expect them to have any open connection with us.

Through the inquiries that were necessary, when trying to secure patrons, we gained considerable information, which, however, unfortunately went to confirm our conviction that Nagano was not a good centre for educational work, and that Matsumoto was preferable.

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1st—It was the generally expressed opinion that Matsumoto was the city in the province that was bound to grow, on account of the railroad then under construction having the junction situated there.

2nd—Matsumoto is the geographical centre of Nagano Province. 3rd—Matsumoto is not a strong Buddhist centre as Nagano city is.

4th—It is populated largely by the "samurai" (higher class), whereas Nagano is populated by the working class.

5th—There was no Government higher girls' school in Matsumoto, while there was a good one in Nagano.

6th—So far as the population of the two cities is concerned there was little difference, Nagano being twenty-nine thousand and Matsumoto twenty-seven thousand.

Considering these things, it seemed advisable to occupy Matsumoto and get a reputation before the Government girls' school was started, and before the railroad opened up the country.

Early in January two young girls came to our house to inquire if we were going to open a school; they wanted English. I had nothing definite to give them concerning the school, so when they came inquiring the third time I consented to allow them to begin, giving them an hour's English each day without a fee. In February a third joined the class, and toward the end of March a daughter of one of the patrons requested admission.

It now being nearly the end of March it became necessary for us to come to some definite decision regarding our plans, as the silk season would soon be opening, which meant the closing of a great part of our evangelistic work; our sewing teacher did not wish to stay longer unless there was a regular sewing class, and our personal teacher was to leave at the end of the month, so that our staff would be reduced to two foreigners and a sewing teacher, whose stay was dependent on the organizing of a sewing class. Mr. Hashimoto still objected to our opening in a small way, so it was decided to postpone further action regarding the school until September, the search for teachers in the meantime being discontinued.

During the spring holidays we engaged a substitute for our personal teacher, and later unexpected circumstances arose which made it desirable for our former teacher to be retained. These facts were laid before Mr. Hashimoto, and he was asked and consented to our opening a small school.

It was now the twelfth of April, consequently very much to our disadvantage, March being the end of the Government school year, the time when all desired changes are made in schools. However, we could only hope for the best under the circumstances, so we advertised to open on the fifteenth, teaching the following subjects: English, music, moral lessons, Japanese and foreign sewing, Japanese composition, etiquette, domestic economy and reading—the tuition fee being forty sen a month, with no entrance fee. This was sent out in the

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name of the owner, Mr. Hashimoto (as decided in the beginning) and the principal, the school being given no name. We had no formal opening, simply extending the time from one hour to four hours a day, and continued the former English classes, with the addition of those mentioned in the advertisement. Very soon we had two new applicants and early in June another, making seven, the total number enrolled for the term ending July the fifteenth.

Evangelistic.—The regular evangelistic work began in December, Miss Lambly having charge. As we had no school work organized we divided the evangelistic work, Miss Lambly going to Tanaka and Komoro with the Bible-woman, while I with our personal teacher took the work at Ueda and in Nagano city. We had only nicely started when our Bible-woman informed us she would have to leave at the end of December, as she was to be married. This was unexpected, and we were very sorry as we knew there was no prospect of supplying her place, and neither of our school helpers were capable of taking the place of a Bible-woman in the work.

In January we extended somewhat, Miss Lambly opened a meeting

in Yashiro and I opened one in a poor district in Nagano.

There had never been any special work done among the women in this district until we came last fall, and, while we found beginning in a new place meant responsibilities that do not come in an old established work, we were much encouraged to find not only the women appreciative of our efforts, but to have the sympathetic co-operation of the ministers and evangelists which made the way comparatively easy, and we have at least made a good beginning in seven places.

As we look back we must say, the Lord indeed has been very good; and while we fail to understand all His providences, we rejoice that we can trust in Him, who can restore to health and strength the one who is laid aside for the present, so far as the work here is concerned. I refer to Miss Lambly. I cannot express my disappointment and sorrow when I realized early in April that she, for health reasons, would have to give up her work and return home.

Since then, having school duties to attend to, I have not been able to keep up all the evangelistic work, but with the helpers have managed to continue the work at Ueda, Yashiro, at the two places in

Nagano city and opened one new meeting.

In all forty-seven women's meetings have been held with an average attendance of ten. Twenty-two children's meetings, average nine. Ninety visits were made mostly at homes of non-Christians. There have been two Sunday Schools opened since March at places distant from the church, children hearing for the first time; so far the attendance has been very good. Two women were baptized.

Miss Hargrave. Another to be sent if new workers arrive before Christmas. If not, the Nagano work to be reconsidered by the Executive.

Two new ladies to be asked for.

The General Superintendent of the Church, during his visit to Japan, having suggested that in order to avoid any hindrance to strict carrying out of the Discipline, the Sunday Schools under the control of the Woman's Missionary Society be known by some other name, it was Resolved, "That we do not distinguish between Sunday and week-day meetings, but that all our meetings among the children be known as 'Children's Meetings."—Carried.

Moved by Miss Robertson, seconded by Miss Hart, That it be inserted in the minutes, that because of the state of Miss Munro's health she has been relieved as far as possible from responsibility for the coming year.—Carried.

The Rev. Mr. Hashimoto, chairman of the Nagano District, now resident in Ueda, and Mr. Kawai, a Christian of the same town, requested admittance to the Council. Mr. Kawai laid before the Council the needs for a girls' school in Ueda, and requested that our girls' school for Nagano District should be established in that town rather than in Nagano city.

After the gentlemen withdrew, a discussion on the Nagano work was taken up and the relative advantages of Nagano, Matsumoto and Ueda were considered.

Moved by Miss Cunningham, seconded by Miss Belton, That the Nagano work be left in the hands of a committee composed of Misses

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at the Misses Hargrave, Blackmore and Jost, and that if during the year any changes be considered advisable, the matter may be referred to the Executive.—Carried.

On motion, all the Tokyo workers who have been in Japan over three years, excepting Miss Munro and the corresponding secretaries of Shizuoka and Nagano branches, were appointed an Executive for the coming year.

The Furnishing Committee was reappointed (Misses Hart and Munro, with the corresponding secretary of the branch requiring furnishings). Misses Blackmore and Cunningham were reappointed Committee on Consultation with the Conference Committee.

Misses Blackmore, Munro, Hargrave and Belton were appointed Building Committee for the year. Miss Hart was reappointed Recording Secretary.

The Committee on Courtesies brought in the following, which was adopted:

"The Japan Council of the Woman's Missionary Society send hearty greetings to the members of the Woman's Missionary Society in Canada. Eph. iii, 17-19."

"The members of the Council of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church of Canada in Japan, now in session in Karnizawa, wish to convey to Dr. Macdonald their deep appreciation of his fidelity as a friend, of his wise counsels and unwearied labors in the field of his chosen work. They also wish to express to Dr. and Mrs. Macdonald their sense of loss in their temporary absence, and assure them of their continued prayer for their speedy and safe return to the work."

"The Japan Council of the Woman's Missionary Society, now in session at Karnizawa, desire to express to Miss Lambly their sorrow at her removal from among them, and to assure her of their sincere love and sympathy. They would commend her to the care of our tender heavenly Father, praying that in His own good time she may be restored to her wonted health and strength. Deut. xxxiii. 26, 27."

"The Japan Council of the Woman's Missionary Society now in session in Karnizawa, send greetings to Miss Crombie and desire to express to her their sense of loss at her absence from the field in which she was so earnest and efficient a worker. They hope that her year at home may be passed pleasantly and with such beneficial results that on her return she may, with renewed strength and zeal, take up again the work that lies so near her heart."

Greetings also were sent to Mrs. Gooderham, to the members of the Canada Methodist Mission in China, to Mrs. Perry, and to the Council of Co-operative Mission also in session in Karnizawa.

Our consecration meeting was led by Mrs. Gooderham, Mrs. (Dr.) Scott, of Azabu, and Mrs. Rose, of Napanee, also being present.

On receipt of a message from Dr. Macdonald, a special meeting of the Council was called. On motion of Misses Preston and Hargrave, Resolved, That we ask our Home Board to grant us \$6,000.00, instead of the \$5,000.00 estimated, for the purchase of the desirable lot for our Azabu school now in the market. That we ask Dr. Macdonald to act for us in presenting the matter to the ladies of the Home Board, and that the reply be cabled to us.

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WEST CHINA.

The close of another year brings us to the task of looking backward to see what progress we have to report since this time last year, and it is with thankful hearts that we can say "Onward" has been the watchword of the year.

The present time sees us comfortably settled in the home which last year was nearly completed; finds the school dormitories all finished and occupied by fourteen little girls, who, we trust, will grow up to be earnest workers in the Master's kingdom; a second day school opened on the place with a competent woman in charge—which is not an easy position to fill in China; the "Ting" and guest room completed—and thus a place prepared for receiving women and explaining to them this doctrine. Many have availed themselves of this opportunity since the building was finished—about Christmas—should say some 150 women have heard the Gospel story explained to them in this way, but hope many more will come in when there are more workers ready to take up the different departments of the work. The "Jennie Ford Home" is also completed, and three additional little waifs brought in to rear for the Master's use.

Miss Foster has looked after the building of this home, as well as taken charge of these little waifs, beside some class work with the people on the place. The hospital repairing, too, is nearly done, and Dr. Killam has done good work here, and now has a hospital, with most of the rooms lathed and plastered, which makes it a pleasant, commodious building with accommodation for all the women and children who are likely to come in for treatment. She has also had considerable medical work on the place among both the grown people and children.

Miss Brooks has devoted most of her time to study but has helped in the school work, when necessary, and the singing, and is taking up regular work next year.

Sunday afternoon also finds from forty to sixty women in for instruction, and, after the Gospel has been preached to them, an appropriate tract or portion of Scripture, is given them to carry home and thus we hope the message is carried to the neighbors as well.

From fifty to eighty children attend at Sunday school here at the same hour. They have now been divided up into classes, each of the ladies taking one. Before leaving they are given cards with texts of Scripture written on them which they commit to memory, and the following Sabbath recite. Thus the written as well as the spoken

word is given them, and we know we have the promise concerning His word that "It shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it."

The Tuesday afternoon meetings, conducted by Mrs. Hartwell, continue to be held as usual.

We ask for a continuation of your prayers on all departments of the work, and that we, individually, may be given wisdom for whatsoever He has for us to do in His vineyard here.

REPORT OF JENNIE FORD HOME.

It was late in February when we received word authorizing us to build an orphanage. We immediately began work. We found the grant to be rather small, but as some of the friends in our Mission kindly contributed to this work, we were enabled to build more largely than we otherwise could have done. We think that the building, which is nearly completed will accommodate from fifteen to twenty children, and two or more helpers.

Since the first of March, we have rescued three children from the street, and probably from death, or a worse fate. Two of these have been reported previously; the last one is a half-starved baby between three and four months old. She was certainly a pitiable object when we found her lying at our gate, literally clothed in rags and dirt. We had her brought in and cared for, and sent for the street official who wrote a paper protecting us from any one who might claim the child in the future. We feel that the Lord's blessing is on this work and we trust that these children will become true servants of His.

REPORT OF MEDICAL WORK, WEST CHINA MISSION.

