SPREADING KNOWLEDGE OF CANADA THROUGHOUT THE BRITISH EMPIRE

A. J. Dawson, an English Newspaper Man Now in the Dominion, Tells the Montreal Canadian Club of His Mission Here --- Canada's Place in the Imperial Family.

A. J. Dawson, an English newspaper man of good repute who has made frequent visits to Canada and who is now in this country arranging for the establishment of a Canadian supplement of the London Daily Standard by which Canadian news will be disseminated throughout Britain was the guest of the Montreal Canadian Club at its luncheon on Tuesday.

"On Friday February 21st. I ate my breakfast in London and London No. 1 should say since a Toronto friend of mine tells me that THE London is situated in the province of Ontario. On the following day I lunched in Montreal and dined in the House of Commons in Ottawa. This may sound to you like mere gastronomy or indigestion, but I would ask you to consider that it really has more serious significance."

"Today, a man may leave Great Britain's house of parliament, at a given time, and be in the chamber of Great Britain's houses of parliament a week later. I don't know whether or not there are other ways of covering the same journey in the same time, but I do know that Canada herself, by means of her magnificent passenger lines, and railways, enables one to do this sort of thing with ease."

"Perhaps some of you gentlemen may remember that a number of old country newspapers have been merged into a few new ones. It is among these newspapers that I find the Dominion. This is a very important fact in the history of the Dominion."

"No, the thing which made absolutely first the steady solidity of Canada's nationhood, the strength of our national spirit, the personality of our people, it is the fact that we are a British people. "This independent newspaper opposed the Robinson government for its weakness and its neglect of public interests. Should the new government in this respect tread in the footsteps of the old, the Telegraph would not hesitate to condemn it and its leaders. The public interest must always be of far more importance than any party creed or allegiance."

The Sun quotes this statement of the Telegraph and declares that it is "tommyrot." This indicates that the Sun is still reluctant to believe that a better era has dawned in New Brunswick politics, and that it still regards the partisan or mercenary appeal as all-powerful or mercurial.

It is stated that the Sun's bill to the government party executive for services rendered during the recent campaign was so high that the gentlemen gaped with amazement when it was presented to them. Naturally that journal would cheer at another which professed a regard for the public interest rather than the spoils of war.

And yet, if the defeat of the Robinson government does not mean the beginning of an era of more honest and business-like administration in this province, the campaign was a useless and foolish waste of energy. As the Times has before observed, one of the results of laxity of political principles for twenty-five years past has been the growth of a spirit of cynical disbelief in the honesty or good intentions of any man who is in politics.

ONCE DANCED IN THE STREETS; NOW THE BRIDE OF A SULTAN

Marriage of Maharajah of Kapurthala and Anita Delgado Reveals Strange Romance.

PARIS, March 5--The marriage in India of the immensely rich and powerful Maharajah of Kapurthala and Anita Delgado reveals a remarkable romance. The young woman, who is now a Sultana, was born in Malaga, Spain, to the poorest of the poor. Her parents made the scantiest ideal of a living by keeping a hot steam-trail the streets.

While they were still little tots Anita and her sister Victoria learned to dance to the music of barrel organs and strolling players. When Anita was twelve years old her family moved to Madrid.
One night in a third-class restaurant she met a young man of aristocratic appearance and dash that the proprietor stopped them. Soon they made the restaurant famous. They had several admirers and better engagements followed.

The Maharajah went to Madrid to attend the marriage of King Alfonso, and in eight days he had seen Anita and the dances and fell in love with Anita. He showed presents upon the offer and offered to take the dancing girl to India.
He went to Anita's father to make arrangements for the betrothal. Not understanding the position of the sultan, the father of the girl became furious and threatened to kill the Maharajah unless he promised to marry his daughter. This arrangement was made. The Maharajah received \$30,000.

Anita was brought to Paris for educational purposes and has just been performed with magnificent Oriental pomp. The news of the Maharajah's marriage to a young Spanish dancer, the daughter of a street boy, has caused a sensation of a shock. He had been patronized by the handsome, the most fashionable and the most aristocratic of the world, the French, English and American society, who believed they had raised the Indian potentate's condition to a high level. They naturally expected that if he were going to choose a European wife, that he would select one from the "upper set."

The Maharajah's entertainments at the Ritz and the Casino de la Ville, at the Carlton and Raleigh, in London, were marked by true Oriental magnificence. He has vast wealth, and soon has become a monetary social lion in the centres of civilization a man is appraised strictly in the "best" circles by the amount of money he is prepared to spend on his "pursuits."

Now he is lost to the class that lives to be fed and otherwise provided for by rich people, and although they had no objection to associating with an Indian Rajah with an entirely different social and civilization from theirs, regarding women as mere chattels, they could not think of meeting an ex-dancer of the fandangos, Spanish and Chinese, who had been married to an American millionaire. But the Maharajah has decidedly got the side of the two whether as a beauty or as a dancer.

WHAT RIDEAU HALL COSTS

Canada Spends \$40,000 Annually to Maintain Governor General's Official Residence

Ottawa, March 5--Brigadier General Otter has declined the offer of the imperial war office to take command of the Fifth Infantry Brigade at Aldershot from May next, and will instead come to headquarters staff at Ottawa where his ability and experience in military matters will be made adequately available for the benefit of the militia of Canada.
A return, tabled in the common house, gives the figures showing the expense of maintaining the Governor General's official residence, Rideau Hall, since 1892. Since 1892 the total cost of maintenance of Rideau Hall has been \$670,541. For the first eight months of the present fiscal year the cost was \$27,455. During that period his excellency drew, in salary, \$24,444 and for travelling expenses \$2,000. For nine months of the last fiscal year his travelling expenses were \$3,750.

Major General Lake's term of command in Canada as chief of staff expires in November next. During his term of position he has inaugurated many reforms in connection with militia service to the detriment of the militia force in the Dominion. It is understood that for the last six months of his time in this country General Lake will be given the position of Inspector General with a view to his making a thorough inspection of all military units in the service, offering criticisms as to defects in carrying out of the system he has established, and making suggestions of possible improvements. The position of Inspector General is now vacant owing to the death of Brigadier General Tisdal. General Otter will, according to the proposed plan, become chief of staff in succession of Major General Lake, thus reducing what has been contemplated, the appointment of a Canadian to the chief command of the militia force in the Dominion.

The militia department is now devising ways and means for the mobilization of troops at Quebec, best summer resort, and other arrangements can be satisfactorily arranged 18,000 men will be equipped for a week or so on the Plains of Abraham. It is not to be ever, but found necessary to cut the number to 12,000 but in any event the Canadian army assembled at Quebec will be the most imposing ever seen in the country during the last 100 years of peace.