You learned from the last report that native buildings were being altered to suit the purpose of a hospital. Also that the work could not be completed until our dwelling house should be finished and these vacated.

The dispensary was open the first three months of the past year, when five hundred and seventy-four treatments were given. There was no native evangelist to be had, but tracts and scripture cards were distributed. A few visits were made to homes and two patients received in the hospital.

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Miss as a nu is neve erning while Mrs. Kilborn was away resting. She had not intended conshall tinuing her official connection with our Board much longer, and did thing not resume her work here on her return. She, however, kindly offered to help me in any way she could. It seemed the best plan to twell, close the work for awhile. Mrs. Kilborn was not well enough to carry on the work without helpers. According to much advice it nts of would be better for Miss Foster and me to devote our time to whatstudy; and we were anxious to lest we should endanger our future

usefulness.

Most of my time from the first of October to May was spent in studying Chinese. Since then I have been superintending the further arrangement of the hospital buildings. When you read this I hope to be at my studies again. Then the work will be about finished. There will be four pleasant rooms lathed and plastered. They will accommodate twenty-six and allow between seven hundred and eight hundred cubic feet of air to the individual. is a small amount, but many windows allow free ventilation. Another room for four individuals has well-fitted board walls reaching nearly to the ceiling. There are still three other rooms for eight persons. They have the ordinary Chinese walls, but still are very good and there is no hurry about changing them when we have so much other room. The operating room is plastered; has on the one hand a wash-room where water can be kept hot in readiness, and, on the other, is separated from the surgical ward by a bath-room and a room where the anæsthetic can be administered. There is a good general kitchen and a pleasant study.

The walls around the compound are of mud, but good and firm. They have just been freshly plastered over with lime and soot outside and where needed inside. Then I had still considerable of the grant left and used it to cement the walks. That we all considered very necessary because of the heavy rains, for our helpers have no rubbers; and, because there are several buildings instead of one as a hospital,

they would be constantly carrying mud in and out. We have thirty-three beds on hand and twenty-five small tables for the bed-sides. There is about enough bedding for eight beds, but it

is not advisable to keep much on hand because of the dampness. I expect to take three more months after July for study and open the dispensary in November. I hope to begin, gradually continuing my studies at the same time.

There has been considerable sickness in the school. Last fall they and all the servants had influenza. Just now we have had seven cases of measles. I have given over eighty treatments since the dispensary work was closed.

Miss Foster is out for evangelistic work, but she has been invaluable We have no other nurse and so she is kept quite busy, is never without a patient for very long.

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I hope by another June the work will be well under way and more

interesting reports forthcoming.

We ask your continued patience while we learn the language, lest we be to those who hear us as barbarians and they to us while we "speak into the air"; and your constant prayers that we may be true to the trust imposed upon us.

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METHODISTE INSTITUT FRANCAIS.

In submitting the ninth annual report of the work of the Institute I am glad to be able to note a higher average attendance than ever before. The number of applications was not quite so high as during the previous year, but out of the 106 students accepted, 92 entered and the average attendance was over 70.

We were wonderfully free from epidemics or illness of any kind, so the work progressed steadily until the close of the term.

Among the girls we had a great variety of character, and some were very difficult types to deal with. Four of the latter were Roman Catholics, and they seemed to vie with one another in devising mischief, until finally we were obliged to send away the most hopeless one. Another left us before Easter, as the priest refused to administer the Sacrament to her mother unless she and her sister were taken from the school. In several such cases our efforts seemed to be labor thrown away, but we can only pray that some stray seeds of truth may have found lodgment, and will bear fruit in time to come.

Contrasted with these were some bright, earnest girls of more than average intelligence and true Christian character. Two of them have prepared to enter the McGill Normal School, and we hope in a year or two to see them carrying on our work in the country districts.

Class-work presented the usual difficulties, as in addition to the course of study taken up in French, we aim to prepare some students for the Normal School or Wesleyan College each session, which means another regular course in English and mathematics.

The training in household duties, which is such an important phase in the Institute work, was given special attention and came under the direct supervision of Mrs. Ross. Each girl was required, in addition to her regular household duties, to spend a day in turn with the cook, assisting in the preparation of all the meals.

Each day is filled so full with work, study and recreation from 6.30 until 9.30 that the hours seem to fly, and the days become weeks and the weeks months almost before we are conscious of it. Thanksgiving and Christmas were made bright, as in former years, by the kindness of the Douglas Mission Band.

Interest was added to our mid-week and Sunday services by the friends who came in from outside and gave us help and encouragement. Several of the city pastors, Dr. Shaw, of the Wesleyan College, and other friends who were with us during the winter, expressed special delight in hearing the bright testimonies and earnest prayers of our students.

At the last sacramental service about thirty came to the Lord's

table, and many more professed faith in Christ as their Saviour. Twelve new names were added to the membership of the Church. It is both comforting and inspiring, as we encounter difficulties and discouragements in our work, to realize that we have the sympathy and prayers of the W. M. S. over the whole communion. Earnest prayers and unremitting toil only can bring about the results we hope to see, and change the darkness of superstition and bigotry into the light of the knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus.

ANNUAL REPORT OF FRENCH MISSION SCHOOLS, 1897-98.

In presenting the report of another year, we are glad to say there has been faithful and painstaking effort on the part of both teachers and scholars. That good results have followed we are fully convinced, as there has been sufficient testimony from the parents, as well as evidences in the lives of the scholars.

Our schools still suffer from priestly interference, but there is a growing spirit of independence among the people and a desire to think for themselves. The aim of the teachers has been to build up Christian character in the pupils, and, so far as is possible, to qualify them for responsible positions in life.

The school at St. Theodore has been under the care of Miss Le Pape. Nine scholars were enrolled, all of whom attended with great regularity. There has been a marked improvement in their conduct, as well as advancement in their studies.

Seventy-two pupils have been enrolled in the East End School, Montreal, which is a larger number than in any previous year.

During the winter considerable sickness has prevailed, and we record the death of one little girl. Miss Matthieu reports a good year's work done. Classes in sewing and gymnastics have been maintained, and proved to be a great advantage as well as a source of interest.

Eight hundred and sixty-seven families have been visited, religious literature distributed, and words of cheer and sympathy given to discouraged ones. Miss Matthieu has met with several families who are non-church-goers, having lost faith in the Roman Catholic Church and relapsed into indifference. Let us pray that the true light may dawn upon them.

In the West End School the year has not been without its difficulties and discouragements. There has been a slight decrease in numbers, but we are pleased to state an increase in the attendance of Romanists, many of whom were very intelligent pupils. One hundred names were enrolled: fifty English, three Jews, thirty-six French-Canadians and eleven Irish Catholics, the average attendance being forty-eight as compared with fifty-one the previous year. Miss

The Band of Hope has had an average attendance of forty-three. The meetings have been conducted by the children, followed by short addresses by pastors and friends. Three prizes, which were much appreciated, were given by Mrs. C. J. Jones for the best scrap-books

on temperance literature.

The majority of the girls showed great interest in the sewing class, several of whom made good progress in plain sewing. Prizes were presented by Mrs. Benn to those who had made the greatest improvement. It is expected in the coming year greater attention will be given to this department of work.

District visiting has been continued, and many hearts and homes brightened by the kind words and timely help of our Bible-woman.

On account of failing health, Miss Anderson has been obliged to give up the position she has held for the past eleven years. We desire to bear testimony to her untiring interest and devotion to her work, and pray that the Master's presence may continue to be with her.

We realize that in this work of French evangelization very much depends upon persistent effort, prayer, and faith in God, and feel sure the work is not in vain for "the battle is the Lord's."

THE INDIAN WORK.

CROSBY GIRLS' HOME, PORT SIMPSON.

In the matter of annual report-making, the difficulty of tabulating actual results when one seeks to form a true estimate of the year's work, meets one at the very outset, owing to the fact that apparent good may prove deceptive, and seeming evil but blessing in disguise.

Sensible of this difficulty, I turn to my task with the belief that gratifying progress along all lines can be noted. Especially is this true of the pupils' deportment, which, though not all that could be desired is certainly very good. Commands are cheerfully obeyed and exhibitions of temper rarely displayed.

The reception of so many new girls has rendered much instruction necessary in all departments. This, with a change of teachers and long continued illness among the pupils, has made the year one of almost unremitting toil; still we have rejoiced that power and privilege to work have been given.

Matilda Mackay still lingers though very frail. Emma Gosnell, aged eight years, died at her own home a short time ago, after an illness of two months which had its beginning in the Home. Helen Nelson, aged six years, was taken out by her parents to-day and cannot live more than a few days. We have nursed Helen for three months and are saddened to see her go thus. A number of others have been ill for several weeks at a time, but are all recovered. Through this siege of illness the friends of the children have acted with fairness and consideration, which has been gratifying to those in charge. At present the general health of pupils appears good.

The school statistics speak for themselves and bear evidence that Miss Paul's painstaking efforts have not been in vain. The more advanced scholars take great interest in the books and papers provided and may often be found reading during play hours.

Five girls are receiving instruction in instrumental music, though this branch has been somewhat neglected of late, owing to illness.

At the annual school examination last November, an exhibition of sewing, knitting, darning and fancy work was made, and received most hearty commendation from both white people and Indians. Since Miss Elliot's arrival in June, her time has been fully occupied with making and mending, and the dressmaking, especially, has received a fresh impetus by the presence of a lady in charge who thoroughly understands her business.

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There has been no revival to report, still evidences of good have not been lacking—evidences expressed more by improved lives and deepened earnestness than by spoken words and outward profession.

Another year's service, with its imperfections, is completed. May God add His blessing to the work we have sought to do in His Name.

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REPORT FROM PORT SIMPSON HOSPITAL TO THE BOARD OF MANAGERS W. M. S.

For the Year 1897-98.

The year just past has called for great faith, patience and endurance on the part of all the workers in the Port Simpson Hospital.

During the greater part of the year Miss Spence was absent on a much-needed furlough, and her skill and experience were much missed; however, Misses Stevenson and Lawrence did nobly, and were, under divine blessing, a great means of good to the sick and suffering that look to us for relief.

Last autumn we had an unusually large number of patients coming from distant parts of the District, and many of them serious cases, requiring more than usual care and watching. Three of these (one white and two Indians) proved incurable. Each when entering the hospital was indifferent to his soul's interests, and in each case we saw evidence of repentance and faith; and in the cases of the Indians great resignation, peace and joy at the hour of death.

Through the winter and spring the increased traffic, due to the rush to the Yukon country, brought us some cases to whom our hospital proved a great boon. One man, at least, came to us in a very critical condition. He was fully restored to health as the result of an operation, and also became reconciled to his Saviour, from whom he had drifted away during years of mining life.

When summer opened we found we had the River's Inlet work on our hands again owing to the much regretted illness of Dr. Jackson, and to keep the hospital there open at all we would have to divide our small force and send a nurse. Accordingly, Miss Lawrence spent the month of June there, and I procured assistance for Miss Stevenson at Port Essington. At each place we had all we could care for, and many had to be refused admittance. Early in July Miss Spence returned to River's Inlet, having voluntarily cut her furlough short by two months. Miss Lawrence then returned to Port Essington, and we hoped to do some surgical work that had been awaiting the second nurse, but alas, in a very few days, Miss Lawrence was taken ill and developed typhoid fever, which she had doubtless contracted from a case that she had nursed at River's Inlet, so we had to keep on our extra help and only admit the most urgent cases. Miss Lawrence, who was much run down from overwork, made slow convalescence, and at our urgent request has taken a trip south to recuperate, and we hope will soon be able to undertake her work with wonted vigor and devotion.

Miss Stevenson, after two and a half years' of faithful service, withdrew from our work in August, and has since been married to a missionary and entered another sphere of usefulness at the Upper Skeena.

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The nurses have assisted in Sabbath School and classes, and other departments of the work.

It is hard to imagine a field that offers greater scope for humble, Christ-like work than that occupied by the nurses of the Port Simpson Hospital.

REPORT OF COQUALEETZA INDUSTRIAL INSTITUTE, CHILLIWACK, B.C.

In looking over the work of the year just closed we realize there is much reason for thankfulness. The boys and girls are becoming more and more interested in their work, and are happy and contented in the "daily round, the common task." We believe that Christianity and education is lifting them out of the old ways of indolence. Regarding our numbers, we have an increase over last year. There are 112 on the roll, though we cannot take in many more until the new building is up—which will be used for the school-room, sewing and kindergarten departments. The present school-room will be used for dormitories, thus giving us accommodation for 130 children. The work in the different departments is faithfully done; a new department of dressmaking has been taken up, thus giving an opportunity for the older girls who desire to learn the trade.

We sent a number of articles to the exhibition at Chilliwack and Provincial exhibition held at New Westminster. We received a number of prizes at both places for sewing, knitting, vegetables and roots. Coqualeetza Institute was also awarded the first prize for best exhibit of the industrial schools of the Province; the Williams Lake (Roman Catholic) school received second, and Kamloops (Episcopalian) received third. Each of the departments of our school was represented: The farm by a display of vegetables, roots and grain; ten pairs of neatly made shoes from the shoeshop; from the kitchen, canned fruit, pickles, bread, butter, cake, biscuits, etc.; coat and dress from the dressmaking; and from the sewing, plain sewing, hand and machine crotchet work, mending, darning, knitting socks and stockings; from the laundry, soap and starch; from the school room, writing and drawing; and from the kindergarten, a collection of weaving, sewing, folding and peas work—altogether making a pretty and useful exhibit.

The band, composed of nineteen members, is progressing along musical lines. They have been paid for playing at garden parties and entertainments during the summer, which will help in paying for the instruments.

Our daily routine has been considerably broken in upon this fall by measles of a very severe type. About fifty of the children were down with it, and from twenty to thirty in bed at once. Our hands were full night and day for about two months; the complications of bronchitis, croup and pneumonia were serious. The doctor did not give any hopes for some of them, but our hearts are filled with thankfulness that God has spared their lives. They are all up and, we trust, will soon be entirely well.

Two little girls have died this fall—one from consumption, the other, Hannah, with scrofulous disease. She had been a great care; her sores required daily dressing, and for the last month she has been helpless. By her patience and goodness many lessons were learned.

We have a Mission Band of sixteen members in connection with the Institute. Some of the older girls are members of the Woman's Missionary Society. Also a number of the boys and girls are members of the Epworth League which meets in the Institute every Wednesday evening.

Our Sunday School is growing. We have organized; have nine classes, with superintendent, secretary, treasurer and librarian. The children have a Bible lesson every day, with an evening a week devoted to the study of the catechism. We find many things to discourage and try us; but what are the trials compared to the joy when these little ones shall accept Jesus as the rule of their life—when they shall "spread their trophies at his feet and crown Him Lord of all"? This is a grand work, with such opportunities for building up the kingdom of Christ. We need day by day the strength from above to enable us to do the work Jesus has given us.

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KIT-A-MAAT, B.C.

We have had rather a serious time at the Home—I believe, a crucial time. All eyes have been on us to see how we would come out of it. I refer to the epidemic—measles. I remember with us at home this disease was not considered very serious, but with the natives it is different, owing to the fact of so much scrofula in some of the parents. Several of the children are not free from it entirely, consequently grave complications developed, a malignant sore throat, and worse even than that, a choleric diarrhœa of very persistent character. There is now a general (slight) improvement, and I have reason to believe the worst is over. Miss Long is patience itself and an excellent nurse.

In my mind the work done in the Home is the most effectual and lasting mission work we do, at any rate at Kit-a-maat. The Home gives the industrial training, quite as necessary as "the three R's." It makes the training of the hands no less than the training of the head a part of education, and fits them for a decent after-life. And more important is the training of the heart. Some, the children of chiefs, have been very early taught that work is degrading; we turn the tables and strive to induce them to believe that there is no degradation in anything but sin, and that a great saving of misery and unhappiness is effected by the salvation of Jesus Christ.

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THE CHINESE WORK.

REPORT OF CHINESE GIRLS' HOME, VICTORIA, B.C.

Another year has expired. Its sunshine and its shadows are

among the things that were.

I began the year with two girls, Christine, an invalid, and little Elsie, a new arrival from Vancouver. Near the last of October. Christine quarrelled with Katie and then walked off to the Convent. Being unwilling to return to the Home, she was sent to the Convent Orphanage, where she remained until May, then took a situation in Nanaimo; but not being able to do the work, she accompanied Dr. and Mrs. Lou to Vancouver. On being informed that she wanted to come back to the "Home," I talked the matter over with the Advisory Committee, which approved of my going for her. July 8th, I brought her over. She is not strong enough for any hard work, but is fond of sewing and knitting. She is now filling orders in knitting. During the winter I had only Elsie, who of herself is a heavy charge and a most uncertain help. We were in a state of anxiety for weeks, while the court trials over Elsie were pending. The sustained decision of Judge Walkem, after the second trial, brought to me most welcome relief.

During the Christmas holidays three entertainments were held in the "Home," for the benefit of Chinese and Japanese.

During the spring house upheaval, the parlor, dining-room, kitchen, halls and girls' room were papered, ceilings as well as walls.

Rev. E. Robson was our guest the week of Conference, early in

May. His presence was a benediction.

Early in June two Japanese girls arrived from Vancouver, with a letter from the Japanese Consul. Up to the present they have been dutiful and docile, quiet and restful. A little later, a rescued Chinese woman was brought in by the police to remain about six weeks. She stayed two months. She is now in the home of one of the married girls, and never misses a Friday meeting and is also a regular attendant at the Mission Church Sunday morning. We trust the seed sown in those few weeks will bear fruit for the honor of the Sinner's Friend. Omitsu returned to us in June, to remain while Mrs. Small and baby went east, so that we have had six girls in the Home this summer, three Chinese and three Japanese. In the summer holidays, the large school-room was papered and put in complete order.

When reports can be put in statistics, the reader has a fair idea of the work represented; but it is impossible for pen to convey the extent of entire year

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extent of the matron's duty, work, worry and care throughout the entire year.

The Friday meeting has been growing in numbers and interest this summer. The average attendance for the last six months has been fourteen adults and five children. One day we had as high as thirty-seven present. It is very seldom we have any English people. We often have singing in three languages. Scripture verses are always recited and explained.

The Chinese Girls' Home Mission Band meets every month and is prospering.

In June, Daisy was taken to the Jubilee hospital and operated on for appendicitis. I visited her a number of times in the three weeks. The last time I saw her, she was in a deep slumber from which she never awoke. Daisy is the first Chinese in this city to have Christian burial. Sarah called on me one day and said she wished me to use the \$22.50 I had placed in the bank for her when she was in honorable service, for any good purpose I might name; consequently, I told her I would like to put a neat head-stone at Daisy's grave. I have ordered one at a cost, in full, of fifteen dollars, with the following lettering:

"IN MEMORY OF DAISY."

"God is Love."

This was the first scripture she committed.

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Since I assumed the charge of the Home, three years ago September 1st, 1898, I have had in all thirteen resident girls under my care, besides Laura and baby two weeks, Jessie and baby nearly five weeks, Daisy two months and Katie three months. I have not been able to leave my charge to make many calls on our girls this summer, but during the year I have made 215, and written twenty-seven Home and missionary letters.

I think I can truly say that this Home has had my heart, head and hands, yes, and feet, too, ever since I entered. I have aimed at being faithful in the detail of duty, irrespective of the class of work involved. On taking a retrospect of the many-sided work of this position, there have been some disappointments and many things reasonably satisfactory, so that taking it on the whole, I have had success. To God I would give all the thanks and praise. It is He who equips for the fight. He gives us our weapons of warfare, which are not carnal but spiritual.

RECEIPTS.

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REPORT OF EVANGELISTIC WORK AMONG THE CHINESE WOMEN IN VICTORIA, B.C.

The plans and aspirations of twelve months ago have not all been carried out or realized during the past year, but the work has been slowly and steadily growing. The number of homes entered, sixty-one, is but one in advance of last year; this is owing to the fact that several families returned to China. So far as can be ascertained there are only six houses that have not opened their doors to the "Jesus woman." Towards the close of July an entrance was gained to the home of one of the leading merchants, where, for two years, admittance was denied me. Now both husband and wife treat me as a friend. Since the Chinese New Year three of the women in Chinatown have been taking lessons in English—one for half an hour daily for which she paid \$3 per month. To the other two I gave a twenty minutes' lesson each day, making more than an hour's teaching in Chinatown in English. In two homes, one of which I hoped would be a centre for a weekly meeting, the women are reading the Bible. I did succeed in holding three or four meetings there, at which there

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were always visitors present, but saw the wiser plan was to let the meeting go for a while, and just call occasionally. Taking my Bible pictures with me, the woman was eager to read about them, and I am hoping will ask me to continue this meeting next year. In every home, where the women can read, a copy of one of the Gospels was left. In others a text of Scripture, printed in large characters, adorns the wall. The Sunday afternoon meeting, mentioned in last quarter's report, has been a real joy to me; men, women and children are all interested; average attendance, sixteen. Five or six of the children attend morning service quite frequently. For weeks last spring I was kept busy taking several women to see doctor and dentist; a number also have asked help in making their children English clothes, thus showing their confidence in me. The little Sunday School has also increased in numbers, twenty six names having been registered. I do not think any of the women are anxious to be Christians, but I do believe a grand work could be done with the help of a Chinese Biblewoman two days during each week; Chinese does not come as readily to me as Japanese; I find the tones very confusing. No visits have been made to Nanaimo or the mainland since March. Total visits during the year, 1,011. The home school was very small all winter and early spring, only Elsie living here, but I closed in July with seven pupils—three Chinese and four Japanese. The latter not being able to read Japanese I taught them to read their own language as well as English. Owing to the Sunday meeting in Chinatown, I was obliged to give up my Japanese Bible-class, but still go to help with the singing and give all the time I can to the night-school. Numbers of Japanese women are met at the boarding-houses and supplied with literature in their native tongue. There are a great many of them now in British Columbia. While I have no conversions to report among the women I am glad to say that a number have from time to time attended the Friday afternoon meeting in the Home.

REPORT OF THE CHINESE METHODIST DAY-SCHOOL.

Taking a glance backward over our school work for the past year, we feel that our report ought to be one of an encouraging character.

During the year 70 names have been enrolled on our books. This number appears very large, but it must be remembered that we have not had this number registered in any one quarter. The third and fourth quarters of the year we registered 47 and 44 respectively. The first two quarters being smaller gives us an average quarterly total of 36. Out of the 70 pupils which have come into the school 47 have been boys from the night-school, ranging from 12 to probably

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25 years of age. The remaining 23 have been children under 12 years of age. Of the 23 children 4 only are girls, the remaining 19 being boys.

While a number of our pupils have been with us for a short time only, some, indeed, merely coming out of curiosity to see what we were like, on the whole the attendance for the year has been very satisfactory and quite sufficient to keep one teacher busy during school hours.

The progress in English has been very good. Our pupils generally are very bright; indeed, after having had six years' experience in teaching in an English school, my testimony is that the Chinese are quite equal, and in some cases superior, in intellect to ourselves.

After having spent almost two years amongst the Chinese people, I feel my interest in them increasing. As I have during all this time come in contact with the Chinese I have experienced nothing but kindness and expressions of goodwill, from both men and women, Christian and heathen. The night school work has been especially gratifying. Indeed, my night-school could not fail to enthuse anyone capable of being aroused at all. While there have been some difficulties in connection with the day-school, and the task of keeping our small children together has called for all our ingenuity and constant oversight, the night-school has gone ahead splendidly, without the slightest interruption, and keener interest is manifested on the part of our pupils now than ever before. During the year eight in connection with our Mission have become Christians and been baptized, while many others have been among the inquirers. finished up the year's work of both schools with a public meeting in the Chinese Mission. This was the most enthusiastic gathering we have ever had. The Mission schoolroom was packed to the doors and numbers had to go away who could not obtain admission. The year we have just entered upon bids fair to be the best in the history of the Mission. Already the night-school is full, and we have to set about providing more seating accommodation.

I have been studying the language since March, and find it exceedingly interesting and not nearly as difficult as I supposed it would be. With my school work I have not been able to give as much time to it as such a language would reasonably call for; but four weeks of good, solid, concentrated study during vacation gave me a great lift forward, and I find myself now able to read the Gospels pretty well. There is something peculiarly fascinating to me in the fact of being able to follow intelligently while the lessons are being read in church and to be able to read those curious-looking characters for myself.

I am sure you will be very glad to hear that on Sunday night past we baptized another young man, one who has only very recently been attending our Mission. The decided stand he has taken, and the intelligent and earnest testimony given in our Thursday night prayermeeting,
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nd the prayermeeting, leads us to believe that he will be a true follower of the Lord Jesus. The baptismal service was one of unusual interest. We had the largest Sunday congregation that we have had since I have been here. Rev. Mr. Speer, of Metropolitan Church, read the service in English, and Rev. Mr. Chan, our pastor, in the Chinese. Everybody seemed very attentive and interested. This is the first baptism since reopening after summer vacation; we hope it may be but the earnest of what is to follow during the year upon which we have just entered.

It would be strange indeed if, on looking back over a year of Christian effort and work, we could say that no shadows had fallen across our pathway; but the sunshine has been a thousand times greater than the shadow; and the consciousness that the Divine approval has rested upon us and our work, more than compensates for all the rest and has enabled us to go steadily forward, turning neither to the right nor the left, with a firm purpose that "none of these

things move us."
We, as heretofore, ask your prayers that the Holy Spirit may direct us in all things, and that God may use us in the salvation of

those whom we are privileged to labor amongst.

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REPORTS FROM BRANCHES.

LONDON CONFERENCE BRANCH.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT, 1897-98.

In presenting another report of the work done by our Branch, it is necessarily the same story of encouragement and discouragement; encouragement because we can report an increase in number of Auxiliaries, in membership, and in funds raised, but disappointed that the increase is not greater, that there are yet so many Circuits within the range of our Conference who have not yet engaged in this work, who find some excuse for standing aloof. This is one of the problems we wrestle with from year to year—How can we interest the uninterested ones in those fields as yet unorganized? If we could only find a solution to this problem our success would be assured. Our organizers are doing faithful work, but in many cases seeing very little result.

Conventions have been held on most of the Districts, and our work has thereby been strengthened. Literature has been distributed through the Auxiliaries. Knowledge increased in the information gathered at the monthly meetings through carrying out the Suggested Programme and Watch Tower. Funds have been increased by collections taken at the missionary prayer service held once a quarter, and by the Easter Thank-offering.

Many boxes of clothing have been prepared by Auxiliaries which have gone to bless many needy homes and bring brightness and cheer to both young and old.

ANNUAL MEETING OF LONDON CONFERENCE BRANCH.

HELD IN GODERICH, OCTOBER 4TH, 5TH AND 6TH, 1898.

The Convention held its first session at 2.30 on Tuesday, Mrs. Burns, of St. Thomas, in the chair, and an attendance of seventy delegates.

After devotional exercises and the reception of memorials and resolutions the President spoke a few encouraging words declining to make any formal address, the Vice-President also following with short and cheering messages.

A sweet and tender service in memory of our promoted members elicited many testimonies of lives spent in the Master's service, and of sufferings borne with resignation and faith. Eighteen names were mentioned.

At the close of the session the Communion was administered by two of the resident clergymen.

Between six and eight a pleasant interval of social enjoyment gave the delegates an opportunity of renewing old acquaintance and making new friends.

The evening session included reports of Secretary and Treasurer, which will be found elsewhere, and an exercise on the Watch Tower taken part in by three delegates.

Wednesday was largely occupied with Committee work, and as the memorials appear in the proceedings of the General Board we insert those referring to Branch work only.

A resolution commending the action of Judge Chesley and others at the General Conference, looking to the admission of women as lay delegates on the Quarterly Boards and Annual Conferences, received the endorsation of the Branch.

A letter of greeting from Mrs. Cavers, representing the Provincial W. C. T. U., met with a hearty response, and an affectionate resolution of sympathy with their work was ordered to be sent in reply. A telegram from the Hamilton Conference Branch, then in session at Palmerston, was also acknowledged.

The Report of the Modes of Work dealt with suggestions for increasing the efficiency of the Auxiliaries, a Prayer Pledge, Outlook and Visiting committees being recommended.

The Organizers recommended that District Organizers be nominated by ballot without debate at the District Convention and elected at the following Branch Meeting. That they be ex-officio members of the Branch Meeting and have all the privileges of delegates, and that their expenses be paid by the District Convention. That they hold Conventions at such time and place as they deem best. That they arrange a plan of missionary meetings in districts immediately after the Branch Meeting. That they arrange to have our work represented at the May District Meeting and Epworth League Convention. That they arrange the finances of the District so as to make the District selfsupporting.

Mrs. Tennant's report of Systematic Giving noted an increase of over one hundred to the list of those so contributing.

The subjects of the Open Parliament were District, Auxiliary and Mission Band work, and also Systematic Giving. All these subjects were intelligently discussed, giving the delegates food for thought and future action.

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The invitation for next meeting was given by First Methodist Church, London, and accepted.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE HAMILTON BRANCH.

The fourth annual meeting of this Branch convened in the Palmerston Church, October 4th, 5th and 6th, under the presidency of Mrs. (Rev.) T. W. Jackson, Elora, whose opening words of invocation and counsel pervaded every session.

Kindly greetings and words of welcome were voiced by the representatives of the various churches and societies, Mrs. Gambells speaking for the Palmerston friends.

In the Memoriam Service, conducted by Mrs. Nichols, Hamilton, the tributes paid to the fourteen members who had died are expressed in the words of John Wesley, "Our people die well."

The Testimony Service, led by Mrs. Kitchen, Waterford, was a real spiritual uplift, fittingly followed by the Lord's Supper, administered by Revs. J. H. Robinson, Crane, Jackson, of Harriston, and Rev. Thos. Crosby.

In the evening the President's address dwelt chiefly on the spiritual side of the work. Mrs. Strachan, Field Secretary, gave a very clear and concise account of the work on the various fields. Rev. Thos. Crosby, of British Columbia, followed with an interesting talk on the habits and characteristics of the Indians and of the work of our Church amongst them.

Miss Barker, Conference Organizer, reported four new Auxiliaries

organized, with conventions held in almost every district.

The report of Mrs (Dr.) Mills, Superintendent of Systems

The report of Mrs. (Dr.) Mills, Superintendent of Systematic Giving, and the discussion which followed, brought out practical illustrations of the system. Thirty-two local superintendents are at work.

In the open parliament, the question drawer, the Workers' Conference and the Organizer's experiences, many helpful subjects were introduced and

discussed, from which valuable information was acquired.

Letters of sympathy were sent to the President of the Board, Mrs. Ross, and the Branch Vice-President, Mrs. Sharpe, who have so recently been bereaved; also to our missionary, Miss Lambly, who is returning with impaired health.

The Convention put on record its sympathy with and desire for a prohibitory liquor law.

The duties of Organizers are again brought before the districts:

1. The duties of Conference Organizer: To prepare a report for the Branch meeting, to assist Organizers where necessary, and represent the Society at the Conference, or be responsible for such representation.

2. Of District Organizer: Where no Auxiliary exists, to be responsible for W. M. Sabbath, to work the Scattered Helpers' scheme and endeavor to organize, to visit or correspond with Auxiliaries and report the state of the work to Conference Organizer.

3. That District Organizers be ex-officio members of the Branch meeting and have all the privileges of delegates, and expenses paid by the Branch Treasurer.

4. That any General Board officer of the Woman's Missionary Society resident in the Branch also be a member of the Branch meeting with all the

privileges of the Convention.

5. That the officers for the district be an organizer only, and that the President and Corresponding Secretary of the Auxiliary entertaining the Convention aid the District Organizer in arranging the programme for District

6. That as soon as a new Organizer is appointed the name and address be sent to the Branch Cor.-Sec., also to the Conference Organizer by the Secretary

of the Convention.

7. District officers shall be elected at their District Conventions. If no Convention has been held they shall be elected at the Branch meeting by the delegates present from the District and the Branch Executives, the term of office in either case to be from Branch meeting to Branch meeting.

8. The Conference Organizer shall be elected by the District Organizers

and Branch Executive at the Branch meeting.

9. That all the privileges of District Conventions be open to every Auxiliary member on the District, and to the members of Circles and Bands.

10. That the finances of the District be left to the management of the

officers of the District.

11. That District Organizers apply to the Corresponding Secretary for the

literature needed for their work.

It was decided that each Auxiliary be responsible for the representation of the W. M. S. work before the Leagues in their respective churches at least once a year, the District Organizer being responsible where the Auxiliary exists.

The closing evening session was given up to the Mission Bands, members of which provided a choir and choice programme. The Band Secretary, Miss McGeary, spoke enthusiastically of the work of the young people. Mrs. John Crowe, Guelph, gave an interesting account of the habits and religion of the French-Canadians.

The invitation to hold next year's meeting at Brantford was accepted.

The prize banner was presented to the Guelph Band. An additional banner was provided for, to be competed for by Bands only.

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ANNUAL MEETING TORONTO CONFERENCE BRANCH.

The fifth annual meeting of the Toronto Conference Branch was held in Orangeville, October 4th, 5th and 6th, 1898, the President, Mrs. J. B. Will-

The report of the Mission Band Corresponding Secretary was gratifying. A beautiful prize banner was won by the Barrie Mission Circle for the largest increase in members. Mrs. Geo. Browne gave an impressive "Heart Talk to Young People." Mrs. Thos. Crosby addressed one of the evening meetings, describing in a most interesting manner the work in which she has so ably assisted her husband at Port Simpson.

The Committee on Resolutions submitted the following, which were

1. "That each Auxiliary send to Branch Corresponding Secretary, by March 15th, a detailed statement of the work as compared with former years."

2. "That Treasurers of Circles and Bands report quarterly to the Treasurer of Auxiliary, and in case there is no Auxiliary, to the Branch Treasurer."

3. "That the financial year of our W. M. S. end May 15th; that we

memorialize the Board to that effect.'

4. "That we express our thanks to the Epworth Leagues, who have so generously assisted us, and trust that their helpful interest in our work may be continued."

5. "That we place on record our appreciation of the loving service ren-

dered by Miss Ogden and Miss MacCallum."
6. "That we desire to convey our loving sympathy to Mrs. Ross, President of the Board, and to Mrs. Williams, our Honorary President, praying God to strengthen and sustain them by His grace and His blessed word (Job xiii, 15; Isa. xliii. 2)."

7. "That the thanks of the Convention be tendered to the pastor of the church, to the trustees, to the choir, to the Hospitality Committee, and to the

ladies who have so kindly entertained the delegates."

"Review and Preview" closed a very helpful series of meetings. Points in reference to our work in the past were briefly touched upon, and three thoughts given for future consideration-" Fersonal Responsibility," "Personal Influence," "Giving Ourselves."

BY-LAWS OF TORONTO CONFERENCE BRANCH.

1. The election of officers in Auxiliaries, and of delegates to the Branch meeting, shall be by ballot, without nomination, and a majority vote be

2. That in the case of new Auxiliaries organized late in the year, the Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary be instructed to mention the organization of Auxiliary, with the money that has been sent, without stating the

number of names.

3. That Auxiliaries provide for the expenses of their delegates to the Branch meeting. The Auxiliary Treasurer, in making returns to the Branch Treasurer, shall state the net sum received and the amount paid for delegates expenses, and transmit the balance to the Branch Treasurer. The Branch Treasurer, in preparing her report, shall credit the Auxiliaries with the full amount of their contributions and charge the expenses of the delegates to the General Fund.

4. That reports of Auxiliaries be given by the District Organizer at the

Branch meeting, five minutes to be allowed for each district.

5. That District Organizers be under the direction of the Branch Corresponding Secretary.

6. That Branch Officers and District Organizers send in a statement of their

expenses before September 15th of each year.

7. That District Organizers be ex-officio members of the Branch meeting and have all the privileges of delegates, and that their expenses be paid by the Branch Treasurer.

8. That in order to save expense, a District Organizer may arrange with

someone more conveniently situated to organize an Auxiliary.

9. That in every district where practicable a convention be held each year. Where desirable, organizers of adjoining districts may arrange for union conventions

10. That all the privileges of the convention be open to all members of Auxiliaries, Mission Circles, Bands and Epworth Leagues on the District.

11. That a collection be taken at the District Convention which shall be applied to the expenses of the convention, any surplus to go to the local Auxiliary

12. That the District Organizer be nominated by ballot, without debate, at the District Convention; in the absence of such convention, that the nomina-

tions be made by the Branch Corresponding Secretary.

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REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF MISSION BANDS, 1898.

It is with great pleasure your Secretary presents this annual report, because the work has been so encouraging. Although two Bands have discontinued their meetings eight new ones have been organized. We now have thirty-two Bands—an increase of six. The membership is 782—an increase of 114. Many of the Bands also report an increase of spirituality in the members, due no doubt to the faithful, prayerful efforts of Band leaders.

It will pay to take time to educate our young people along missionary lines. A missionary education is of necessity a spiritual education, because they are taught that important lesson of service for others which Christ so often impressed upon His disciples.

We rejoice to know that Epworth Leagues are paying such close

attention to missionary work.

Although most of the Leagues are co-operating with the Students' Forward Movement, yet many of them send a share of their missionary givings to the Woman's Missionary Society. For this we ask them-

to accept our sincere thanks.

It would take too long to mention in detail all the various kinds of work performed by our Mission Bands. Autograph and Scripture quilts have been made and sold; warm quilts and articles of clothing have been sent to mission fields. In one case a Band of boys and girls undertook to cloth a missionary baby.

An extract from one of the reports will give an idea of the work

done in many Bands:

"Our programmes consisted of missionary readings by the young folks, our president or some other of the older ones giving missionary information, more particularly about our own Woman's Missionary Society work. Our meetings are always opened and closed with devotional exercises. The last half-hour is usually spent in sewing, and cutting out mottoes in colored paper."

These mottoes are sent with useful clothing to mission fields.

Many of our young people take quite an interest in their little missionary paper, *The Palm Branch*. It would be gratifying to know that *The Palm Branch* had a place in every home where there are children.

Let us never forget to pray that the missionary spirit may sink deep into the hearts of our young people.

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ANNUAL MEETING OF BAY OF QUINTE BRANCH.

The fifth annual meeting of the Bay of Quinte Branch was held in the Methodist Church, Bowmanville, October 4th, 5th and 6th. Ninety-six delegates were in attendance.

The President, Mrs. G. D. Platt, occupied the chair. Her annual address, full of helpful thought, was an inspiration to all, and was, by resolution,

ordered to be printed.

The reports of the organizers indicated unabated interest in the work of the several districts. The District conventions have been well sustained, and continue to prove a helpful media of instruction and inspiration.

The report of the Corresponding Secretary was presented by Mrs. Grange, and showed the number of Auxiliaries to be 140; annual members, 2,950; lifemembers, 102; total, 3,052; an increase of eight Auxiliaries and 150 members. This represents but a fractional part of the work done by the Auxiliaries.

The Mission Band Corresponding Secretary, Miss Hawley, reported a grow-

ing intelligent interest on the part of the Band workers.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Campbell, presented her annual statement. Amount raised, \$5,694.17.

Mrs. Sing, Superintendent of Systematic and Proportionate Giving, presented a very encouraging report of her department, showing an increase of over 150 who have adopted this method of giving during the year. Regret was felt that Mrs. Sing had to resign on account of removal from the Branch.

An impressive "in memoriam" service was conducted by Mrs. (Rev.) J. A. Jewel. Touching reference was made to sixteen of our members who have entered into rest during the year. "The memory of the just is blessed."

The Consecration service was one of great interest and blessing, many bearing testimony to the spiritual helpfulness of missionary work.

The Workers Conference proved to be exceedingly profitable. Suggestive papers were read, bearing on practical phases of the work, and a free discussion followed.

The following new by-laws were adopted:

1. That reports of District Organizers do not exceed five minutes each.

2. That Branch officers and District Organizers send a statement of their expenses to the Treasurer by the 15th of September each year.

3. Auxiliaries shall pay the expenses of their delegates without entering said expenses in their report.

4. Each Auxiliary shall elect two delegates to the District Convention, who shall be responsible for reporting to and from the Convention, and who alone shall be eligible for voting for the District Organizer.

5. That District Organizers be elected by ballot at the District Convention. In the absence of such Convention, the appointment be made by the Branch President and Corresponding Secretary.

6. That the first week in November be "Crusade week."

It was resolved that 6,000 copies of "An Easter Appeal" be printed for the use of Auxiliaries.

A number of memorials were presented, and passed on to the Board for final decision.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT, 1897-98.

Another year of work done for the Master has closed, and in taking a review of its record, we see much which calls for our deepest gratitude and praise to our heavenly Father, for although we have been unable to extend the work as much as we hoped, owing to the varied difficulties of this North-West country, yet we have sure evidence that interest and zeal in our beloved work is growing and spreading, many reporting that no department of church enterprise has done more to develop the spirituality of its members than the Woman's Missionary Society.

Our Treasurer's statement again shows a considerable increase in our funds over that raised last year, and "Systematic Giving" is becoming more generally adopted by our members and congregations.

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ANNUAL MEETING.

The third annual meeting of the Manitoba and North-West Conference Branch was held in Grace Church, Winnipeg, beginning with a public meeting on the evening of May 31st, 1898, and continuing throughout June 1st and 2nd. At roll-call on the morning of June 1st, all officers were found to be in their places, and the attendance of delegates was larger than at any previous meeting.

After devotional exercises and the formation of the various committees necessary to the proper transaction of business, reports from Auxiliaries were given. These all indicated a deepening interest in the work and a determination to continue to prosecute the same, even under (in some cases) discouraging circumstances.

The consecration and sacramental service was conducted by the Rev. S. Cleaver, assisted by Rev. W. Bridgman, when those present readily testified to the joy experienced in service for the Master.

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The afternoon sessions were largely attended, many visitors being present. The greetings from sister societies proved to be of unusual interest, and many helpful suggestions were thrown out by the various speakers. A short address was given by the Rev. Mr. Elliott, lately returned from mission work in Japan; and a letter from Miss Hargrave, now engaged in the work there, which possessed special interest for the members of this Branch, was read, conveying her affectionate greetings and sketching in part her daily work in that far-away land.

The Corresponding Secretary reported a membership of 461, and the Mission Band Secretary a membership of 193, making a total of 654. The Treasurer reported an increase in funds of nearly \$300, and the Literature Secretary and Treasurer that interest in the Branch depot was increasing. The Branch Organizer, Mrs. (Rev.) Huntsman, who is also Superintendent of Systematic Giving, stated that although she could not report having organized any new Auxiliaries during the year, still a good deal of seed-sowing had been done which she felt sure would yet result in this being accomplished. Greater interest than ever before is shown in Systematic Giving as evidenced by eighty members reported as giving in this way.

At the memorial service, conducted by Mrs. (Rev.) J. Semmens, it was found that four members had been promoted to higher service during the year. Part of one afternoon session was devoted to a "Workers' Conference," in which a very lively interest was taken. Many matters of interest to the workers were freely and informally discussed, and good to the work will undoubtedly result. A paper by the Recording Secretary, Mrs. Dolsen, titled "Notes of Board Meeting," evoked a great deal of interest, and was found to be a very pleasing and profitable change introduced into the customary routine of business.

The awarding of the two banners by the Banner Committee resulted as follows: The Auxiliary one went to Beulah, and that of the Mission Circles and Bands to Moose Jaw. All notices of motion were very fully discussed and passed upon.

What this annual gathering does for individual members cannot be estimated, but increased spirituality is aimed at from year to year and greater zeal in the work of winning the world for Christ. Large audiences gathered for the three evening programmes, which were unusually good. The music throughout was inspiring and helpful. On the first evening the chair was occupied by Rev. S. Cleaver, pastor of the church. The President, Mrs. G. H. Young, gave her annual address, which was replete with facts relative to the

work and full of suggestive thoughts for the workers. The beautiful address of welcome by Mrs. W. H. Culver, of Winnipeg, was responded to, on behalf of the delegates, by Mrs. Rorison, of Moose Jaw. Then came a Mission Band exercise by Zion Church Mission Band, and a paper on the work of Mission Circles and Bands, by Mrs. Jackson, all of which elicited the interest of the audience in a marked degree.

A beautiful banner, donated by Mrs. J. H. Ashdown, to be awarded the Auxiliary making the largest percentage of increase in membership and funds during the year, was accepted on behalf of the Branch by the President.

On the second evening the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Carcary, gave a condensed report of the year's work, and grand missionary addresses were given by Revs. S. Cleaver, L. Gaetz, and the honored Secretary of the General Board, Rev. A. Sutherland, D.D.

On the third evening the meeting was under the auspices of Grace Church Auxiliary, when addresses were given by those now active in mission work on the mission fields of this North-West country, Rev. J. McDougall in the chair. These addresses were of a most stirring character, and a great many facts connected with the Indian work in this country were brought out.

The interest of the audience resulted in a collection amounting to \$31.75,

which is to be devoted to medical work at Norway House.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR 1898.

Pleasure and sorrow are strangely mingled in our retrospect of the last year's work, which may be characterized as "a patient continuance in well-doing."

We rejoice to note steady and faithful work done, and consequent advancement in our large towns; but regret to say that two of our smaller Auxiliaries, which struggled for an existence, have collapsed. The principal reason assigned has been removal and sickness, and no one to take their places.

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Encouraging reports from Coqualeetza and Port Simpson have been received, and faithful work has been done at the Chinese Rescue Home. The case of the little Chinese slave-girl Elsie is still before the courts; there is every probability of it being settled in our favor.

Two of our sisters have passed away during the year. Mrs. Jewell, of the Metropolitan Auxiliary, and Mrs. Russ, of Port Simpson, have both entered triumphantly into the heavenly home. These two are not the only friends whose loss we are called to mourn. The Rev. Coverdale Watson was for many years the auditor of our Branch, and in his death we have lost a valuable friend and counsellor.

ANNUAL MEETING BRITISH COLUMBIA BRANCH.

The seventh annual meeting of the British Columbia Branch was held in the Metropolitan Methodist Church, Victoria, May 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 1898. It was opened by a Sunday afternoon meeting. Rev. Mr. Betts, President of Conference, occupied the chair. Addresses were given by the chairman, Miss Bowes, and Rev. Dr. Eby, interspersed with a solo from Mrs. Armson and a missionary quartette.

The Branch assembled for business on Monday at 9.30 a.m., President, Mrs. Betts, in the chair. After devotional exercises, on motion, missionaries present were made members of the Branch with the usual privileges. Seventeen responded to the roll.

Mrs. Jenkins gave a beautifully worded address of welcome, and Mrs. Cunningham, of New Westminster, replied on behalf of the delegates.

The President's address was encouraging. She gave a brief review of the work in the various fields, and a concise report of the Board meeting held in Whitby. She also—as did others—expressed regret at the absence of Mrs. Watson, who had suffered severe affliction in the death of her husband, the Rev. Coverdale Watson.

Reports of Executive Committee, Corresponding Secretary and Mission Band Corresponding Secretary were received.

Mrs. Kaburagi (wife of the Japan missionary in Vancouver) gave a very nice address, telling of her conversion and her desires for those of her native land.

Mrs. Woodsworth, of Brandon (wife of the Superintendent of Missions for Manitoba, North-West and British Columbia), who was present, gave a brief but excellent account of the work of the Woman's Missionary Society in Manitoba.

Mrs. Root, of the Baptist Church, extended greetings, and the President responded. The day's session closed with a testimony meeting led by Mrs. David

Spencer, of Victoria.

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Tuesday was occupied with reports from Auxiliaries and committees.

The Branch Organizer's report showed that the work had consisted chiefly in correspondence with circuits and missions.

Treasurer's report showed an increase of about \$120.

Supply Committee's report proved that there was plenty of room for distribution within the borders of the Branch.

Report of Committee on Proportionate and Systematic Giving was brief,

Vancouver taking the lead.

Miss Bowes and Miss Morgan gave accounts of the work in connection with the Chinese Rescue Home and the Chinese. Several ladies expressed entire sympathy with, and approval of, the Rescue Home.

Miss Morgan has met with encouraging success in her visits in Chinatown. Miss Churchill, teacher of the Chinese Mission School, gave a paper on "The Greatest Problem of the Nineteenth Century, and Woman's Part in Solving it." It displayed much thought and originality.

As the Conference was in session, the Branch adjourned to the Conference room, and Mrs. Chapman very cleverly conveyed the greetings of the Branch, combined with those of the W.C.T.U. Several members of the Conference expressed the hearty sympathy of that body.

The committees on Memorials and Modes of Work occupied a good deal of time. The report from Committee on Modes of Work was ordered to be type-written and a copy placed on file, and copies sent to all Auxiliaries in

the Branch.

Wednesday morning was occupied with unfinished business, reports from

committees, etc.

Mrs. Bolton, of Port Simpson, gave a report of the work of the hospital and missionary labors at Simpson. Mrs. Raley gave a verbal report of the Kit-a-maat Home and other lines of work, and the Corresponding Secretary read reports from Coqualectza and Crosby Girls' Homes. All these were both interesting and encouraging.

The Committee on Memorials report contained various resolutions relating to the Constitution to be passed on to the Board. There were also various

memorials in regard to the Indian work sent to the Board.

The ordinary votes of thanks were passed and the President was requested to express in person the thanks of the Branch to Rev. Dr. Sutherland for his sermon on Sabbath evening.

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CONSTITUTION

OF THE

Woman's Missionary Society

OF

THE METHODIST CHURCH.

ART. I .- NAME.

This Association shall be called "The Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church."

ART. II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society shall be to engage the efforts of Christian women in the evangelization of heathen women and children; to aid in sustaining female missionaries and teachers, or other special laborers in connection with mission work, in foreign and home fields; and to raise funds for the work of the Society.

ART. III.—MEMBERSHIP.

The payment of one dollar annually, either at one time or in instalments, shall constitute membership; and twenty-five dollars given by one person at one time, or in instalments during the year, shall constitute a Life-membership.

ART. IV. - ORGANIZATION.

The organization of this Society shall consist of a Board of Managers, co-ordinate Branches, Auxiliary Societies and Mission Circles and Bands, to be constituted and limited as laid down in subsequent articles.

ART. V.-BOARD OF MANAGERS.

Section 1.—The management and general administration of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of the Officers of the Society, the Corresponding Secretary of each Branch, the Editor of department in *Outlook*, Secretary-Treasurer of the Literature and Publication Department, and delegates from

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each Branch in the proportion of one to every six hundred members, or major fraction thereof, which delegates, together with two alternates, shall be elected at the Branch Annual Meetings, said meetings to be held within two months before the meeting of the Board of Managers, except in the cases of the British Columbia and Manitoba and North-West Territories Branches. Branches numbering five hundred or less may send a delegate in case neither the President nor the Corresponding Secretary be able to attend. Said Board shall meet annually or oftener, at such time and place as it shall annually determine.

Sec. 2.—The Officers of the Board of Managers shall consist of a President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Field Corresponding Secretary, Home Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting of the Board, and also of the President of each Branch, who is by virtue of her office a Vice-President of the Board of Managers. Any vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Sec. 3.—The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Managers and its Executive Committee; she shall sign all cheques and all orders on the Treasurer, authorized by the Board of Managers or its Executive Committee; she shall call special meetings of the Executive Committee at the request of three of its members, of which not less than ten days' notice shall be given, except in cases of emergency. She is ex officio a member of all standing committees. Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in the absence of that officer. The Recording Secretary shall notify members of all meetings of the Board, and its Executive Committee, and shall keep a full record of the proceedings. She shall also have charge of Order Book, signing, with the President, all orders on the Treasurer. The Field Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society with all its missionaries, and with the Secretary of the General Society; shall prepare the monthly letters for publication. and present the report of the work in the mission stations to the Annual Meeting of the Board. The Home Corresponding Secretary shall attend to the correspondence with Branches, Auxiliaries and other organizations, and shall prepare the statistical report for the Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall receive all contributions to the Society, keeping proper books of account, and shall make such disposition of the funds as the Board of Managers or its Executive Committee may direct; and she shall present an audited statement to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 4.—To transact business during the year, the Officers of the Board of Managers, with the Corresponding Secretary of each Branch, shall ex officio form an Executive Committee, seven of whom shall be a quorum.

SEC. 5.—The duties of the Board of Managers shall be: (1) To

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take into consideration the interests and demands of the entire work of the Society, as presented in the reports of the Branch Corresponding Secretaries, the reports of the agents employed by the Society, and the estimates of the needs of mission fields; to ascertain the financial condition of the Society, to appropriate its funds, to devise the means for the carrying forward of the work to be undertaken by each; suggesting the amount to be raised, employing suitable missionaries, as the work may require, and designating their fields of labor.

(2) To appoint a committee to arrange for the publication of an Annual Report of the work of the Society. (3) To appoint an auditor for the Treasurer's books. (4) To transact any other business that the interests of the Society may demand, provided all the plans and the directions of the Board shall be in harmony with the provisions of the Constitution.

ART. VI.—BRANCHES.

Section 1.—Branches may be organized according to Conferences. This plan, however, may be changed by an affirmative vote of three fourths of the Board of Managers present at any Annual Meeting of the same.

SEC. 2.—The officers of each Branch of the Society shall consist of a President, three or more Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Mission Band Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and an Auditor, who shall be elected at the Branch Annual Meeting, and shall continue in office till others are elected. These, with the exception of Auditor, shall constitute an Executive Committee for the administration of the affairs of the Branch, five of whom shall be a quorum.

Sec. 3.—The President or one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside at all meetings of the Branch and of its Executive Committee. shall sign all drafts upon the treasury before they are paid. Recording Secretary shall notify all the meetings of the Branch, and of its Executive Committee, and shall keep a full record of the proceedings. The Corresponding Secretary shall, under the direction of the Executive Committee, conduct any official correspondence with the other Branches, with its Auxiliaries, hereinafter mentioned, and with the Secretary of the Board of Managers, and shall endeavor, by all practicable means, to form Auxiliary Societies within the prescribed territory of the Branch. It shall also be her duty to prepare for the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers a report of the work of the Branch during the year, for publication in their Annual Report. The Treasurer shall receive all contributions to the Branch, keeping proper books of account, and shall forward the money quarterly to the Treasurer of the Board of Managers.

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Thi Board notice of its An with the odist C SEC. 4.—The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the President and Secretary as often as may be necessary, to transact any business that may arise between the annual sessions of the Board.

SEC. 5.—No Branch shall project new work, or undertake the support of new missionaries, except by the direction or with the approval of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 6.—Each Branch may make its own by-laws, regulating its own meetings and those of its Executive Committee, also any others which may be deemed necessary to its efficiency, not inconsistent with this Constitution.

ART. VII.—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.

Any number of women contributing at least one dollar each annually may form a Society auxiliary to that Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society within whose prescribed limits they may reside, by appointing a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, and a Treasurer, who together shall constitute a local Executive Committee.

ART. VIII.—RELATION TO THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

Section 1.—This Society shall work in harmony with the authorities of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, and be subject to their approval, in the employment and remuneration of missionaries or other agents, the designation of fields of labor, and in the general plans and designs of the work.

SEC. 2.—All missionaries or other agents supported or aided by this Society shall be approved, before appointment, by the constituted authorities of the Methodist Church, and shall be subject to the same rules and regulations as other missionaries or agents of the said Church.

ART. IX.—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution may be changed at any Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers by a two-thirds vote of the members present, notice of such amendment having been given to each Branch before its Annual Meeting; but Art. VIII. shall not be changed, except with the concurrence of the General Board of Missions of the Methodist Church.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. Each session shall open and close with devotional exercises.

2. All resolutions to be discussed shall be presented in writing.

3. Delegates shall rise when they address the chair.

4. No member shall be granted leave of absence except by a vote of the entire body.

BY-LAWS.

1. The Corresponding Secretary of each Branch shall be required to furnish in her report, in schedule form, to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers, the following items:

List of Auxiliaries.

Number of Auxiliaries present year.

Number of Life-members present year.

Number of Mission Bands

Number of Mission Band Members.

A list of Life-members and Annual Members, and the report of the Branch Treasurer.

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Wedn 13 Also, to send to the Home Secretary immediately at the close of Branch meeting the names of delegates elected to the Board and the name of delegate appointed to the Nominating Committee.

2. The Recording Secretary of each Branch shall furnish a condensed account of their Annual Meeting, to be published in the

Report.

3. Each Branch Treasurer shall furnish the Corresponding Secretary of her Branch an annual report, in schedule form, of moneys received by her quarterly, and the sources of income.

4. The Mission Band Corresponding Secretary of each Branch shall send a notice of the Branch meeting to Mission Circles, Bands

and Epworth Leagues entitled to representation.

5. Branch Corresponding Secretaries shall meet an hour before the Board meeting to classify memorials, record the findings of

Branches and report to the Board.

6. In the election of delegates to the General Board a majority vote is required. After election these delegates shall meet and appoint one of their number as a member of the Nominating Committee, said committee to meet one hour previous to the opening session of the Board.

7. The names of, and amounts given by, contributors to special purposes shall be printed in a separate column of the Annual Report.

8. No appeals for funds to be applied to special objects shall be made to our Auxiliaries, Circles or Bands, except such as have been approved of by this Board or its Executive Committee; and all funds must be forwarded to the Branch and Board Treasurers.

9. There shall be a Supply Committee consisting of four members appointed at the Annual Board Meeting, who shall have charge of all supplies of clothing, bedding, etc., contributed by the Auxiliaries and Young People's Societies, and who shall direct as to their destination. To avoid confusion, Auxiliaries, etc., must correspond with the Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee before sending goods to the Supply Committee or elsewhere.

10. There shall be a Literature and Publication Committee consisting of not more than seven members, resident in Toronto, who, with the Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee, shall be appointed by the Board. Orders for Annual Reports, *Monthly Letters* and Leaflets should be sent to the Literature Committee, Room 20, Wesley

Buildings, Toronto, the money to accompany each order.

11. The Annual Meeting of the Board shall be held in the third week of October, leaving power with the President and Corresponding Secretary to postpone to the fourth if necessary.

12. Regular meetings of the Executive shall be held the third

Wednesday in January and third Wednesday in April.

13. All expenses of the Annual Meetings of the Board and of

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meetings of the Executive, including all necessary travelling expenses, shall be paid from the General Fund.

14. All money received from legacies shall be used for special purposes, unless the object for which it is to be used be specified by

the donor.

15. The printed or prepared forms issued by the Board shall be used in all homes, refuges, schools, etc., supported or aided by the W. M. S., in order that proper returns may be made of the number, names, days' stay, age, sex, etc., of inmates, sources of income, and expenditure of the same, in detail, so that the cost of such institutions may be ascertained in order to have a basis on which grants may be made from the aforesaid Society to support such institutions, these reports to be sent to the Field Corresponding Secretary in time to reach her not later than the 1st of October of each year.

16. The General Treasurer's books shall be closed October 9th, for the purpose of auditing. A statement of money received shall be

published each quarter in the Outlook.

17. Certificates of Membership may be granted to members of any Auxiliary who may be changing their place of residence, which shall constitute them members of the Auxiliary in the place to which they remove.

18. It shall be the duty of the Associate Editor of the Outlook to publish articles relating to our own work; and also to select and publish items of interest concerning the work and modes of working of the Woman's Missionary Societies of other denominations.

19. Auxiliaries shall send the reports of their work which they wish published, to the Branch Recording Secretary, who shall pre-

pare a summary for the Outlook.

20. Any Branch may arrange for representation, by proxy, from the Branch within whose limits the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers may, from time to time, be held.

21. All memorials and resolutions forwarded to the Board of

Managers of this Society shall be officially signed and dated.

22. All funds of this Society in the hands of the General Treasurer shall be deposited in a chartered bank designated by the Board of All funds of this Society in the hands of Branch Treasurers shall be deposited in chartered banks to be designated by such Branch. This rule shall apply to Auxiliaries and Mission Circles and Bands when possible.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED AT ANNUAL MEETINGS.

That every By-law and Resolution that governs our Board, Branches, Auxiliaries, Circles, Bands, Committees or Agents, be each year revised to date by the Editing Committee of the Annual Report, and pr at the

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T dents to be at th and printed in every year's report, and that this resolution be placed at the head of the revised By-laws and Resolutions.

That the members be requested to remember this Society in prayer

between the hours of five and six each Sabbath.

That when any change of Constitution is requested, notice of such change shall be sent to the Home Corresponding Secretary, who shall notify each Branch before its annual meeting. The notice shall also be published in the *Outlook* as soon as practicable.

That as it is desirable that the Annual Report be printed in November, all matter for the Report, except the Minutes of the Board Meeting, shall be forwarded to the Editing Committee im-

mediately after the Branch Meetings.

That our public meetings be guarded against anything which might tend to foster a love for the dramatic, and that we use our influence against the introduction of any methods of raising money on which we cannot conscientiously ask God's blessing.

CONSTITUTION FOR AN AUXILIARY.

ART. I.—NAME.

ART. II.—OBJECT.

Its object shall be to aid the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church in its work of engaging the efforts of Christian women in the evangelization of heathen women and children; to assist in sustaining female missionaries and teachers, or other special laborers, in foreign or home fields; and to raise funds for the work of this Society.

ART. III.—MEMBERSHIP.

Any person paying annually the sum of One Dollar, at one time or in instalments, to the funds of this Society, shall be deemed a member, and as such shall be entitled to be present at the Annual Meeting of the Society, and vote at the election of Officers. Twenty-five Dollars given by one person at one time, or in instalments during the year, shall constitute a Life-membership.

ART. IV .- OFFICERS.

The Officers shall consist of a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, to be elected by ballot without nomination from among the members, at the Annual Meeting.

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ART. V.—COMMITTEE.

The Officers shall constitute an Executive Committee, who shall conduct the affairs of the Auxiliary during the year.

ART. VI.—ANNUAL MEETING.

An Annual Meeting shall be held in the month of September, at which the reports of the Secretary and Treasurer shall be presented, an abstract of which is to be forwarded immediately to the Secretary of that Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society to which the Auxiliary belongs; Officers, Auditor and Committee elected for the ensuing year, and such services held as may tend to promote the objects of the Society.

ART. VII.—APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS.

After meeting necessary local expenses, the funds raised by the Auxiliary shall be transmitted quarterly to the Branch Treasurer, to be applied to the support of such part of the work as the Board of Managers may indicate.

Note.—Any Auxiliary having a preference for any special department of the work is at liberty to designate it.

BY-LAWS FOR AUXILIARIES.

1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all the meetings of the Society, and to supervise its general interests. She shall call special meetings upon the request of three members, and shall be ex officio a member of all standing committees. She shall sign all orders upon the treasury before they are paid.

2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents to perform the duties of the President in the absence of that officer, and to aid in devising means for the efficiency of the Society.

3. The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair record of the proceedings at all meetings of the Society or Committee, and give proper notice of all special and stated meetings.

4. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to report quarterly to the Corresponding Secretary of the Branch the amount sent to the Branch Treasurer for the quarter, and any other items indicating the state of the Society. She shall, in connection with the Recording Secretary, prepare the Annual Report.

5. The Treasurer shall receive, hold and keep an account of all money given to the Auxiliary, and shall transmit the same quarterly to the Branch Treasurer, not later than the 20th of the month.

6. Meetings of the Society for prayer and business shall be held ——of each month. Once a quarter, if practicable, a public meet-

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ing shall be held, in which reports shall be read, addresses given, and every effort made to increase general missionary intelligence and zeal, as well as earnestness in the special work of the Society.

7. There shall be a standing committee of three or more to provide literary exercises of a missionary character for monthly and quarterly meetings, one of whom shall drop out each month, and another be elected to take her place.

8. If an office becomes vacant by death, resignation, or removal, it must be filled by the appointment of the Executive Committee, until the next Annual Meeting.

9. Each member shall try to induce others to become members, and shall do what she can to add to the general interest, remembering in prayer daily the Society, its workers, missionaries, orphans, or other objects of special interest.

10. At the Annual Meeting of each Auxiliary in September, or such other meeting as may be most convenient, delegates to the Branch Annual Meeting shall be elected by ballot without nomination in the proportion of one for every Auxiliary numbering under fifty, and two for every Auxiliary numbering fifty or more, a majority vote being required.

11. A member shall be appointed in each Auxiliary to obtain subscribers for the *Outlook*.

12. Membership fees must be forwarded in full to the Branch Treasurer. Local expenses must be met out of other funds.

Note.—Local expenses mean stationery and postage for officers and books necessary for transaction of business.

13. The names of life-members shall be printed where they reside.

14. The last Wednesday in September shall be observed throughout our entire membership as a day of special prayer for God's blessing on the approaching Annual Branch and Board meetings.

15. Auxiliaries shall be responsible for the presentation of the work of the Woman's Missionary Society to the Epworth Leagues once a year.

CONSTITUTION FOR MISSION CIRCLES AND BANDS.

1. An Association of young people, banded together to aid the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, shall be called a Mission Circle or Band, auxiliary to the Missionary Society of the Church in which it is found, or to the Branch in whose territory it is.

2. The object of Mission Circles and Bands shall be, primarily, to develop a missionary spirit, and secondarily, to raise funds to

send the Gospel to the heathen.

3. Anyone may become a member of the Mission Circle by the annual payment of twenty-five cents, and may become a life-member thereof by the payment of five dollars, and her name be printed in the Annual Report. Annual membership for Bands or Junior Members may be ten cents.

4. The Officers of a Mission Circle or Band shall be President, Vice-President, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries and Treasurer, and a committee to arrange the best methods of work; these and

an Auditor shall be elected annually.

5. The duty of the President shall be to preside at all stated meetings, and to have a general oversight of the work of the Circle or

6. The duty of the Secretary shall be to keep a record of the proceedings of the Circle or Band, and to make quarterly and annual reports to the Mission Band Corresponding Secretary of the Branch in whose bounds it is.

7. The Treasurer shall receive and hold all funds, paying the same quarterly to the Treasurer of the Auxiliary in which the Circle or Band is formed. Where there is no Auxiliary she shall remit to the Branch Treasurer.

8. Each Mission Band may select an appropriate name not already in use, and shall report the same to the Branch Mission Band

Corresponding Secretary.

9. Any Mission Circle or Band numbering forty members or over, or contributing \$25.00 to the Woman's Missionary Society, shall be entitled to send one delegate to the Branch Annual Meeting, but she shall not be eligible to any office in the Branch, or election to the Board of Managers, except she be a member of an Auxiliary.

10. Any Epworth League numbering forty members or over, and contributing \$25.00 to the funds of the W. M. S. shall be entitled to send one delegate to the Branch Annual Meeting, but she shall not be eligible to any office in the Branch, or election to the Board of Managers, except she be a member of an Auxiliary.

11. Where there are two Mission Circles or Bands, neither having a large enough membership to be entitled to send a delegate to the

Branch meeting, they may unitedly send one delegate.

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QUESTIONS TO MISSIONARY CANDIDATES.

1. Do you believe that you are moved by the Holy Spirit to take upon you the work of a missionary?

2. Do you desire and intend to make this your life-work, and are you willing to labor in any field?

3. Have you an experimental knowledge of salvation through the atonement of Jesus Christ our Lord?

4. Have you an earnest desire to win souls for Christ, and how has this desire been manifested?

5. Do you believe in the doctrines of the Methodist Church, as set forth in the Book of Discipline of said Church?

6. Have you any knowledge of the aims, constitution, methods and work of the Woman's Missionary Society?

7. Have you a good English education? have you a certificate? If so, what grade.

8. Have you studied Latin or any modern language; to what extent? did you readily acquire the same?

9. In what schools have you taught?

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10. Have you a knowledge of music? vocal or instrumental?

11. Have you any proficiency in domestic lines, or aptitude therefor?

12. What is the condition of your health?

13. Are you engaged to be married?

14. Have you ever been married? If so, is your husband living?

REQUIREMENTS OF MISSIONARY CANDIDATES.

1. A missionary candidate must believe herself divinely called to the work of a foreign missionary, and assert her belief that she is actuated only by a desire to work in accordance with God's will.

2. She must here indicate her ability to work in a foreign field by Christian usefulness at home.

3. She must declare her intention to make foreign missionary work the service of her effective years, and agree to give at least five of these years of continuous service, as a single woman, to the work of the Woman's Missionary Society, unless prevented by ill health; she must also assert her willingness to labor in any field, though her preference is always to be taken into account.

4. She must furnish satisfactory testimonials in regard to scholarship; some experience in teaching and a knowledge of medicine and nursing are desirable qualifications. 5. She must present a certificate of health from a competent physician, and give satisfactory answers to medical questions.

6. The age of a candidate must not be less than twenty-five years nor more than thirty. A thorough intellectual training, with a facility in acquiring languages, and a remarkable ability for Christian work, may be considered as a sufficient reason for deviation from this rule.

7. Financial and executive ability, and power of adaptation to

circumstances are essential qualifications.

- 8. Missionary candidates shall be recommended by the Branch in which they reside, before their testimonials are considered by the Board or its Executive. There shall be a personal interview with at least two members of the Executive of the Board before final acceptance.
- 9. Each missionary candidate shall be required to attend a Methodist Training Home such time as the Executive Committee shall specify, taking up the course required in theology and actively engaging in Christian work, as directed by the Superintendent of the Home, the expenses of such training to be borne by the Society when necessary.

Note.—In exceptional cases the Executive shall have power to suspend this rule.

10. Each missionary candidate shall pass a theological examination in the following course prescribed by the Board:

COURSE OF STUDY.

1. Doctrines.

- (a) Manual of Methodist Doctrines (Galbraith).

11. After the adoption of a missionary candidate, she shall be regarded as under the direction of the General Executive Committee.

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INSTRUCTIONS TO MISSIONARIES.

1. The missionaries sent out by the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church to any foreign field, when not less than five in number, shall constitute a Mission Council, with powers and duties as hereinafter defined. When there are less than five missionaries in the field they may act as a committee to make recommendations but shall not possess the powers of a Council. The Council shall be subject to such regulations as the Board of Managers of the Woman's Missionary Society may from time to time adopt. The Council shall have authority:

(a) To elect a Secretary who shall keep a true record of the proceedings and decisions of the Council. It shall be her duty to forward to the Board or its officers, all resolutions, memorials, recommendations or other official action of the Council or its Executive, and all official communications intended for the consideration of the Board or its Executive, except such as pertain to the Treasurer's Department as hereinafter defined. The Treasurer appointed by the

Board shall be the Chairman of the Council.

(b) To appoint an Executive Committee to deal with any matters

that may arise in the intervals of Council meetings.

(c) To designate the particular field of each foreign missionary and to appoint or reappoint her thereto; the department of work (whether educational, evangelistic or the like) to be designated by the Board.

(d) The Council shall meet in joint session at least once in the year with the Council of the General Board of Missions for consultation on matters of common interest with the view of promoting harmony and co-operation between the agents of the two societies in the prosecution of their work. If any question arises in regard to which a majority of either Council cannot agree, it may be referred to the Home Boards for final decision, subject to the provisions of paragraph 370, sub-section 2, of the Discipline of 1894. The Executives of the two Councils shall meet in joint session when deemed necessary. A copy of the minutes of all sessions of the Council and Executive, whether joint or otherwise, shall be forwarded promptly to the Field Corresponding Secretary.

(e) The Council shall prepare and forward to the Board of Managers at least annually, a full report of the work, and any recommendations touching the same, which the Council deems it expedient

to make.

2. Missionaries shall incur no expense to be met by the Society for which estimates have not previously been submitted to, and approved of, by the Board of Managers, or by its Executive Committee.

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all be ittee. 3. They shall credit to the Society all donations received for the support of their work, and annually report the same with their financial statements.

4. All solicitations for funds for special work must be made through the proper official authorities, and missionaries are requested

not to apply to private sources for aid for their work.

5. A medical missionary shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and disbursements. Such receipts may be used for necessary expenses in her medical work, and any surplus shall be credited to the Woman's Missionary Society, and her medical outfit shall be the

property of the same.

6. We recommend that, when practicable, such arrangements be made for the duties of our missionaries to foreign fields during their first year's service, as shall allow them considerable time for the study of the language, and that their salary for that year shall be two-thirds of the fixed salary. Medical missionaries shall, from the first, receive full salary.

7. Missionaries to foreign fields shall be allowed one hundred dollars (\$100) for personal outfit, and \$100 for house furnishings, when considered necessary by the furnishing committee on the field—the latter to be the property of the Woman's Missionary Society. Missionaries to home fields shall be allowed fifty dollars for personal

outfit, said sum to be considered part of first year's salary.

8. If there prove manifest unfitness for missionary work, the Board of Managers or its Executive Committee may cancel its obligations to a missionary whom it has appointed, three months' notice having been given to such appointee by the Board or its Executive; necessary return expenses to be paid by the Society, provided she

return at the expiration of the three months.

9. A missionary desiring to return home from any other cause than ill health, must secure permission from the Board of Managers or its Executive Committee, otherwise her expenses cannot be allowed. In case of ill health requiring her immediate return, she shall bring a certificate to that effect from a physician and the lady missionary in charge, and shall be entitled to one-half salary for that year. If it be necessary for her to remain at home longer than one year, arrangements must be made by the Board or its Executive.

10. Each returned missionary on furlough shall be expected to attend the first session of the Board of Managers after her return. Her travelling expenses to and from the place of meeting shall be

paid by the Society, unless otherwise provided for.

11. Returned missionaries are directly under the control of the Board and its Executive, and it is strongly recommended that they address no public meetings during the first three months. If health permit they may attend a limited number during the following six months at the discretion of the Executive, the last three months to be given up to rest and preparation for return.

12. Missionaries on the field are required to send annual and quarterly reports to the Field Corresponding Secretary, and the action of the Board of Managers or its Executive Committee will be communicated to them through that Secretary, and no other instructions are to be considered as official.

13. The Treasurers in the mission fields, both home and foreign, are instructed to forward receipts for remittances to Treasurer, and a statement of balance on hand with the number of pupils in residence, quarterly to the Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, and a full statement annually, properly signed and audited, in time to insure its arriving before the first of October of each year.

14. All Mission Treasurers shall forward their estimates, properly approved, to the Corresponding Secretary in time to insure their

arriving on or before the first of October of each year.

15. Missionaries shall not exceed in expenditure the amount appropriated by the Board of Managers. Emergencies arising during the year can be met only by application to the Executive Committee.

16. If any money be not required for the object for which it was appropriated, it may be used for any other purpose which the Mission Council may recommend and the Board or its Executive approve, and any surplus funds from native sources may be used under the direction of the Mission Council. If any surplus funds remain in the mission treasuries from unused appropriations, exchange, or any other source, they must be reported in the annual statement.

17. Each missionary must report to the Field Corresponding Secretary the date of her arrival on the mission field to which she has been appointed; her salary begins that day and all allowance for travelling expenses ceases. A detailed statement of her travelling expenses and the balance in hand, must be handed to the Treasurer of

her specific field, taking a receipt therefor.

18. The furlough for missionaries sent out under the direction and control of the Board of the Woman's Missionary Society, shall be for one year, with travelling expenses home and \$300 salary.

19. Where there is an Advisory Committee in connection with a mission field or home, the matron or missionary in charge shall consult it in all matters pertaining to the efficiency of the work under her care. The annual and quarterly statements shall be submitted to said Committee for its approval, and the estimates for the coming year shall receive its endorsation, being signed by the Secretary of said Committee, as well as by the Treasurer of that specific mission field or home.

20. The Secretary of each mission field or home must send to the Home Corresponding Secretary of the Board a yearly list of Biblewomen, supported students and orphans in October, after the open-

ing of the schools.

21. Each mission is a little community in which the will of the majority should rule. Each member of it should do her utmost to

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promote its peace and unity, and to submit gracefully and not merely because she cannot prevail. She should keep herself well informed as to the work and policy of her associates, in order that her estimate of their needs and rights may be fair and comprehensive, and that of her own just and unselfish. In the possible case of a decision which she may think unfair, she has always the right of an appeal to the Board of Managers, but her strength will be in that "charity that thinketh no evil, which suffereth long and is kind," and in quiet waiting upon Him who makes "all things work together for good to them that love him."

Every missionary candidate shall be required to sign the following contract:

I agree to conform to the above requirements and conditions while in the employment of the Woman's Missionary Society, and, failing in this, to refund the amount of my outfit and passage-money.

FORM OF A BEQUEST

TO THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, CANADA.

GIVE, devise and bequeath to The Methodist Church the dollars out of my pure sum of personalty (if the bequest is to be real estate instead of or as well as personal property, the bequest should read as follows: Also the following lands and premises situate, lying and being [describing the property as accurately as possible, to be held or disposed of by the said Methodist Church, and the proceeds) to be paid, expended, and applied by the said Methodist Church for the benefit of the Woman's Missionary Society according to the Constitution and rules of the said Woman's Missionary Society as sanctioned by the General Conference of the said Methodist Church, and for the support of the different Mission Stations of the said Woman's Missionary Society, or any of them, or for the aid and support of the (fill in the name of the Mission for which preference is had—for instance, the Japan Mission, the French Missions, or otherwise as the case may be) Missions of said Society, and the receipt or receipts of the Treasurer or Treasurers of the said Woman's Missionary Society, for the time being, shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors, and the published Report of the Board of Managers of the said Society, containing the appointment of such Treasurer or Treasurers, shall be sufficient evidence of the authority upon which the said Treasurer or Treasurers may demand payment of the said bequest.
